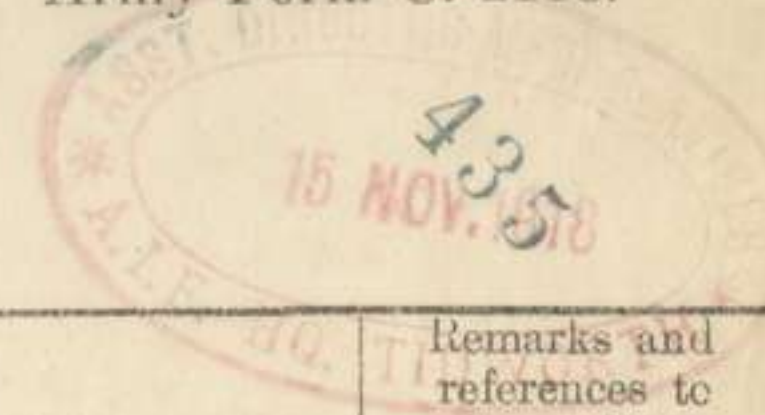

WAR DIARY, MEDICAL SECTION, HEADQUARTERS A.I.F. DEPOTS IN U.K. FOR THE MONTH OF OCTOBER, 1918.

During October the strength of A.I.F. Depots decreased from 37624 to 36630.

A. - MEDICAL OFFICERS.

The strength of Medical Officers in the Command has increased slightly during the month from 69 to 71, but the number on duty in the Command is still considerably below requirements. If the present shortage continues for any length of time the efficiency of the medical work must suffer. For the same reason it is at present almost impossible to grant leave to Medical Officers.

During the month, only 1 Reinforcement Officer has arrived from Australia, and 9 have reported from the D.M.S.

6 marched out to report to the D.M.S. for passage overseas, and 2 have embarked for return to Australia.

Captain J.H.B. Brown MC., reported for duty on 23.10.18. He was appointed D.A.D.M.S. A.I.F. Depots in U.K. on 28.10.18, vice Major F.T. Beamish who reported on that day to the D.M.S. for passage overseas.

B. - HEALTH OF TROOPS.

The number of soldiers in hospital shews a considerable and steady increase during the month. This is due to the incidence of the Influenza Epidemic which, however, was shewing signs of abating towards the end of the month.

For full statistical details as to health of troops, see APPENDIX "B", which consists of the Weekly Reports on this subject submitted to the D.M.S.

These reports shew that for the five weeks ending 3.10.18, 10.10.18, 17.10.18, 24.10.18, and 31.10.18, the total numbers of soldiers in hospital were respectively 2156, 2410, 2638, 2782, and 2969, the corresponding percentages of the total strength of the Command being 5.7%, 6.38%, 6.86%, 7.64%, and 8.04%. Of these totals, the following numbers viz: 961, 1112, 1076, 908 and 1049, represent patients in the Group Clearing and Camp Hospitals, which are not true hospitals for statistical purposes.

The amount of serious disease has shown a marked increase as compared with the previous month. There have been sixty four (64) deaths from all causes, of which 54 were due to Pneumonia and Broncho-Pneumonia, occurring in almost every case as a complication of Influenza. There has been one case of Cerebro-Spinal Meningitis.

APPENDIX "G"

INFECTIOUS DISEASE.

The Measles and Mumps Infection which was introduced in August by Reinforcements ex "Orontes" showed a marked increase in the incidence of both these diseases in September, and during the first half of October this incidence was still further increased, this being due to the arrival of two more Transports late in September, all the troops from one of which - the Borda - being Mumps Contacts. During the latter half of October, however, both these diseases have decreased considerably in incidence, though a number of cases still continue to come in.

During the 4 weekly month of September there were 34 fresh cases of Mumps and 84 of Measles, whereas during the 5 weekly month of October there were 88 fresh cases of Mumps and 117 of Measles.

DEPOTS IN U.K. FOR THE MONTH OF OCTOBER, 1918.</u></p> <p><u>VENEREAL DISEASE.</u></p> <p>The increase in the number of soldiers in hospital with Venereal Disease to which attention was drawn in the reports of August and September has continued during the month, the numbers for the five weeks ending 3.10.18, 10.10.18, 17.10.18, 24.10.18, and 31.10.18 being respectively 770, 796, 791, 818, and 834.</p> <p>An average of 69.4 per week were admitted from soldiers from British or Australian Auxiliary Hospitals or on Sick Furlough, as compared with 56.5 per week from these sources last month.</p> <p>Of B.E.F. Troops on leave from France, a weekly average 49.8 were admitted as compared with 33.5 in September.</p> <p>The admissions to Bulford Hospital from within A.I.F. Depots has remained about the same as during September.</p> <p>309 cases of Gonorrhoea were discharged to the Convalescent Training Depot during the five weeks ending 31.10.18, of which 45 cases relapsed and were returned to No. 1 A.D.H. for further treatment.</p> <p><u>Early Treatment.</u></p> <p>10,976 soldiers attended the Early Treatment Depots during the five weeks ending 31.10.18; Of these 557 shewing signs of disease were sealed up and 420 such cases were aborted.</p> <p><u>APPENDIX "C"</u> which consists of the Consolidated Weekly Early Treatment Returns ending 30.9.18</p> <p><u>APPENDIX "E"</u> which consists of consolidated statistics of Early Treatment and V.D. 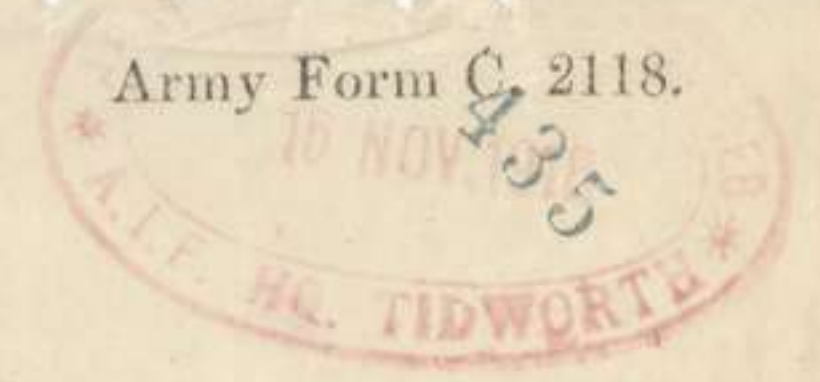

At the end of the month a draft of 250 were under orders to proceed to France at an early date, this number being required to fill vacancies caused by the despatch from France of 1914 men on leave to Australia. 6 "A" Class men have during the month been transferred at their own request to combatant arms of the Service.

No. 4 Command Depot shews a marked increase in the number of admissions as compared with last month; No. 1 Command Depot a slight increase.

The above figures shew that, for the four-weekly month of October 5545 soldiers reported to Command Depots from Hospitals (either direct or after furlough): The corresponding figures for September were 4,680. Thus the admission rate shews an increase of approximately 19%. This increase is due to casualties from the heavy fighting of August and September having passed through Hospital and reporting to Command Depots after furlough.

On 28.9.18 the total unfit at these 2 Depots numbered 5,436, and on 26.10.18 only 3,614; while 5,136 men were made dentally fit during this period.</p> <p>For detailed Command Depot statistics see <u>Appendix "D"</u>, which consists of the Consolidated Weekly Command Depot Returns.</p> <p><u>No. 2 COMMAND DEPOT.</u></p> <p>The strength of this Depot has decreased during the month from 6,695 to 4,581. 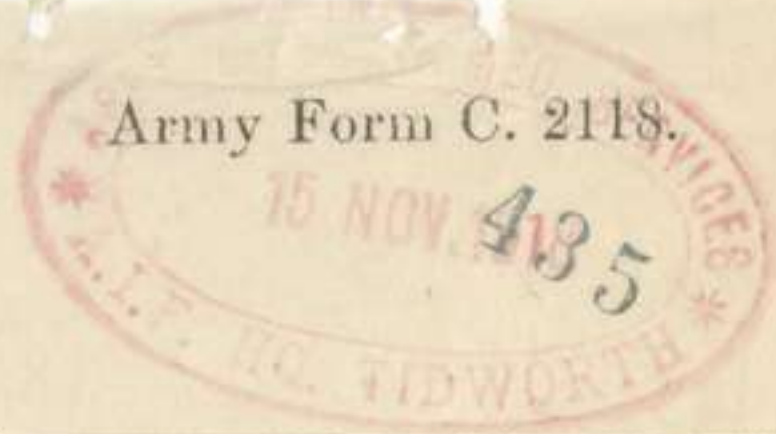

GENERAL HEALTH:

The statistics relating to the health of troops show an all-round increase as compared with last week. This is mainly due to an increased amount of Measles, Mumps, and Influenza; a large majority of these cases have occurred in Training Battalions which have received Reinforcements from Australia, both from the "Orontes" and "Field Marshall" in August and the "Borda" and "Marathon" which arrived on 27.9.18. The ~~former~~ ^{former} ~~line~~ had many cases of Mumps during the voyage and all her troops are in isolation till the 21st inst.

Total number of troops in Hospital has increased from 1999 (5.6%) to 2156 (5.7%). Of these 961 are in Retention Hospitals, the remainder 1195 being in true Statistical Hospitals.

Number of Admissions to Hospital has increased from 571 (1.57%) to 731 (1.97%)

Number of General cases in Hospital has increased from 1122 (3.14%) to 1207 (3.19%) and the number of Admissions to Hospital has increased from 311 (.85%) to 392 (1.02%).

Average number attending Daily Sick Parade has increased from 583 to 696.

RESPIRATORY DISEASE:

Number of cases admitted to Hospital has increased from 69 to 135. Of these 103 were on account of Influenza as compared with 43 last week. 64 of these Influenza cases occurred in the 9th Training Bn.

There has been 1 case of Pneumonia, but no deaths from this disease.

INFECTIOUS DISEASE:

Number of cases in Hospital, excluding Scabies, has increased from 89 to 137.

The number of Contacts has increased from 771 to 3246.

Measles: Number of Admissions to Hospital for Measles has increased from 13 to 50, 46 of which occurred amongst troops in Segregation and 4 amongst unisolated troops.

Mumps: Number of Admissions to Hospital has increased from 15 to 36; 35 of which occurred amongst troops already segregated and 1 amongst unisolated troops. Included in this 36 are 9 cases which were sent direct to Hospital from Transport.

Number of cases in Hospital has increased from 25 to 48.
C.S.M.: 1 positive case has occurred and 2 other suspect cases are under observation. There have been no deaths from this disease.

Scabies: Number of cases undergoing treatment has increased from 82 to 135.



GENERAL HEALTH:

There is an increase in the incidence of illness as compared with last week. It is almost entirely due to an outbreak of influenza, which has occurred in the main in the Training Battalions among drafts recently arrived from Australia. The outbreak has been moderately severe, and in some Units very highly infectious.

The total number of troops in Hospital has increased from 2156 (5.7%) to 2410 (6.33%). Of these 1112 are in Retention Hospitals, the remainder 1298 being in true Statistical Hospitals.

Number of Admissions to Hospital has increased from 731 (1.97%) to 941 (2.5%).

Number of General cases in Hospital has increased from 1207 (3.19%) to 1442 (3.61%), and the number of Admissions to Hospital has increased from 392 (1.03%) to 664 (1.76%).

The number attending Daily Sick Parade has increased from 696 to 735.

RESPIRATORY DISEASE:

Number of cases admitted to Hospital has increased from 135 to 426. Of these Influenza accounted for 393 as compared with 103 last week. 120 of these Influenza Cases occurred in the 1st Training Battalion and 69 in the 9th Training Battalion.

GENERAL HEALTH:

There is a further increase in the number of troops in hospital as compared with last week. The Influenza epidemic has been very marked in all Infantry Training Battalions and the R.B.A.A., Heytesbury. It has also spread to No. 1 Command Depot, from which 44 cases were admitted to hospital during the week. No. 2 and No. 4 Command Depots have so far almost completely escaped the infection.

The total number of troops in hospital has increased from 2410 (6.38%) to 2638 (6.86%). Of these, 1076 are in the Group Clearing and Camp Hospitals, and the remainder 1562 being in true Statistical Hospitals.

The number of admissions to hospitals has increased from 941 (2.5%) to 1057 (2.78%).

GENERAL HEALTH:

The number of troops in hospital as compared with last week shows a further increase. The Influenza has been considerably reduced in point of incidence. Infantry Training Battalions continue to be the most affected by the epidemic, which on the whole shows signs of abating.

Total number of troops in hospital has increased from 2782 (7.64%) to 2969 (8.04%). Of these 1,049 were in non-statistical hospitals - the remainder 1920 were in true statistical hospitals.

MONTHLY MEDICAL REPORT.

Health of Troops.

There has been a severe epidemic of Influenza throughout the whole Area, especially marked in the 1st Training Battalion and R.B.A.A. Camps. It started about October 5th and reached its height in the middle of the month, and has been steadily declining since. The epidemic is of a much more severe type than the one reported in July and there have been 33 deaths, the cause of death being Pneumonia following on the Influenza. All precautions have been taken to try and check the spread of the disease but it seems to be wide spread throughout all the Camps.

During the first week there was a congestion in the No.1 Group Clearing Hospital and Sutton Veny Military Hospital, and several of the mild cases had to be placed on bed boards; there was not a sufficient number of sheets, pillows and pyjamas, this was soon rectified and after that week all patients were provided with Hospital beds, sheets, mattresses, pyjamas &c.

The arrival of Sisters at the No.1 Group Clearing Hospital was a great help and the Hospitals after the first rush were easily able to cope with the number of patients.

Throughout the whole epidemic every man suffering from Influenza having a temperature of 99 or over was immediately evacuated to Hospital and accommodation was always provided there. There has not been a death either in the lines or at the Group Clearing Hospital.

There has been a slight increase in the number of cases of Mumps and Measles, and at present there are 270 contacts in isolation.

The General health of the troops apart from the influenza is excellent and compares well with previous months.

The E.T. Depots, with the exception of O.T.B., are now under the supervision of Captain Fethers, and the Plugging Method is being used throughout the Area.

The Group Medical Store has been placed under the Command of the O.C. No.1 G.C.H. (Capt. Glassford).

The work at the No.1 G.C.H. is being carried out very satisfactorily.

The Medical work at No.1 C.D. has not been very satisfactory this month owing to -

first, changes in the personnel, the new medical Officers taking some time to learn their work.

second, there not being a sufficient number of Medical Officers

third, two of the Medical Officers are not suitable for work at a Command Depot.

Sanitation.

The sanitation of the whole Area is excellent.

Medical Boards.

There are still a large number of men being boarded at No.1 Command Depot, and many men marching in as Bla who obviously should be classified in a lower category.

Personnel.

There is a shortage of Medical Officers in the Area at present, and with two more the Medical work of the Area could be improved. At present it is impossible to allow Medical Officers to go on leave although many of them have been due for leave for some time.

MONTHLY REPORT FOR OCTOBER.

With regard to the health of the troops in No. 1 Command Depot the only matter requiring comment is the epidemic of influenza. The total number of cases reporting for the month was 213, with a daily average of 6.87; the highest number for one day being 16 on 31.10.18, and the lowest being 2 on five occasions. The number of deaths has been five. All precautions were taken in evacuating men showing any of symptoms immediately to Group Clearing Hospital, Medical Officers being specially instructed to give a careful examination to all men reporting sick. There has been no case of neglect or failure to remove men immediately to Hospital on showing signs of the disease. A special memo was forwarded to the Commandant requesting him to instruct his Officers to see that all cases of men in the lines sick should be reported to Medical Officers immediately. Ventilation has been attended to, and the Commandant on the recommendation of the S.M.O. has closed down all concerts in the Camp, as owing to overcrowding it was a source of danger. The epidemic is now abating, the cases being reported are of a milder nature and numbers are distinctly less.

57 cases of Gonorrhoea were held to be unsuitable for Early Treatment and were sent direct to No. 1 A.D.H., Bulford. 138 cases of V.D. 20 were treated, 17 of these were failures and were transferred to No. 1 A.D.H. Of the remaining 121, 86 have been discharged cured and 35 are undergoing treatment at present. During the month the old system of seals has been abandoned and the plugging system introduced. It is too early as yet to deduct anything regarding the merits of this system as compared with the old. Sterilised bottles and a syringe have come to hand and I am now in a position to take blood for Wassermans myself.

Please find attached a return showing the number of men reporting sick daily and an analysis of same.

During October the health of the troops has not been so good. The number of evacuated shows a marked increase on September. This has been largely due to the Influenza Epidemic. All efforts are being made to combat the disease. Cases are being quickly evacuated, minor cases without temperature or pulmonary signs are being isolated and a systematic spraying of hutments, cinema, theatre, etc., has been organised.

INFLUENZA EPIDEMIC.

33 (1) 55
During the month of October this Area has been effected by an outbreak of Influenza. The numbers of cases occurring in the respective Units are shown on attached graphs.

The epidemic was characterized by respiratory complications following the Influenza. In the initial stages of the disease there were the usual symptoms of influenza, viz:- headache, pains in limbs and pyrexia, but in quite a number of cases in the course of a few days, and even sometimes after the patient apparently had got over the influenzal attack, the temperature would rise, and on examination a diagnosis of either lobar or broncho pneumonia would be made. With these pneumonias, in the majority of cases which died the toxæmia was very marked, more so than the respiratory embarrassment.

In order to combat the epidemic prophylactic measures were at once adopted.

Instructions were issued to Units re care of the health of their troops, and the importance of A.D.M.S. Cir. Ins. No 47 emphasised. Lectures were given to Officers, N.C.O.'s and men of various Units throughout the Area, pointing out the importance of avoiding risk of infection. A special point was made in these lectures of the responsibility of the battalion in reporting any men, who were not fit, to the R.M.O. This was emphasised by a surprise visit to a Training Battalion at 1900 one evening, and inspecting the huts in company with the Orderly Officer. All men lying down in their huts were asked why they had turned in. In many cases the answer was on account of not feeling well, and on examination the majority of the men were found to have Influenza, and were immediately evacuated to Hospital.

Medical Officers were instructed to be of constant watch for any respiratory trouble in any man parading sick, and quick evacuation to Hospital of any cases with a temperature of 99° was a standing order.

Any cases showing signs of pneumonic trouble were sent direct to Fovant Military Hospital, and uncomplicated cases to No 2 Group Clearing Hospital.

As a result of the epidemic and the constant watch for slightest signs of the disease, by both combatant and medical personnel, both Hospitals soon became full.

No 2 Group Clearing Hospital, originally 150 beds, became a 200 bed Hospital, and on October 16th authority was obtained from A.D.M.S. to expand to 300 beds. For this purpose extra accommodation in No. 5 Camp was placed at the disposal of the Group Hospital by the C.O., 3rd. Training Brigade, and, had it not been for the willing and helpful co-operation of this Officer in the question of accommodation, it would have been exceedingly difficult to have coped with the increased number in the Hospital.

The amount of work to be done in the Hospital was very large, and Captain McLennan, the O.C., No. 2 Group Clearing Hospital, found it quite impossible to do the work satisfactorily by himself. Another Medical Officer, Captain Blackall, reported on 15.10.18, and, even then, the type of case, demanded an extra Officer. Major Kelly reported for duty on 17.10.18

Colonel C. DeCrespigny, D.S.O., visited the Hospital on 16-10-18 in an advisory capacity and recommended Nursing Sisters, on account of the pneumonic nature of the disease, and the unavoidable necessity of sometimes keeping a case overnight before sending to Fovant. (Whenever possible all cases were transferred to Fovant Military Hospital on the first sign of respiratory complications).

Colonel. C. DeCrespigny, D.S.O., became a casualty on 17-10-18 and was admitted to Fovant Military Hospital with Influenza.

One Matron and five Nursing Sisters of A.A.N.S. reported for duty on 18.10.18. Accommodation was arranged for them at Cliffe House, Swallowcliffe, which was fortunately to let, some four miles from No. 2 G.C.H., and arrangements made for them to be taken backwards and forwards to Hospital by Ambulance Car.

Extra Orderly Nursing Staff was obtained from casuals and others in A.A.M.C. Training Depot, and also from "Bla" A.A.M.C. men in No. 4 Command Depot. The Nursing Orderly Staff has been brought up to 85 other ranks for a 300 bed clearing Hospital

On account of the liability to relapse, a standing instruction was laid down in the Hospital to the effect that no patient was allowed out of bed until the temperature had been normal 48 hours. If the temperature then remained normal for the 60 hours following he could be discharged to his Unit provided he was fit otherwise.

Units were advised to the effect that Patients on/

435 Patients /

on discharge from Hospital were to be automatically on five days' light duty, and to report twice daily to R.M.O. for inspection. By this means all relapses were discovered early.

On 29.10.18 Miss Quartermaine, Matron of No. 2 G.C.H., developed Broncho-Pneumonia, and is at present in a critical condition. Two Sisters have been put on to special her at Cliffe House, Swallowcliffe, and 3 extra Sisters, asked for to replace them, reported for duty from London on 1.11.18.

During the month // other ranks, A.A.M.C., out of a total of 62, have become casualties of Influenza, on account of coming in direct contact with Influenza Patients.

The epidemic apparently is settling down, but there is still much work to be done. All Medical Officers, Nursing Sisters, and A.A.M.C. Personnel have worked exceeding hard during the month. It is due to their combined efforts that the death ~~rate~~ rate has been comparatively low. The excellent work done by the Officers at No. 2 G.C.H. is deserving of note, as the heaviest work was theirs, on account of the numbers, and the careful and constant watch of each patient for early signs of pneumonia.

INFLUENZA EPIDEMIC.

I have to forward the following report on the Influenza Epidemic, which commenced in this Command early in October.

(1). INCIDENCE.

The number of soldiers admitted to hospital with Influenza has steadily increased since the commencement of the epidemic but during the last two days there has been a decrease and the epidemic appears to be lessening.

The number of cases admitted from the whole Command to hospital was as follows:-

(2). MORTALITY:

The mortality was high and was due in practically every case to Pneumonia or Broncho-Pneumonia.

The daily incidence of Influenza and the death rate ~~are~~ due to the epidemic are shown in attached Graph.

(One of these being due to Whooping Cough and not Influenza).

(3.) NATURE OF THE DISEASE.

The Influenza was of an extremely virulent form and Respiratory complications were frequent. Of these the commonest were Pneumonia, Broncho-Pneumonia and Bronchitis.

In a number of cases the temperature rose in a few hours to 103° or 104° .

Generally Pneumonia did not occur till several days had elapsed from the onset, ^{but} occasionally it occurred early. In some cases it was noticed on the first day of the disease.

The number of cases of Bronchitis, Pneumonia and Broncho-Pneumonia and Pleurisy will be reported later.

(4.) MEASURES TAKEN IN CONNECTION WITH THE EPIDEMIC.

(a). Special attention was paid to the ventilation of huts and buildings. Medical Officers made frequent inspections to ensure that existing regulations re ventilation were being complied with, and the matter was brought under the notice of all Combatant Officers in the following Orders by the G.O.C.:-

(1). "INFLUENZA EPIDEMIC"

(a). It has been noted that existing orders re Ventilation are not being complied with in some Units. Commanding Officers will be held responsible that special measures are concerted to ensure compliance with the following instructions.

(b). Fresh Air is the chief preventative of Influenza, and during the day all windows in the huts should be widely open except that when raining, the windows on the weather side may be closed.

At night all fan-lights and diagonally opposite windows in each hut must be left open; under fine weather conditions it will be advantageous to have additional windows open during the night and it should be explained to all ranks that the provision of maximum ventilation is an essential and effective factor in combating disease and infection.

(c). Windows in Mess rooms, Canteens, and places of entertainment should be open as far as possible.

(d). Generally, special attention should be paid by all ranks to ensure that the air in all buildings is kept fresh."

(2). "INFLUENZA EPIDEMIC.

- (i) Where influenza is prevalent steps will be taken to isolate the locality as far as possible. Troops in such localities will not be allowed to be present at Cinemas, Theatres, or other places of entertainment.
- (ii) It is essential to avoid overcrowding in barrack huts and regimental institutes. Where possible, at least 50 square feet of floor space should be given to each man and never less than 40 square feet.

During the night at least two windows on each side of every 60 x 20 hut will be open; the open windows being those diagonally opposite each other. All ranks will be encouraged to remain in the open air as far as possible & to avoid overcrowded rooms, institutes etc.

- (iii) Bedboards will be placed so that the head of one man is opposite the feet of his neighbour.
- (iv) Care will be taken that during the prevalence of Influenza the military training is regulated so as to prevent excessive fatigue.
- (v) The use as a gargle of one part permanganate of potash to five thousand of 0.5 per cent solution sodium chloride solution is recommended twice daily for all troops where the disease is occurring. The solution should be snuffed into the nose before gargling."

(b). At the onset of the epidemic all Medical Officers were seen by the A.D.M.S. personally, and informed of the serious nature of the disease and of the frequency of Pneumonic complications. They were instructed to make the greatest possible effort to ensure the early detection of cases by careful and thorough medical examinations, and by continual inspection of troops. The necessity of admitting such cases at once to hospital was impressed on all.

(c). The responsibility of Combatant Officers, especially of Company Commanders, with regard to keeping a careful watch for the occurrence of sickness among their men and for informing the Medical Officer of any such cases, was brought personally under the notice of Brigade and Unit Commanders by the A.D.M.S. and by S.M.Os.

(d). The following specific instructions concerning the health of troops during the epidemic were issued to all concerned:-

"GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS:

1. All soldiers will be specially warned against allowing themselves to become chilled when cooling after severe exercise, e.g., when the day's training is finished men should put on dry clothing, change wet socks, and wear their greatcoats.
2. During route marches the greatcoat should be carried "on Banderole" and put on during the halts, and after the march is finished.
3. After taking brisk exercise at parades, e.g. Bayonet Fight! Physical Training etc., greatcoats should be put on AT ONCE.
4. During parades involving standing about, e.g., Musketry, greatcoats should be worn.
5. The matter is one of common sense, i.e., soldiers undergoing severe exercises should not be overclothed, but should put on any additional clothing when the exercise is finished.
6. Huts must be kept well ventilated.
7. Soldiers attending Sick Parades will wait under cover.
8. In the case of soldiers who are too ill to attend Sick Parades, the Combatant Officer concerned is responsible for reporting the case to the R.M.O., so that the soldier may be by the R.M.O. as soon as possible.
9. The supper meal will be procurable at a fixed hour, which under ordinary circumstances, should not be earlier than 1930 or 2000."

"SPECIAL MEDICAL INSTRUCTIONS.

1. The attention of Medical Officers is directed to the following:-
 - (a). The susceptibility of troops to Respiratory Disease of soldiers arriving from Australia during the Winter months
 - (b). The susceptibility of troops to Respiratory Disease during epidemics of Influenza and Measles.
 - (c). The recent marked increase in the incidence of Influenza.

In order to lessen the disability of Pneumonic complications, Medical Officers will be constantly on the watch for the physical signs and symptoms of Respiratory Disease, so that soldiers in whom these signs and symptoms have appeared may be admitted at once to Hospital.
2. All soldiers with a temperature of over 99° for 12 hours will be admitted to hospital.
3. All sick soldiers suffering from comparatively slight disabilities, but who are not well enough to be treated as out-patients at the Sick Parades, will be admitted to Hospital at once. No such soldiers will be retained in Unit lines either for observation or for treatment.
4. R.M.Os., will see that lying down cases are warmly wrapped in blankets during transfer to hospital and that facilities are available for giving warm drinks, e.g. Bovril, etc., to sick men when they are to be transferred any long distance to Hospital.
5. All men excused duty for the day, will be seen in the afternoon by the R.M.O.
6. All soldiers unfit to attend Sick Parades must be seen without delay by the Medical Officer in their Huts."

"INFLUENZA EPIDEMIC.

1. In view of the prevalence of severe Influenza at the present time, the attention of Combatant Staffs and A.A.M.C. is again drawn to existing instructions, which are here repeated, and which are to be carried out with the utmost promptness, vigilance, and care.
2. This order is to be specially brought to the notice of every Officer and Non-Commissioned Officer in the Command, and also to the notice of all ranks, in order that they may assist in preventing the spread of the disease and in securing immediate and proper attention for any who become ill.
3. (a). Every Officer and H.C.O. must be ^{continually} on the look-out for signs of illness among the troops, whether on or off parade.
 - (b). Anyone feeling ill must immediately inform his Officer or H.C.O.
 - (c). Anyone noticed to be ill or reporting ill must be seen without delay by the R.M.O., without waiting for any fixed hour, whether for Sick Parade or otherwise.
 - (d). Men reporting or reported sick and not well enough to attend sick parade must be seen without delay in their huts.
 - (e). Medical Officers have received instructions from the A.D.M.S. as to the mode of disposing of cases of sickness.
 - (f). The early symptoms of the influenza are one or more of the following:-
Headaches, pains in the back, pains in the limbs, or a chilly or shivery feeling (sometimes described as "Cold Shiver").
 - (g). When a case of convalescent influenza is discharged from hospital to his lines, he is to be seen by the R.M.O. twice daily for not less than five days and until the convalescent appears thoroughly re-established in health. Naturally, in any relapse, the convalescent will be returned again to hospital.
4. This order is to be read on company parades once a day till further orders, and a copy kept posted on company notice boards"

- (e). All troops arriving from Australia during the epidemic were addressed personally by S.M.Os., and advised as to the precautions to be taken in order to diminish the tendency to infection.
- (f). Sufficient hospital accommodation was at once secured by enlarging Group Clearing Hospitals from 200 to 300 beds and by obtaining from the D.D.M.S. Southern Command, the necessary hospital accommodation in Sutton Veny and Fovant Military Hospitals. The staffs of these Group Clearing Hospitals were increased in proportion to their increase in accommodation.
- (g). Nursing Sisters were attached to the Group Clearing Hospitals, - 7 to No. 1 Group Clearing Hospital, Sutton Veny, and 6 to No. 2 Group Clearing Hospital, Hurdcott.
- (h). A Consultant Physician was detailed by the Acting D.M.S. to visit the Command and assist Regimental Medical Officers and Medical Officers in Group Clearing Hospitals.
- (i). An A.I.F. Bacteriologist was detailed by the Acting D.M.S. to consult with the R.A.M.C. Bacteriologist.
- (j). The Acting D.M.S. visited the Command on the 19th October, and inspected the Group Clearing Hospitals and the medical arrangements in connection with the epidemic.

5. The Medical Staffs in units and Group Hospitals have worked untiringly, and I cannot speak highly enough of the zeal displayed by all ranks in the care of the sick.

During the whole of the epidemic I have asked personally a very large number of patients whether everything possible was being done for their welfare, and up to the present I have not received a single complaint.

A.I.F. Detention Barracks, Lewes.

I visited this Depot on Octr., 22nd. The sanitation was excellent. There is a well appointed Sick Ward for observation of patients. There had been little Influenza and no deaths. The air space is very liberal.

The arrangements for local treatment of Venereal Disease were a model of cleanliness and efficiency.

Aust. Engineer Training Depot, Brightlingsea.

I visited this Depot on Novr., 1st. The health of the Depot is good. All the men are comfortably billeted in rooms which can be well ventilated. The neighbourhood is very clean and free from overcrowding. There have been very few cases of Influenza. Only one case was in hospital at Colchester.

The local arrangements for early observation of the sick were good. The cooking was good. I suggested that something hot should be provided in accordance with Orders about 8.30 at night.

Early Treatment arrangements were satisfactory.

Aust. Signal Training Depot, Clifton.

I visited this Depot on Novr., 2nd. The men are housed very comfortably in houses. There is ample air space, and the neighbourhood is open and healthy. The sanitation of billets was good. The Influenza had not affected the troops to any extent, though the civilian population had been severely attacked.

There is a comfortable Sick Ward with four beds where patients can be sent for early observation. It was well looked after. There were two cases in Hospital at Cambridge.

The Early Treatment arrangements were satisfactory. The local practitioner of Shefford, in whose charge this Depot is, though very busy had done everything possible for the troops.

- 2 -

A.R.O.D. Training Depot, Longmoor.

I visited this Camp on Novr., 5th. The situation is healthy and open. Sanitation good. The men are in huts which were well ventilated, clean, and adequately warmed. The Influenza epidemic had been severe. There had been four deaths, all among recent arrivals from Australia, chiefly ex "Borda".

I inspected the huts where men reporting sick are sent, and found them satisfactory except in one case where an asbestos lined hut, without fires, was being used. This had never received Australians and I asked the S.M.O. not to allow Australians to be placed in it. I also advised the O.C., A.R.O.D. Depot not to allow his sick to be admitted there. There is a local Observation Camp Hospital which was quite satisfactory. The cases were being discovered early and hospitalised at once. At the date of my visit there were two patients in the Observation Hut, one in the Camp Hospital, and two at the Military Hospital, Frensham, suffering from Influenza. The epidemic was abating.

The M.O., R.A.M.C., in charge of this Depot is a conscientious and hard working Officer, and the O.C., A.R.O.D., expressed himself as quite satisfied with the Medical arrangements.

SPECIAL ORDERS.

1. A.F.W. 3243 and 3243a -

All Medical Officers will exercise the greatest supervision over the compilation and completion of A.F.W. 3243 and 3243a, as errors are still found to exist in these since the last instructions were issued.

Medical Officers will note that if they sign their name to a document they are personally responsible for the statement thereon exhibited.

2. CARE OF I.R. GLOVES -

All Medical Officers must exercise the greatest care and economy in the use of I.R. Gloves. For the six months ending 30.9.18, 351 pairs of gloves have been issued by the Pharmaceutical Officer, which is equivalent to nearly 2 pairs per diem. The demand for such a number shows grave lack of care, either in their use or the manner in which they are put on and off. Medical Officers will note that it is not necessary to return a pair of gloves, as single gloves will be issued in lieu of one of a pair damaged.

3. INFLUENZA EPIDEMIC -

Until further orders Medical Officers will carefully observe the general condition of their cases, and also of any members of the Unit working in their Office or Ward, with a view to detecting and immediately reporting and treating any cases in any way resembling "Influenza" of the virulent type which is attacking the community at present.

All cases that are ordered to bed will be AT ONCE reported to the O.i/c Treatment, who will notify the Commanding Officer forthwith.

As far as possible cases will be isolated in the annexe of their Ward.

The early symptoms are one or more of the following :- Headache, Pains in the back, Pains in the limbs, or a chilly or shivery feeling ("cold shivers").

4. REMARKS - Patients and Treatment

The number of admissions has steadily increased during the month due to the same reasons given in my report for September 1918. The marked difference and benefit derived from the E.T. daily resume is still very apparent. The averages for principal complications work out as follows:-

There have been 10 cases of peri-urethral abscess, 4 of stricture, 2 of cystitis, 8 of polypus, and 1 of vasitis.

The average number of Massages and Sounds passed throughout the month have been:-

Three cases of relapse of Gonorrhoea and four cases of relapse of syphilis were re-admitted during the month.

The Officer i/c of Treatment in his report draws attention to the number of cases admitted to hospital suffering from Secondary syphilis, which works out at 18.75% for total syphilis admissions (224). He states that investigations show that most of these have been missed in the primary stages through no fault of the R.M.O.'s but due to the failure on the part of the patient to report an apparently insignificant sore, not necessarily on the penis, for in several cases they were extra-genital chancres.

It will be noticed that only three cases of Gonorrhoea relapse and were returned to this hospital during the month, which means that of all those discharged only three failed, after successfully passing their tests at C.T.D., to remain cured. As for some time past the percentage of relapses has been from 5% to 10%, this is a very marked and satisfactory improvement, the usual percentage of recurrence while undergoing tests at C.T.D is from 8% to 10%. I think therefore the treatment staff of this hospital are to be

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congratulated on the way cases are discharged from this hospital. The principal cause of Epididymitis after admission to this hospital is due to the too frequent change of the personnel of the medical staff for it is found that massage of the prostate is often begun too early or sounds are passed too soon by Medical Officers before they have gained sufficient experience and grasped the importance of avoiding such active treatment while the patient has a turbid urine.

5. QUARTERMASTER'S DEPARTMENT.

The new laundry contract commenced on the first of this month and the washing of the articles sent has so far been satisfactory but the times for delivery and shortages have left much to be desired; the Manager ~~thru~~ attributes these irregularities to the influenza epidemic and the difficulty in obtaining the necessary transport; we are protecting ourselves against all shortages by obtaining an immediate acknowledgment from him.

It has been possible during the month to slightly amplify the dining hall diet for patients, more particularly as regards their evening meal, but it is still very evident that the ration is altogether too light for the class of cases dealt with in this hospital.

The Quartermaster from A.I.F. Depots in U.K. (Capt. L.J. Aspinall) made a check of the medical wards and linen store and investigated the system followed by us, on which he reports that he considered the system almost perfect and the practice quite satisfactory.

On the 30th two wards in "A" Division (5 and 6) were taken over by me from the S.M.O., N.Z.E.F., owing to the steady increase in the number of patients. A special hut known as the Lower Expense Store hut has been cleared and will be used as a ward for N.V.D. cases, which will slightly increase our accommodation.

6. PHARMACEUTICAL DEPARTMENT.

A Staff-Sergeant Dispenser has been transferred to another unit and his successor does not appear to be nearly so capable. Army Form I 1214 was rendered on 8.10.18 to A.D.M.S., Tidworth, showing a complete record of all receipts and expenditure of medical and surgical stores and equipment for the 6 months ending 30.9.18.

This department is still short of one staff-sergeant and I am given to understand that the Pharmaceutical Officer will shortly march out.

Clutton's sounds have been received during the month and issued to Officer i/c Treatment for distribution.

7. PATHOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT

The Pathologist reports that the work has proceeded satisfactorily during the month. His detailed report is attached.

8. GENERAL

With the increased number of patients the almost complete depletion of A.A.M.C. from the staff of this unit is rendering the work increasingly hard and difficult to carry out satisfactorily.

The new routine treatment for Gonorrhoea is working extremely satisfactorily and the instructions issued are appreciated by the Medical Officers.

Towards the end of the month the G.O.C., A.I.F. Depots in U.K. after inspecting the detention compound stated that he would in all probability reduce the Guard attached to this hospital and remove the Officer in charge of the Guard, replacing him by a Sergeant.
