



The younger men will be the backbone of the A.A.M.C. in future war as most of the older men will be too old. It is therefore important to give these men an opportunity of gaining experience in C.C.Ss. and General Hospital as soon a they can be spared from the Field. There is no change of improving medical and surgical knowledge to any extent whilst R.M.Os. and with	
			Field ambulances and consequently they get out of touch with medical work.
