November 1 <sup>st</sup>	OLD NO 3 POST Anzac (from 8 <sup>th</sup> hour ending 7 am)	Improvement of escarping works and terracing for bivouacs carried on. Very quiet throughout the 24 hours. One patrol reports a few shells fired from SNIPERS NEST during night. Casualties: - 1 off <sup>c</sup> Other ranks to Hospital Sick. Wounded 2 O.R.	
November 2 <sup>nd</sup>		Steady work was put in on bivouacs. Some enemy work reported in progress on main ridge. Otherwise nothing unusual occurred. Casualties three men to Hospital Sick. Wounded 2 O.R.	
November 3 <sup>rd</sup>		A Turkish outpost was located on a hill with MALONE GULLY near head of gully. Three large shells fell on OLD NO 3 POST yesterday two in the trenches and one in the bivouac. Casualties:- 1 man wounded and 8 O.R.s. Hospital sick and 1 officer - Off to Hospital LT J.T. BRIGG.
November 5 <sup>th</sup>	9	Except for an enemy demonstration between 2100 and 2200 the 24 hours has been quiet. The demonstration reported to did not extend further North than POPE'S. Patrols report a little work being carried on in rear of SNIPERS NEST. The forward position on DESTROYER HILL has been improved and work on underground *man slightly shelters has been commenced. Casualties: *2 men wounded and <del>officer</del> and 3 men to Hospital sick.



MEMORANDUM:

1. The General Officer Commanding desires to draw the attention of Brigadiers and Commanding Officers to the necessity for providing adequate protection from shell fire.
2. Experience in France indicates that head cover to the height of 12 to 16 feet at least is necessary and this must be provided some short distance in rear of the fire trenches. The German system is to concentrate artillery fire on length of trenches dotting them down for their whole lengths and continuing until they are demolished. This rather implies that in places where such a contingency must be considered our plan of constructing tunnels and cave dwellings from the fire trenches is not always suitable. In some places therefore other effective measures must be sought. The varying nature of our line makes it impossible to suggest any stereotyped form but in all that is done the two following principles must be kept in view :-
  - (i) Bomb proof shelters must be constructed in rear of firing line but with communication trenches leading thereto.
  - (ii) That altho' the men must be withdrawn from the firing line during an intensive bombardment :-
    - (a) communication trenches must be available which will enable them rapidly to oust an enemy who has got into the forward trenches;
    - (b) there should be available whenever possible a second line which can be occupied as a fire trench to resist attack.
3. Examples of a useful type of cover fulfilling these conditions can be seen in the lines of the 2nd L.H.Bde., 1st Australian Division.  
The diagram beneath explains the system followed:-

Steps or ramp.

In adopting this type it is an essential that sufficient communication trenches leading to the fire trench should be provided and that the several bomb-proofs should be connected underground. If this is done the blocking of certain exits by enemy gun fire will not constitute as great a danger.

The following copy of instructions re gas attacks is forwarded for information and guidance. Indents should be submitted for canvas hessian in lieu of blankets.

1. Our many deep level and surface tunnels may also prove a source of danger.

3. A further issue of sprays is being made by the A.D.O.S. and certain men should be instructed in their use and told off to take charge of them.

ROAD MAINTENANCE - SAZLI BEIT DERE & CHAILAK DERE.

1. In order to maintain the roads up the SAZLI BEIT & CHAILAK DERES in an efficient state, specially selected men will be detailed forthwith to act as "Readmen". These "Readmen" will act under orders of the C.R.E., N.Z. & A. Division.

2. Readmen will be detailed as follows :-

<u>Formation.</u>	<u>No. of men.</u>	<u>Section of Road.</u>
1st A.L.H. Bde	2	SAZLI BEIT DERE from the main ANZAC sap to the eastern boundary of the Brigade Area.
3rd A.L.H. Bde	2	SAZLI BEIT DERE from western boundary to ABBOTT ALLEY.
N.Z. Inf. Bde	4	CHAILAK DERE - All included in the Brigade Area.
4th Aust. Inf. Bde	4	CHAILAK DERE - remainder

3. The duties of Readmen will be as follows -

- (a) To keep road surface and drains in good order.
- (b) To give notice of slips and washouts.
- (c) To improve gradients where possible.
- (d) To warn traffic regarding dangerous points.
- (e) To report to an Engineer Officer all matters which affect the safety and condition of the road.

4. Readmen detailed for the SAZLI BEIT DERE will report for detailed orders to the O.C., No. 1 Field Co. N.Z. Engineers, near H.Qrs, 3rd A.L.H. Brigade.

These detailed for the CHAILAK DERE will report to the O.C., No. 2 Field Coy, N.Z.E., near H.Qrs, N.Z. Infantry Brigade.

MEMORANDUM.

(1) It is by no means improbable that the enemy may think the present stormy weather conditions make a favourable opportunity for attack, more particularly as he may imagine us to be in straits owing to the impracticability of land stores or ammunition. The Army Corps Commander desires therefore that special precautions be taken to ensure that despite any inclemency of the weather the garrison of the firing trenches is in position, sentries alert and supports and reserves readily available.

(2) The natural tendency of troops to reply to a hostile demonstration during such periods should however be guarded against.

In forwarding the above the General Officer Commanding wished to remind Brigadiers and Commanding Officers that the more inclement the weather the greater is the necessity for increased vigilance on the part of the troops in the trenches and for more constant visits of inspection especially at night on the part of senior officers.

The G. O. C. noticed that a patrol sent out on the night of the 17/18th Novr. returned on account of the inclemency of the weather. So far from this having happened the patrol should have taken advantage of the inclemency of the weather to approach nearer the enemy's trenches and to remain out longer than usual as there would be more chance of obtaining useful information or of doing damage to the enemy.
