W NUEIMAH	lst	2000	Four Officers from "A" Squadron reported to the Stafford Regiment and accompanied their patrols on the East side of the Jordan. One officer each from "B" and "C" Squadrons reported to 6th Cavalry Regiment and inspected second line of defence on Wadi AUJA. The Regiment - less "A" Squadron left its present bivouac area and marched to W. AUJA and relieved 6th Cavalry Regiment. Relief was completed by 2200, this Regiment - less one squadron being in Anzac Divisional Reserve. "A" Squadron, 4th L. H. Regiment, attached to 12th L. H. Regt marched to AUJA Bridgehead and relieved Stafford Yeomanry. Two troops from this squadron patrol the area East of the Jordan daily, leaving at daylight and returning at dusk. 2300. Enemy shelled W. AUJA on our front.

JERICHO 1-40000 J.l.c	14th	6430	Enemy attacked and broke through defences to the right of ABU TELLUL at about 0400 but were driven back by counter attack of 1st L.H. Brigade. The Regiment stood to and remained saddled up until 1430. This bivouac area was under heavy enemy artillery fire during the early part of the morning, casualties being 1 0/R Killed; 2 0/Rks wounded and 4 draught horses killed. Six hostile aircraft also flew over the bivouac at a very low altitude but no bombs were dropped in the immediate vicinity.	
	16th	- 1	This area was again heavily shelled by enemy artillery at intervals throughout the day and sustained the following casualties; 1 0/R killed; 3 0/Rks wounded, by H.E. shell fire. The 11th L.H. Regiment took over the line from 12th L.H. Regiment and "B" Squadron of this Regt. remained at AUJA Bridgehead attached to 11th L.H. Regiment for patrol duty East of the Jordan.
