Herewith Train Timings and Allotment of ~~the~~ of
Transports to Units of this Brigade.

With regard to the former,

- (a) An Advance Party of 1 Officer, and 3 men from each Light Horse Regiment, and 1 N.C.O. and 1 man from the Brigade Train and the Field Ambulance will proceed to Alexandria on Saturday morning. These parties will report to *Capt. Handhaugh* at 7:15 a.m. at the entrance end of Platform No. 1. *Cairo*.
- (b) Units must be at the entraining station a quarter of an hour before time scheduled for the train to be ready for loading, so as to ensure punctuality in trains leaving Cairo.
- (c) Troop Trains are of standard type and will be run alongside the ships at Alexandria, which latter will be berthed together at the Timber Quays. Care must be taken to use all available flat trucks for vehicles. Wagons to go on Infantry Trains should be taken before hand to Palais Kubba and Helmieh so that they can be loaded with their Units when the latter entrain. All vehicles which cannot be accomodated on Troop Trains must be left at Cairo Station clearly marked with the name of the Unit to which they belong and in charge of a few men from the Unit. These vehicles will be picked up as soon as the move is completed, and taken to Alexandria on a special train of flats.

With regard to the latter,

The accomodation on the transports for officers being limited, the best possible use of saloon accomodation must be made.

The hired Transport "Melville" will not sail till she has embarked the special Works Battalion party which is due at Alexandria during the night of the 9/10th.

Instructions regarding wagons will be issued
as soon as possible.

General.

If a wagon has to be left behind, an escort will be left with it, with clear instructions what to do with it (that is it goes on Flat Special from Cairo). Wagons will be loaded packed. All efforts are to be made to place wagons as above indicated.

It is to be distinctly understood that any wagons and baggage left at Helwich and Palais Kubba will not be taken, they must be immediately despatched to CAIRO to go on the Flat Special which departs after Train No. 713 A..

Horses will have to be put in the trains allotted as there will be no animal trucks on the Flat Special.

Composition.

APPENDIX

TURKISH SIGNALS USED IN THE FIELDSignal Pistols.

A. One white signal - for keeping up communications e.g., if a detachment has got some distance away and wishes to show its own unit which way it is going, or if one detachment wishes to show another where it is.

B. A second white signal - tells that a detachment which has gone forward has reached the place to which it was ordered to go.

N.B. When a signal consists of two flashes, the shots should be fired as quickly as possible one after the other.

C. One red signal - to inform that one is in touch with the enemy.
 D. Two red signals - the enemy is advancing.
 E. One green signal - a detachment or reconnoitring party that has gone forward has returned.

Other signals will be decided upon for particular occasions.

Signals for the attack.

Red rocket - That the infantry were half way across the intervening ground between the trenches.

White rocket - That they were close up to the trenches.

Green rocket - That they were in the trenches.

Star shell pistols will be in charge of an Officer in the front lines. The signals are the following -

A red light repeated - Artillery fire should be directed more to the front.

A white light repeated - Enemy's front line has been taken.

A green light repeated - Enemy's main position has been entered.

... repeated three times from front to rear - We are ready to attack.

Ditto from rear to front - Begin attack

... Go back.

... repeated three times from front to rear - Ammunition needed.

ditto from rear to front - Ammunition coming.

Here with Turkish signals used in the field.
 They are continually altered, and are different for different forces, but this list may possibly be of use to you.

ASA G INTELLIGENCE STAFFSURRENDER OF TURKISH TROOPS

In view of the importance of securing Turkish prisoners, both Military and civilian, for the purposes of the Intelligence Staff, it is desirable that, whenever possible, the surrender of such persons should be accepted.

Experience in other fields of the war against ~~Turk~~ Turkey has shown that many Turkish soldiers are serving under compulsion and are anxious to give themselves up at the first opportunity. From these men information of great military value has often been obtained. Consequently, where such a course does not expose our own men to any danger, facilities should be given for as ~~many~~ ^{many} surrenders as possible.

~~Turkish~~ Turkish soldiers as a rule manifest their desire to surrender by holding their rifles butt upwards and by waving cloths or rags of any colour. An actual white flag should be regarded with the utmost suspicion as a Turkish soldier is unlikely to possess anything of that colour.

The following phrases, to be shouted to those apparently desirous of giving themselves up, will assist our officers and men to accept a BONA FIDE surrender without exposing themselves to any unnecessary danger.

TREATMENT OF SURRENDERS.

During the last two days, several instances of the enemy showing a white flag have been reported.

The white flag merely means a desire to treat, usually with a view to surrender. As it is necessary to be on guard against treachery, no one should expose himself to answer the white flag, but to show the white flag that his signal has been seen. A flag, of any colour, may be waved in token of acceptance by the officer in command of the section of trench opposite the white flag.

If any of the enemy then come forward, unarmed and obviously intending to surrender, they should be allowed to advance, though full precautions against treachery should be taken. On arrival at our trenches, they are to be taken in one by one, blindfolded, and led to the headquarters of the section.

This procedure applies also to the approach of an enemy without a white flag, but unarmed and obviously intending to surrender.

Cases may occur, however, when a white flag is displayed but nothing further occurs. In such a case, the officer nearest the spot is at once to inform his battalion commander, who will make application for an interpreter through his section headquarters. The interpreter, on arrival, will call to the enemy, ordering them to come in one by one without arms, if the intention is to surrender, otherwise to remove the flag at once.

AUSTRALIAN AND NEW ZEALAND ARMY CORPS.
INSTRUCTIONS REGARDING COMMUNICATION WITH THE ENEMY.

The following notes are to be widely circulated.

The enemy may possibly now send forward a white flag or Red Crescent flag to cover removal of dead and wounded.

The points to be observed by Commanders of sections and of parts of the fire trenches, are :-

1. Every precaution must be taken to avoid firing in error on people covered by the above flags.
2. But every precaution must also be taken to prevent the enemy using either flag to cover movement with hostile intentions.
3. None of the enemy must be permitted to overlook our trenches.

To do this, on a flag being shown by the enemy, a white flag should be shown in reply to a white flag, a Red Cross flag in reply to a Red Crescent flag. On the person showing the flag coming forward, he should be halted by signal at a point equidistant from the two lines of trench, and a messenger under cover of our flag sent out to meet him.

If the showing of the flag is accompanied by men to collect dead, the whole party must be halted, and not allowed to cross towards our trenches.

An interpreter should then be called for and their intentions ascertained.

If their intention is removal of wounded or dead, an unarmed party may be allowed to come out. Our trenches are to be manned and a sharp look-out kept, but no firing except in necessity, and men should not expose themselves. An unarmed party will then be sent forward with entrenching tools to collect and bury the dead in pits, removing identification discs, unless the corpse is too putrefied to handle, and bury with them all enemy equipment. The enemy should not be allowed to clear any portion of the ground nearer to our trenches than halfway, but up to that limit should be free to remove any articles of clothing or equipment, except guns and machine guns.

Observers should be warned, both in the immediate vicinity of the clearing operations, and in sections overlooking it, to keep a look out for any massing of the enemy or other activity which appears to have a hostile intent.

GENERAL REPORT REGARDING THE ORALS ETC. OF THE TURKISH FORCES
 IN THE SOUTHERN PART OF THE GALLI BULL. (AS OBTAINED FROM UNITS IN
 CONTACT WITH THE ENEMY.

1. It is the general opinion that the Turks are putting up a very good fight, and that their morale appears to be good. They have a large number of machine guns, which they employ freely and with great skill. It is reported that in some cases the Turks will not wait to face a bayonet attack: at the same time other reports show that they wait in their trenches, and fight to the end.
2. The Turks are learning the "ruses de guerre" employed by the Germans. For instance, in one case, an order was shouted out in English, "Officers to the left", and subsequently a heavy fire was opened on that point, by which several officers were killed. Another instance: a regiment, when advancing, was challenged in English, "What unit is that?" On the reply being given, "----- Regiment", the further order was given, "----- Regiment this way!". An effective fire was then opened on the Regiment when it had gone forward in the direction indicated.
3. Sniping is regularly carried out by picked shots, and cases are reported of snipers having been found behind our lines. Our trenches are also swept at regular intervals by machine gun fire. One Brigade adopted the following method, specially to suppress sniping :- The enemy's front was divided into sectors, each of which was continually under observation by a man with strong field glasses. As soon as he discovered a sniper, three picked shots who had been told off with him, picked him off. In this way, a decisive fire superiority was obtained on this part of the front.
4. As far as is known, there has been no instance of misuse of the white flag by the Turks opposite to the British Force. The French, however, report that on a few days ago, a number of snipers under cover of a white flag, moved to a favorable position, whence their fire caused considerable loss.
