

WAR DIARY FEBRUARY 1919.

- Location of Office and Dump and Bootmakers Shop at Onhaye.

 Armourers Shop at Gerin.

 104th Army Brigade R.F.A. with B.A.C. and P.rk Section moved to D.A.D.O.S., 32nd Division for administration.

 The Divisional Railhead still located at Florennes.
- Advice received that Condr. C.S. Newman had been promoted 2nd Lieut. and that he has been posted to this Division for duty.

 Wire received that all trains for returning stores to the Base are cancelled for the present owing to the railway strike.
- Attended conference of D. A. Ds. O. S. at Corps Headquarters at Ham.

 Condemnation wire received for an 18-pdr carriage for the 41st
 Battery. No new carriage was demanded from the Base as it was not
 considered necessary in view of reductions of Batteriez R. F. A. to
 four gun Batteries.
- 4th Office Routine.
- on D. A. Q. M. G. also 13th Brigade Headquarters and was informed by the D. A. Q. M. G. that the first train alloted to this Division for return of demobilisation stores to the Base was now arranged for the 10th instant. and that Mr. Newman was to go to Chatelineau to supermntend the loading on the 7th instant.
- D.A.Q.M.G. now advises that our train will not now leave until the 11th instant.

 A shortage in Australian Patern Boots is now being experiencied.

 My last two bulk demands for Boots having been met by the supply of English Pattern Boots. Wrote to Division asking that representation be made to hasten the supply of Australian Boots as many of the Units refused to accept English boots.
- 7th 500 sacks being consigned from Calais without indent for use of Units of the Division when returning atores to the Base.

 Owing to the continued frost large demands are being received for Frost Cogs.

 Half a tone of mineral jelly wired for for use in packing guns and machine Guns before return to Base.
- 8th 2nd Lieut Newman proceeded to Chatelineau to superintend loading of train of Artillery Stores.
- Owing maxima to the fact that no trucks have been available for some considerable time for the despatch of stores to Calais. on account of the railway strike, a very large quantity of salvage has accumulated, some of which is at railhead at Florennes and the remainder at my store at Onhaye. This is being continually being pilfered and application has been made to obtain from 4th Army authority to send two truck loads to Havre, but so far without sincess.

 Advice received that Major Tuckett will probably be returning to the Division in the course of a few days.
- 10th Complaints have recently been made by several Units that Horse and Mule Shoes have been issued without taps for frost cogs. All Units have therefore been asked to report on this matter and also to give particulars of any marks that may be on the shoe itself or on the boxes they are packed in, so that the matter may be reported. as it is most essential during a period of continued frost such as

- oth is at present prevailing that shoes should all be tapped.
- 11th A.D.O.S. advises that an aditional 500 sacks are being consigned from Calais without indent for use of Units in packing up small stores for return to Base.
- Units are urgently in need of Frost Cogs as owing to the continued frost very large quantities are being used. Ample supplies have been demanded by me from the Base, but stores are now taking ten to fourteen days from date of indent to arrive and, although, the full authorised reserve was held by me it was not found to be adequate.
- Information received to the effect that Major J.H.TUCKETT has now been appointed A.D.O.S., Australian Corps.
- 14th Office Routine.
- 15th Office Routine.
- Mr Walker visited Chatelineau.to make arrangements regarding the loading of the first demobilisation train.

 Thaw precautions adopted.

 On arrival at Chatelineau it was found that the demobilisation train had beencancelled.
- 17th Received wire from Base advising 3 tons General Stores placed on rail. also 8 tons clothing.
- 18th 4 tons general stores received from Calais. The truck had been very much tampered with and quite a number of articles stolen. This pilfering has been greatly on the increase lately and causes a large amount of extra clerical work.

 Lieut.Walker proceeded to Chatelineau for the purpose of selecting a suitable site for the store when it is moved from Onhaye. A place was chosen close to the Railhead.
- 19th Office Routine.
- 20th Thaw precautions lifted.
 Units of 4th Australian Divisional Artillery and the 14th and 48th
 Australian Infantry Battalions returned their Mobilisation equipment
 to the demobilisation store at Chatelineau.
 Advice received that 7 tons general kank stores despatched from Base
 today.
- Mobilisation stores of the 4th and 12th Australian Light Trench Mortar Batteries, also the 50th Infantry Battalion returned to Chatelineau.

 Advice received from Australian Corps that the first demobilisation train for the Base will leave on the 24th instant. In order to get an idea as to the method of receiving stores at the Base it was decided to send one of our own N.C.Os. down to Calais with the first train.
- 22nd 3 tons general stores and 8 tons clothing received from Base. This consignment was very much pilfered as was the case in the previous lot received on the 18th inst.

 4th Aust. Field Company Engineers and Cable Section, 4th Australian Divisional Signal Company returned their equipment to Chatelineau.
- Mobilisations stores of the 10th and 11th A.F.A. Brigade Signal Sub. Sections, also 7th and 8th Medium Trench Mortar Batteries were today handed in to demobilisation depot at Chatelineau.

 Three dasks of mineral jelly and three bales of flannelette sent to

- 23rd Chatelineau from the store at Onhaye for use in preservation of Guns and Machine Guns prior to their return to Base.
- 24th The first demobilisation train, comprising 16 flat tank trucks for vehicles and six covered trucks, five for stores and one for the use of the gaurd, was loaded and despatched to Base today.

 13th Australian Light Trench Mortar Battery and 16th Infantry

 Battalion handed in their stores today.
- Owing to the progress of demobilisation and the proposed amalgamation of the 1st and 4th Australian Divisions, it has been decided to move the 4th Division into close proximity with the 1st Division at Chatelet. With this in view it will be no longer necessary to maintain a store at Onhaye, and consequently two lorry loads of stores were despatched to the new store at Chatelineau, where we shall be in close touch km with Divisional Units when they move to the new area.
- 26th 12th Aust. Field Company Engineers today handed in their equipment at Chatelineau.

 Two more loads of stores despatched from Onhaye.
- 27th Sub.Conductor R.McDermid who had been in charge of the Artillery Group promoted to Conductor to fill the vacancy caused by the promotion of Condr. Newman to 2nd Lieut.

 Owing ot the shortage of sacks for packing up stores, 11,000 German sand bags were handed over to us by the 10th Australian Field Artillery Brigarde.
- 4 tons clothing and boots received from Base. Here again, although the truck showed no signs of having been tampered with, on checking the stores with the Vouchers it was found that about 40 pairs of Australian Pattern Boots were missing.

 46th Infantry Battalion, 4th Machine Gun Battalion and No.5 Section Divisional Signal Company all handed in their equipment to demobilisationx to depot today.

 One lorry load of stores sent from Onhaye to Chatelineau.
