<p>Sunday, 1 August 1915 ANZAC COVE, Gallipoli</p>	<p>A new Map of portions of the GALLIPOLI PENINSULA 1:20,000 was brought into use at midnight (Appendix 71). All quiet during the day along the line. At night, bombs thrown from our trenches did rather more fire than usual. A strong barbed wire entanglement was erected during the night by the Turks across the CHALAH DERE (S.O.B. 1-4). Considerable movement of men and horses has been observed for the last few days in the direction of KUTCHUK ANAFARTA. The bulk of the men available have been employed in improving communications within the ANZAC Position and in clearing stores, guns and ammunition for fresh troops which are due shortly.</p>	<p>Appendix 71 CENT. <p>Monday, 2 August 1915 ANZAC COVE, Gallipoli.</p>	<p>A quiet day. A small defensive mine was exploded in front of Quinn's Post in No. 3 Section &amp; produced a heavy burst of fire. Army Corps Order No 15 with Order of Battle and Table of Movements received. This notified the arrival of troops at Anzac and detailed the consequent re-adjustment of troops.</p>	<p>Appendix 72</p>

During the night short bursts of fire <del>and</del> , bomb throwing and the burning of flares drew a large volume of fire from the enemy. During the day the following were issued: Divisional Order No 10 (Appendix 72) Memorandum forwarding "Organisation Order to Troops." <del>Divisional Instruction No 10</del> Army Corps Order No 16 and Instructions to Major General Sir A.J. Wednesday 4 August 1915 ANZAC COVE, Gallipoli	Nothing unusual during the day. At night attempts to draw the enemy's fire were again successful. Chinese crackers were used and at first drew a good volume of fire. Artillery engaged in registering LONESOME PINE, LITTLE TABLE TOP and BIG TABLE TOP. A memorandum was issued appointing officers to take command of the various Brigades in case of casualties. Circular Memo issued commanding Divisional Order No 11 d/d 4/8/15. Divisional Headquarters moved to No 3 Outpost in No 3 Section during the afternoon. The Operations of the 5-10 August are described in the Report on these Operations by Major General Sir A. J. Girdle of August vide Appendix 79 The leading Columns reached their rendezvous well up to time but from this on Operations were considerably delayed and consequently the rear Troops were much behind time. Friday 6 August (cont)	<p>CHAILAK DERE &amp; AGHYL DERE (b) By the slow progress at first of the left Covering Force which did not gain a secure footing on the DAMAK TELIK BAIR till after midnight - This was largely due to the fact that the North western spurs of BAUCHOP HILL i.e. TAYLORS KNOB and WALDEN POINT were found to be still occupied by the enemy whilst the Div left <del>the</del> Covering Force came up.</p> <p>(c) By the fact that the Guide of the left Assaulting Column (A Greek) led the Column over the saddle between TAYLORS KNOB and WALDEN POINT instead of round the latter feature to the AGHYL DERE: This entailed the passage of a very restricted defile &amp; caused the column to lengthen out &amp; this in turn delayed troops in rear.</p> <p>The advance of the two Assaulting Columns up the three line of advance was steady but slow as the hills on either side had to be picketed: No firing was permitted the bayonet alone being used. The Battalion using the SAZLIBEIT DERE was considerably delayed owing to the guide losing his way but it eventually connected up with the CHAILAK DERE Column.</p>	<p>Map of</p>

Saturday, 7 August 1915 No 2 Post, ANZAC, Gallipoli	By about 11 a.m. The forward movement of the Force had ceased. Units & formations were much mixed up and the losses had been heavy. The Troops were very tired owing to the long <del>and</del> night march and the steep & intricate nature of the scrub covered country. Brigadier General Johnston, commanding the New Zealand Infantry Brigade made an attempt to gain ground but this was stopped by cross rifle & machine gun fire. He intended to make another effort at 6 p.m. but <del>this</del> did not do so in view of <u>Divisional order</u> No 12 issued at 8.30 p.m.	Appendix 80.

<p>Sunday, 8 August, 1915. No 2 Post, ANZAC COVE Gallipoli.</p>	<p>During the assault on CHUNUK BAIR itself, comparatively few casualties occurred, The Troops on top however suffered severely from cross rifle and machine gun fire and especially from shell fire from the direction of KOTA CHEMEN TEPE and from the South East.</p> <p>Until communication trenches over exposed portions of RHO-DO DEN DRON SPUR were made, the forwarding of reinforcements, ammunition, water etc was much hampered.</p> <p>In the centre, the assaulting columns were hampered by the difficult nature of the ground - steep narrow spurs and tortuous gullies made deployment difficult - and the enemy's machine guns swept most of the ground over which an advance on a broad front was possible.</p> <p>On the left, the 4 Australian Infantry Brigade met large enemy reinforcements and, but for the skillful handling of a rearguard, which included a large proportion of machine guns, would have suffered far more heavily than it did. Monday, 9 <sup>th</sup> August 1915. No 2 Post, ANZAC COVE Gallipoli.	<p>The third assault on the CHUNUK BAIR Ridge was timed for 5.15 am. The main attacking Columns under General Baldwin, 38<sup>th</sup> Infantry Brigade found it impossible to get on to RHODODENDRON SPUR and deploy for attack in rear of the N.2. Troop. This was due to the fact that the CHAILAK DERE - the only avenue of approach to RHODODENDRON SPUR is narrow and tortuous and was blocked to a great extent by mules, stretcher parties etc. Orders had been given for the DERE to be kept clear of all traffic during the passage of the Columns: but in spite of this the gully was hopelessly blocked.</p> <p>General Baldwin made an attempt to get up on to RHODODENDRON SPUR by another route but was unable to do so. He then turned his Columns about and marched via LITTLE TABLE TOP with the AGHYL DERE and eventually endeavoured to launch his attack via the FARM. The result was that instead of starting his attack from the top of Rhododendron Ridge he started it from the foot of the CHUNUK BAIR: also the numerous delays to which his Column was subjected made his attack late.</p> <p>A portion of the G/Grkha Rifle, part of General Cox's Column, actually reached the top of SARI BAIR - unfortunately, before they had recovered from the disintegration caused by the long climb, they were counterattacked and at the same time several <del>shot</del> heavy shell, almost certainly fired by one of H.M. Ships, fell among them and they were unable to maintain their position. Had there been any fresh formed bodies of men <del>ready</del> available to support the Grkhas, it is probable that the fortune gained would have been made good.</p> <p>Divisional Order No 14 issued at 0900.</p>	For narrative see Appendix 79 Page 15 <sup>th</sup> seq.

<p>Tuesday, 10<sup>th</sup> August 1915 No 2 Post. ANZAC COVE, Gallipoli.</p>	<p>The Turkish attack on our position at CHUNUK BAIR was delayed suddenly and with great violence. Of the first three lines, two were destroyed by our fire; but the third swept over our trenches and drove the remainder of the garrison down the hill. The confused mass of men poured down on to the bivouac of the 5<sup>th</sup> Wilts Regt who had arrived during the night. This Regt was engaged in digging shelters as it had been subjected to machine gun fire earlier in the morning and had no time to get under arms: so it too was swept away and eventually got down partly into the SARLI BEIT DERE and partly towards the FARM: in the former gully it came under machine gun fire from BATTLESHIP HILL. The Turks at first advanced over the crest of the hill between CHUNUK BAIR and BATTLESHIP HILL in dense masses and suffered severely from our Gun and Machine Gun fire: later they charged across in successive lines, each line, as it came on, being engaged by our 18-pr batteries. The Turks behaved with the greatest gallantry: but few of them were seen going back over the ridge when their attack finally came to a standstill. A prisoner captured a few days later described the dead on the slopes South of CHUNUK BAIR as being "like corn that has been reaped".</p> <p>2 Battalions, 29<sup>th</sup> (British) Infantry Brigade joined the Force. A redistribution of the Troops in the line was found necessary and Force Order No 15 was issued. The occupation and consolidation of the line was ordered and the offensive of the Force, <sup>as a whole</sup> came to a standstill for the time being.</p>	<p>In narrative see Appendix 79 page 18 et seq.</p> <p>Appendix 82 B.F.O. <p>Thursday 12 August 1915</p> <p>No 2 Post, ANZAC</p> <p>Gallipoli.</p> <p>Night 12/13</p>	<p>The day passed quietly along the whole front - improvements to fire trenches and the construction of communication trenches being in progress. Little work could however be done on the more important portions of the line by day as the enemy, who dominated our positions from the SARI BAKIR Ridge, at once observed and opened fire on movements by bodies of troops.</p> <p>On the left, General Cox ordered an attack on KASLIK KUYU and an advance of his line of picquets which stretched across the plain to the ASMAK DERE. The former operation was not successful but the picquet line was advanced to a more favourable position. Satisfactory touch with the 9<sup>th</sup> Corps was not however obtained. The right of this Corps rests at the Crossroads South of 92 A.3. and our left at the H of KAZLAN CHAIR - thus leaving a gap of 4000 yds. In No 5 Section a small enterprise was carried out from the APEX on RHODODENDRON Ridge - a Turk trench was seized, some damage being done to the enemy. (It transpired later that the "bombs" consisted of soda water bottles filled with kerosene &amp; fitted with fuse and detonator!).</p> <p>During the night 17/18 August two attempts were made on the Knoll (since named THE PINNACLE) opposite the APEX on Rhododendron Spur. Casualties were inflicted on the Turks, but the attempt <del>was</del> did not <del>successfully</del> succeed in destroying the bomb proof which the Turks had erected there.</p>	<p>WW Map. 92.</p>
Wednesday, 18 August 1915 No 2 Post, ANZAC Gallipoli.	<p>All quiet during the day.</p> <p>During the night 18/19 August a further attempt was made against the bomb-proof on the PINNACLE (vide 17 Aug 15). 

1. The contents of para 3 of this Memorandum are to be treated as secret and are only to be communicated only to the extent that is necessary to ensure the efficient carrying out of the orders therein contained.
2. A re-distribution of Troops in the Division will be carried out as stated in para 3. All moves are to be carried out as quietly and secretly as possible and every precaution is to be taken to prevent the enemy from discovering either from his Observation Posts or from the air, the re-distribution of our Forces. The orders issued with regard to hostile aeroplanes are to be strictly observed.

NO. 3 SECTION OF DEFENCE

3. (a) The Battalion N.Z. Infantry Brigade now in REST GULLY will move to a bivouac in MONASH GULLY selected by the G.O.C. No. 3 Section : to be ENTIRELY CLEAR of Rest Gully by 10 p.m. 3rd August.
- (b) The 1st(Australian) Light Horse Brigade will relieve Units of the N.Z. Infantry Brigade now in QUINN'S POST and POPE'S HILL on the 4th and 5th August : relief to be complete by 7.30 p.m. 5th August.  
2 Companies, 40th Infantry Brigade will be available for the Inner Defences on the night 4th/5th August.
- (c) The 1st (Australian) Division takes over COURTNEY'S POST by the evening of the 5th August. Detailed arrangements to be made by G.O.C. 3rd Section direct with the G.O.C. 2nd (Australian) Infantry Brigade.
- (d) The N.Z. Infantry Brigade will move to HAPPY VALLEY (Square 80.M. 5) during the night 5th/6th August via REST GULLY.

MULES. The O.C. Divisional Train will allot mules as under:-

Two to each Brigade for the Brigade Signal Section  
To Engineer units in consultation with the C.R.E.  
Transport mules allotted to the Division will work under the orders of the Senior Transport Officer, who will arrange the daily distribution, so as to get the utmost possible work out of them. No mules will be allotted to Regiments, etc., but all will remain under the direct orders of the S.T.O. A limited number may be allotted to Engineer Units for R.E. Stores, etc., and two may be allotted to each Brigade Signal Section as stated above.

Mules will not be allotted either to machine gun sections or to the Regimental Medical Officers. Machine guns will be man handled, and the regimental medical equipment will also be carried by orderlies.

LOADS. - Ammunition Boxes, Water, etc.

Loads will be taken as close as possible to the firing line, on pack mules, which will be divided according to tactical requirements along the position gained. On arrival at their destination, i.e., Brigade Centres, (to be selected by Brigadiers), they are to deposit their loads.

From these Brigade Centres ammunition and water will then be passed forward by hand to Regimental and Battalion Centres, the mules returning at once for fresh loads.

On the night 7/8th August it may happen that a redistribution of the whole of the transport will have to take place, or perhaps it may only be necessary to hand over to each Unit its supply mules, which arrive at ANZAC BEACH on the morning of August 7th. Should this be so, the Brigade Supply Officers should be detailed to take over these mules, and, as soon as taken over, will draw one day's supply for their unit, and return with the least possible delay.

ORGANIZATION ORDERS FOR THE TROOPS IN ANZAC.

Appendix No. 73

The following orders are published, so that troops may make provision now for the various steps required.

DRESS AND EQUIPMENT

1. The dress for operations will be :-

P.S. EQUIPMENT less great coats, coats and packs. Respirators will be carried.

AMMUNITION - 200 rounds per man carried on person.  
Machine Guns - 3500 rounds per gun in belt boxes.

No regimental or brigade reserve will accompany the troops, but will be sent forward later as required from the reserves which have been formed.

Trained bomb throwers will be included in each company. These men will carry only 50 rounds of ammunition but will each be provided with an additional haversack to carry 8 bombs.

SANDBAGS. At least one per man.

TOOLS. The light entrenching tool will be carried, and in addition picks and shovels in the proportion of one pick and one shovel to each 8 men - carried on person. (One pick and one shovel per 4 men not employed in an attacking column).  
Wire cutters will be carried. Other articles of equipment at the discretion of Commanders in charge of special operations.

ALL RED AND YELLOW SEMAPHORE FLAGS - signalling or special issue in possession of units are to be taken. One each per Officer and N.C.O. up to the number in possession, after deducting signalling requirements.

These Red and Yellow flags are to be waved rapidly when it is desired to show the position of our troops to the Navy, our own Artillery, or to our infantry.

WATER BOTTLES - filled, and to be very sparingly used.

IRON RATIONS. Meat and biscuits or equivalent : one day.  
Groceries 2 days.  
Indian ranks. Ghee or sugar in place of groceries.

All ranks will wear white armbands 6" wide fixed on each arm above the elbow - and a white patch about 8" square fixed on the back of the right shoulder or between the shoulder blades. This will be worn in addition to any distinguishing marks selected by Commanders of Columns.

No animals will be available for carriage of any equipment. Cable and other technical equipment usually carried in carts or wagons is to be carried on barrows or by hand.

NIGHT OPERATIONS

2. The pass word for night operations will be published in Operation Orders.

Any one not answering with the countersign at once : and anyone without the distinguishing armbands and patch ordered in Para 1 will be treated as an enemy.

The following refers to night operations involving a night march previous to assault :-

i. Rifles are not to be loaded. Magazines will not be charged before moving off, and are only to be charged by the direct order of an officer.

ii. Bayonets will be fixed.

iii. All movements is to be as silent as possible:



476

Guides and leaders of columns are reminded that a pace of more than a mile an hour cannot be attained in broken country with a column of more than 500 men.

iv. No talking is to be permitted from the hour of falling in till daylight : necessary orders are to be passed in low tones.

v. No smoking or lights are to be permitted from the hour of falling in, till daylight.

vi. No messenger is to be sent from front to rear at a faster pace than the column is moving, as men moving rapidly back are apt to cause panic. Unless therefore the matter is urgent the messenger should be dropped to await the arrival of the person the message is meant for.

Similarly no evacuation of wounded to the rear during darkness is to take place till the columns have passed by. No man not a stretcher bearer is to fall out, on the excuse of assisting wounded to the rear unless his services have been demanded by a medical officer.

vii. In the event of the enemy's fire being opened while troops are moving on the objective, troops are to move on, advanced parties or special groups being detailed for attacking enemy picquets or snipers with the bayonet if these are close to the line of march.

If the fire is effective, as from machine gun fire trained on a point, troops will take cover while steps are organized to deal with it.

When, however, the objective is close, troops will press on to its capture at all costs, remembering that several other columns are aiming at the same objective and that the attack of one aids all.

viii. Electric torches, used only by Officers and by the order of the senior commander on the spot, will be useful to flash backwards and show position of front lines from time to time to those in rear. (These are only for use once touch with the enemy has been gained and the advance of the troops can no longer be concealed.).

ix. When considering the distribution of troops in their commands, leaders are warned that soon rather than late enemy picquets will be met with. Each column should therefore be headed by a party ready to deal without any hesitation with an enemy party when met with - using the bayonet and following up quickly on the heels of the enemy if he withdraws up the direction of the march.

#### DISPOSAL OF SURPLUS EQUIPMENT.

3. In accordance with Para 1, packs, coats, and other articles of equipment have to be left behind. This applies to all units, as whether employed actively or passively to begin with, all may be required to assume the offensive at short notice.

These articles will be collected before falling in and left in charge of a party of

- 1 Officer per brigade
- 1 senior N.C.O. per battalion
- 2 men per company

and a similar proportion for other units.

This equipment with all surplus kit, will be left :-

In the case of new arrivals - in the area allotted to the units, under brigade arrangements.

In the case of Anzac units - as may be selected under Divisional arrangements.

#### DISPOSAL OF SICK

4. Casualties occurring in the brigade area between dark of the night on which movement commences and the march of troops will be dealt with under arrangements which are being made for all troops by Australian Division in their area, and New Zealand & Aust. Division in theirs. None but urgent cases will be evacuated until daylight.

#### WATER

5. The afternoon before operations commence an extra supply of water will be provided for troops detailed for



427

operations beyond the Anzac position. Water bottles are to be filled from this. As much as possible of any balance from this extra issue should be consumed before starting.

#### CARE OF SUPPLIES

6. All ranks are to be warned to be sparing in their use of water, food, and ammunition. In some cases there is no possibility of water being sent up to the troops for at least 18 hours after their movement commences, nor of food being available for 48 hours. Any food or water thrown away cannot therefore be replaced.

As regards ammunition, every effort will be made to bring up reserves immediately in the rear of troops, but none the less wild firing is to be checked at once and no firing permitted except on paying targets-or by picked shots specially detailed to deal with individual enemy.

#### REST

All ranks are also to be warned that the first night of the operations will be sleepless and the next probably sleepless also.

They should therefore during the night and day preceding the operation rest rather than move about unnecessarily.

#### ENTRENCHING

8. All new arrivals are reminded that no labour expended on digging is wasted and that when they occupy a position they are to dig, not till they have completed a little breast-work, but till a deep recessed fire trench has been made. Then they are to continue till support and communication trenches are complete and give full protection against shrapnel and small arm fire. And as the only tools available will be those carried by the men, these are on no account to be thrown away because of their weight or inconvenience.

#### DIFFERENT MARKS OF AMMUNITION

9. The troops employed are armed with rifles firing two Marks of ammunition, Mark VI and Mark VII.

The maxim built for the Mark VI cannot take Mark VII ammunition - and this is being legislated for as far as possible by employing guns now at Anzac in places where only Mark VI ammunition is used by the troops.

Mark VII ammunition can be used in any Mark of .303 rifle but is likely to jam in loading, and a different sighting is necessary. Briefly - L.E. short rifle or the long rifle using Mark VII ammunition fires high up to 400 yards and after that low. A rifle sighted for Mark VII ammunition and using Mark VI ammunition fires low for the first 400 yards and after that high.

It is therefore desirable to avoid mixing up the two Marks and to help in this, boxes of Mark VII ammunition are clearly marked, and have in addition two "V" shaped nicks on the ends of the lids of all boxes, so that the boxes can be distinguished by feel as well as by sight.

An additional safeguard is that all Mark VII ammunition is packed in bandoliers for convenience in distribution, and not in packets.

CIRCULAR MEMORANDUM.

In anticipation of a forward movement the attention of Brigadiers and Officers Commanding Divisional Units is directed to the following.

Where not already provided for, immediate steps must be taken to complete the same.

1. LUMINOUS COMPASSES.

All leaders of columns, however small, should be in possession of a Luminous Compass, and, if necessary, they must be borrowed from those who do not actually require them at the time. Leaders of columns should be acquainted with the magnetic bearing of the general line of their advance.

Brigadiers will render to Divisional Headquarters a return showing the number of Luminous Compasses available in their respective Brigades, by Wednesday evening, 4th Inst.

2. CRACKERS.

The 1st Light Horse Brigade will take over the 50 Crackers which were allotted to No. 3 Section, and the 3rd Light Horse Brigade those allotted to No. 4 Section, and they will use them during the attack.

3. FIRE STICKS AND TINDER LIGHTERS.

Fire sticks for lighting bombs can be obtained from Captain Parry Okeden, the Ammunition Supply Officer, and should be drawn at the rate of three for each bomb thrower.

Each bomb ~~throws~~ carrier will also carry an additional reserve of 20.

A supply of tinder lighters for lighting the fuses of bombs ONLY has been obtained, and can be drawn on application to the Divisional Ordnance Officer at the following rate:-

1st Light Horse Bde	25
N.Z. Mounted Rifles Bde	20.
3rd Light Horse Bde	25.
N.Z. Infantry Bde	20.
4th Aust. Inf. Bde	20.

They are to be issued to and carried by bomb throwers only.

4. BOMBS.

Great care is to be taken to ensure that all bombs are kept to be kept dry and in good order.

5. PRIVATE PAPERS, MAPS, etc.

Very strict orders are to be issued forbidding Officers and others from carrying orders or any private papers that would convey information to the enemy, on their person.

6. THIRST QUENCHERS.

All ranks are strongly advised to carry two or three pebbles. It is found that one pebble placed under the tongue relieves the craving of thirst.

7. GUIDES.

The names of guides leading all columns will be published in the Divisional Operation Order.

8. LAMP SIGNALLING.

Brigadiers will ensure that the lamp signalling equipment of their Brigade and Regimental Detachments is in working order and that their Detachments are prepared



to work the lamps in the event of their cable or telephone communication breaking down.

9.

PRISONERS.

In the event of prisoners being captured, they should be immediately disarmed and handed over with their arms, under escort to the Assistant Provost Marshal at Divisional Hdqrs (Report Centre). The latter will ensure that he maintains a sufficient guard ready to receive prisoners. The escort conducting prisoners back from the Firing Line should be as small as possible compatible with security.

Prisoners should be collected in batches of convenient size before being sent back to the Assistant Provost Marshal at Divisional Headquarters (Report Centre).

Escorts, having handed over their prisoners to the Assistant Provost Marshal, will return immediately to the Firing Line.

10.

BRIGADE AMMUNITION RESERVE.

(1) In each Brigade an Officer in charge of the Brigade Ammunition Reserve will be appointed. (2) At least 20 men per Brigade should be detailed to act under his immediate orders.

His duties will be to forward the ammunition from the Brigade Ammunition Centre to the Regimental Reserves by means of runners.

The ammunition will be carried from the Advance Depots to the various Brigade Centres on mules under the orders of the C.R.A.

The exact positions of Advanced Depots will be notified in Divisional Orders.

11.

MULES:

The O.C. Divisional Train will allot mules as under:-

- 2 to each machine gun.
- 1 to each Battalion for the Medical Officer.
- 2 to each Brigade for the Brigade Signal Section.

occupied by Australian and New Zealand Army Corps.

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1. The Australian and New Zealand Army Corps, with attached troops at Anzac, has been ordered to take part in a combined operation which has for its object securing a position astride of the Gallipoli Peninsula from the neighbourhood of Gaba Tepe to the Straits North of Maidos.

The main features of the immediate operations for the attainment of this object are given below, for the information of Divisional Commanders and Staff, and of Brigade Commanders, only. Fuller and non-secret details are given in the instructions prepared for the commanders of the various operations to be undertaken by us.

(a) On August 6th/7th the forces in the South of the Peninsula are to attack with the object of drawing part of the enemy's forces in that direction.

(b) A force is to be landed North of the Anzac position with the object of securing Suvla Bay as a base: an operation which includes the seizure of the "W" and "Chocolate" Hills and the enemy guns there.

(c) Action by the Australian and New Zealand Army Corps as detailed in the following paragraphs.

2. The Australian and New Zealand Army Corps with attached troops is to advance and occupy a line extending from the neighbourhood of Gaba Tepe along the main spur marked approximately by the ~~xxxxxx~~ track 82 - 87 - 165 - Chunuk Bair, and thence along the Chunuk Bair Ridge to and including Hill 305.

3. With this object :-

(a) Australian Division will assault the Turkish positions on Plateau 400 commencing at 5.30 p.m. on August 6th. A subsidiary operation against German Officer's trench will also be undertaken, to assist the operations from No. 1V Section against Baby 700.

(b) New Zealand and Australian Division; 13th Division less one brigade (except a battalion) and less artillery;

29th Indian Infantry Brigade; and I.M.A. Brigade less one section, under command of Major-General Sir A.J. Godley, K.C.M.G., C.B. :-

1. will carry the line Chunuk Bair - Hill 350 during the night of the 6th/7th August, the operation to commence at 9 p.m.
- ii. will hold No. III Section less Courtney's Post, and assist in "iii".
- iii. will hold Walker's Ridge and Russell's Top, and provide columns to assault Baby 700.
4. - The General Reserve (29th Brigade, and 40th Brigade less 1 Battalion) will be located in Rest and Reserve Gullies from 4 a.m. on 7th till called upon to move.

5. Arrangements for Naval support are included in the detailed instructions given to each commander, but they consist generally of :-

A Southern squadron of five vessels, stationed off Gaba Tepe and firing on targets East of Plateau 400 - Hill 180 - Chunuk Bair Ridge.

A Northern squadron of two monitors and two torpedo boat destroyers firing on targets on the Northern and Western slopes of the Sari Bair.

3. The Army Corps Commander wishes you to detail the 1st L.H. Brigade with a proportion of your Ambulance units, under Brig-General Chauvel, to hold No. III Section, and to add to the force at his disposal 2 companies of the 40th Brigade, and a proportion of Ambulance requirements.

With this force he is :-

(a) to secure the front usually held in No. III Section, less Courtney's Post, which is to be taken over by the Australian Division.

(b) to assist the assault to be delivered against the Nek and the trenches East of it.

This entails an attack on the "I" trenches in front of Quinn's Post, to secure these as a means of preventing reinforcements reaching the enemy opposing the assault on Baby 700 and of assisting a later advance on Mortar Ridge.



The Officer entrusted with this operation should be restricted to the "I" trenches and such trenches North and South of them as are necessary to secure his position there.

The timing of this assault will naturally depend on that from No. 1V Section, viz - at 4.30 a.m. on August 7th unless orders are received to the contrary.

It is for the consideration of Brig-General Chauvel whether in view of the assistance the garrison of Pope's Hill can give in covering fire for the assaults from No. 1V Section and Quinn's Post, the action of that garrison should be confined to fire support or include offensive action, which, if undertaken, must be vigorous.

A copy of the instructions given to G.O.C. Australian Division is attached for the information of Brig-General Chauvel as to the action being taken with regard to German Officers Trench, and a copy of Appendix "A" is also attached.

4. The Army Corps Commander wishes you to detail the 3rd Light Horse Brigade under Brig-General Hughes to No. 1V Section and to add the following to his command :-

2 guns, 26th Mountain Battery.  
Details of the N.Z. Field Troop, ensuring that Brig-General Hughes has with him sufficient men acquainted with the mining situation, to make full tactical use of the mines and galleries on Russell's Top.  
One Field Company, 13th Division.  
Two battalions 40th Brigade, less 2 Companies.  
A proportion of Ambulance requirements from the units at your disposal.

A copy of Appendix "A" is attached for his information.

With this force he is to :-

- (a) occupy and hold No. 1V Section down to the sea.
- (b) Assault and secure the trenches on the Nek (Group A on Trench Diagram): and those of the Baby 700 and Chess-board positions - as far South as is necessary to secure his right flank, and as far East to the East as the trenches of D group, which are all to be taken.
- (c) If and when the situation admits, advance to meet your forces approaching from the direction of the Chunuk Bair and assist in their operations outlined in Para 6. iii. below.

The attack will be delivered at 4.30 a.m. on August 7th unless orders are given to the contrary. Troops will be rested during the night as much as possible.

If the assault is postponed, the troops should remain in readiness to attack at half an hour's notice.

A copy of the instructions to G.O.C. Australian Division is attached for the information of Brig-General Hughes as to the action being taken in regard to German Officers Trench.

5. With the remainder of your force you will :-

(a) Clear the line Destroyer Hill (exclusive) - Table Top - Bauchop's Hill, commencing at 9 p.m. on August 6th with the destroyer action detailed in Appendix "A".

(b) Move strong columns across the Aghyl Dere to :-

i. Clear off enemy from the DAMAKJELIK BAIR, thus assisting directly the operations of our troops further North, who will be using the beach as close to us as the mouth of the AZMAK DERE (Sq. 91).

ii. Attack the line Hill 305 - Chunuk Bair Ridge moving in the area bounded approximately by the line KAJAJIK AGHALA - DAGH CHESME and by the Northern limit you set on the movement of (c).

These operations are to be timed so as to reach the lower slopes of the DAMAKJELIK BAIR at 10.30 p.m. on August 6th.

(c) Move a force up all available approaches to the Chunuk Bair Ridge - objective Chunuk Bair Ridge about 161 - SU YATAGHA - main ridge North of Chunuk Bair.

These moves are to follow on each other without delay and you should impress on the Commanders entrusted with each that the objective to be reached is to be aimed at whatever the progress of columns in other parts as the success of one move will go far to ensure the success of the whole.

A system of flares is to be arranged to show the Navy the position reached by your advanced troops at dawn on August 7th. This is to consist of a Naval green light burned at 3.45 a.m. and again at 3.55 a.m. by each battalion in the front line along the position occupied by its most advanced troops. Care is to be taken to place the flare where it will be shaded from the direction of the enemy. If the Chunuk Bair Ridge has been reached the flares will be burned a little down our side of the slope.

The greatest care is to be taken to conceal unusual movement by day, and lights, noise, and smoking at night during the operation are to rigorously forbidden. Absolute silence to be observed while troops are moving into positions.



6. You will be guided in your action after the success of the above operations by the following considerations :-

i. The continued occupation of Hill 305 and the Chunuk Bair Ridge is essential to the success of the main operation. The ground taken is therefore to be consolidated without delay and made impregnable against counter attack.

ii. Preparations are to be made immediately for an advance from the direction of Chunuk Bair, to co-operate with the attack on Baby 700, which is to be delivered by No. 1V Section.

As soon as it is known when the force detailed for this will be ready to advance, intimation of the approximate hour will be sent to Army Corps Headquarters.

iii. The operation in ii. involves an advance down the spur to the East of Battleship Hill, and the consequent and necessary clearing of the ground East of our present position, and this advance, if your strength admits, is to be pressed down to the line Quinn's Post - Cross Roads near Scrubby Knoll (Sq. 80 Z 4).

7. Casualty Clearing Stations are being established :-

(a) In Anzac Cove, to deal with evacuations down Monash Gully and South thereof.

(b) At the barrier on the beach just North of Mule Gully.

(c) Near No. 2 Post.

Cases brought down to these will be dealt with before removal to the Casualty Clearing Stations at dressing stations arranged by you in

(a) Monash Gully.

(b) H.Z. Field Ambulance Dressing Station (Mule Gully).

(c) A station to be opened by you near No. 2 Post early on the 7th.

8. Arrangements for replenishment of ammunition and water are detailed in attached Appendix Z of which copies are also attached for the information of O's C, Nos. III and IV Sections.

9. From 8 p.m. on August 6th till 4 a.m. on August 7th the Beach road from Reserve Gully Northwards is to be reserved for forward movement of troops and animals.

The covered way to No. 2 Post is to be reserved for all rearward movement after the hour by which you cease to require it for forward movement of troops. This hour should be intimated by you to all concerned. The provisions of this paragraph are



to be made widely known in your command and your arrangements for traffic control on the night of August 6th/7th, and on the 7th, should include steps to ensure their not being infringed.

10. The army Corps Report Centre will be at its present site till further orders.

CIRCULAR MEMORANDUM.

SUPPLY WATER AND TRANSPORT INSTRUCTIONS.

1. GENERAL. (a) System of Supply.

After 6th instant all units will look to the Brigade Supply and Transport Officers of Brigades to which they are attached for rations water and transport.

The normal system of supply in the field will be used viz. Brigade RENDEZ VOUS and REFILLING POINTS.

Water and supplies will be brought to R.V. or when the tactical situation permits further to R.P. on pack animals where they will be handed over to units for man handling to the Trenches.

Brigade R.V. and R.P. will be fixed by G.C.C. Brigad who will ensure that all unitx quartermasters are at the R.V. to instruct Supply Officers as to their requirements and to take over water and rations as they are brought up from the rear.

(b) Divisional Order No 10 para 3.

Units leaving No 3 Section on night 5th and 6th should draw rations for consumption on the 6th in their new bivouacs.

(c) Divisional Troops which are remaining near the Beach and are unattached to formations will continue to draw rations from the Beach as hitherto.

2. SUPPLIES.

(a) Iron Rations meat and biscuits one day, Groceries two days for consumption on the 7th and 8th will be drawn on the morning of 5th.

(b) Rations for consumption on the 9th and the following days will be drawn in the usual manner through the Brigade Supply Officer.

(c) Indian Rations. A Field Depot for Indian Rations will be established in MULE GULLY under Supply Officer 29th (Indian) Infantry Brigade. In addition to this Brigade all Indian troops attached to the Division will be supplied from this Depot.

3. WATER.

(a) Ration. One gallon per man.

(b) Cans. Cwing to the shortage of receptacles milk cans and other water vessels in possession of the following will be disposed of as follows: New Zealand Infantry Brigade will hand over half their tins to C.C. Field Depot No 3 on afternoon 5th, taking the xther half with them, which should be handed over to the C.C. Field Depot No 4 on afternoon 6th.

4th Australian Infantry Brigade hand over all cans to C.C. Field Depot No 5 afternoon 6th.

New Zealand Mounted Rifles Brigade hand over all cans to C.C. Field Depot RUSSELLS TOP afternoon 6th



Sealed vessels containing water must be punctured in the corners at the top of the vessels and in such a manner as to permit the tin to be readily repaired for future use.
