

281. BAMBOO STRETCHER POLES.

The issue of bamboo stretcher poles has been authorised at
the rate of 12 per regiment. Indents should be submitted

282. NATIVE PERSONNEL.

With reference to the Native personnel with divisions
authorised by present War Establishments the following is
the procedure for obtaining same and replacement of casualties.

283. INDENTS FOR NATIVE LABOUR.

Attention is directed to G.R.O. 328, para 2888, of 2.9.17.

284. TETANUS ANTITOXIN.

All tetanus antitoxin that is over two years old should be
returned to store and requisitions put in for fresh supply.

285. WATER.

It is essential that each R.M.O. should have a water testing
case (Horrocks) or the equipment issued for water duty men
last October and that his water duty men are thoroughly
familiar with the use of these. It was thought last year
that wells might be freely scattered about the country
but apparently this is unlikely in the future and they will
more probably be grouped together. It will largely depend
on the initiative of the R.M.O. whether the early purification
of such wells is carried out and the great importance of
exercising this initiative should be ~~carried out~~ remembered.
As is now done in France, each R.M.O. should provide
himself with labels - cardboard should be obtainable -
marked "Fit for Drinking" or "Unfit for Drinking" to be used
at any wells he examines or treats. These will replace
the confetti previously supplied. The possibility should
not be forgotten that wells poisoned with Chemical poisons
may be encountered and medical officers must be in possession
of the cases "Water Testing Poisons" authorised and understand
their use. This treatment of wells and pools when first
encountered will be followed by routine chlorination of
all drinking water as at present.

286. MEASURE TO PREVENT TIGS TICK BY CONTAMINATED WELL WATER.

Regimental Medical Officers will be responsible that all wells on line of advance covered by their units are treated by Bleaching Powder as the forces advances. Should trained water duty men not be available they will train men supplied by C.O. of Unit under P.S. Regs. Part I para 46, section 4.

287. ARTIFICIAL DENTURES.

A charge of 2/- will be made for the renewal or replacement of any denture for any Officer or man which has been supplied at the public expense, unless such renewal or replacement is required on account of the dental condition of patient, or unless it is shown that the loss or destruction of the denture was not due to the fault of the officer or man concerned.

The amount will be entered in the soldiers pay book by the dental officer supplying the denture, who will also, on the prescribed form obtain the receipt of the soldier for the denture, and will certify that the amount has been entered in the paybook as above directed.

In the past Mounted Ambulances have transported the equipment for their mobile sections, while the Immobile sections have moved by rail or especially allotted transport; for long distance evacuation of casualties a camel convoy has been supplied by Infantry Divisions.

In future operations heavy motor ambulances will take the place of the Camel Convoys while light motor ambulances augment the sand carts and cacolets, the Immobile sections will have to be transported by the normal wheeled transport of the ambulances.

Each Division will form a Receiving Station from two of its Immobile sections for which 2 G.S. wagons and one water cart per ambulance will be required. Extra transport will be available for the operative unit.

It is hoped that approval will be given for the horsing of the two Immobile G.S. wagons in which case the transport can be distributed as follows:-

The latter transport while sufficient for requirements leaves little margin and one further wagon would be obtained if possible for the baggage. The following is the equipment suggested for Mobile and Immobile sections; that for the Mobile sections is based on what was carried in the days of camel transport and proved suitable but is not intended to be binding for repacking and substituting may result in saving of weight and space; the general principle should be followed however. Only small departures for the equipment for ~~IMMEDIATE~~ Immobile sections are to be made.

On the recommendations of Consultant Surgeons at Home and in the Army areas in France, it has been decided to discontinue the issue of the Iodine Ampoule to each officer and soldier and the use of iodine ampoules in the first field dressing, when the existing stocks become exhausted.

290. MEDICAL CERTIFICATES.

Medical Officers are on no account to give certificates to officers or other ranks concerning their condition, to recommend leave, transfer to England, or line of treatment when transferred from their care. Recommendations as to line of treatment should be forwarded confidentially through the usual channel to the hospital to which the officers or men are transferred. (G.R.O. 2922).

291. EVACUATIONS.

All ambulances will evacuate to the Anzac Receiving Station, 1st.L.H.F.A. Immobile Section, at KILO 9.

292. RETENTION OF PATIENTS.

Ambulances will retain patients 4 days and the Receiving Station will retain them 7 days in cases likely to recover within these times.

293. TRAINING.

The personnel of Immobile Sections of ambulances will be practised daily in marching.


