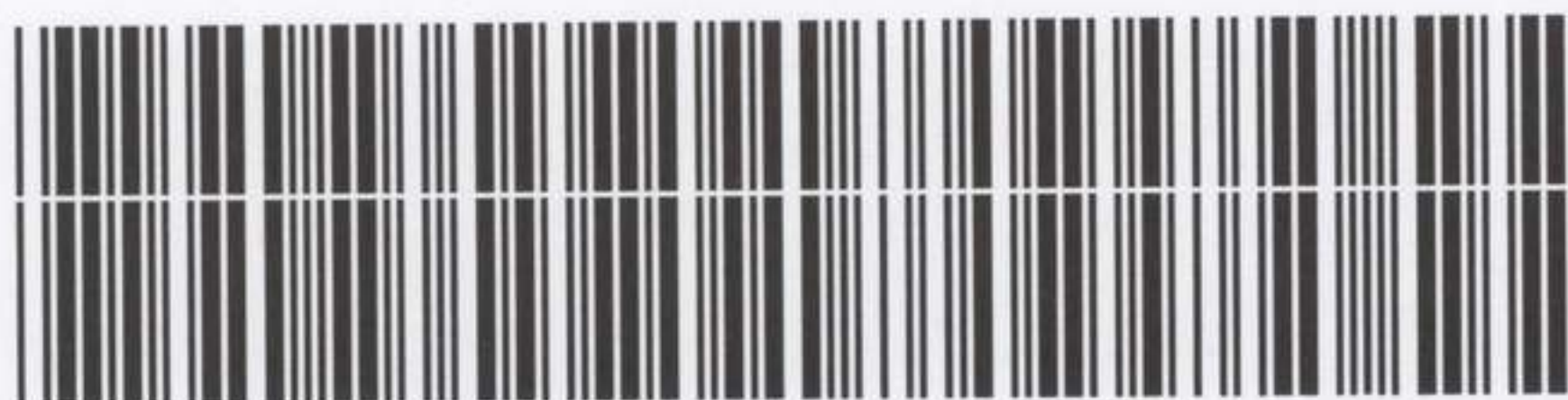

He was attached as an Ambulance Bearer to HQ 45th A.I. Bn. In the attack Bn H.Q. came under enemy barrage fire as they moved off from starting point. Nearly every H.Q. Officer and 7 of the Ambulance Bearers became casualties. He with great coolness collected the surviving 9 Bearers and reformed them into Squads. He personally showed the greatest bravery in dressing the wounded and placing them in sheltered positions. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty on the night of 21st-22nd Sept 1918 South of LE VERQUIER and East of PERONNE. He was driving a Ford Ambulance Car which evacuated wounded from Motor Loading Post to AIS along roads which were continually bombed by enemy aircraft, and also subjected to enemy shell fire. Many bombs fell within a stones throw of his car, and his car was perforated many times by flying fragments. One large piece of metal passing through his car missed his head by inches. He succeeded in doing so, and personally placed the Bearers of the Relieving Amb. with the RMO's, thus ensuring for them a line of evacuations, which otherwise they would not have had that night. ## Report on Sanitary School.

While the Division was in rest, it was considered a good opportunity to instruct a certain number of men in each Unit in Sanitary methods and appliances, and in the improvisation of these from the usual material which is available in most areas.

The O.C. 4th Australian Sanitary Section was responsible for the instruction and training of these men. As accommodation was limited, and also for greater supervision of individual work, the school was made up into three separate courses.

The first October 14th-- 19th  
 " second " 21st-- 26th  
 " third " 28th-- Nov. 1st.

Two men who were supposed to have some knowledge of rough carpentering were detailed from each Unit in the Division for each course.

Each of these courses was divided into a morning and afternoon session, morning 0900-1200., afternoon 1400-1800. One hour of each morning and afternoon session was devoted to a "Lecture on Technical Subjects" by the O.C. Sanitary Section himself or an N.C.O. in his Unit, the remaining time to practical work in the making and improvising of Sanitary Appliances. This latter was done under supervision by the men themselves, usually on the lines as laid down in the preceding lecture and from the study of miniature models.

Some difficulty was experienced in getting sufficient material to begin with, but the Units were intrusted to send all boxes and tins to the Sanitary Section, and this helped considerably.

At the end of each course before the men returned to their Units, an examination was held to test their knowledge, and all passed in a satisfactory manner.

Thus there are now six men in each Unit who should be well versed in the making of all appliances needed by a Unit under ordinary circumstances for its sanitation.

It was intended to hold some demonstrations on this subject for the benefit of Officers, but the projected move of the Division has interfered with this, and it will have to be postponed to a more favourable opportunity.

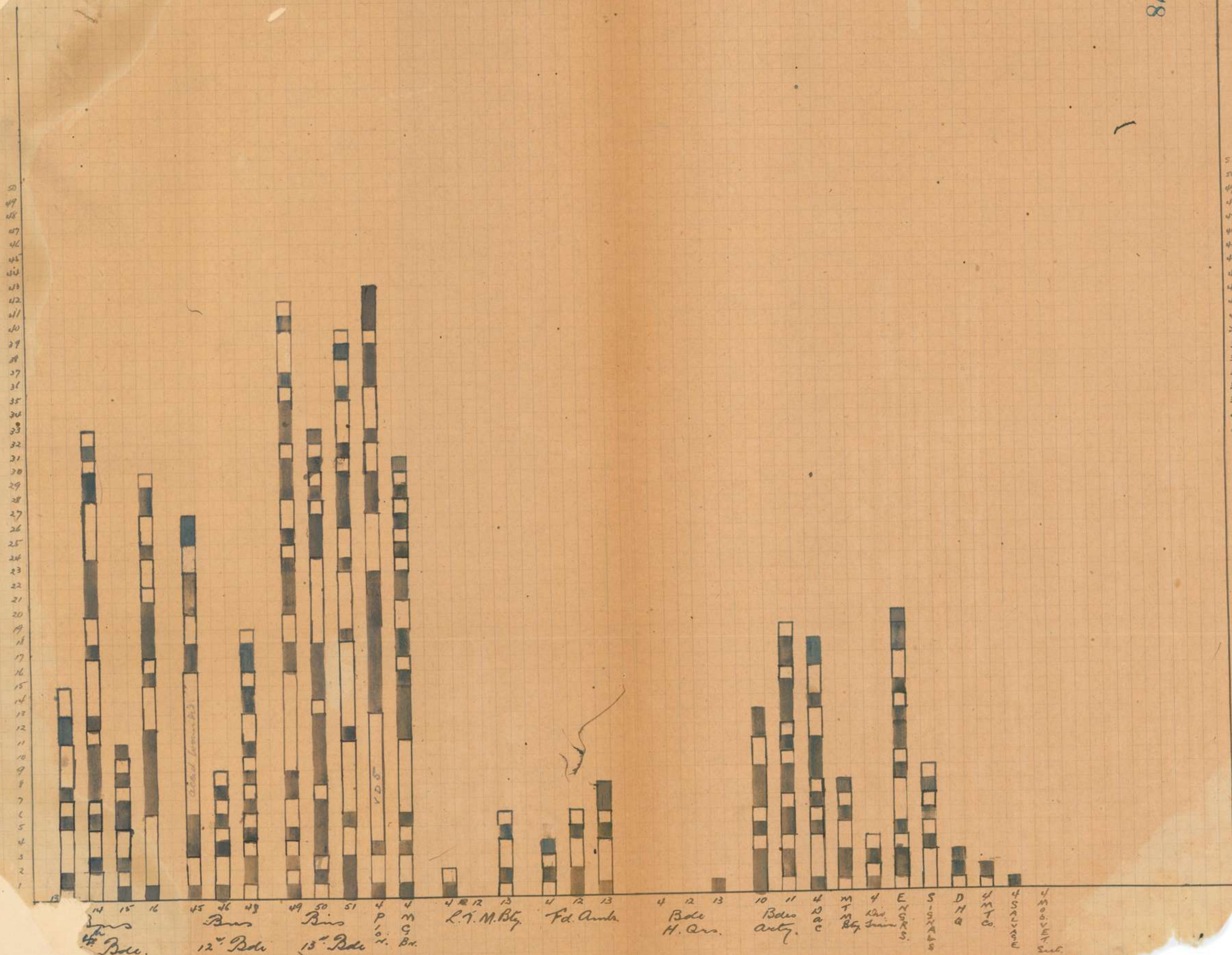






Sick Evacuations to C.C.S. by Units for September 1918

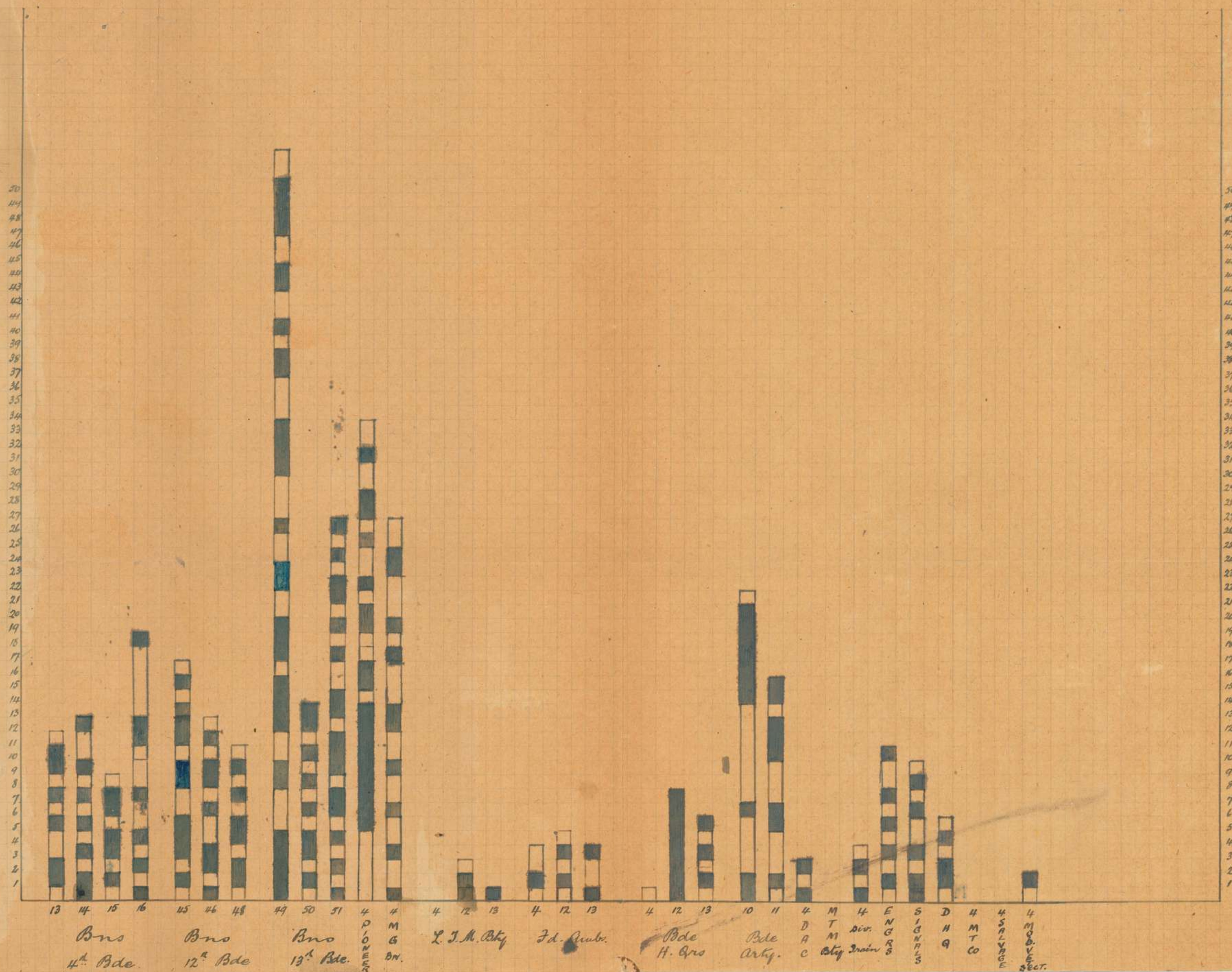




Sick Evacuations to C.C.S. by Units for October 1918.

- (c) Send all cases requiring evacuation to C.C.S. to 4th. Aust. Fld. Amb. by 1500 daily.
- (d) Send all indents for drugs, dressings, etc. to 4th. Aust. Fld. Amb. by 1500 Saturdays.
- (e) Arrange to treat Scabies at Brigade Baths, when established.

ii. O.C. 4th. Aust. Fld. Amb. will:-

- (a) In addition to 4th. Brigade Group, clear sick from 4th. Division Artillery Group in the RAMOUSIES Area.
- (b) Be responsible for the evacuation of all sick from the Divisional Area to C.C.S. Cars carrying cases from 12th. and 13th. Aust. Fld. Ambs. will be at his disposal daily for this purpose.
- (c) Consolidate all indents for drugs etc. and collect them weekly, notifying O's.C. 12th. and 13th. Aust. Fld. Ambs. when available.

2. TRAINING. Will be carried on as in the CAVILLON Area. (See A.A.M.C. Order 115) Special attention will be given to Educational and Recreational Training. At least two Route Marches a week will be carried out.

3. TRANSPORT. As horses are not clipped extra time and care must be spent on grooming. Vehicles and harness must be kept up to the highest standard of smartness. Horse Ambulances will be used to collect sick whenever possible, to conserve the mechanical transport for the long runs to C.C.S's.

MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT.

4TH  
AUSTRALIAN DIV.

NOVEMBER 1918.

During this month owing to the frequent moves and the uncertainty of date of moving during the first 11 days, few men could be kept in Battalion Rest Billet. Moreover, orders were received to evacuate Influenza cases as soon as diagnosed as such. For this reason the number of men evacuated reached the high figure of 40 compared with last month's 15 evacuations. Of this total 29 were cases of Influenza, 6 were due to injuries, 1 Pneumonia, 1 Measles and 2 Venereal Disease.

After the 14th the cold weather set in and coughs and colds became more prevalent.

On leaving FLUY on the 12th the Influenza epidemic seemed to have died away. There were spasmodic cases during the rest of the month until the 23rd when there was a sudden revival of the disease. On the 28th no less than 5 men and three officers were stricken down with this malady.

The men were bathed regularly every 10 days at the Brigade Baths.

Only three cases of Scabies were recognised throughout the month.

Billets occupied en route were invariably in a filthy state and required much cleaning up.

During the period cases of diarrhoea have been frequent and altho endeavors made to trace the source of same I was unsuccessful.

These cases however quickly responded to treatment with no serious accompanying symptoms.

Only possible source seemed to me to be the coffee supplied by the cafés which was certainly not the pure article but an infusion of a roasted nut which probably contained laxative principles.

Scabies have been fairly numerous with at present about 20 men suffering from it.

The non isolation of cases, close contact in large billets and absence of duplicate uniforms to a great extent prevents eradication of the disease.

In other respects the health of the men is very good and they express themselves as <sup>being</sup> comfortable and sufficiently warm at night.

Sanitation

Sanitation is not quite satisfactory owing to inability up to present to obtain fly proof box latrines.

The Battalion is making all efforts to remedy this matter which is however much dependant on the supply of building material.
