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WAR DIARY, MEDICAL SECTION, HEADQUARTERS A.I.F. DEPOTS IN U.K. FOR THE MONTH OF SEPTEMBER 1918.

During September the strength of A.I.F. Depots increased from 35858 to 37624.

A.- MEDICAL OFFICERS.

The strength of Medical Officers in the Command has decreased during the month from 85 to 69; this has been due to two heavy demands from the D.M.S. for reinforcements for duty in France; these demands have been met in full, but the result is that the number on duty in the Command is considerably below requirements. In the last week each R.M.O. has been doing two Training Battalions, and if the present shortage continues for any length of time, the efficiency of the medical work must suffer.

During the month, 10 reinforcement officers have arrived from Australia and 5 who have served in France, have reported from the D.M.S.

25 marched out to report to the D.M.S. for passage overseas, and 6 have embarked for return to Australia.

Major (Temp. Lieut. Colonel) C.L. Chapman DSO., reported for duty on 4.9.18. He is attached to Headquarters as Assistant to the A.D.M.S.; he is to be President of the Officers' Medical Board, President of all Area Medical Boards, and in addition will examine unfit soldiers arriving from Australia; he will also supervise the classifications of temporarily unfit men in Command Depots, and generally standardize classifications.

B.- HEALTH OF TROOPS.

The number of soldiers in hospital shows a general all round increase as compared with last month. This is due mainly to an increased incidence in Infectious and Venereal Disease, as described later.

The Diarrhoea outbreak has greatly diminished with the advent of colder weather; many of these cases clinically strongly resembled true Dysentery, although in only one case, which occurred in July, was a specific organism isolated.

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of the Weekly reports on this subject submitted to the D.M.S.

These Reports show that from the four weeks ending 5.9.18., 12.9.18., 19.9.18., and 26.9.18.; the total numbers of soldiers in hospital were respectively, 1940., 2016., 2051., and 1999., the corresponding percentages of the total strength of the Command being 5.37%, 5.5%., 5.71%., and 5.6%., as compared with 4.52%., 4.70 %., 5.23%., 5.17%, and 5.06%., for the five weekly month of August. Of these totals, the following numbers viz., 750., 779., 923 and 816., represent patients in the Group Clearing and Camp Hospitals, which are not true *hospitals* for statistical purposes.

The amount of serious disease has again been small there being only one case of Pneumonia, and one (which proved fatal) of Cerebro-Spinal Meningitis. There have been nine (9) deaths from all causes.

INFECTIOUS DISEASE.

The Measles and Mumps Infection which was introduced in August by reinforcements ex "Orontes" has resulted in a marked increase in the incidence of both these diseases, Measles in particular; the epidemic is continuing and at the end of the month was still very prevalent, particularly in the 2nd Training Brigade. On 27.9.18., two more Transports - The "Borda" and the "Marathon" disembarked; all the troops from the former are Mumps Contacts, and so an increase in this disease is anticipated; of course the men from this Transport have been placed in isolation.

DEPOTS IN U.K. FOR THE MONTH OF SEPTEMBER 1918.</u></p> <p>During August there were 29 fresh cases of Mumps and only 17 of Measles.</p> <p><u>VENEREAL DISEASE.</u></p> <p>The increase in the number of soldiers in hospital with Venereal Disease to which attention was drawn in the August Report, has continued during the month at an accelerated rate, the numbers for the four weeks ending 5.9.18., 12.9.18., 19.9.18., and 26.9.18., being respectively 572., 663., 668., and 755.</p> <p>An average of 56.5 per week were admitted from soldiers from British or Australian Auxiliary Hospitals or on Sick Furlough, as compared with 45.4 per week from these sources last month.</p> <p>Of B.E.F. Troops on leave from France, a weekly average of 33.5 were admitted as compared with 29.4 in August.</p> <p>In addition, to the above sources of increase, the admissions to Bulford Hospital from within A. I. F. Depots has increased, this undoubtedly being due to the limitations placed by A.A.M.C. Orders No. 693 of 28.8.18., and 707 of 18.9.18., on the administration of Early Treatment.</p> <p>317 cases of Gonorrhoea were discharged to the Convalescent Training Depots during the four weeks ending 26.9.18; 50 such cases relapsed and were returned to No. 1 A.D.H. for further treatment.</p> <p><u>Early Treatment:</u></p> <p>8,972 soldiers attended the Early Treatment Depots during the four weeks ending 26.9.18; Of these 447 showing signs of disease were sealed up and 386 such cases were aborted. The marked decrease in the two latter figures as compared with the previous month is similarly due to the above quoted A.A.M.C. 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casuals have marched in from the Overseas Training Brigade. 7 Casuals were returned to France and 20 general reinforcements also proceeded overseas. At the end of the month a draft of 220 were under orders to proceed to France at an early date, this number being required to fill vacancies caused by the despatch from France of 1914 men on leave to Australia.

Twelve (12) "A" class men have during the month been transferred at their own request to combatant arms of the Service.

A School for newly arrived Medical Officers was commenced on 30.9.18; the syllabus for this School as well as the series of very instructive lectures delivered by the O.C., Major A.C. Fraser, are included in the A.A.M.C. Training Depot War Diary for September.

The increased establishment recommended for the Depot on 15.7.18., is still unauthorized; its appearance in A.I.F. Orders would be most welcome.

D. - COMMAND DEPOTS.

Statistical:

The strength of Command Depots shows an increase during the month from 16,463 to 17,296.

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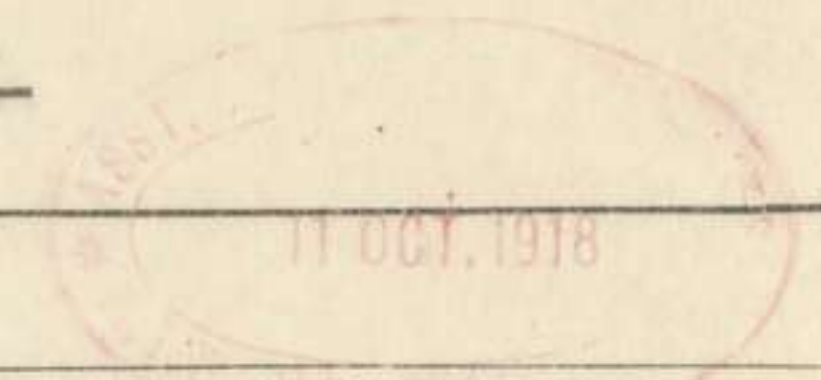
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As the above figures indicate, No. 3 Command Depot finally closed during the second week of September, and the corresponding enlargements of Nos. 1 and 2 Command Depots explain the marked increase in their number of admissions as compared with preceding months.

The above figures show that for the four-weekly month of September, 4,680 soldiers reported to Command Depots from hospitals (either direct or after furlough); the corresponding figures for August (5-weekly month) were 4,647. Thus the admission rate shows an increase of approximately 20%.

The disbandment of No. 3 Command Depot has resulted in a decrease in the total available accommodation of Command Depots from 20,396 to 17,681; these two facts combined with the postponement for 10 days of the departure of a Hospital Carrier, which was due to leave about the end of the month, has resulted in all accommodation being severely taxed, but there is little doubt that this slight temporary embarrassment will be adjusted without great difficulty.

APPENDIX "D"

GENERAL.

There have been no actual changes in policy at Command Depots during the month. Now that soldiers of Blb class are reviewed at Littlemoor Sub-Depot of No. 2 Command Depot, where accommodation is limited, they will, as soon as they are classed Bla., be sent on furlough and at the conclusion of this will report to No. 4 or No. 1 Command Depot, the lower grades to the former, and the higher to the latter.

On the 10th instant instructions re the training of men at Littlemoor were issued by the A.D.M.S. - a copy of these instructions is attached as APPENDIX "E".

APPENDIX "E"

The other changes outlined last month, as a result of the closing of No. 3 Command Depot, have been effected and the structural changes required at Littlemoor are being pushed on with.

Attached as APPENDIX "F" is a statistical return showing the amount of Remedial Gymnastic and Massage Treatment given in Command Depots from January to June 1918.

APPENDIX "F"

Recommendations for an increased A.A.M.C. establishment for all Command Depots and Group Clearing Hospitals were submitted to the D.M.S. early in September. Pending the

authorisation of these S.M.Os. are carrying on their work under a big handicap.

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NO. 2 COMMAND DEPOT.

The strength of this Depot has increased during the month from 4,716 to 6,695. The number of invalids who have marched out to the Port of Embarkation for return to Australia during the four weeks ending 28.9.18., was 1,758.

On the 9th September a recommended establishment of A.A.M.C. Officers for Monte Video Camp, Weymouth, was submitted to the D.M.S. (v. APPENDIX "G"); this is of course considerably greater than the present staff of this Sub-Depot, but it is necessary if the Orthopaedic work is to be raised to the standard desired.

Attached as APPENDIX "H", is a statement showing the training given to Masseurs and Electrical Operators at No. 2 Command Depot.

Attached as APPENDIX "J", is a copy of instructions which it has been recommended to the D.M.S. be given to S.M.Os. and Os.C. Ambulance Transports carrying soldiers requiring Orthopaedic treatment. It is understood that these are approved, and will henceforth be issued.

Attached as APPENDIX "K" is a report to the D.M.S. re Medical Records of Orthopaedic Cases. This also has been approved.

APPENDIX "L" is a recommendation to the D.M.S. re introduction of A.I.F. Education Scheme to No.2 Command Depot.

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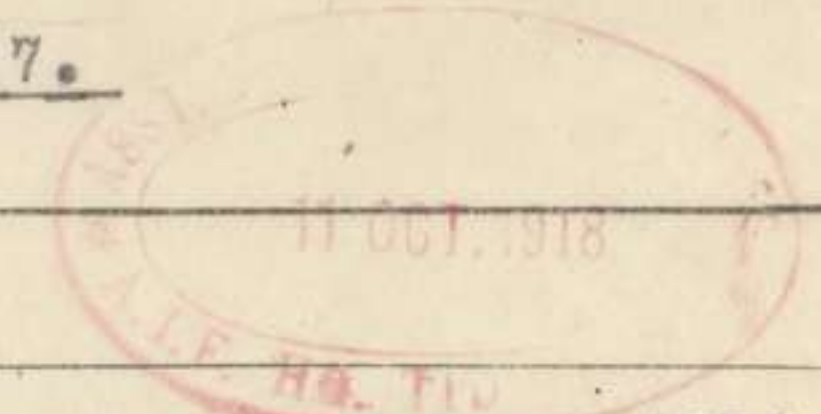

A.I.F. and instructions have accordingly been issued to S.M.Os. concerned. At the time of writing it has just been decided to adopt a similar procedure in the case of all B.E.F. men in A.I.F. Depots, and an instruction covering the whole subject will shortly be issued.</p> <p><u>OVERSEAS TRAINING BRIGADE.</u> This Unit is at present understaffed as regards Medical Officers, each R.M.O. having to attend to two Battalions. 			<p><u>1. GROUP CLEARING HOSPITALS.</u></p>	
			<p>Owing to the transfer of the 3rd Training Brigade from Godford to Hurdcott on 13.9.18., the Group Clearing Hospital at Godford was closed down on that date. The S.M.O. of the 3rd Training Brigade was transferred to Hurdcott and appointed O.C. of the Group Clearing Hospital, Hurdcott. The Group Clearing Hospitals at Sutton Veny and Hurdcott are now known as No. 1 and No. 2 Group Clearing Hospital respectively, and have been organized as independent units; the Medical Officer in charge now has all buildings, stores, rations etc., on his charge, and he is responsible for the administration and discipline of the staff. He is directly responsible to the Area S.M.O. in medical matters; formerly the Group Clearing Hospital Sutton Veny came under the S.M.O. No. 1 Command Depot.</p>	
			<p>The Group Clearing Hospital at Hurdcott has been taxed for accommodation during the month, owing to the large number of admissions of Infectious and Respiratory cases from the 2nd Training Brigade; at the end of the month the number of patients was 213. This number would justify the appointment of an additional Medical Officer, but unfortunately there is not one available at present.</p>	
			<p>The small Group Clearing Hospital at Parkhouse has also been organized as an independent unit, the S.M.O. Parkhouse being also O.C. of the Hospital (which is known as No. 3 Group Clearing Hospital).</p>	
			<p>Attached as <u>APPENDIX "O"</u> is a Consolidated Statistical Return of the work done by the Group Clearing Hospitals for the six months January to June 1918.</p>	<p>APPENDIX "O"</p>
			<p><u>2. HANDING OVER OF PART OF No. 1 A.D.H. BULFORD to NEW ZEALAND MEDICAL CORPS.</u></p>	
			<p>In pursuance of this matter, as outlined in former reports, six large hospital wards, one small hospital ward and corresponding annexes were on 18.9.18., handed over to the New Zealanders. This leaves us with accommodation at Bulford for 926 patients; as already indicated, the number of patients at present is approximately 750., and as for the last nine weeks this number has been steadily rising, it is not improbable that in a couple of months or less the hospital will be over full. Bearing this in mind, Southern Command were notified on 27.9.18., that it may be necessary for us to again take over part of the huts now handed over to the New Zealanders.</p>

GENERAL HEALTH:

There is a slight increase in the number of soldiers in hospital as compared with last week. The number of Admissions to Hospital on account of Venereal Disease shows a slight rise, the number being 166 - the highest for over 6 months.

Total number of Troops in Hospital has increased from 1817 (5.06%) to 1940 (5.37%). Of these, 750 are in Retention Hospitals only, the remainder, 1190., being in true Statistical Hospitals.

Number of Admissions to Hospital has decreased from 590 (1.66%) to 587 (1.63%).

Number of General cases in Hospital has increased from 1175 (3.27%) to 1290 (3.57%) and the number of Admissions to Hospital has decreased from 402 (1.13%) to 364 (1.01%).

Average number attending Daily Sick Parade has decreased from 558 to 546.

RESPIRATORY DISEASE:

Number of cases admitted to Hospital has decreased from 108 to 59. Of these 30 were on account of Influenza as compared with 62 last week. There have been no cases of Pneumonia, but one case previously reported has proved fatal.

INFECTIOUS DISEASE:

Number of cases of Infectious Disease in Hospital, excluding Scabies, has increased from 39 to 45.

The number of Contacts has decreased from 2321 to 921. This decrease is due to the liberation from hospital of reinforcements ex "Feldmarschal" *isolation*

Measles: Number of admissions to hospital for Measles has increased from 3 to 4; all of which occurred among troops already segregated.

Scabies: Number of cases undergoing treatment has increased from 72 to 116.

VENEREAL DISEASE:

GENERAL HEALTH:

This week shows a marked increase in the incidence of Measles on account of which 46 soldiers have been admitted to Hospital. 37 of these cases occurred in one Training Battalion. The infection was introduced by Reinforcements ex Troopship "Gronos" which arrived in England on 19-8-18. There is no appreciable change in the Venereal Disease figures as compared with last week.

Total number of troops in Hospital has increased from 2016 (5.5%) to 2051 (5.71%). Of these 983 are in Retention Hospitals only, the remainder, 1128, being in true Statistical Hospitals.

Number of Admissions to Hospital has increased from 639 (1.76%) to 661 (1.86%).

Number of General cases in Hospital has decreased from 1262 (3.45%) to 1256 (3.50%) and the number of Admissions to Hospital has increased from 380 (1.04%) to 397 (1.11%).

Average number attending Daily Sick Parade has increased from 466 to 522.

RESPIRATORY DISEASE:

Number of cases admitted to Hospital has increased from 63 to 65. Of these 27 were on account of Influenza as compared with 50 for this disease for last week.

There has been one case of Pneumonia but no deaths from this disease.

INFECTIOUS DISEASE:

Number of cases in Hospital, excluding Scabies, has increased from 65 to 93.

The number of Contacts has increased from 628 to 698.

Mumps: Number of Admissions to Hospital has increased from 1 to 7, all of which occurred amongst troops already isolated.

Number of cases in Hospital has decreased from 31 to 24.

Measles: Number of Admissions to Hospital for Measles has increased from 21 to 46, of which 37 occurred amongst troops in segregation and 9 amongst unisolated troops.

C.S.M.: No cases have occurred.

Scabies: Number of cases undergoing treatment has increased from 82 to 102.

VENEREAL DISEASE:

Number of cases in Hospital has increased from 663 (1.8%) to 668 (1.86%). Of these 21 are Officers.

Number of Admissions to Hospital has increased from 193 less 14 Readmissions from C.T.D. = 169 to 187 less 8 Readmissions from C.T.D. = 159

Infection was acquired as follows :-

Before Reporting to the Command: The number has increased from 44 to 51, of whom 17 were on furlough from Administrative Headquarters.

After Reporting to the Command: The number has decreased from 85 to 69.

Number of cases among B.S.F. Troops on leave from France has decreased from 59 to 33.

Number of cases occurring among soldiers on the strength of Administrative Headquarters, other than those on furlough, has remained the same as last week, namely 3.

Number of cases discharged during the week has increased from 92 to 162.

Early Treatment:

1877 soldiers reported for Early Treatment during the week. Of these 182 showing signs of disease were "Sealed Up" and 100 such cases were aborted.

GENERAL HEALTH:

The measles epidemic referred to in last report appears to be under control. The number of fresh cases having fallen from 46 last week to 13 this week.

The number of soldiers in hospital with Venereal Disease show a further marked rise, viz.- from 668 to 755.

Total number of troops in hospital has decreased from 2051 (5.71%) to 1999 (5.6%). Of these 818 are in Retention Hospitals only, the remainder ~~1235~~ ¹¹⁸³ being in true Statistical Hospitals.

Number of Admissions to Hospitals has decreased from 661 (1.86%) to 571 (1.57%).

Number of General cases in Hospital has decreased from 1256 (3.50%) to 1122 (3.14%) and the number of admissions to hospital has decreased from 397 (1.11%) to ~~301~~ ³¹¹ (.85%).

Average number attending Daily Sick Parade has increased from 522 to 583.

RESPIRATORY DISEASE:

Number of cases admitted to Hospital has increased from 65 to 69. Of these 43 were on account of Influenza as compared with 27 for this disease last week.

There have been no cases of Pneumonia, and no deaths from this disease.

INFECTIOUS DISEASE:

Number of cases in Hospital, excluding Scabies, has decreased from 93 to 89. The number of contacts has increased from 698 to 771.

Measles: Number of Admissions to Hospital for Measles has decreased from 46 to 13, of which 8 occurred amongst troops in segregation and 5 amongst unisolated troops.

Mumps: Number of Admissions to Hospital has increased from 7 to 15, of which 13 occurred amongst troops already segregated and 2 amongst unisolated troops.

Number of cases in Hospital has increased from 24 to 25.

C.S.M.: One case occurred, which proved fatal.

Scabies: Number of cases undergoing treatment has decreased from 102 to 82.

VENEREAL DISEASE:

Number of cases in Hospital has increased from 668 (1.36%) to 755 (2.12%). Of these 19 are Officers.

Number of admissions to hospital has increased from 167 less 8 Readmissions from C.T.D. = 159. to 184 less 19 Readmissions from C.T.D. = 165.

Infection was acquired as follows:-

Before reporting to the Command: The number has increased from 51 to 75, of whom 22 were on furlough from Administrative Headquarters.

After reporting to the Command: The number has decreased from 69 to 59.

Number of cases of B.E.F. troops on leave from France has decreased from 33 to 29.

Number of cases occurring amongst soldiers on the strength of Administrative Headquarters other than those on furlough has decreased from 3 to 2.

Number of cases discharged from ^{hospital} during the week has decreased from 162 to 97.

Early Treatment:

1879 soldiers reported for Early Treatment during the week. Of these 104 showing signs of disease were "Sealed Up" and 107 such cases were aborted.

A. Those who have ^{been} classified from "Blb" to "Bla" class, and who are awaiting furlough.

Soldiers of "Bla" class referred to above will not receive training by organised games while they are awaiting furlough, but will be given compulsory walking exercise on the ^{lines} laid down for "Blb" class in appendix C issued in accordance with para 9 of Standing Order No. 4917 of 28/5/18.

The training of these "Bla" class soldiers will include however the physical training laid down for soldiers of "Blal" class and issued with the above mentioned order.

B. Soldiers of "Blb" class.

These will be trained on the lines laid down in appendix C referred to above.

Simple exercises will be given in a section of the Remedial Gymnastic class for 15 minutes, both in the morning and afternoon for all soldiers fit to receive it.

The Remedial Gymnastic Class will therefore consist of 2 sections:

Section 1.— Requiring remedial exercises for the treatment of specific disabilities, such as limitation of finger movements, etc.
This section will also receive general exercises as heretofore.

Section 2.— Not requiring remedial exercises for specific disabilities, but to be given simple exercises in accordance with the above instructions.

INSTRUCTIONS TO S.M.Os. OF AMBULANCE TRANSPORTS CARRYING SOLDIERS WHO REQUIRE ORTHOPAEDIC TREATMENT.

- 435
- (1). The S.M.O. of the Ship is responsible that Orthopaedic Treatment is carried out during the voyage for all soldiers requiring it, and the O.C. of the Transport will give every facility for this to be done.
 - (2). A staff trained in Orthopaedic Treatment will be placed on board according to the following Scale:-
 1. Remedial Gymnastic Instructor per 50 cases under treatment.
 - 1 Masseur per 20 cases under treatment
 - 1 Electrical Operator per 20 cases under treatment.
 - (3). The Apparatus and Equipment necessary for carrying out this treatment has been placed on board. A List is attached.
 - (4). The Apparatus will be fitted up and in working order before the Transport leaves England. For this purpose one Remedial Gymnastic Instructor and one Masseur and Electrical Operator will be placed on board at the first port.
 - (5). When invalids are embarked Nominal Rolls as follows will be handed over to the S.M.O. of the Transport:-
 - (a). Soldiers requiring Remedial Gymnastic Treatment.
 - (b). Soldiers requiring Massage Treatment.
 - (c). Soldiers requiring Electrical & Massage Treatment.
 - (6). Cards containing a record of the previous treatment and progress of these soldiers will be given to the S.M.O. of the Transport and on these cards the record of the progress of each case will be continued until the troops are disembarked in Australia.
A.F.B.178 (Medical History Sheet) and A.F.B.179 (Board Papers) also contain further clinical information about these cases.
 - (7). Organised Games under the direction of the Remedial Gymnastic Instructor should be encouraged for soldiers with slighter disabilities.
 - (8). When soldiers are disembarked, Nominal Rolls and Treatment Cards, for soldiers under treatment will be handed over at each State. These rolls will be prepared separately for each State.

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INSTRUCTIONS TO O.S.C. AMBULANCE TRANSPORTS CARRYING SOLDIERS
NOT REQUIRING ORTHOPAEDIC TREATMENT.

- (1). Weather permitting, all soldiers placed on Ambulance Carriers except those marked "Unfit for Training" by Medical Officers will receive training for ½-hour in the morning and ½-hour in the afternoon, except on Saturday afternoons and Sundays. This training is essential in order to prevent the men becoming slack physically and mentally.
- (2). Thoroughly trained Instructors, sufficient in number to carry out the training, have been placed on board.
- (3). Attached is a "List of Games" suitable for use on board ship. The Instructors have been taught to use this Table of Games so that training will be progressive. All necessary Apparatus, (Medicine Balls etc) has been placed on board. List of this Apparatus is attached.
- (4). When soldiers are embarked Nominal Rolls of soldiers Unfit for Training will be handed over to O.C. Transport.
- (5). The number of Instructors has been based on the "Bull Ring" System in which a series of classes are dealt with one after another, by the same Instructors.
- (6). Men will be medically examined once every three weeks to ascertain their fitness or otherwise for training. If a soldier states he cannot do the training he is to be paraded for medical examination without delay.

MEDICAL RECORDS OF ORTHOPAEDIC CASES.

I have the honour to recommend that the following instructions be promulgated to Australian Auxiliary Hospitals. Similar instructions have been issued to the S.M.O., No. 2 Command Depot, Weymouth.

- A. It is essential that the following information accompany every case of nerve injury invalided to Australia:-
- (1) A complete statement of the condition found at operation and of the nature of the operation performed.
 - (2) The Neurological condition under the following headings:-
 - (a) Range of Movement:
 - i. Active (Voluntary power in muscles below lesion).
 - ii. Passive:
 - (b) Sensation (both Epicritic and Protopathic):
 - (c) Electrical reactions:
 - i. Faradism.
 - ii. Galvanism.
 - iii. R.D.
 - iv. Threshold of Excitation.
 - (d) Trophic changes:
 - (3) Associated Lesions:
 - i. Bone injuries including X-ray reports.
 - ii. Vascular Lesions.
 - iii. Other Lesions.
- B. When a patient who has been previously operated upon for a nerve lesion is transferred to an Australian Unit unaccompanied by the description of the operation referred to in para A(1), the O.C. of the Unit is responsible for obtaining the required information from the hospital concerned.
- C. A complete record of the Neurological examinations referred to in para A(2) will be made:
 - (1) before operation;
 - (2) after operation (at least once every 3 months).
 When an operation has been performed prior to a patient reporting at an Australian Unit, the O.C. of the Unit will endeavour to obtain from the hospital concerned the information referred to in para C(1).
- D. All Orthopaedic cases without nerve injury when invalided to Australia will be similarly accompanied by a complete medical history. This history will include a description of:
 - (1) The condition found at operation and of the ~~value~~ of the operative procedure.
 - (2) Range of movement in joints both active and passive, stating cause of any limitation.
 - (3) Bone injuries including X-ray reports.
 - (4) Injuries to muscles or tendons.
 - (5) Associated lesions - vascular, etc.
 - (6) Progress of case.

E. The record of Orthopaedic cases will be kept on the attached pro forma - "Orthopaedic Case Sheet".

These Orthopaedic Case Sheets are to be kept in addition to the Medical Documents already in use. They will be prepared when an Orthopaedic case first reports to an Australian Unit, and will accompany A.F.B.178 when a soldier is transferred.

A.I.F. Education Scheme.

Reference pamphlet on the above subject issued by the D.A.G., A.I.F., on 11th June, 1918. I recommend for favourable consideration -

- (1) That invalids, while at No. 2 Command Depot, and while on Transports returning to Australia, be given educational instruction on the lines referred to in the above-mentioned pamphlet.
- (2) That the necessary Instructors be sent to Weymouth as soon as possible so that the organisation may be in working order at this Depot before the commencement of the winter.
- (3) That similar Instructors be placed on board all Ambulance Carriers as soon as possible.

These recommendations are made in view of the following :-

- (1) That for psychological reasons soldiers who are being invalidated from the service are in most need of such instruction.
- (2) That there is plenty of time available, both at Weymouth and on Ambulance Carriers, in which this instruction may be given.
- (3) That it is extremely difficult to keep invalids at Weymouth occupied during the winter months. Educational classes at this Depot would therefore be invaluable.

Re Suggested Classification, Procedure, and Allotment
of all A.I.F. Reinforcements.

Herewith I beg to submit a scheme of medical classification of reinforcements arriving in U.K. with suggestions as to procedure and allotment.

Reinforcements on arrival will be sent to Infantry Training Battalions as directed by the G.O.C., A.I.F. Depots in U.K. There examined by R.M.O. immediately on arrival. Those classified other than "Aa" at the first and subsequent examinations will be reported to the S.M.O. of Area, who will examine them with R.M.O., and if they are fit for service abroad will classify them 'Ab', 'Au' or 'D'. This classification will be checked by the A.D.M.S., A.I.F. Depots in U.K. with the object of standardising classification.

I suggest for consideration of G.O.C. A.I.F. if classification recommended is approved, that reinforcements be allotted to the several Arms of the service as indicated in the margin of attached.

Men over Forty (40) who are fit for service abroad and possess special qualifications, may be allotted to any Arm of the Service .

The health of the Area has been highly satisfactory for the month of September and no matters requiring special comment have arisen.

The diarrhoea epidemic although not quite at an end is markedly diminishing and I do not think there is any need for anxiety on the score of its becoming in any way serious.

The Group Medical Store has been left under the direction of S.M.O. No.1 Command Depot for the month, the reason being that the half-yearly stock-taking was due at the end of September, and it was thought the handing over to the O.C., No.1 G.C.H. would be more complete and satisfactory at this time than at the end of August, when the G.C.H. was handed over. The Store is therefore being taken over by O.C. No.1 G.C.H. as from 1st October.

The work of the Area Medical Board is now finished and all men in the area have been examined with the exception of 4 at the O.T.B. The reason for the length of time taken to complete is the difficulty experienced in obtaining complete parades of men for boarding,

Sanitation in the Area has been on the whole satisfactory, and greater attention to fly prevention has been observed by practically all units.

MONTHLY REPORT.



The general health conditions for the past month called for no special comment as there have been only the usual diseases prevalent mainly of a mild character. The diarrhoea which was so prevalent last month is still fairly common although it is abating somewhat. The fact that it is still existing although flies have greatly diminished owing to the recent cooler weather, seems to go to prove somewhat my statement, that it is of an influenzal nature and not one of the usual fly-borne diarrhoeas.

Owing to the bad weather the Sick Parades have been changed from 0700 to 0900. This change took place on Tuesday the 17th. and to some extent explains the increase in the number of men reporting sick daily although this is very largely explained by the increase in strength of the Depot owing to the large number "marching in" from Hurdcott.

The fact that only 238 cases were sent to Hospital as compared with 254 last month is highly satisfactory when the increased strength of the Depot is borne in mind.

Only one case of infectious disease has been reported for the month viz. Measles, and an Isolation Compound has been set aside in No.10 Camp where all contacts of infectious cases are isolated. This is preferable to isolation in the lines themselves which is never entirely satisfactory.

The most marked difference in the Depot is the large increase in the Remedial and Massage Department which required some changes in organisation to ensure all men attending at the proper time. I am commencing this week, 30th., by a time table and Nominal Rolls sent to Companies, and not to individuals, of all the men required daily for treatment from each Company as a whole. These will all be marched over together and treated at the same time and marched back to their Companies by a N.C.O.. If carried out properly by the different Companies it should do away with illegal absentees entirely.

Owing to the large area now carried by the Depot viz. Camps Nos. 5, 6, Engineers, 7, 8, 9, and 10, I have opened a second Early Treatment Depot in No.5 Camp as the distance to the already existing one in No.7 Camp would be too great from some of the Camps to guarantee that men would report for prophylactic treatment at night. Both E. T. Depots are under the same officer to ensure uniformity of treatment being carried out. "C" System was used in every case. 146 cases were given Early Treatment; of these 85 were discharged to lines - apparently cured, 20 were transferred to No.1 A.D.H., 41 are still undergoing treatment. This shows a percentage of nearly 85% of what are apparent cures.

62 cases of Gonorrhoea were sent direct to No.1 A.D.H., being considered unsuitable cases for early treatment. 58 cases of hard or soft Chancre were sent on to No.1 A.D.H. and 14 cases were sent to the C.T.D. for Wasserman Tests. 320 men reported for prophylactic treatment.

Forty (40) cases have already passed through the new Early Treatment Depot opened in No.5 Camp, and 42 men have reported for prophylactic treatment. Full use has been made of the microscope, over 800 smears having been examined for gonococci.

Sanitation in the Camp has been satisfactory and gauze protection against flies contaminating food is still more improved by the issue of small gauze-covered frames to cover small articles of food such as cheese and butter. Also all the latrines have a supply of saw-dust in them to sprinkle in the pans after use.

Please find attached a return showing the number of men reporting sick daily and analysis of same.

1. HEALTH.

(a) GENERAL.

Throughout the month the general health has been very good, the number of evacuations to Hospital showing a substantial decrease on August. Even the incidence of Diarrhoea did not assume alarming proportions in this Brigade.

(b) INFECTIOUS DISEASE.

After over three months freedom from Infectious Disease, one case - mumps - occurred on September 20th. No case has as yet occurred amongst the contacts.

(c) VENEREAL DISEASE.

A.A.M.C. orders 693 of 28-8-18 and 707 of 18-9-18 have effected a marked change of policy in this Brigade as regards Gonorrhoea.

(1) All cases of Relapse, detected or reporting, have been evacuated to 1st A. D. Hospital during the month. These only number - 38, whereas the number of relapses reporting for treatment at E. T. Depot during August was 77 and the average for four months previously was over 90.

Acute Gonorrhoea is easily detected at draft inspection, but the milder relapses and chronic gleans, even though positive Gonococcal, are impossible to detect if the soldier wishes to deceive. Discovery means Bulford and loss of pay. Hence I am of opinion that a number of relapses are now marching out overseas and to U.K. Depots from Overseas Training Brigade.

(2) The nine days period of observation after Early Treatment is welcomed as a marked scientific improvement but has the disadvantage of being the cause of a soldier being struck off two successive drafts overseas. Gonorrhoea thus becomes an asset to some soldiers, but the proportion is fortunately very small.

(3) Consequent on the evacuation of all relapses the number of V. D. cases evacuated during September has markedly increased on previous months.



No 3 Command Depot was disbanded on 13.9.18 and the Personnel of the Depot were distributed as follows :-

Blb's to Littlemoor Camp, Weymouth.

No 2 Group Clearing Hospital was established as a separate Unit on 9.9.18. Accommodation 150 beds. Staff 56 O/Ranks, 1 Medical Officer.

Major E.B. Riley, A.A.M.C. Dental Services, took over duty as S.D.C. A.A.M.C. Training Depot, 2nd and 3rd Training Brigades on 23.9.18.

Captain S. McLennan took over duties as O.C., No 2 Group Clearing Hospital, Hurdcott on 17.9.18 from Major J.B. Lewis, who together with Captain D. Crombie, was in temporary command from the time of disbandment of No 3 Command Depot. Major Lewis marched out to Orthopaedic Hospital, Shepherd's Bush, London on 19.9.18, and Captain Crombie to No 2 Command Depot, Weymouth on 16.9.18.

MEASLES EPIDEMIC AT 2nd TRAINING BRIGADE.

During the month of September, Measles have occurred and persist in occurring in 2nd Training Brigade. The largest number of cases have occurred at 9th Training Battalion, from which 80 cases have been evacuated. 5th Training Battalion have been comparatively small, viz. 16. The segregation of contacts was commenced immediately, but cases still are occurring outside of the contacts in isolation. I do not think that this is due on a large extent to any laxity in the segregation of contacts. I have taken steps to ensure that isolation of contacts must be strict in every detail.

A big element in the spread of infectious disease in this Area (Fovant), is in my opinion due to the Garrison Cinema at Fovant. This is nightly packed to its utmost seating capacity, which seats I might say are far too close together - and is also an extremely badly ventilated building.

I have in conjunction with the S.S.O., Wylve Valley, inspected this Cinema and this Officer has placed the Cinema out of bounds until further notice, mainly on account of the measles in the 2nd Training Brigade, but I think that something should be done, to compel the N.A.C.B. to make the hall a more sanitary one, and seating accommodation not so crowded.

I understand that the S.S.O., Wylve Valley is taking these necessary steps.

There is similar crowded seating accommodation at the Hurdcott Cinema. Fortunately, at present there has been few cases of infectious disease occurring in the camps about Hurdcott, otherwise I feel that there would be an epidemic there, similar to the measles outbreak at Fovant.

SANITATION. The general sanitation of camps occupied by A.I.F. troops in Hurdcott Area are satisfactory, and all matters adversely reported on in Weekly Sanitary Reports, have and are being rectified.

Herewith suggestions as requested, regarding the collection of soldiers in Hurdcott Area, for evacuation to No 1 A.D.H. Bulford.

The two N.C.O. Hospital Conductors to be on the strength of the 2nd Training Brigade for Rations & Discipline, and attached to this Office for duty. The weekly classification could be done by the S.M.O., Hurdcott Area.

They would be on duty on alternate days.

2nd Training Brigade to supply return Railway Warrant and Duty Pass for the Hospital Conductor, to this Office daily.

It would be necessary for the Units in this Area to carry out the following:-

- (a) notify this Office by 6 p.m. daily, of the number of cases they have for evacuation to No 1 A.D.H.
- (b) have patients paraded according to the attached time-table, for collection by the Hospital Conductor.
- (c) have the patients' necessary papers, rations, kit and Railway Warrant to Bulford, with them when paraded for collection.

The Hospital Conductor's duty would be as follows:-

- (a) proceed by Ambulance Car, from 2nd Training Brigade according to the time-table attached, to the various Units in the Area, where patients have been notified at 6 p.m. on the day previous, as awaiting evacuation.
- (b) He will collect such patients, together with necessary papers, rations, kit, Railway Warrant etc., and will give a receipt for same to the Unit's representative, who is in charge of the patients.
- (c) He will take patients to Bulford, as per time-table attached.
- (d) On arrival at Bulford, he will hand patients over to the Admitting Officer, receiving a receipt for necessary papers, rations, kits and patients.
- (e) He will receive from No 1 A.D.H., any patients who are due for discharge to this Area, and will receive with them their necessary ~~kit~~ papers, kits, rations and Railway Warrants and give No 1 A.D.H. a receipt for same.
- (f) He will then proceed with these discharged patients to Fovant, as per time-table attached.
- (g) He will then be met by Ambulance Car at Fovant Station, and take these men to their respective Units, handing them over and obtaining from the Unit's representative ~~for the same~~ a receipt for the men, kits, rations and necessary papers.
- (h) He will then return to this Office and hand in a report of his tour of duty.

Alternative.

Unit representatives could meet the Hospital Conductor at Fovant Station, and take discharged patients over there.
