WAR DIARY FOR JULY 1918

STRENGTH

1. On the 31st July the strength of the Depot was 127 Officers and 3770 Other Ranks. The actual Number in Camp was 119 Officers and 3313 O/Ranks. The difference being accounted for by - those on Leave, Absent, and in Hospital.

The Numbers marching in are 2414, and those Marching Out 1479 for the period.

HEALTH

a. Medical. 2. The Health of the Depot is satisfactory. The Influenza Epidemic is definitely at an end. The admissions and discharges to the Group Clearing Hospital are again Normal.

b. Dental

For the month under review 1484 men were made "Dentally Fit".

MESSING

3. During the period under review 23,645 Meals were served to 78,215 men. Supplies generally were good. The recovery of fats for War purposes from meat drawn is again satisfactory, although showing a slight decrease on that for last month i.e. June 16.9%

The Store Pigs are making satisfactory weight. Some 500 chickens have been incubated and are putting on feathers fast. These will be a welcome addition for the Christmas Dinner.

The Vegetable Cleaning Machine is now installed and is no appreciable extra demand on the engine. By means of this the labour of 6 fatigue men daily is cut out, and the consumption of water is reduced 75%.

4. The cutting of Meadow Hay is now finished; four healthy Ricks have resulted from this, estimated at 100 tons.

The Potato Crop, which is now being gathered, promises a good yield.

REPORT ON TRAINING. JULY. 1918.

Owing to the inclement state of the weather during July the Training was not as satisfactory as could be desired. There is no provosoon, whatever, made for wet weather training in t is Depot and I would suggest that Headquarters be again approached re provision of suitable shelter sheds especially as winter will soon be here.

Squads were put in the Rifle Ranges (miniature), in empty huts, and wherever shelter was available. This meant over-crowding, and improper supervision as squads were scattered over four camps.

There was a daily average of 944 Bla categories undergoing training

Shooting for BlA3 and BlA4 categories in the Miniature Rifle Ranges commenced on 14.7.18 and 18,000 rounds were fired. I would suggest that this work be extended to all BlA Categories and that the period for shooting be extended to 11.45.a.m. 8 of the Rifles have minor defects such as Broken Strikers, Broken Retaining Springs, Cap of Backsight loose. It is impossible to have the parts replaced in the Depot.

A small supply of tacks, crayons, etc., is necessary. Perhaps these could be purchased from Regimental Funds.

Material for Games. There is a big deficiency of material for games, especially "Soccer" and Medicine Balls. As many as possible of these are required. I have been told that there were a number of Medicine Balls stored at Fovant. If these could be procured they would greatly assist in the efficiency of the Training; or perhaps arrangements could be made for a supply from the Red Cross and Comforts Funds Committee. Repair outfits are necessary to mend punctures in bladders, and sets of about 20 coloured Bands to be worn over the shoulder to distinguish men in team games are necessary.

MONTHLY REPORT.

The health of the Depot for the month of July has, on the whole, been satisfactory. The influenza epidemic seems to be definitely at an end, as is shown by the following figures which are the monthly admissions to the Group Clearing Hospital. w/e 7.7.18 27 cases admitted, w/e 14.7.18 11 cases admitted, w/e 21.7.18, 9 cases admitted and w/e 28.7.18 3 cases admitted. Since the 27th inst., to end of month only 2 cases were admitted.

On 9.7.18 there was an outbreak of dysentery in the Depot. The men were all isolated in Group Clearing Hospital until a bacteriological diagnosis was obtained, when they were all transferred to Sutton Veny Military Hospital. In all there were 21 cases and the infection of all of them apparently occurred on the same day and all came from No. 7 Camp. A suspected carrier was found in the cookhouse of this camp and he was sent to Sutton Veny Hospital for bacteriological diagnosis. Herewith report of Bacteriologist Sutton Veny Hospital.

This man's stools have been examined on three occasions for dysentery, all negative. He is at present obstinately constipated but states that this is usually followed by diarrhoea. He should report again for examination when this takes place.

In spite of this report the outbreak was so localised and so quickly suppressed after this man left the cookhouse that I consider he was the probable cause of it and have taken steps for him to be employed in other work not connected with the preparation of food.

Other infectious diseases have been remarkably low and there have only been two cases of measles for the month.

E.T. Department. 233 cases of venereal disease were admitted to isolation during the month of July.

146 cases have been discharged to lines showing no signs after seven days routine treatment by " C " system.

Out of those discharged as showing no signs last month ( June ) 31 reported back for treatment.

293 men reported for prophylactic treatment. It has been noticed that very few of these have after developed venereal disease.

29 cases of gonorrhoea were evacuated to Bulford still showing signs after 7 days treatment by system " C ". Of these 29, 19 were relapse cases in which there was probably posterior urethritis. The remaining ten cases were first infection.

The Group Clearing Hospital has now returned to its normal numbers in admissions and discharges since the influenza epidemic has abated and on the 31st July 1918 the number in Hospital is only 111.

Sanitation in the camp is, on the whole, satisfactory, but I would recommend that A.A.M.C. Order No. 627 of 19.6.18 re reduction of flies, be more rigidly carried out especially with regard to catching flies at present in cookhouses and ration stores.

Herewith please find summary of work carried out by these Departments during Month ending July 31st, 1918.

The total figures show that 2,414 N.C.O's and Men marched in and 1,479 N.C.O's and Men marched out, as against 2,644 and 1,209 respectively for Month ending June 30th, 1918.

Approximately 470 Full Fare Railway Warrants were issued for the Month as against 400 for June 1918, 1,358 Leave Passes, 1,708 Road Passes and 80 Duty Passes as against 970, 1,933 and 60 for June 1918.

Report on Messing - Period 29th June to 26th July '18.  
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During this period 234,645 meals were served to 78,215 men. Supplies generally have been good and shortages at the Canteen practically negligible.

The usual inconvenience has however been caused by further heavy issue of sausages, 23,212 rations, amounting to 8,741 lbs. were issued in lieu of a corresponding number of rations of meat. As regards the actual meat issue, further variety was introduced during this period by an occasional issue of mutton. Of the total weight of meat received, five-sevenths approximately, or 24,652 lbs was beef and the remainder, totalling 9,696 lbs Mutton. This was the first issue of mutton since March, and although not so suitable in forming the basis of made meat dishes yet gives a very welcome change as an occasional issue.

During the period I was enabled to underdraw bread to the extent of 12,000 rations, drawing flour (in weight, 7875 lbs) in lieu.

The sale of By-Products, which has been very good, is made up as follows:-

This will realise a sum of £120.

It will be noticed that the total sales of Dripping comes under the heading of 1st Class. This is entirely due to the excellent work of my By-Product section.

The returns generally are not so good as those obtained during June, but it must be borne in mind that these figures were well above the average. The most satisfactory result is the reduction in the Swill figure. This return of 2.5 ozs. per man per day is very good, particularly with fresh vegetables, which always gives a high percentage of waste, figuring so prominently in the Diet Sheet. The Swill figure would be even more satisfactory were it not for the excessive waste from the Officers' and Sergeants' Messes.

The pigs purchased two months ago have increased in weight during this time to the extent of approximately 1,900 lbs. With such satisfactory progress I shall be in a position to give the troops a further pork dinner within the next few weeks. In the near future I hope to be able to put on a regular monthly pork dinner, and partly to assist in this direction I am retaining two sows for breeding purposes.

By means of further incubations and purchases I have increased the number of chicks to about 500. With the exception of a few weeklings these are making excellent progress, and I feel that I can safely guarantee a good supply of poultry for the Christmas dinner.

Since my last report I have installed the vegetable cleaning machine, worked by the engine, which has even surpassed expectations. By means of this machine I am able to dispense with the services of six fatigue men daily, reduce the consumption of water for vegetable cleaning purposes to the extent of 75% and to ensure my supply of cleaned vegetables, a matter which for various reasons has frequently caused considerable inconvenience in the past.

Owing to the difficulty in obtaining suitable men of low category for work in this department, changes in the personnel are continuous, and I find it impossible to obtain anything like a fixed staff, which condition would naturally tend to lead to greater efficiency. In spite of this, however, my staff has worked conscientiously and well and every credit is due to the members of same for the results obtained.

Staff. There were no changes of staff during the month, with the exception of a few men on the detention compound staff being marched out as they became classified "A3". These included Sergt. R. Edmonds.

Compound. The number of men confined in the compound ranged from 13 on 2nd. and 10th. July, to 30 on 18th. July, 1918. In addition to these there were, on the opening day of the month, 7 men under open arrest awaiting D.C.M. and five men in custody at the detention ward at the Group Clearing Hospital; and, on the last day of July, there were 15 D.C.M. cases under open arrest, and three men in custody at the G.C. Hospital.

A large number of men were admitted to open arrest pending their appearance before Orderly Room; and 33 men were given open arrest after being remanded for D.C.M., pending the fixing of the date of trial. Only one of these 33 broke his parole, and he was subsequently recaptured.

Three men escaped from escort at this Depot during the month, one of them Dvr. Norton - doing so on two separate occasions. One of these three was subsequently recaptured.

Men undergoing F.P.2 continue to sleep in the Compound, the number doing so being between twenty and thirty nightly.

The subjoined table shows the number of men marching in to and out of the Compound during the month.

The Compound is visited daily by officers from the Depot, and frequently by the G.C.C., A.I.F. Depots in U.K.

Escorts.

The amount of escort work, and number of men escorted, is slightly in excess of that of the previous month. Towards the end of July a change in the method of escorting prisoners to A.I.F. Detention Barracks, Lewes, was introduced. Such men are, in future, to be escorted by a Depot escort to Warminster, where they will be taken over by an escort from the A.P.C.. Soldiers being conducted from Lewes at the termination of their sentence will be taken over by escorts from this Depot, as heretofore.




