

11th. Light Horse Regiment (Erase heading not required.) will be prepared in manuscript. Remarks and Summary of Events and Information references to Hour Date Place Appendices LUDD Sept Capt C.P. STUMM resumes duties of Adjutant vice Lieut G. Nutting to "C" Squadron. 0600 Hifles buckets were drawn today and issued one for each man armed with a sword. 0900 Notification was received from Brigade that the Court Martial against R.Q.M.S. Jardine 1000 for negligence in loss of rifles etc when the Regiment was at Solomon's Pools in June this year would not be proceeded with. Local leave was given for twelve other ranks per Squadron to visit surrounding villages 1300 excepting those villages placed out of bounds. Training was carried out in Sword work Ablution day for the Regiment today. 0800 6th mounted, and troop and squadron Drill. One officer per squadron and one N.C.O and two other ranks per troop paraded under an 1500 Officer of the Field Squadron for instruction in the use of "Chursas" a device for lifting water from deep wells. The Regiment paradeddismounted for a lecture on venereal disease and the prophylactic 0700 7th. treatment for same. A proportion of men per troop attended a lecture and demonstration on explosives and 0900 demolitions given by an officer of the Field Squadron. A Voluntary musketry practice was carried out today by Two Officers and six other ranks per Squadron to test faulty ammunition, the course fired over, and faulty rifles. Lieut G.S. James and thirty seven other ranks marched in from Training Ismailia and were taken on strigth and posted ten each to "A" and "B" Squadrons and fourteen to "C" Lieut James was posted to Hagrs and assumed duties of Signalling Officer Squadron. vice Lieut Clifford. Church Parade today for Protestant Denominations was held. 8th. 1130 All bayonets and swords were sharpened at the I.O.M. Workshops today. 9th. Training today Sword Exercises mounted. Squadrons Drill and Troop Drill with manouvre. JAFFA	Sept 18	2330	The Regiment arrived at J 21 at JAFFA and bivouaced for the night. With "C" Squadron was detailed to escort a convoy of Camels from J 21 to X 22 near the Nahr El AUJA tomorrow the 19th. Instant. The Balance of the Regiment to escort the wheeled transport of the Division and be responsible for its safety as far as the Nahr Iskanderuneh tomorrow the 19th. Instant.	
NAHR	19	0630 0930 1030 1330 1445	known were discussed. "O" Squadron moved out at this time as escent to the Camel Convoy. The Regiment less "C" Squadron moved off as secont to the wheeled transport of the Division with instructions to take the transport as far as X 32, and there await further instructions Two troops from "B" Squadron with pioneer packs were sent ahead as a ramping party to clear all obstacles from the track and make good the road. Arrived at Mahr Auja and watered horses and moved on to X 33 central which was reached at about 1530. From hereon the road became very bad, one Squadron was placed on the left as a protection and also to assist any waggons that might get stuck in the heavy sand. The other Squadron was posted in rear to help along stragglers. The Transport arrived at Mahr A X 23 when horses were offsadd isd and fed. A halt was made here for one hour. The convoy moved off passing via the Twin trenches and the eastern track of Birket Ramadan As the road was particularly bad for wheeled transport and the wagons were having a good deal of trouble in keeping up, it was reported to the D.A.Q.M.G. of the Division and instruct ns were received that one Squadron was to push ahead with the Divisional Train and Bl echelon as quickly as possible, the other two Squadrons to help along as best as possible the balance of the train. The Camels were placed under the scort of a troop with instructions that when the detination was reached and the forage and rations off loaded the camels were to be returned as quickly as possible to Ras El Ain. The Transport of nearly all B2 Echelons were so over loaded and the B.A.C. so heavy that it was decided when Birket Ramadan was reached to halt for the night and give the horses a night's spell, water the following morning and then push on. The road was particularly bad from X32 and so bad that at times and in fact hearly all along the route it was found necessary to detach whole troops to help the horses through the sand, the men dismounted and manhandling	10 ** SEP 1918

Birket Ramadan	19	2230	Arrived at Birket Hamadam at this time and bivouaced for the night. The Divisional Train and Bl echelon under escort of "C" Squadron pushed on ahead.	
	30	0600	Horses were commenced watering from the shallow pools in the Birket. Attemps were made to make use or the large cumbersome "churses" that had been issued to the Regiment at Ludd, but these were found to be totally unserviceable for this kind of work. The water was not deep enough, nor in the case of narrow wells, was the mouth of the wells large enough, and if it were not for the forethought in bringing cildrums that had been made into buckets, it would have been impossible to water the horses. The column mo ved off, and after proceeding about five miles, it was decided with the consent of the O.C of the Transport to off load all ordnance articles, and dumpt them in a separate heap. It was decided to do this as the wagons were getting stuck in the sand, in some cases right up to the axels, and even with double banking the teams it was not possible to pull them along. Further the transport of two Divisions had been over the same track a few hours previously and had cut it up very badly, making the going every so much worse, so that it was necessary to make a detour to avoid their tracks and pick up fresh ground, in the hope that the surface would be harder and stand the weight of the wagon. At the place where the articles were dumped, there were numerous wagons of the o ther divisions abandored on the road, some with full loads, others that had been emptied of any necessary articles and then abandoned and the teams used in the other wagons. It was here that the Mobile Section of the 4th. L.H. Cfield Ambulance	
Iskerandu	neh 20	1230	was left behind, these wagons afterwards rejoined the Regiment at the Nahr Iskeranduneh. By so jett-ie- unloaded some of the wagons it was possible to push on slowly, but only with great difficulty and the help of the escorting troops. Nahr Iskeranduneh was reached at 1230. The Divisional Transport of the Fifth Cavalry Division was bivouaced here and the Regiment was delayed from 1230 until 1600 whilst this transport was crossing the Wadi. Arrived at Nahr Iskeranduneh and watered and fed up and rested until the transport of the Fifth Cavalry had crossed. This crossing was particularly bad and dangerous, over a narrow bridge left behind by the enemy. Beisan	34th. Sept	1700	The Brigade left for ber Mejamie at this time and arrived there at 1900. Horses were off saddled and arrangements were made for a move at 0230 the next morning.	
Mejamie	35th	.0330	of Machine Cuns. All wheels were left behind. "C" Squadron was detailed as advance guard with one section of Machine Cuns. "A" and "B" Squadron were detailed to make the attack mounted. The Regiment was moving along the Road from Mejamie to Semakh in line of troop columns when the enemy opened fire at close range with Machine Gunsand rifles. A Guide from the Regiment cocupying the Jisr Mejamie Bridgehead accompanied the Regiment forward and reported shortly before the enemy opened fire that there still another two miles to go before the station and cutbuildings were reached. The his he was wrong, the consequence was that the fire was quite unexpected although fortunately there were no casualties. The plan of attack was for the Machine Guns to give covering fire from the Railway onto the town, whilst the attack was made mounted by "A" and "B" Squadrons, charging in line with swords drawn. The strength of the enemy from the first burst of fire was estimated at six machine guns with about one hundred rifles. On account of the unexpected fire from the enemy it was decided to attack the village from the east with two squadrons mounted supported by Machine Gun fire. In launching this attack the whole of the Machine Gun Squadrons came into action and did very effective work. The two Squadrons accordingly went in in two lines one along the Reilway and swinging left charged through the village, the other engaged the enemy who were protecting his left flank with machine gun and rifles about two hundred yards to the East of the village. The country was bad for a charge on account of the numerous pitfalls and long spiked thistles, there were nine men injured from falls alone. The light at this time was bad and the position of the enemy could be located only by the flash of the rifle and machine guns, but apparently this was sufficient as a target for our own machine guns who kept the fire from the snew yens in the outer defences well down and under control. This trench if it had held out could have made it very uncomfortable for the machine guns that subsequently moved up on the western side of the village.
