

1. The 2nd L.H.Bde will detail one Regiment and One Section of 2nd L.H.Field Ambulance to proceed to SEMAKH in relief of the 7th Indian Infantry Brigade.

2. The Regiment and Section Field Ambulance will march as follows :-

7th November	- RAS EL AIN.
8th "	- TUL KERAM.
9th "	- MESSUDI EH.
10th "	- JENIN.
11th "	- NAZARETH.
12th "	- TIBERIAS.
13th "	- SEMAKH.

3. On arrival the Regiment and Section Field Ambulance will come under the direct orders of Inspector Palestine Lines of Communication, and will be located in the vicinity of SEMAKH.

The Regiment will be kept concentrated; its role being that of a mobile reserve which can be readily moved to any point in case of disturbance.

4. When the Regiment is in position at SEMAKH the 7th Indian Infantry Brigade is being withdrawn to rejoin its Division.

5. A proportion of 2nd Line Train Wagons will accompany the Regiment.

6. The completion of each days march and the relief of the 7th Indian Infantry Brigade at SEMAKH will be wire PRIORITY to this office.

Mosquito breeding is still prevalent and new Malarial infections must be expected for another two months.

All measures of prevention must therefore be re-started at once; Units which handed in mosquito nets should be re-issued with them, the greatest care must be taken in the selection of non-malarial camp sites, Medical Authorities being consulted on the subject, and anti-mosquito breeding measures vigorously pursued.



REPORT ON AUSTRALIAN PATTERN AMBULANCE WAGGON. MOUNTED DIVISION

The Australian pattern ambulance waggon has proved far superior to any other type of horse ambulance vehicle for the following reasons, -

1. 4 lying patients can be carried with comfort as well as 3 sitting cases.
2. If no lying patients carried, 12 sitting patients can be carried with comfort.
3. The patients are not bumped about so much as in other vehicles owing to the waggon being heavier in pattern and more low set.
4. In hilly country it is considered advisable that 5 horses be used which can be and are (in this unit) driven from the box seat.

CIRCULAR MEMORANDUM No.27.

PROMOTION OF WARRANT OFFICERS AND NON-COMMISSIONED OFFICERS
1914 LEAVE PERSONNEL.

The promotion of Warrant and Non-Commissioned Officers who are eligible for 1914 leave, and of other Warrant and Non-Commissioned Officers appointed to fill vacancies caused by 1914 personnel proceeding on leave, are governed by the following rulings:-

(1) Vacancies caused by casualties other than by personnel proceeding on 1914 leave may be filled by substantive, E.R., or temporary promotions in the ordinary way, whether the men promoted are eligible for leave or not.

(2) Vacancies caused by personnel proceeding on 1914 leave may be filled by temporary promotions, whether the men promoted are eligible for leave or not.

(3) Men eligible for leave who are granted E.R. or temporary rank under (1) will retain their rank if still holding same at date of proceeding on leave.

(4) Men eligible for leave who are promoted to temporary rank under (2) will relinquish their temporary rank as from date of embarkation, if they subsequently proceed on leave.

(5) No man is eligible for promotion whilst on leave.

To enable action to be taken in this Office, it is essential that, in showing promotions on Army Forms B.213 you give full particulars of the nature of the casualties which cause the vacancies being filled.

The Divisional Area was visited throughout by the inspectors today and the question of manure disposal and of fly breeding followed up by them.

1. Manure disposal. The universal method is to allow orchardists to remove the manure whether directly from heaps in the lines or from a general B&E dump (1st B&E). The German horses collect the horse droppings with the drivers.

Throughout orchards were found dumps of manure some in pits but uncovered, mostly on the ground. It is difficult to find breeding in these heaps - the manure is very mixed with earth. After about 4 weeks a circular trench is dug around each tree and filled with the ripened manure. Thus plenty of time is given for the completion of the life cycle of the fly under suitable and undisturbed conditions. The German team cart their manure to an orchard where Beduins at once transfer it to around the trees but this is the less common method.

2
The orchardists have the byproduct of probably 5 or 6000 horses to deal with and are finding it beyond their capacity to deal with owing to the limited labor available hence the careless dumping is universal. Further dumps are to be found in backyards perhaps alongside the human house latrine & the human excreta incorporated with the other refuse.

Manure disposal is the primary failure and needs controlling. I would suggest that units either road spread their manure (burning is increasingly difficult) or ^{directly} control the disposal of manure by the cultivator directly.

The cultivators and all occupiers of any allotment should avoid the present dumping habit and adopt at once the system of pit burial with earth packing. A pit say 9 feet long, 6 feet deep and 6 ft wide sides the damp manure tipped in and packed down. Then 4 to 6 inches of earth rammed in on top.

This method not only curbs the breeding of flies but also preserves the agricultural value of the manure. I would suggest both municipalities being informed and the cultivators compelled to do so except the method of further disposal by digging in all previous collections.

REPORT ON MALARIA IN ANZAC MOUNTED DIVISION 1918.

From January till May 1918 there were only isolated cases of malaria occurring in the Anzac Mounted Division. Most of it was probably due to infection contracted on the Nahr Auja in December 1917.

The average weekly malarial rate for this period was _____ 3 and the highest number in one week 7.

SECOND PERIOD. May 11th. to June 15th the effects of the Jordan Valley were being definitely felt but owing to two weeks of this period being spent in the Bethlehem area it was not severe.

The weekly malarial rate for this period was 18.4 and the highest number in one week was 31.

THIRD PERIOD. June 16th. to August 4th the effects of the Jordan Valley were severely felt especially as the anti-mosquito work had not by that time become fully effective.

The weekly malarial rate for this period was 81.9 and the highest number for one week was 221.

Two weeks of this period were also spent in the Bethlehem area.

FOURTH PERIOD. August 25th. to October 5th. the beneficial effects of the anti-mosquito work in the Jordan Valley was very definitely shown and the effect of moving forward into untreated areas had not become marked.

The weekly malarial rate for this period was 46.3 and the highest number for one week 77.

None of this period had been spent in the Bethlehem area.

FIFTH PERIOD. The effects of moving into an untreated area were most decisively felt.

The malarial rate for this period was 320.7 and the highest number for one week 457.

Nearly all of this occurred in two Brigades, the 1st. and the N.Z., who spent two days September 21st/23rd. in the Jisr-ed-Damieh area before moving into the hills. The weekly rate for these two Brigades was 118.3 and 131.6 against 50.3 in the 2nd. L.H. Brigade which moved directly into the hills from a protected area. The difference is even more striking if confined to the two weeks ending October 12th. and 19th. in which most of the Jisr-ed-Damieh infection was felt. 1st. L.H. Brigade 152.5, N.Z.M.R. Brigade 180, and 2nd. L.H. Brigade 52.

SIXTH PERIOD. October 27th. to November 23rd. the malarial rate had dropped again to a fairly normal figure 65.5 and is continuing to fall. For most of this period the Division was back in the Deiran area, but most of the infection was picked up in their passage back through the Jordan Valley.

The above figures are for pathologically diagnosed malaria only. Total number 2462. There were in addition a very large number of cases of pyrexia which were never diagnosed malaria. As the pyrexia curve very closely followed the malaria curve throughout the year it is probable that a large number of these cases were undiagnosed malaria, the blood parasite having been obscured by quinine. The ratio of cases of malaria and cases of pyrexia in which no parasite was found is as follows:

The different ratios in the fourth period was undoubtedly due to influenza which was most markedly felt about this time. In the fifth period I am of opinion that the pyrexias were mostly malaria undiagnosed pathologically. The majority of the cases did not look like influenza.

Statistics of admissions to Field Ambulances for malaria are attached. The number of deaths which took place in field ambulances from malaria were 3 of Anzac Mounted Division, the cause of death in each case being toxæmia without further complications.

Also died of malaria in Field Ambulances of Anzac Mounted Division Indians 2, R.W.I.s. 1, Egyptians 2. The cause of death in these cases was also toxæmia.

EFFECT OF INFLUENZA EPIDEMIC. Except that it complicated the diagnosis, the influenza epidemic did not have any marked effect on the malaria epidemic while the cases were in the division. In almost every case the patients were evacuated before the effect of the double infection could be felt.

MALARIAL DIAGNOSIS UNITS. In the recent operations microscopic examination of blood slides proved to be of inestimable value. In every case that developed pyrexia the question immediately arose "is it influenza or malaria?" If the latter it was essential to give intra-muscular quinine at once but if this was done before a blood slide could be taken the probabilities were that the case would never be subsequently diagnosed and might be discharged without a proper course of treatment, as influenza. If influenza it might go through a course of treatment for malaria on the presumption that the quinine had obscured the parasite.

When the severe outbreak of pyrexia N.Y.D. occurred at AIDAH on October 5th, a detachment of the Anzac Field Laboratory was immediately brought up from Jericho and as many cases as possible were examined before giving quinine. Over 90% of those examined proved to be malaria.

This detachment consisting of 1 Off and 1 O/R. with all necessary equipment was brought up in a light motor ambulance and proved sufficient for the purpose.

I am of opinion that wherever possible a detachment of a Malarial Diagnosis Unit should accompany the mobile section of an ambulance in malarial country. The necessary equipment would be less than 100 lbs. and a bell tent is sufficient accommodation.

PROPHYLACTIC QUININE. The movements of units were so irregular and the areas so varied that I am unable to give an opinion as to the value of prophylactic quinine. All I have observed is that patients on large doses of prophylactic quinine do get infected and in some instances die.

TREATMENT. The treatment adopted in this Division was to give intra-muscular quinine at the earliest possible moment - Grains XII per day and to supplement it with quinine by the mouth - 40 grains per day.

On one occasion when there was a temporary shortage of hypodermic quinine the difference in the condition of the patients was very noticeable.

SUMMARY OF ANTI-MOSQUITO WORK CARRIED OUT BY ANZAC MOUNTED DIVISION

Period 2nd. to April 27th.

During this period the Division with the I.C. Brigade attached were responsible for the anti-mosquito work in both sectors of the Jordan Valley defences.

Mosquito squads were organised in all units and systematic work was commenced but owing to the large amount of work presenting and the relatively small number of men available for this duty no real impression was made on the work. An area map drawn up on the 12.4.18, showed active anopheles breeding to be taking place in the Aujah and Nellehah, the Tel-el-Sultan water area and at Ain Hajla. The Wadi Kelt was fast diminishing in volume and no breeding was demonstrated in it during this period. Work was suspended from the 28.4.18. to 5.5.18. owing to operations East of Jordan.

Period May 5th./10th.

Vigorous anti-malarial work was recommenced in the Divisional area which now consisted only of the Right Sector of Jordan Defences. The Tel-el-Sultan, Hajla and Nimrin swamp areas all showed mosquito breeding.

Period May 7th. to June 19th.

The Division was situated in the Bethlehem area. Mosquito breeding, mainly culex, was demonstrated in over 500 cisterns located in this area. Bi-weekly oiling was undertaken by the Anzac Sanitary Section.

Period 19th. June to 20th. July.

The Division took over the left sector Jordan Valley Defences. The closest supervision was maintained over the whole water area and mosquito breeding was at a minimum. A company of Sikh Pioneers was attached to assist in initial construction work in the central Aujah and Wadi Hueiameh, the malarial squads of units being fully employed on maintenance work. Towards the close of this period no anopheles breeding could be demonstrated in the Divisional water area.

Period 21st. July to 23rd. August.

Routine oiling of cisterns was carried out in the Bethlehem area.

Period 23rd. August to 5th. September.

Routine maintenance work in Left Sector Jordan Valley Defences.

Period 5th. September to 21st. October.

The Division had control of both Right and Left Sectors Jordan Valley Defences. Considerable anopheles breeding was found in the ~~Right~~ Sector, notably in the southern aqueduct of the Wadi Kelt in close proximity to the Supply Depot and in the lower reaches of the Wadi Hueiameh. A working party of 200 E.L.C. was secured to carry out the canalising necessary to control breeding in this area. This work was not fully completed when operations commenced. After 21.10.18 no further anti-malarial work was carried out in the Divisional area.

D.A.D.M.S. and O.C. Anzac Sanitary Section were responsible for the supervision and execution of the work.


