The following appreciation of the Australian Light Horse in Palestine has been addressed by General Allenby to Mr. H.S. Gullett, Official Australian War Correspondent, for publication:-


Australian Light Horse well in the Boer War, and I was glad to meet some of my old friends of those days when the Light Horse came under my command just two years ago.


Force in July, 1917, The Light Horse were already veterans, tried and proved in many a fight. Since them, they have shared in the Campaigns which achieved the destruction of the Turkish army and the conquest of Palestine and Syria, and throughout they have been in the thick of the fighting. I have found them eager in advance and staunch in defence. At Beersheba, a mounted charge by a Light Horse Regiment armed only with rifles, swept across the Turkish trenches and decided the day. Later, some of the Regiments were armed with swords which they used with great effect in the pursuit of last Autumn.

On foot, too, they have equally distinguished themselves as stubborn fighters. They have shown in the dismounted action the dash and enterprise of the best type of light infantry.

The Australian Light Horseman combines with a splendid physique a restless activity of the mind. This mental quality renders him somewhat impatient of rigid and formal discipline, but it confers upon him the gift of adaptability and this is the secret of much of his success mounted or on foot. In this dual role, on every variety of ground - mountain, plain, desert, swamp or jungle - the australian Light Herseman has proved himself equal to the best. He has earned the gratitude of the Empire and the admiration of the world.

4. It must be clearly understood that the procedure of demobilization in Australia, as outlined in these pages, may be varied in accordance with unforeseen local conditions, at any time without notice.

OBJECTS OF DEMOBILIZATION SCHEME IN AUSTRALIA.

1. The process of demobilization commences from the time the soldier leaves his unit. From that date until he disembarks in Australia the process is directed by the Demobilization Staff abroad. The completion of demobilization in Australia takes place under the direct control of the Department of Defence.

2. It is the object of the Department of Defence to complete the demobilization of all troops after disem-

3. The reasons for this are many, but the chief one is that the soldier may be set at liberty to resume his civil occupation with the least delay and the least possible interference by the Military Authorities.

4. While the Defence Department is anxious to settle its accounts with all troops as soon as possible, yet it is realized that it has a great duty to fulfil towards men who have been fighting abroad. Therefore, the Commonwealth Government has been very generous in the question of leave and pay before discharge. This is to give men, while still under the protection of Army pay, an opportunity to resume their pre-war independence of thought and action which they have been inevitably more or less deprived while under Army discipline.

3

5. To attain this end the scheme of demobilization in Australia is arranged so that after the day of disembarkation the soldier is, in the ordinary course of events, absolutely free from military control. His pay and papers will be forwarded to his home town according to his desires. Unless specially instructed to do so, he will not be required to report at District Head-Quarters, and if he desires it his discharge will be forwarded to him, post-dated, so that he may resume his civil occupation even so soon as the day after disembarkation.

6. At the same time, all ranks on leave before discharge remain soldiers, and can wear uniform if they so desire. The standard of conduct demanded of a member of the Australian Imperial Forces is well known, and it is expected that while on leave in Australia all ranks will behave in as worthy a manner as they have behaved abroad. The penalties the Defence Act imposes for misconduct in the Army still apply in the case of soldiers on leave before discharge. Permission is granted from the office of the Staff Officer for Invalids and Returned Soldiers for personnel to wear civilian clothes immediately leave is granted.

PORTS OF DISEMBARKATION.

- 1. Final ports in all cases will be determined by the Naval Authorities, having regard to the route, destination of the troops, and the nature and destination of the cargo carried.
- 2. Melbourne, subject to the above limitations, will be the main port for Queensland, New South Wales,

Victoria, South Australia, and Tasmania, whilst Fremantle will be the port for Western Australia.

- 3. If troops are disembarked in a State other than their States of enlistment, they will be railed, on the day of disembarkation if possible, to the State of enlistment.
- 4. Troop traffic between Western Australia and other States will be confined to the sea.
- 5. Troops for Tasmania will disembark at Melbourne, and be transhipped as soon as possible to Tasmania.
- 6. Quarantine Regulations, if in force, may materially affect the above arrangements.

TRANSFER TO DISTRICTS OTHER THAN DISTRICT OF ENLISTMENT.

- 1. Approval has been given for soldiers who enlisted in one Military District, but with home or relatives in another District, to be disembarked and finalized in their home or relatives' district if they so desire, on the understanding that the Department of Defence is not liable for the expense of transfer to the District of enlistment later.
- 2. Personnel desiring to be so disembarked and finalized are required to make application to the O.C. finalized on the transport before the first payment at sea is made.

5

PROCEDURE ON DISEMBARKATION.

1. Personnel-

- (a) On disembarkation, troops for other districts will be immediately entrained for their Districts of enlistment, except in the case of Tasmanians, who will be disembarked at Melbourne and transhipped by the first boat to Tasmania.
- (b) On disembarkation or arrival at district of enlistment, troops will proceed to the Finalization Depôt, where they will be immediately medically examined and finalized.
- (c) Where it is not possible to finalize all men on the one day, men whose homes are in the country will be finalized first, and the town men will be instructed to report the following day for finalization.

Every effort, however, will be made to finalize all men on the day of disembarkation.

(d) Though a natural anxiety to meet friends and relatives immediately on arrival at the State of finalization will make itself felt, men are urged to be patient until the routine and formalities have been gone through, as thereby vexatious delays in the future will be saved. Except in special cases, they will not be interfered with again by the Military Authorities.

2. Kit-

(a) Kits will be left on the ship, and will be collected by specially trained baggage parties and taken to the Military District Kit

Stores, where they will undergo inspection by S.O.I. and R.S. Staff and Customs

officials. (b) Kit and personal baggage will be available within 48 hours after disembarkation, and, if required, will be expressed to any address given on a written order.

3. Passes and Warrants-

(a) Leave passes and railway warrants will be issued on completion of finalization.

(b) It is every man's duty to see that he obtains his leave pass and warrants, &c., before leaving the Finalization Depôt.

FINALIZATION.

This process merely consists of a medical examination, conducted in order to see whether the soldier is suffering from any disabilities contracted while on active service, and to record his medical state.

LEAVE AND PRIVILEGES.

1. (a) All ranks of the A.I.F. will be granted $7\frac{1}{2}$ days' leave for every period of six months' service abroad, reckoned from the date of embarkation in Australia to the date of disembarkation in Australia-completed half-yearly periods only to be reckoned for such leave, with the exception, however, that if the final period be over four months it will count in the assessment of leave as a six months' period.

- (b) Sustenance allowance of 3s. for each day of such furlough will be granted to all personnel with over one year's service abroad. Officers' field allowance will cease as from date of disembarkation.
- (c) Not less than 14 days' leave without sustenance allowance is to be granted to personnel who have embarked from Australia for service abroad.
- (d) 1914 personnel, who have taken their long-service furlough abroad, will be granted 14 days' leave without sustenance allowance on their return to Australia.
- 2. (a) In all cases where the leave to which a member is entitled under the above scale includes a halfday, the half-day will be counted as a whole one.
- (b) In cases where troops have returned to Australia and re-embarked for active service the second time, the total amount of service out of Australia is to be used in calculating the amount of furlough to which they are entitled under Clause 1 (a) above.
- 3. Members will be discharged on the last day of the leave referred to above, and pay will be allowed up to and including that date. In the case of Anzacs-1914 men-who returned on furlough under the recent approval, leave and sustenance allowance for 60 days will be granted in all cases irrespective of whether such members completed four years' service abroad or not. In all other cases the scale will be adhered to.
- 4. Leave according to the scale above will, except in the case of invalids who are admitted to hospital for treatment, commence on the day following the date of arrival in district of finalization. In the event of

a soldier not being examined by the Medical Board on date of arrival, an extra day will be added to his leave. In the case of men requiring medical treatment, leave will commence on the day after the date of the recommendation of the Medical Board for discharge.

5. If a member of the A.I.F. becomes ill while on leave, he should, if possible, report to the nearest Military Hospital, or, if in the country, at the nearest public hospital, reporting the fact, in writing, to the S.O.I. and R.S.

If unable to report to a hospital, he should report, in writing, to the S.O.I. and R.S., and obtain and forward to this officer a certificate from the doctor attending him.

6. The uniform, except greatcoat, may be retained after discharge, but uniform must not be worn except on special occasions sanctioned by the District Commandant or the Minister for Defence. The greatcoat, also, may be retained if the soldier joins the Australian Army Reserve.

7. The official "Returned Soldiers' Badge is obtainable from the Staff Officer for Invalids and Returned Soldiers.

Soldiers discharged for misconduct, or who are "medically unfit" due to their own default, are not eligible for the badge or for leave privileges.

8. All soldiers on being granted leave may receive a railway warrant entitling them to a free ticket to their place of enlistment.

9. The Staff Officer for Invalids and Returned Soldiers acts in the capacity of Officer Commanding all

returned soldiers from their arrival in the District until their discharge. Inquiries should be addressed to him in his official capacity.

9

10.—War Medals.—The number and nature of the war medals to be issued to soldiers who have served overseas in any theatre of war have not yet been determined. When peace is declared, the question will be determined by the Imperial Government, and on receipt of medal rolls from Australia the medals will be struck, names engraved thereon, and the medals sent to Australia for issue. It will be understood that this procedure will take a very long time, and it is anticipated that medals will not be available for a considerable period after peace is declared.

When ready, they will be either presented or sent to all concerned by registered post. It is, therefore, essential that soldiers should leave their correct address with the S.O.I. and R.S. on discharge, and notify District Head-Quarters of any changes in their address.

PAY ARRANGEMENTS.

VOYAGE MATTERS.

Soldiers to be paid off in Districts of Enlistment.

1. (a) Soldiers will be paid off in their District of enlistment unless special application is made for payment elsewhere. Should you desire to disembark and be

paid off in another District than that in which you enlisted, you should make application to the Officer Commanding Troops before the first payment is made at sea.

(b) It must be understood that, in special cases, where a soldier applies to be paid off in a district other than that in which he enlisted, some delay will probably ensue before settlement is made, owing to details of his pay account having to be obtained from the district of enlistment.

Soldiers to fill in Orders for Final Payment.

2. Payment of amounts due, other than periodical payments to invalids in hospital, will be made through the Commonwealth Bank to the soldier's credit at his home town. An order supplied by the Paymaster on the transport must be completed in duplicate, stating the address and the name of the place at which the soldier desires his money made available. Three specimen signatures will also be furnished by . the soldier. If an account in any other bank or Savings Bank in the Commonwealth already exists, full particulars thereof should be given by the soldier, and the money will be credited to this account. If no account exists, an account will be opened for him in the Commonwealth Savings Bank, and the money will be made available at his home town. Should there be special reasons for desiring payment to be made at a place other than the home town, the soldier should, before filling in the order referred to above, make application to the Commanding Officer of the Troops, who, if the circumstances justify it, will approve of payment being made to his credit as desired.

11

Special Disembarkation Payment.

3. Immediately prior to disembarkation in Australia the following advances will be paid:—

To men who embarked prior to 1917, and are not overdrawn in their pay-books .. £10

To men who embarked in 1917 or later, or who embarked prior to 1917 and are over-drawn in their pay-books .. £:

No further payment, excepting in the case of invalids admitted to hospital, will be made until the balance in full is made available through the Commonwealth Bank as provided for above. This will take from four to seven days after arrival in the District of finalization. Special cases may require a little longer, according to the locality of the home town.

PAYMENT ON DISCHARGE.

Deferred Pay.

- 4. Payment of deferred pay to soldiers who are not admitted to hospital for treatment, but are recommended for discharge, will be made in full through the Commonwealth Bank to the soldier's credit at his home town, within seven days after disembarkation or arrival in District of finalization.
- 5. In isolated cases where a soldier's statement of account does not reach Australia until some time after disembarkation, a substantial advance up to 75 per cent. of deferred pay due will be made.

ALLOTMENT TO BE PAID IN ADVANCE.

6. After being boarded for discharge, the soldier's allotment will be paid to his allottee in advance, calculated up to date of discharge.

RE-EMBARKED MEN.

7. Where men have previously returned to Australia and re-embarked for further service, only the actual period of service outside Australia will be regarded as "service abroad" for the purpose of calculating leave pay.

DISCIPLINARY CASES.

8. Special leave and sustenance allowance is not granted to members who are returned to Australia for disciplinary reasons.

STATEMENT OF ACCOUNT.

9. After the discharge certificate is received there is no need to call at the Pay Office unless special information is required. Instructions as to pay will be carried out promptly, and a copy of the statement of account will be posted to the soldier's address.

13

RE-ENLISTED MEN.

10. In cases where members have had service abroad under a previous enlistment, leave and sustenance allowance included in the soldier's final account will be calculated on the basis of his final enlistment. Application should be made to the Secretary, Department of Defence, in respect of the first period of service. Forms of application can be obtained from the Post Offices.

PAY-BOOKS TO BE RETURNED.

11. Pay-books, when finished with by the Pay Office and the Audit Office, will be posted to each soldier at the address given.

OFFICERS.

12. Officers will be granted special leave and sustenance allowance on the same basis as men. Field allowance will cease as from the date of disembarkation.

INVALIDS.

13. Invalids who are admitted to hospital on disembarkation will receive regular payments each fortnight of the amounts accruing on their pay-books, and the full amounts due to them on discharge will be paid to them at their home town through the Commonwealth Bank within seven days of the recommendation of the Medical Board for their discharge.

Deferred pay will not be paid until a recommendation for discharge has been made by a Medical Board.

DEPENDANTS IN THE UNITED KINGDOM.

14. Soldiers who have dependant allottees in the United Kingdom should note that their allotments and separation allowance will only be continued by the Chief Paymaster for a period of one hundred days from the date of embarkation of the soldier for Australia. In special cases where a soldier is admitted to hospital for a prolonged period of treatment the Chief Paymaster will be instructed to continue payment to dependants, but, otherwise, a soldier upon disembarkation should take immediate steps to provide for his dependants abroad.

FACILITIES EXTENDED BY COMMONWEALTH BANK.

1. The Commonwealth Bank extends special facilities to soldiers. It has branches and agencies throughout Australia. Savings Bank agencies are established at all Post Offices in Australia which are also Money Order Offices. Accounts may be opened in either the General or Savings Bank Department.

2. The amount due on discharge will be made available at the home town, and the Bank will notify mem-

bers when it is available.

3. If an account in the Commonwealth Bank is already possessed by the soldier, the amount will be paid to the credit of it-free of exchange. If he has an account abroad, but omitted to transfer it to Australia before his departure, the Bank will recall it if requested to do so. The charge for recall by cablegram is £1 12s.

15

4. If a soldier directs that his account be opened in the branch of the Commonwealth Bank, Savings Bank Department in the Capital City, it will be necessary for him to call at the Military Branch to receive his pass-book.

If unable to call, he should write to the Officer in Charge of the Branch mentioned, and the book will be

forwarded to him by post.

5. The following facilities extended by the Bank should be borne in mind if doubt is entertained about continuing to keep a banking account:-

(a) It is possible for a depositor to operate on his account at any Branch or Agency, provided the Bank receives due notice as to where he wishes to draw amounts. Full details relating to Savings Bank accounts are contained in the pass-books.

(b) It will remit amounts to any other Banks or Savings Banks in Australia free of ex-

change.

6. Any further information required may be obtained either on personal application or by letter to the Bank.

REPATRIATION.

Provision for the future welfare of the returned soldier has been intrusted to the Department of Repatriation, a public Department specially created and directly controlled by the Commonwealth Government. Under the scheme which that Department has formulated, the soldier can pass direct from military to civil

life. This scheme seeks to enable the individual who was drawing his military pay one day to become a wage-earner the next. Should employment not immediately be available, a sustenance allowance is paid until it is. Should a soldier, through war injury, not be in a position to immediately commence to earn his living again, a sustenance allowance is paid him while he is being vocationally trained, and at the end of his training period he will be placed in suitable employment. Where a family has lost its breadwinner, provision is made for the support of that family, and the dependants of a deceased soldier are maintained in comfort.

Every feature of the Australian repatriation scheme aims at repairing, so far as is practicable, the economic

loss which military service has entailed.

The work of the Department may be classified under the headings Employment, Vocational Training, Medi-

cal Attention, and General Assistance.

The provision of employment is perhaps the most extensive duty which the Department has to discharge. The Department undertakes to provide suitable employment for those who are able to follow their previous or some kindred occupation, and to pay sustenance until such employment is procurable. Only one stipulation is made, and it is that when an opportunity for suitable employment is presented to an applicant, he must, failing some adequate reason, avail himself of it. Until that opportunity is presented, however, the discharged soldier is entitled to sustenance under the following scale:—

(a) A soldier without dependants—a weekly income (inclusive of pension) of £2 2s.

17

(b) A soldier with a wife—a weekly income (inclusive of their combined pensions), of £2 12s.

(c) A soldier with a wife and one child—a weekly income (inclusive of their combined pensions) of £2 15s. 6d.

(d) A soldier with a wife and two children—a weekly income (inclusive of their combined pensions) of £2 19s.

(e) A soldier with a wife and three children—a weekly income (inclusive of their combined pensions) of £3 2s. 6d.

(f) A soldier with a wife and four children—a weekly income (inclusive of the pensions payable to the soldier, his wife, and four children) of £3 6s.

A widower with children is entitled to the same sustenance allowance as if his wife were living. A soldier who upon his discharge is not, on account of ill-health, capable of immediately resuming his former occupation, is, also, during the period of his convalescence, entitled to assistance under this scale.

Vocational Training.—If a man is prevented by wounds or illness which are the result of war service from returning to his former employment, the Department will vocationally train him, that is, will re-educate him to some trade or calling which, in view of his physical disabilities, he will be able to follow, and which living will adequately support him and his dependants in their battle in life.

The man who is but slightly incapacitated may, under the industrial regulations, be trained in an ordinary workshop or factory, or he may be given a short

intensive course of instruction in one of the vocational training classes which have been set up in the technical schools throughout the Commonwealth. Should a soldier be placed in a workshop or factory, he is guaranteed (inclusive of his pension) the minimum wage of the industry in which he is being trained, but should he be placed in a technical school he is paid during the period of his instruction on the same scale as that quoted in reference to employment.

The repatriation scheme contemplates provision for the soldier whose incapacity, while permitting him to perform some useful labour, is so severe that it will preclude him from entirely earning his own living. Provision for this class will take the form of national workshops, in which these men may remain as regular employees.

Provision is also made whereby an apprentice whose indentures were interrupted by enlistment may finish his apprenticeship, and during the completion of his indentures he will be paid sustenance which will bring his wages up to the standard which he would have been receiving had his apprenticeship not been interrupted by war service.

Medical Treatment and General Assistance.—The Department of Repatriation is undertaking the afterwar medical treatment of the members of the A.I.F. Medical officers are being appointed to local areas throughout the Commonwealth, and every case of sickness arising from war service and requiring medical care and attention will be treated at the expense of the Department of Repatriation.

10

Should a discharged soldier, owing to the recurrence at any time of injuries or illness arising from active service, require hospital or other medical treatment, this will be provided, and he will be paid sustenance under the scale previously set out. Fares to and from hospital and travelling expenses are also paid. A married soldier incapacitated to the extent of being unable to engage in his usual employment, or a soldier who prior to enlistment was dependent on a business which he owned and conducted, may be advanced up to £150 to purchase a business, plant, or stock, to enable him to reestablish himself.

The scheme also provides for relief from onerous mortgages, educational grants, equipment with tools of trade, free passages to and from the Commonwealth to incapacitated soldiers, their wives and children, and other specified applicants, and grants for furniture.

Care of the Seriously Incapacitated.—Soldiers who are so seriously incapacitated that they are not in a position to provide for themselves, and widows and orphans, are the special care of the Department. For the totally and permanently incapacitated, a living allowance on the following scale is paid:—

Soldier and wife (inclusive of pension), 60s. per

week.
Soldier and wife and one child (inclusive of pension), 63s. 6d. per week.

Soldier and wife and two children (inclusive of pension), 67s. per week.

Soldier and wife and three children (inclusive of pension), 70s. 6d. per week.

Soldier and wife and 4 children (inclusive of pension), 73s. per week.

Soldier and wife and five children or more (inclusive of pension), 77s. per week.

Alternative provision is made for those who are no longer able to assist themselves by the establishment of hostels, where the inmates may spend their days amidst pleasant surroundings, and be assured of skilled attention. Hostels have already been secured in Sydney and Melbourne, and others will be established in other capital cities.

For widows with children a living allowance on the following scale is provided:—

Widow with one child (inclusive of pension), 51s.

per week. Widow with two children (inclusive of pension),

54s. 6d. per week.
Widow with three children (inclusive of pension),

58s. per week. Widow with four children (inclusive of pension),

61s. 6d. per week.

Widow with five children or more (inclusive of pension), 64s. 6d. per week.

Provision is also made for the assistance of dependent mothers and of incapacitated dependent fathers of deceased soldiers.

Land Settlement.—The Department, in co-operation with the State Governments, renders assistance to the man who desires and is qualified to settle upon the land. The State Governments provide the land on easy terms, and the Department of Repatriation, through their Lands Departments, advances up to £625 for working

21

capital. Approved applicants who lack the necessary experience can obtain the requisite training before entering into occupation of their holdings free of cost to them. In addition, where such is necessary, the Department provides sustenance for a period of six months during the early and unproductive periods of their occupation. Such sustenance scale is:—

Single men (inclusive of pension), £1 per week.

Man and wife (inclusive of pension), £1 10s. per

week.

Each child up to four (inclusive of pension), 2s.

6d. per week.

Housing Scheme.—A Bill providing for advances to enable men now married, or who subsequently may marry, to acquire homes under most favorable conditions was passed by the Federal Parliament last session, and the Housing Commissioner having now been appointed, applications may be submitted for homes under the Act.

The Housing Bill has two main sections. Under one of these, the Commissioner who will administer the Act is empowered to carry on ordinary building-society activities. He is entitled to either purchase houses for the men, or to build for them. If a man owns a house which is encumbered with a mortgage, he can lift that mortgage. Under the other section of the Act, the Commissioner can, without waiting for returned men to apply for houses, build in anticipation of requirements.

The advance cannot in any case exceed an amount of £700, and a man can secure this advance even though he has no deposit to pay. The periods of repayment

range from twenty to thirty-seven years, according to the nature of the structure-whether wood or brick, stone or concrete. The sinking fund for the thirtyseven years is 1 per cent., therefore a man would have to pay 6 per cent. for the amount standing to his debit in connexion with his property. Applicants desiring to do so can pay off at any time.

Every soldier who requires the assistance of the Department should make application as early as possible.

Applications should be made personally to the branch of the Department in the capital city of the State in which applicant resides. State branches have been established as under:-

AUSTRALIAN ARMY RESERVE.

- 1. The Australian Army Reserve was brought into existence by the Minister for Defence. If 200,000 or 300,000 men, all trained in the latest methods of war join, it will be a valuable asset to this country.
- 2. The Australian Army Reserve will not be called upon to serve beyond the limits of the Commonwealth.
 - 3. It is not a strike-breaking machine.
 - 4. It costs nothing to join.

5. The Australian Army Reserve is composed entirely of men who have been on active service, and of exmembers of the Permanent Military Forces.

6. Members will be attached to Reserve Units bearing the same number of designation as their old A.I.F. Units. To enable this to be done, the Citizen Forces have been re-numbered and given A.I.F. numbers. This means that old regiments of the A.I.F. will be in existence for all time.

7. Trainees may join the Reserve instead of complet-

ing their service with the Militia Service. 8. The annual training will consist of four days in camp, during which pay will be at the same daily rates as laid down for the Citizen Forces.

9. No training will be attempted until after Peace

is declared.

10. A reservist signs on at the same rank as quoted on his discharge certificate; acting rank does not count.

11. Except for those liable for training under the Defence Act with the Militia Forces, the term of engagement is not limited to a specified period, but a reservist may, except in time of war, resign on giving fourteen days' notice, in writing, to his Commanding

Officer. 12. There will be no medical examination on enrolment, but in the interest of both the reservist and the Department an examination will be held prior to the

reservist going into camp. 13. There is also an Honorary Reserve for those who have been on active service, and are over fifty years of age, or who are obviously unfit. No training will be required from the Honorary Reserve.

14. Members of the Australian Army Reserve wear the brass letter "R" on the front of their head-dress, also their battalion or regimental shoulder patches.

15. All members of the A.I.F. should join the A.A.R. on discharge, because they will be able to keep in touch with their old regiment and comrades, and because they will also be able to set a standard of soldierly conduct and self-sacrifice to the young trainees, who, in the future, will be the defenders of Australia and the preservers of those traditions and honours which members of the A.I.F. have helped to make.

16. The Organizing Officer, Australian Army Reserve, for each Military District, will be pleased to enrol returned soldiers, or give any further particulars.

GRIEVANCES.

1. That mistakes will occur, and that individual soldiers will have grievances during the process of demobilization, is inevitable when the vastness and complexity of the problem of demobilization and repatriation is realized.

2. The correct and most efficient manner for a soldier to adopt to have any grievance redressed or any mistake

rectified is often not thoroughly understood.

3. The military regulations prescribe that if a soldier considers himself wronged or aggrieved, he should ask to parade before his Commanding Officer, and all Commanding Officers are required by the regulations to insure that any complaint is investigated and redress given. In the case of a returned soldier of the A.I.F. on leave in Australia, his Commanding Officer is the

Staff Officer for Invalids and Returned Soldiers. All soldiers are, therefore, requested to carefully remember this, and if they at any time consider themselves wronged they are first to represent the matter to the S.O.I. and R.S., either verbally or in writing. In the case of a soldier in hospital, his C.O. will be the O.C. Hospital so long as he is there, but immediately he is discharged from hospital he again comes under the control of the S.O.I. and R.S. If, after investigation, the aggrieved soldier does not consider that his Commanding Officer has given him satisfaction, he may, by the regulations, ask that the matter be referred to higher authority. The next higher authority is the District Commandant of the Military District concerned, and after that the Military Board of the Aus-

4. In many cases, however, soldiers while still on leave before discharge, have represented their grievances to politicians, political and semi-political parties, to patriotic and other societies, and to private persons of influence. This procedure, besides being a military offence, merely serves to waste time, as the grievance concerned has always to be referred to the soldier's

Commanding Officer for report.

5. Also, after discharge, an aggrieved soldier may still state his case, either verbally or in writing, to the S.O.I. and R.S., and the grievance will be fully investigated. It is always much easier and quicker to obtain redress by representing the matter direct to the Military Authority concerned. The Department has also consented to recognise the branches of the Returned Sailors and Soldiers League in each State when they

represent grievances of discharged soldiers, but it must be distinctly understood that a soldier still serving is not authorized to represent his case other than through his Commanding Officer.





NEW SOUTH WALES.

QUALIFICATION.

Any person who has served abroad during the present war in His Majesty's Australian Naval or Military Forces, or who, having enlisted for service abroad, was retained in the Commonwealth through no fault of his own, and who has received an honourable discharge, may apply for a certificate of qualification.

APPLICATION.

Returned Soldiers should, immediately after arrival in N.S.W. register themselves as land seekers.

To obtain the certificate of qualification, two forms have to be signed and sent, with the soldier's discharge, to the Soldiers' Settlement Branch, Lands Department, Sydney, N.S.W.

The case will then be investigated without delay by a Classification Committee.

LAND AVAILABLE.

Large areas of Crown Lands in suitable localities have been made available; several large, and many small estates have been purchased; the State will purchase private properties for a soldier-settler: special "Group Settlements" have been established for communities of soldiers who may wish to form co-operative companies.

ADVANCES AND REPAYMENTS.

The Government is empowered to afford such assistance as may be necessary to give the settler an advantageous start in life, and to provide him with the basis to make the farm productive of income at the earliest possible season.

When a holding comprises a home-maintenance area, the Government will advance up to £500 for buildings, clearing, fencing implements, stock, etc., and general improvement. Details of requirements must be given, and advances will be made either when the work is finished, or by progress payments if desired. Payments will be made

upon the certificate of a Government nominee, who will make inspection, etc. Conditions upon which advances for stock, implements, etc., can be made, are laid down.

REPAYMENT.

Interest at the rate of 3½ per cent. for the first year, 4 per cent. for the second year, and so on, advancing by ½ per cent. each year until a maximum rate determined by the Minister is reached. Repayment will be on a long deferred system, of which further details are being printed by the N.S.W. Government.

TENURE.

Detailed information can be supplied on application about tenure and conditions for:—

- (1) Homes and Farms.—A lease in perpetuity, with conditions regarding residence, transfer, payment for improvements, survey fees and rents.
- (2) Crown Leases.—Currency of 45 years, with similar conditions.
- (3) Returned Soldiers' Special Holding.—Perpetual leases for which a grant (title) will be issued after 5 years, if conditions fulfilled.
- (4) Suburban Holdings.—Perpetual leases for which a grant (title) will be issued after 5 years, if conditions fulfilled.
- (5) Group Settlement Purchase.—The Government provides the land, improvement and equipment, and training under competent supervisors; 5 years residence imposed.
- (6) Privately Owned Land.—Provisions under Closer Settlement Act, by which one or more discharged soldiers may purchase private land; conditions regarding residence and improvements.
- (7) Irrigation Areas.—Particulars from Water Conservation and Irrigation Commission, Hunter Street, Sydney.

Group Settlements have been arranged for in areas suitable for fruit growing, poultry farming, wheat, sheep and mixed farming. A liberal home maintenance area provided for in each settlement.

The work may be co-operative at first.

Each man must show that he means business, and will be on probation for three months; but due allowance will be made for the physically disabled. During the period of probation each man (married or single) will be provided

3

with absolutely necessary equipment, and in certain cases will receive allowances for sustenance, including sustenance for wife and children.

Government assistance will be given for co-operative services, such as transport and sale of produce, purchase of supplies, establishment of canneries, creameries, etc.

TRAINING SCHOOLS, STUD FARMS, NURSERIES.

There is a training system in connection with each different class of settlement.

Stock or stud farms, and demonstration and training schools, will, wherever possible, be established near each Group Settlement Area

For orcharding, grape-growing and poultry farming, some orchards and farms have already been acquired for supplying settlers, and opportunities will be given for preliminary instruction at such establishments. Settlers will also have the advantage of the advice of a resident manager in each Group Settlement.

VICTORIA.

(Discharged Soldiers' Settlement Act, 1917.)

QUALIFICATION.

"Discharged Soldier" includes:-

- (1) Australians who have served, or enlisted for service, outside the Commonwealth, either in Australian or British Forces, and have been honourably discharged.
- (2) Non-Australians of British Forces who have come to Victoria and have been honourably discharged. The Act applies to:—.
- (1) Soldiers who have received their discharges either before or after the commencement of the Act.
- (2) Discharged soldiers who have been permitted to occupy land in anticipation of the Act.
- (3) Dependents who make application during the war or within two years after its termination.

("Dependent" means widow or mother or child or ex-nuptial child of a deceased Australian who has served. or enlisted for service, outside the Commonwealth in Australian or British Forces. The privileges conferred on dependents shall not extend to more than one dependent of any deceased person as aforesaid.)

APPLICATION.

First to the "Qualification Committee" specified in the Act which will give a certificate of suitability or probable suitability after training. Every application for land must be accompanied by this preliminary certificate, and will then be dealt with by a Discharged Soldiers' Settlement Inquiry Board.

Training Farms will be provided and maintained to enable discharged soldiers to acquire the knowledge requisite for agricultural, pastoral, horticultural, viticultural or dairying pursuit, or pig-raising, or poultry farming.

LAND AVAILABLE.

Under the Act power is taken to reserve sites for building dwellings for discharged soldiers by voluntary effort, to set apart any area of Crown Land for disposal to

5

discharged soldiers exclusively, and to acquire by agreement or compulsorily, blocks of private land as required.

Blocks may be prepared for settlement and the amount of the cost added to the value of the land or treated as an advance.

Payments of purchase money may extend over 20, 311 or 40 years, according to the various methods of acquiring Crown Lands.

The Act may be extended to include discharged soldiers settled, or proposing to settle, on private land by arrangement with any person or bodies of persons. For the purposes of the Act the Governor in Council may increase the Victorian Government Stock or issue of debentures to the total value of £2,250,000 during the three years following the commencement. Apart from the Crown Lands made available for soldiers' settlement upwards of 50,000 acres of private lands have already been acquired for the same object by the Government.

ADVANCES AND REPAYMENTS.

Total amount advanced not to exceed £500, but where the whole or part of an advance is repaid, a further advance up to a total of £500 may be made.

Advances made by progress payments as work progresses. Provision made for securities.

Materials, implements, live-stock, etc., to be the pro-

perty of the Crown until paid for.

Share-farming.—Advances up to £250 may be made to assist discharged soldiers who are parties to share-farming agreements with other persons or bodies of persons.

Repayments of advances may extend over 20 years. Interest shall not exceed 31 per cent. for the first year, 4 per cent. for the second year, and so on, advancing by per cent. each year until the ordinary maximum rate is reached.

POSTPONEMENT OF PAYMENTS.

The Minister may direct that no instalment of purchase money and interest or rent shall be payable for the first three years, and may extend the term of the lease accordingly.

QUALIFICATION.

"Discharged Soldier" means any member of Commonwealth Forces honourably discharged. It may be extended to members of His Majesty's or Allied Forces who have been discharged before arrival in Queensland, and also dependents of a soldier who died before receiving his discharge, or at any time within twelve months after discharge.

The benefits relating to advances may be extended to any soldier, discharged or on active service, who at the

passing of the Act held a selection.

LAND AVAILABLE.

The Governor in Council has power to set apart any Crown Land, and resume private lands and City and suburban blocks.

Three large areas have already been set aside:

(1) 60,000 acres at Beerburrun, on N. coast, 40 miles from Brisbane. This is chiefly for pine-apples. but will also be suitable for poultry and beekeeping. Clearing and improvement works are . being carried out. The Government intends to clear and plant with pine-apples 3 acres on every soldier's farm.

(2) 17,000 acres in the parish of Pikedale, 8 to 14 miles W. of Stanthorpe. This is good orchard land. 5 acres on each block being cleared, roads made, etc., and an area retained for a nursery.

(3) 157,300 acres in the Innisfail district, for dairying, agricultural, and sugar-cane.

In addition-

(4) Notice has been given for the resumption of 125 acres at Sunnybank, for small fruit, poultry farms, and soldiers' homes, and further areas near Brisbane are being reported on for similar action.



(5) Further smaller areas are being reserved for dis charged men, with priority of application, under ordinary group selection provisions of "Land Act. 1910," as Perpetual Lease Selections, and further areas adapted for the purpose will be dealt with from time to time.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS.

Country lands as Perpetual Lease Selections, town and suburban as Perpetual Town and Suburban Leases.

No deposit required with application.

No rent or survey fee for first three years. Survey fee payable in ten annual instalments, com

mencing with fourth year.

Rent, from 4th to 15th year, 11 per cent. of capital value of land; for each succeeding 15 years, rate to be determined by Land Court.

Minister has power to remit or postpone rent.

Residence necessary, but need not begin till two years after commencement of lease.

Within first five years selector must fence, or effect, other equivalent improvements, which must be commenced 12 months from commencement of term.

No transfer (except in case of death, illness, etc.), for first 5 years, nor for a further 5 years except to another discharged soldier.

For the Areas under (5):

- (a) Residence required for first 5 years only, after which transfer may be made to any qualified person.
- (b) Selector must deposit a year's rent and one-fifth survey fee with his application, and balance of survey fee in four annual instalments.
- (c) Rent is payable each year except the second.
- (d) The soldier may have such, selections brought under the Act.

ADVANCES AND REPAYMENTS.

Advances on the basis of £1 for £1 by the Government Savings Bank for improvements, dwellings, etc., up to £500 (Sums expended by State in preparatory work to be counted as an advance from the Bank.) Selector to execute a mortgage as security. Rate of interest in the case of Crown Lands is 31 per cent. for first year, 4 per cent. for second year, and so on, increasing by 1 per cent

each year, up to not more than 5 per cent. 33 years are allowed for repayment, which starts 7 years from date of advance-i.e., 40 years in all.

Further advances, not to exceed £700, may be made in the usual manner under "Queensland Government Savings Banks' Act, 1916," for purchase of stock, machmery, etc., or for further improvements. These advances have a currency of 25 years, and the rate of interest is 5 per cent.

Training Farms have been established in the Beerbur-

run Area, and

Canning Factories are proposed in this and in the Pikedale Area.

ADDITIONAL CONCESSION TO SOLDIERS ON ACTIVE SERVICE.

There is also an amendment of the Lands' Act, by which parents, relations, or any accredited agent, may make application for land on behalf of soldiers on active service; fees will be suspended during his absence, and the lease extended.

SOUTH AUSTRALIA.

QUALIFICATION.

"Discharged Soldier" means any person who has been a member of the A.I.F., or of any other naval or milito force raised in the Commonwealth, and has served outside the Commonwealth, returned, and been honourably discharged.

Further legislation is proposed to include non-Australians.

APPLICATION.

Made to Land Board, giving particulars of service. blocks applied for, experience, capital, etc.

This is referred to "Returned Soldiers' Settlement Advisory Committee," which makes recommendation to Commissioner.

LAND AVAILABLE.

The Government has already set aside two large blocks north of Adelaide, the Mount Remarkable Estate, near Melrose, and the Mount Crawford Estate, near Gawlor. These are suitable for wheat, fruit growing and grazing.

Some irrigation and re-claimed swamp land on the banks and flats of the Murray also ready; this will produce six or seven crops of lucerne a year. Probably the Lake Bonney Area will be ready very soon. Other considerable areas of such land, and of rich lands in the S.E. will be made available. Also larger areas of ordinary Crown lands suitable for wheat can be acquired on easy terms.

Holdings will vary in size according to quality of land and purpose for which it is suitable.

ADVANCES AND REPAYMENTS.

The Act empowers the Commissioner to assist settlers with respect to erection of buildings, purchase of implements, stock, seeds, plants, etc. All advances to bear interest at a rate determined by the Commissioner, who may at his discretion remit the payment of interest in whole or part.

The State promises liberal advances in respect of improvements effected, such as clearing, buildings, fencing. etc., and the repayment will be spread over a great number of years. The purchase money for the land will be payable on similarly easy terms.

Training Farms have been established on the two blocks, and the irrigation areas above mentioned, for men who have had no previous experience.

FOR THE PARTLY INCAPACITATED.

The Employment Committee of the State War Council is dealing with the question of the incapacitated, in conjunction with the Chamber of Manufactures, Chamber of Commerce, Employers Federation, Shopkeepers' Association, and Municipal Bodies.

The relatively fit will be trained in various handicraft and mechanical trades, such as wood-working, bolt-making, cigar-making, etc., and efforts will be made to place a number of men for training in blacksmithing, iron-working sheet-metal, book-binding, and motor trades. The more seriously incapacitated will be assisted to obtain positions as lift-men, night watchmen, caretakers, etc.

In general the State will undertake any further legislation that may be necessary for the welfare of the returned

soldier and his dependents.

WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

APPLICATION.

All applications for land under the scheme must be approved by the "Land Qualification Board."

LAND AVAILABLE.

(1) In the Wheat Belt, from Geraldton in the north to within 50 miles of Albany in the South, and all east of the Darling Range. This is suitable for wheat, oats, sheep, cattle and pigs.

(2) In the wet South-West, between Perth and Albany, suitable for dairying, fruit, intensive culture and pigs.

(3) Land near towns, suitable for poultry farms and

The "Returned Soldiers' Settlement Board" selects the land and decides size of holdings, etc.

Wheat farms to contain not less than 640 acres of good land within reasonable distance of a railway station.

South-West farms to vary from 20 to 160 acres, according to class of land.

Free Homestead forms for the control of the second forms for the control of the

Free Homestead farms from 20 to 160 acres according to locality.

1,400 Wheat and Sheep Blocks, and 1,400 Blocks suitable for dairying, fruit and mixed farming, have already been surveyed in connection with this scheme.

ADVANCES AND REPAYMENTS.

Advances to be made on such basis as the State decides. The Agricultural Bank may make payments for the soldier, i.e.—

(a) Lands Dept. fees (no rent payable for first 5

(b) Water supply, clearing, fencing, building, drain-

(c) Plant, horses, machinery, seed and all thing necessary for sowing, harvesting, and marketing of crop.

REPAYMENT.

Interest 3½ per cent. first year, 4 per cent. second year, and so on, increasing by ½ per cent each year until the ordinary Bank rate is reached.

Advances for improvements to be repaid in 30 years.

Advances for horses, stock, etc., to be repaid in 8 years.

Advances for grass seed and fertilizer to be repaid in 8 years.

Advances for other seed and recurring charges to be repaid from crop proceeds.

TRAINING FARMS.

Applicants who have not enough experience to qualify before the Land Qualification Board may be required to acquire experience on a training farm, or with some established farmer until they can be certified by the Board as competent to manage their own farms.

OTHER CONCESSIONS.

- (1) Protection will be granted in the matter of rents and improvements in the case of enlisted men. but application for this protection must be made to the Lands' Department.
- (2) Rent on leases had by lessees on active service is deferred for 5 years, and leases extended accordingly.
- (3) In applications for land not specially reserved for returned soldiers, preference is given to returned soldiers.
- (4) Land held by a soldier prior to the Act may be brought under the Act if desired, and exempted from rent for 5 years.
- (5) Properties privately purchased by returned soldiers may be valued and approved by Government before purchase if assistance is required.
- (6) For those incapacitated, for ordinary farming, and for wives of soldiers killed on active service.—

 Land has been purchased at Osborne Park for the establishment of poultry farms. Applicants may be required to take a course of training at Subjaco

School, or produce a certificate of competence from the Subiaco Committee.

The land will be improved by erection of a house, poultry runs, water-supply, tank, etc., and fencing. Maintenance may be provided for a limited time in special cases. Repayment for the land extends over 25 years. No capital repayment for the first 5 years. Advances for improvements and other purposes repayable on the same basis as for wheat and South-West farms.

TASMANIA.

QUALIFICATION.

The Act includes:-

- (1) Members of Commonwealth or United Kingdom naval or military forces who have served outside Commonwealth, and been honourably discharged, either before or after return.
- (2) Any resident of Tasmania who enlisted for such service, but was prevented through no fault of his own from serving outside the Commonwealth.
- (3) Non-Australian members of the United Kingdom forces who have been honourably discharged, and have come to Tasmania to settle on the land.

But no free grants of land are made to any but discharged soldiers who have, prior to their becoming such, resided in Tasmania for at least two years.

LAND AVAILABLE.

The Minister may acquire private land in any part of the State or set apart Crown Land or settlement land for discharged soldiers exclusively.

Land will be offered either by sale or lease.

100 acres of first-class land may be selected, and larger areas of second and third-class land.

APPLICATION.



ADVANCES.

Applicants may be assisted in:-

- Clearing, fencing, draining, irrigating, and general improvements.
- (2) Erection of buildings up to £300.
- (3) Purchase implements, stock, seed, etc.

Demobilisation of the A.I.F. in Egypt

- 1. When the question of the Demobilisation of the A. I. F. arose, the G. O. C. (Lieut.-General Sir H. G. Chauvel K.C.B., K.C.M.G.) decided that the following governing principles be the basis on which demobilisation should rest:
 - (1) Every member of the A.I.F. should be returned to Australia at the earliest possible moment.
 - (2) The return to their employment of those who have positions awaiting them, and the finding of employment of those requiring same.
 - (3) Equal treatment to every soldier of the A.I.F. with regard to employment with no preference to those with most friends and influence.
 - (4) The moral right of the soldier to the best employment that can be found for him.
- 2. In view of the above it was strongly recommended that the return to Australia be by military formations and units for the following reasons:—
 - (a) Should any unforeseen trouble arise during the period of demobilisation, either before leaving or during the passage home, the Unit is still a fighting force, and could be quickly organised to deal with any situation that might arise.
 - (b) The unit system is quicker, more effective, and cheaper. Organisation and the necessary staffs already exist in the units to expeditiously handle equipment, clothing and stores, and also to control camps, entrainments and embarkations.

- (c) The unit system is less likely to cause discontent. It is only reasonable that Units first to leave Australia should be first to return, and this seems to be the fairest and most equitable way of returning them. It is of course known that under the unit system some men who enlisted after the original men of other units will be returned to Australia before the members of those units, but it is contended the unit system will be accepted as a fair working scheme. To grant priority to individuals would, except in cases of extreme hardship, cause discontent, and however careful the Selecting Committee were, there would be possibilities of grave mistakes being made. The selection of early repatriated men is made by the Commanding Officers of Units, who are best able to judge the individual merits of each man's case.
- (d) Two big factors in favour of the Unit system are "Esprit de Corps" and discipline. Men are proud of their Units, and "esprit de corps" alone will materially assist in disciplined and organised demobilisation.
 - Good discipline means a good voyage and a comfortable ship. You will be returning with your old comrades and your own Officers. The people of Australia will display much more interest and enthusiasm on your return if you arrive by Units. Being old comrades you will assist each other in securing employment. You will have the advantage of your existing regimental organisations in Australia to assist you in this respect. You will have your own Officers who will assist in obtaining you employment, and they can vouch for your worth to intending employers.
- 3. The System outlined in the previous paragraph was agreed to by the Director of Demobilisation London, and is being carried out.

4. POINTS TO REMEMBER.

Para. (1) Do not take any notice of unofficial statments or rumours about Demobilisation, and particularly about the departures of ships. Newspapers are very often incorrect and misleading.

Para (2) It is the desire of the G.O.C. A.I.F. in Egypt that every Australian soldier should be told everything that is known about demobilisation. It is therefore your duty to ask your Troop, Squadron, or Commanding Officer any questions that you are not clear about. If he cannot give you an answer he will find out full particulars for you from the Divisional Representative, who is in touch with A.I.F. Headquarters, CAIRO, and knows of the latest amendments and rulings that come out from time to time.

Para (3) You have to realise that the task of sending home over 150,000 men still in Europe, in addition to our own Light Horse in Egypt is a complex, lengthy and difficult business. It requires not only the most careful organisation at every stage, but also sympathetic help from all. Rules and Regulations are indispensable to secure orderly, expeditious, and comfortable movements of large bodies of troops. You all know enough about organisation to realise its benefits. Without an organised plan the A.I.F. would never get home, but remember the organisation is only effective if it works, and it can only work, when everyone concerned plays his part. If, however, every man can be relied upon conscientiously to obey all rules and orders the task will be enormously simplified.

Para (4) You must also have patience with the inevitable delays which have already occurred and may reoccur from causes

which are not always evident. The chief difficulty has been, and always will be, the shipping.

Para. (5) The time which demobilisation will take depends entirely upon the amount of shipping which can be secured. Everyone must realise the enormous amount of shipping urgently required by the whole world to carry food to starving populations, to repatriate millions of soldiers of all races and colours, and to carry raw material so as to restart industries of all kinds. This heavy demand finds the Empire with a great shortage of ships, due to heavy losses during the war. The following table published by the "Excelsior" of Paris shows the position of the mercantile marines of the World before, during and after the War. It estimates the pre-war tonnage of the various countries as follows:

Para. (6) Australia, however, is getting a very good share of the available shipping. We here in Egypt, owing to special demands made on grounds of health are getting much more than our share of the Australian allotment. We have been promised ships sufficient to repatriate at at the rate of 3.000 per month. There is every possibility of more being allotted.

Para. (7) Remember that every ship has to be entirely cleaned and refitted so as to make her suitable to carry troops on a long voyage in comfort. This is an enormous job when you remember the great difficulties in procuring material and competent labour at this juncture in Egyptian Ports. Remember also that as the voyage to Australia is a long one through the Tropics we have to allow more space per man. While this means more comfort, it also means more ships, and therefore a longer time in Demobilisation.

Para. (8) The present crisis in Egypt has temporarily stopped Demobilisation, but representation has already been made to obtain a special allotment of ships to make up for any delay that may occur.

Para. (9) The table at back of this booklet shows the numbers sent home since January 1st. Most of these men where invalids, and no one will begrudge sick and wounded men the chance of getting home early. We are now making a definite start with the Units, and have already

sent the 1st. and 2nd. Regiments with a portion of their Brigade staffs, and the 1st. Squadron of the Australian Flying Corps. The Regiments return in numerical order from 1 to 15. The Brigade proportion of Technical Units will go as far as possible with their Brigades.

Para. (10) We cannot give you the names or the accurate dates of sailing of transports, as we do not know them ourselves until a few days before sailing. Transports ofter arrive but are held up in Port awaiting other ships in order to tranship cargo. This to you may seem unnecessary, but we are not in a position to judge the necessity for these delays. It is our intention to give you as much information as we know ourselves, but we do not give you information that may ultimately lead to disappointment.


Para. (11) The success of the whole Demobilisation depends largely on the good temper, the patience, the loyalty, and the desire to "play the game" of the men themselves. Even such a small matter as a few men going absent and delaying a train or a ship will cause confusion and delay, not only to themselves, but to their mates. It is, for this reason, every man's business to discourage misconduct and irregularity in every form.

Para. (12) The fighting efficiency of our troops has placed them second to none on the battle-field. It remains with us to make our Demobilisation a model and our return Home worthy of our service.

Information regarding Pay, Allowances, Leave, Etc., Prior to, during, and after return to Australia.

1. An overdraft upon the Active Pay Account of every soldier of the A.I.F. at the nett drawing rate of pay, up to a maximum of 30 days, will be made prior to embarkation from United Kingdom, France, Egypt or India, as the case may be. This advance is payable when the name of the soldier appears upon the "Boat Roll," but after the completion of any leave that may be granted and just prior to embarkation. The advance will, however, be subject to the following special proviso:—

Those soldiers who desire to do so, may
—provided their paybooks show no
debit balance exceeding £10—draw,
prior to taking 14 days' leave,
an advance of 84s. against their pay.
All soldiers who take advantage of
this concession will forego their
right to receive the above-mentioned
30 days' nett drawing rate of pay,
unless the amount to their credit in
their paybooks, after allowing for
this 84s. advance, is sufficient to
cover such further payment.

Thus the soldier who has insufficient credit in his paybook to cover both payments above referred to, has the option of receiving either one or the other benefit, but he cannot claim both. Those soldiers who have sufficient credit in their paybooks to cover both payments are entitled to claim and receive both.

2. Although Deferred Pay is not payable until the determination of a soldier's service, the Director-General may, however, at his discretion, grant an advance upon the Active Pay Account of the soldier to the following extent, not exceeding

£50 to Officers, £20 to other ranks, provided

- (a) The advance does not exceed 75 per cent. of the Deferred Pay.
- (b) The purpose for which the advance is required has a direct bearing upon the soldier's repatriation to Australia, or would assist in his reestablishment in civil life. Examples of cases in which an application will be considered are such as the following:—
 - Purchase of an Agency in London for Australia.

- 2. Purchase of Professional Materials or Storekeeper's Stocks.
- 3. Purchase of passage to Australia for a Non-dependant, etc., etc.

Application should be submitted, addressed to the Director-General of Repatriation and Demobilisation, 54, Victoria Street, London, S.W. 1, in writing, stating fully the reasons for the grant and the amount required by the applicant.

- 3. The undermentioned amounts may be drawn by soldiers of the A.I.F. during the voyage to Australia if travelling by Military Transport and provided the necessary credit exists in the Paybook:—
 - (a) Officers and Nurses ... £10 (b) Sergeants and higher rank £5
 - (c) Other ranks ... £3
- 4. Immediately prior to disembarkation, the following payments will be made:—
 - £10 to soldiers who embarked from Australia prior to 1917 and who have not been back since, provided the necessary credit exists in paybook.

£5 in all other cases, irrespective of paybook balance.

- 5. To assist the District Paymaster in Australia, to effect a prompt settlement of the Pay Account, each soldier during voyage to Australia will be required to:
 - (a) Sign an authority directing the District Paymaster to place the balance due to the soldier's account with any bank or Savings Bank Agency in Australia (free of cost).
 - (b) State in writing his Australian Postal Address.
- 6. Upon disembarkation "Leave of absence on full pay and subsistence" has been approved by the Commonwealth Government according to the year of embarkation or re-embarkation from Australia, as under:—

Leave.

- 7½ days for every six months' service abroad from date of embarkation to date of disembarkation, but in no case will more than 60 days' leave be granted.
 - (a) For this purpose, fractional periods of service over four months will be regarded as six months.
 - (b) Where total period calculated on above scale includes half a day, the latter will count as a whole day for purposes of leave and also subsistence.

- (c) Where members returned to Australia and re-embarked for further service, only the total service outside Australia will count.
- (d) Where period of service abroad is less than six months, not less than 14 days' leave will be granted, without subsistence allowance.
- (e) Those who have taken long service furlough abroad will be granted 14 days' leave without subsistence allowance.

Subsistence.

Three shillings each day for leave granted as above for all ranks with over one year's service abroad, except for those who have taken long service furlough abroad, vide sub-para. (e).

In the case of Officers, Field Allowance will cease as from date of disembarkation.

- 7. Soldiers will be discharged from A.I.F. upon expiration of their leave.
- 8. The District Paymaster in Australia will make available within 4 days of disembarkation all balance to the credit of the soldier's pay account to date of discharge, together with

75 per cent. of accrued Deferred Pay, also subsistence allowance if payable. Balance of Deferred Pay will be payable as soon as the soldier's Pay account has been finalised.

- 9. Final Settlement of the soldier's account will be made by the District Paymaster in Australia.
- 10. If a soldier has enlisted in one Military District, but has his home or relatives in another, he will be permitted to disembark and be discharged in that other District, on the understanding that the Commonwealth will not subsequently be liable to transfer him to the District of his original enlistment. Any soldier desiring such change of District of Disembarkation can arrange same by application to the Officer Commanding the Transport.

In all cases where the home or family of the soldier is situated at a distance from the port of disembarkation a free warrant to the rail-way station nearest such home will be issued from port of disembarkation.

11. All the above provisions apply to the Australian Nursing Service.
