

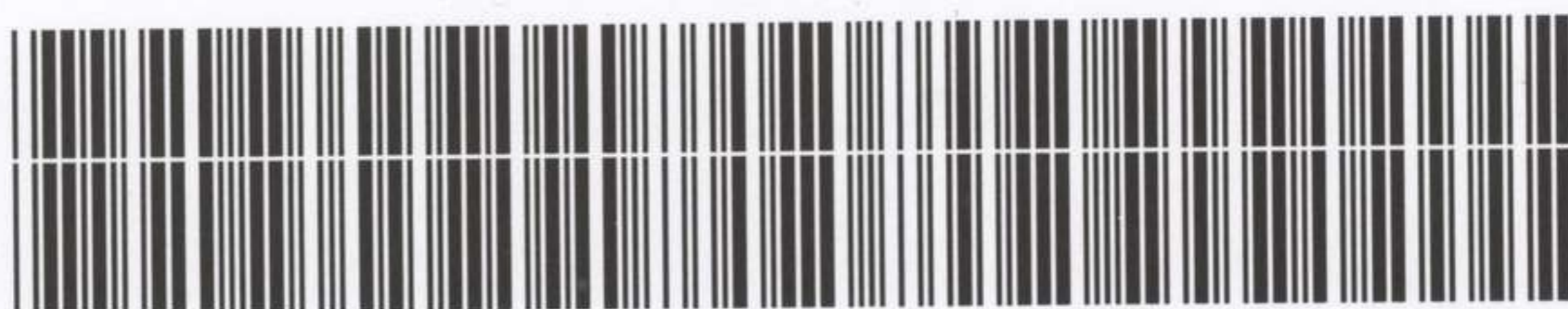

ABU BIR FEBB SHUNAR			The recent Cholera inoculation has revealed marked deficiencies in the entries of inoculations in Army Book 64. On the issue of new paybooks the recopying of inoculation records has been omitted, in many cases. A conference was held at Divisional Headquarters at 1500 on 24th.	
CEK	March 24		to discuss forthcoming operations D.H.Q. moved to DEIR EL BELAH.	
DEIR EL BELAH	March 25		The Immobile sections of 2nd. L.H.F.A. N.Z.M.F.A. and 22nd M.F.A. left camp at 0230 with their respective Brigades, the two latter moving by the beach to DEIR EL BELAH, the former marching via RAFA and SHEIKH HAMUDAH to DEIR EL BELAH. The Immobile sections of 2nd. And N.Z.M.F.A. with a detachment from 22nd. M.F.A. marched via KHAN YUNUS to DEIR EL BELAH leaving at 0900 and arriving at 1830 with camels exhausted and men foot sore.	
			The water control at DEIR EL BELAH was most defective. Indiscriminate drinking from unauthorised sources went on throughout the area. No allotment of the village wells had been carried out and this Division had perforce to obtain it's drinking water from the large lagoon of muddy water in which animals were wading and drinking. Brigade chlorination arrangements were deficient, notably so in the case of the 2nd. L.H.Bge.	
CEK	March 26	0230	Closer touch between the Desert Column water reconnaissance and the Divisional C.R.E. and Headquarters of Divisional Medical services is advisable.	
			Three Immobile sections moved out at 0230 with the Division less camel transport which followed with Immobile sections at 0245 under Major Hercus D.A.D.M.S. and marched across the WADI GHUZZE just north of TEL EL JEMMI to BEIT DURDEIS when 2nd. L.H.F.A. moved on with it's brigade north east of GAZA. Remaining ambulances remaining with their Brigades in reserve.	
		1500	At 1500 on orders being received for the Division to attack GAZA each amb. accompanied it's brigade to the attack, collecting casualties and remaining in close contact with brigades until troops were withdrawn. 2nd L.H.F.A. and N.Z.M.F.A. collecting casualties in the town of GAZA itself. The camel portion of the mobile sections and the whole Immobile sections crossed the WADI GHUZZE at 1130 and proceeded to SHEIKH ABBAS arriving there at 1330. The division moved back to the north east side of GAZA at 2355. each ambulance carrying wounded up to full capacity including Turkish wounded Several of the latter could not be brought in owing to lack of accomodation These were made comfortable and left. 9 CLOTHING & EQUIPMENT
 Disposal of, in possession of sick taken to hospital.
 1. Officers Commanding Units are to take steps that every man admitted to a Field Ambulance, Casualty Clearing Station or Hospital, is accompanied by the clothing and necessaries authorised in G.R.O. No 1236.
 2. Arms and personal equipment, including blankets and waterproof sheet
 (a) belonging to men of units in the field and in advance of Casualty Clearing Stations will, when possible, accompany the men to the Field Ambulance and thence to the Casualty Clearing Station, where they will be collected and handed in to the nearest Ordnance Depot.
 (b) Belonging to men of other units, admitted direct to Stationary or General Hospitals, will subsequently be handed in by the unit to nearest Ordnance Depot.
 General Routine Order No 2023 of 11-12-16 is cancelled.

10. DISCIPLINE
 Attention is called to No 3 Section Routine Order No 263 dated 22nd Sept 1916, and the following extract from it is to be published in the Orders of all units :-
 1. No man is to ride on a camel without special permission from an Officer.
 2. No loaded camel is ever to be ridden.
 3. No baggage camel is to be trotted.
 4. Not more than two filled fantassies are to be put on one camel.

11. CLEANING CANVAS WATER TROUGHS
 It is necessary that the interiors of canvas tanks used as drinking water reservoirs be periodically cleaned, to remove the heavy deposit of rust and slime which occurs.
 It is further desirable to remove the residual water left in these tanks after each partial emptying in the usual course of daily working, as otherwise proportion of calcium chloride remaining after chlorination ~~will steadily increase~~ will steadily increase.
 In view of G.R.O. 263, the following means of cleaning should be adopted, once a week, or more often if found necessary.
 By a soft sterilized mop, the slime should be washed from the interior of the canvas into as small an amount ~~of residual water~~ of residual water as possible. By carefully tilting the bottom of the reservoir, this water should be collected in one corner, whence it should be siphoned off. The greatest care must be taken that the canvas is not strained, and that no more water is used than is necessary.

12 ETHER
 With a view to preventing deterioration of ETHER .720 intended for anaesthetic purposes, only small stocks should be held and it is essential that it be stored in a cool dark place.

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Appendix 59

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213. SUPPLY OF GLYCERINE

It has been found necessary to stop the manufacture of medicinal glycerine and pharmaceutical preparations containing that substance. Demands for glycerine and preparation containing it cannot therefore be met in future. It is possible to substitute glucose or treacle for glycerine in the following preparations which can therefore still be supplied:-

- Tinctura Cardamomi Composita
- Tinctura Chloroformi et Morphinae Composita
- Tinctura Rhei Composita
- Tinctura Sennae Composita.

214. ELECTRIC & MAPS.

Electric torches and Maps issued to Ambulances are the property of the unit and must not be taken by Officers when leaving the unit.

215. TREATMENT OF CARRIERS OF ENTAMOEBCIC DYSENTERY.

The relative failure of a full course 10 to 12 grs of Emetine hydrochloride given hypodermically to completely clear up the chronic carrier points to the entamoebae being more or less completely shut off from the circulation and tissue fluids of the patient, hence perhaps the undoubted superiority in some ~~cases~~ chronic cases of ipecacuanha by the mouth.

With a view to obtaining the therapeutic action of ipecac without its nauseating action a double iodide of emetine & bismuth has been prepared and is under trial, with most encouraging results.

30 to 36 grains, equivalent to about 10 or 12 grs of emetine-hydrochloride, has been regarded as a full course and the daily dose has varied from 2 to 4 grains given in capsules. Three grains representing one grain of emetine-hydrochloride seems to be a good average daily dose, and 12 such doses may be given in succession, unless giddiness, depression, or diarrhoea become severe. The frequency of vomiting is in no way comparable to that seen with the ipecac treatment, and there is no need, as a rule, to restrict diet, to keep the patient recumbent, or to adopt the precautionary measures which the ipecac treatment entails. The daily dose suggested of three grains of double iodide is equivalent in emetine to some 50 grains of ipecacuanha.

It is suggested that the compound be tried.

- (1) to clear resistant carriers of their cysts.
- (2) In acute cases to substitute wholly ~~wholly~~ or supplement the hypodermic dosage as soon as acute symptoms are brought under control.
- (3) Possible prophylactic use 1 grain every few days.

218. OFFICERS REPORTING IN CAIRO.

Reference to G.R.O. 1982 of 2/12/16.
Any officer who visits Cairo, whether on duty or on leave and whether he remains in Cairo for a few hours or a longer period must register his name at the Provost Marshal's Office in the Old War Office, Cairo. This applies to officers attending courses or schools of instruction who may already have reported on their arrival when joining the school, if at any time they stay in Cairo. Every officer proceeding to Cairo from Desert Column, whether on duty or on leave is to have his attention drawn to G.R.O. 1982 before departure.

219. HYDROQUINONE AND KASOLAK.

It is notified that there is a quantity of Hydroquinone in stock at the Levant Base Medical Store A LEXANDRIA, also a quantity of Kasolak (Sanatogen substitute). These stores may be had by indenting through the usual channels.

220. ECONOMY IN EXPENDITURE OF DISINFECTANTS.

The supply of disinfectants being limited, every economy compatible with actual requirements must be practised in it's expenditure. The following points should be particularly noticed:-
(a) Liquor Cresoli saponatus. The standard emulsion for sanitary purposes is 2½%. Stronger emulsions will only be used in exceptional circumstances under direct advice of a medical officer.
(b) Bleaching Powder (Chloride of Lime) should not be thrown into latrine interiors or placed in latrine buckets.
(c) The use of Formalin and formaldehyde for sanitary and disinfectant purposes is prohibited.
(d) Crude Oil should not be painted on the exteriors of urine funnels, but sprinkled on a plug of brushwood pushed for two or three inches into the mouth of the funnel.

221 EMERGENCY WATER STERILIZATION.

In view of the advent of the Cholera season and the possibility that occasionally Bisulphate of Soda tablets may be the only available means of sterilization, the following points should be noticed:-
(a) If two tablets of bisulphate of soda tablets be added to the contents of a water bottle, they form very dilute sulphuric acid, which must be given at least half an hour's contact to ensure sterilization.
(b) If used in enamelled iron or aluminum water bottles, this method is quite safe. If used in fanatis, in large water bottles of the medical equipment, or in water bottles of metallic alloy, toxic metals are brought into solution in dangerous amount by the solvent action of the dilute sulphuric acid. All R.M.Os should therefore ascertain that all water bottles in their units are of enamelled iron (blue) or aluminum (characteristically light) and should be on the alert to prevent bisulphate being used in fanatis or the receptacles composed of alloy.

(*) Bisulphate of Soda being hygroscopic, exposure of the tablets in pockets leads to the formation of sulphuric acid sufficiently concentrated to burn holes in the material. Troops should therefore be cautioned to protect the bottles and to remove the tablets at once from their pockets should the bottle be broken.

221. EMBARKATION.

All officers embarking at Egyptian ports on mail or other private ships whether proceeding on duty or leave, must, prior to embarkation, report to the Embarkation Staff Officer at the port informing that officer of the name of the ship and their destination.

222. VENEREAL. FORFEITURE.

In future when a soldier is found to be suffering from venereal disease by a medical officer of a unit this officer will immediately make the following entry in the soldier's pay book in the cash payment column:-

"Forfeits pay from(date) "

On discharge from hospital or transfer from one hospital to another of a soldier suffering from venereal disease an entry is to be made by the Medical officer in the cash payments column of the soldier's paybook shewing the date of entry and date of discharge and the amount of pay forfeited for the period at the total rate per diem, less deferred pay only.
