



NOT. AUSTRALIAN COMMAND DEPOT.

Strength. 1. The Strength of the Depot on the 31st May was 117
Officers and 2565 Other Ranks. The Number actually in Camp
being 113 Officers and 2147 Other Ranks; the difference being
made up by those on Leave of Absence, and those in Hospital.
The Number Marching-In for the period was 906 and those Marching Out 1411. (Analysis of the Figures attached.)

Health. 2. The general health of the Troops was good.

Oversea Requirements.

quirements. 3. The "Speeding-up" Process, and altered Methods of Training have proved beneficial; despite the depleted number of
men, the number of "A" Class evacuated to the Overseas Eraining Brigade was 1073.

Visits.

4. On the 2nd instant the G.O.C.inechief, Southern Command, General Sir H.Slater, G.C.B. inspected the Training carried on at the Depot, and visited the Cook-houses and saw the men at their mid-day meal, (where the benefit of the Self-Help System was demonstrated,) and the S.M.O.S. Department.

Afterwards the General and his Staff remained for Lunch with the Commandant.

On the 7th instant the G.O.C., A.I.F. Depots in the U.K. Major-General the Hon.Sir J.W.McCay, K.C.M.G., V.B., V.D. visited the Depot, and inspected the Mens' Cook-houses, Huts, Bootmaker's and Tailor's Shops, and on the 20th instant the Detention Compound was inspected.

On the 23rd instant His Grace the Duke of Somerset, accompanied by the Duchess, and their Suite, visited the Depot being shown the various Messing Departments, and afterwards taking lunch at the Depot Headquarters Mess.

On the 29th instant the G.O.C. A.I.F.Depots in the U.K. Maj-Gen. The Hon. Sir J.W.McCay, K.C.M.G. etc., together with Major-General Featherstone, A.A.M.C. and Surgeon-General N.R.Howse, V.C. A.A.M.C. and Mr Manifold, M.H.R.visited the Depot and made an inspection of the Detention Compound, Mens' Dining Hall, Messing Officer's Department and Group Clearing Hospital.

Administration. 5. Major A.N. Aitken, 13th Light Horse, A.I.F. reported from Weymouth for Duty, and has taken over the Command of the Right Wing.

The Commandant, Lieut-Col.W.O.Mansbridge, D.S.O. was detailed as President of a General Court Martial at Salisbury on the 24th instant, A.I.F.Order No.4886.

Re-organisation.6. On the 29th instant the re-organisation of the Depot was put into force. The present system provides that no matter what the man's Medical or Dental Category he still remains in the same Company and under the same Commander until he marches out of the Depot. Previously a man was transferred from one Platoon, or Company, as he was raised or logred in Medical or Dental Category. It is hoped that under the new scheme the working staff of the Depot will be reduced.

Messing. 7. / During the Month 204381 Meals were served to 66238 Men. The daily meat ration which had previously been reduced from 12 to 10 ounces per man was further reduced to 8 ounces on the 1st May. Nevertheless this reduction was compensated to a degree by an increase in the cash allowance from Five-pence-half-penny to Six-pence-half-penny. The first Kill of the Seven Pigs raised in the Depot took place. A total of 1400 Meals of Fresh Pork was served to the Men thus relieving the Commissariat Department from supplying that number of rations. A further experiment is being conducted in the breeding of Rabbits for consumption.

" The Aussies ", the Depot Concert Party, visited Weston Concert Parties. super-Mare and Newport giving performances in aid of the G.O.C's Fund, raising £70 approximately by this means.

9. The Depot Band proceeded to London to perform at the Band. Australian Battle Picture and Photographic Display at the Grafton Galleries. During the month on Saturday afternoons and Sundays, they have given selections at Warminster at the various Y.M.C.A's in the district for the benefit of the men.

Red Crosslo. This Society has established a Bulk Store in No. 9 Camp Society. with one of their Officers in Charge. This will greatly facilitate the distribution of comforts to the Hospitals in the area.

Recreation. 11. From Regimental Funds 6 Concert Parties were engaged, and their efforts greatly appreciated by the men. Four Evenings were set aside for Boxing Contests. These entertainments do not include the Concerts and Lectures arranged by the Y.M.C.A. A keen interest is taken in the Boxing as the competitors are drawn from the Australian Training Units and the Imperial Troops in the area.

Cultivation. 12. A Motor Tractor was engaged to complete the ploughing of land for Potato Planting.

Herewith please find summary of work carried out by these Departments during month ending May 31st, 1918. The total figures for - marching in and out show an increase of 86 in the Marching In for April, 1918, and a decrease of 335 in the Marching Out for the same period, viz., 1610 and 1746 respectively for April, and 1696 and 1411 for May, 1918.

Approximately 415 full fare railway warrants were issued for the month, against 330 for April, 1918, 1130 leave passes, 1675 road passes, and 60 duty passes, against 1350, 1720, and 60 for previous month.

The general health of the Depot during the past month has been good and production has equalled the number of men marching in. The total number of men raised to A3 class and marched out to Overseas Training Brigade being 1030.

The number of men evacuated to Hospital has been 200 with general diseases, mostly of minor character. There was a slight increase in the number of Influenza cases being admitted to Group Clearing Hospital at the onset of the hot weather but they have again sunk to normal, and nothing else of an epidemic nature has occured.

The number of men sent to Bulford with Gonorrhoea after early

treatment has shown a decided diminution.

The Group Clearing Hospital has maintained a daily average of 135 and on one occasion rose to 178 for one day. The increase has been effected by obtaining more accommodation for patients by putting the


personnel under canvas.

"The Carrier" Centre has now been entirely cleared of C.S.M. cases at present there being only one Diphtheria carrier in the compound. "On account of these huts being released I have turned the Centre into an isolation Centre for contacts of Mumps and Measles cases occuring innthe lines, thus effecting a much more complete and effective isolation than when it was carried out in the lines themselves. One Hut in the Carrier Centre has been fitted up as a Ward for Detention cases of a mild nature occuring in the Area, the Guard, when required, being obtained from No.1 Command Depot.

The samitation of the Camp has been on the whole satisfactory, and the daily inspection of the Guard Hut by a Medical Officer has been properly carried out with the result that it is now in a clean condition.
