WAR DIARY, MEDICAL SECTION, HEADQUARTERS A.I.F. DEPOTS IN U.K., FOR THE MONTH OF NOVEMBER, 1918.

During November the strength of A.I.F. Depots increased from 36,630 to 39,167.

A- MEDICAL OFFICERS:

The strength of Medical Officers in the Command has increased during the month from 71 to 77, a number just sufficient to carry on the medical work. During the month 3 Reinforcement Officers have arrived from Australia and 12 have reported from the D.M.S. 7 marched out to report to the D.M.S., and 2 have embarked for return to Australia.

B. - HEALTH OF TROOPS:

The number of soldiers in hospital shows a slight decrease during the month. This is due to the decline of the Influenza Epidemic, which had already commenced abate towards the end of October.

For full statistical details as to health of troops, see Appendix "B" which consists of the weekly reports on this subject submitted to the D.M.S. These reports show that, for the four weeks ending 7/11/18, 14/11/18, 21/11/18 and 28/11/18, the total numbers of soldiers in hospital were respectively 2866, 2736, 2657, and 2614, the corresponding percentages to the total strength of the Command being 7.52%, 7.05%, 6.41% and 6.66%. Of these totals, the following numbers, viz.- 941, 893, 853, and 880 represent patients in the Group Clearing and Camp Hospitals, which are not true hospitals for statistical purposes.

The amount of serious disease has again been considerable. There have been fifty-eight (58) deaths from all causes, of which 48 were due to Pneumonia and Br. Pneumonia, occurring in almost every case as a complication of Influenza. There have also been four (4) deaths from Influenza uncomplicated. It is to be noted, however, that 48 of these deaths occurred during the first half of the month, i.e. as a result of the Influenza Epidemic in October.

APPENDIX "J" Instructions re Inoculation with Influenza Vaccine. Supplies of Vaccine did not become available until late in the month, and it is, therefore, not yet possible to form any opinion as to its value.

During the 5 weekly month of October there were 88 fresh cases of Mumps and 117 of Measles, whereas during the 4 weekly month of November there were 62 fresh cases of Mumps and 86 of Measles. The increase in the incidence of Mumps during the latter half of the month was due to a fresh infection by Reinforcements which arrived ex "Barambah".

VENEREAL DISEASE:

The increase in the number of soldiers in Hospital with Venereal Disease to which attention was drawn in the reports of the past three months, has continued during November, the numbers for the four weeks ending 7.11.18, 14.11.18, 21.11.18 and 28.11.18 being respectively 902, 929, 984, and 930.

An average of 72.75 per week were admitted from soldiers from British or Australian Auxiliary Hospitals or on Sick Furlough, as compared with 59.4 per week from these sources last month.

Of B.E.F. Troops on leave from France, a weekly average of 63.25 were admitted as compared with 49.8 in October.

The admissions to Bulford Hospital from within A.I.F. Depots averaged 36.5 per week as compared with 52 per week in October.

318 cases of Gonorrhoea were discharged to the C.T.D. during the four weeks ending 28.11.18, of which 28 cases relapsed and were returned to No. 1 A.D.H. for further treatment.

Early Treatment:

8,427 soldiers attended the Early Treatment Depots during the four weeks ending 28.11.18; of these, 460 showing signs of disease were sealed up and 362 such cases were aborted.

APPENDIX "C"

C - A.A.M.C., TRAINING DEPOT:

During the month, the total strength of the A.A.M.C., Training Depot, has decreased from 448 to 176; 13 other ranks have arrived as reinforcements from Australia and 87 casualties have marched in from the Overseas Training Brigade. 45 casualties were returned to France and 235 General Reinforcements also proceeded overseas. 7 "A" class men have during the month been transferred at their own request to Combatant Arms of the Service.

Towards the end of the month it was decided that, owing to the fact that at least 260 A.A.M.C. other ranks would be required for Transport Duty to Australia in December, no more drafts could be sent Overseas.

No. 1 Command Depot shows a marked increase in the number of admissions as compared with last month; No. 4 and No. 2 Command Depots shows a slight decrease and increase respectively.

The above figures show that, for the five weekly month of November 6739 soldiers reported to Command Depots from Hospitals either direct or after furlough. The corresponding figures for the four weekly month of October were 5545. Thus the admission rate shows a decrease of approximately 3%.

G GENERAL:

The number of returned B.E.F. men discharged for General Service to O.T.B. and elsewhere for the five weeks ending 30.11.18 was 4296, a relatively large number although a slight decrease as compared with October.

No. 2 COMMAND DEPOT:

The strength of this Depot has increased during the month from 4,581 to 6,416. The number of invalids who marched out to the Port of Embarkation for return to Australia during the five weeks ending 30.11.18 was 1,632.

E.- TRAINING UNITS:

745 Reinforcements ex Transport "Barambah" arrived from Australia on 14.11.18. There had been an Epidemic of Influenza on this ship over 600 cases having occurred with 21 deaths. In addition, there was also a mild epidemic of Mumps on board on arrival. The troops were consequently in poor condition on arrival, but have since picked up.

702 Reinforcements ex Transport "Bakara" also arrived from Australia on 14.11.18. There had been over 400 cases of Influenza during the voyage with 23 deaths. Their condition was also poor on arrival.

All the Reinforcements from these two boats were isolated, those ex "Barambah" for 28 days and those ex "Bakara" for 14 days.

Reports as to their standard of physical fitness are not ^{yet} to hand.

Total number of troops in hospital has decreased from 2967 (8.04%) to 2866 (7.52%). Of these 941 were in Non-statistical hospitals and the remainder, 1925., were in true statistical hospitals.

The number of admissions to hospital has decreased from 1109 (3.03%) to 976 (2.6%)

Number of General Cases in hospital has decreased from 1987 (5.38%) to 1827 (4.79%) and the number of admissions to hospital has decreased from 830 (2.26%) to 711 (1.9%)

The total number of troops in hospital has decreased from 2866 (7.52%) to 2736 (7.05%). Of these 893 are in Non-statistical hospital and the remainder 1843 were in true statistical hospitals.

The number of admissions to hospital has decreased from 976 (2.6%) to 740 (1.95%).

Monthly Medical Report - November '18.

The appointment of S.M.O., Sutton Veny Area, was vacated by Lt.Col. H.J.Williams, DSO, on the 19th November and his place was taken by Major H.H.Woollard.

Medical. The Influenza Epidemic has practically abated. A few cases of Mumps have occurred, chiefly in 1st Training Brigade.

The success which Major J.P.Fogarty, MC, has achieved in the treatment of Early Gonorrhoea is very striking, and to my mind constitutes a landmark in the therapeusis of Gonorrhoea.

Sanitation. This side of the work has reached, and is maintained at, a high standard in every unit. The R.B.A.A. is particular is a very noteworthy camp from this point of view.

The functions of the Command Depot have been earnestly carried out by the staff of the Depot under the able direction of Major McDonald.

The Remedial Establishment which is under the charge of Capt. E.G. Glassford, MC, is of very great value for this Officer has brought to his work not only a complete understanding of the mechanical and psychical value of the means at his command, but carries on his work with an enthusiasm which has enlisted for him the active co-operation of his patients.

The successful issue of the war has, however, brought about a revolution in the aim of the work here, and the speedy return of men to duty has been replaced by the speedy return of men to Australia.

Demobilisation has begun and B2a and C class personnel of the Area have been concentrated at the C.D. for checking Board Papers and Medical Inspection.

The next step has been the prospective return to Australia of the Temporarily Unfit. This has involved boarding at a high speed and to keep pace with the transport accommodation allotted 200 boards must be held daily. This extra work is being loyally met by all Officers, and arrangements have been made for the Officers of all units to assist as far as possible in this work.

The Group Clearing Hospital performs a valuable work. There have been difficulties in bringing the Hospital to the standard one would wish. For instance, bed linen and the hospital clothes of the patients are delayed at the laundries, and supplies thus get short and the linen in use very soiled.

The hospital personnel have not worked as loyally as they should but by weeding out the undesirables, and with more efficient N.C.O's - in this respect S/Sgt. Brierly promises to be most valuable - and reducing the number of patients we hope to improve the Hospital.

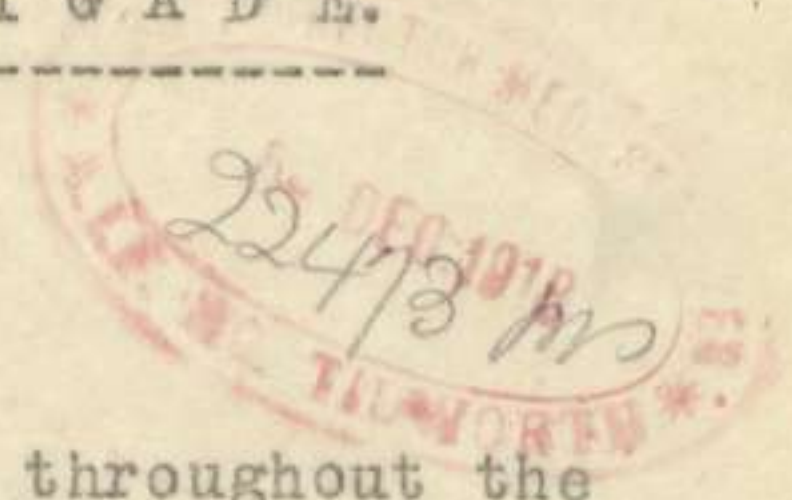

INFLUENZA EPIDEMIC.

During the month of November, the Influenza Epidemic which affected this Area during October, has greatly declined, as will be seen by the attached Graph.

Cases which occurred early in the month showed practically the same symptoms as those which occurred in October, inasmuch that they were characterised by respiratory complications, &c., but the Pneumonia complications gradually decreased, and recent cases admitted to Hospital showed the usual symptoms of Influenza.

This appreciable decrease is due to the prophylactic measures which were adopted, and the realization of all Officers and Other Ranks of the seriousness of the Epidemic, which caused them to take necessary steps to avoid risk of infection.

Instructions issued to Medical Officers were strictly adhered to by all medical Officers of the Area, inasmuch that all men parading sick with Influenza or showing signs of early Pneumonia were/

immediately evacuated to Hospital, thereby minimising the risk of infection among the healthy troops

The O.C., No. 2 Group Clearing Hospital has been able to dispense with a number of huts which were placed at his disposal by C.O., 3rd. Training Brigade, and the staff of that Hospital has been proportionally reduced by one Medical Officer and a number of other ranks. During the month of November the number of Influenza cases admitted to No. 2 Group Clearing Hospital was 352, which compares favourably with 871 admissions for the month of October.

Early in November approval was obtained from the A.D.M.S. to accommodate the Nursing Sisters attached to No. 2 Group Clearing Hospital, in No. 5 Camp Officers' Quarters. This action enabled the Nursing Sisters to be in close touch with their work, and also affected a saving in petrol.

During the month three Nursing Sisters were evacuated to Delhi Military Hospital, Tidworth, suffering from Measles; and four other ranks of Group Clearing Hospital Staff became casualties of Influenza, compared with eleven casualties for month of October.

It is now safe to say that the Epidemic has abated and that the present Influenza admissions to Hospital, though still slightly high, are practically normal, considering the number of new arrivals in the Area, and the climatic conditions.

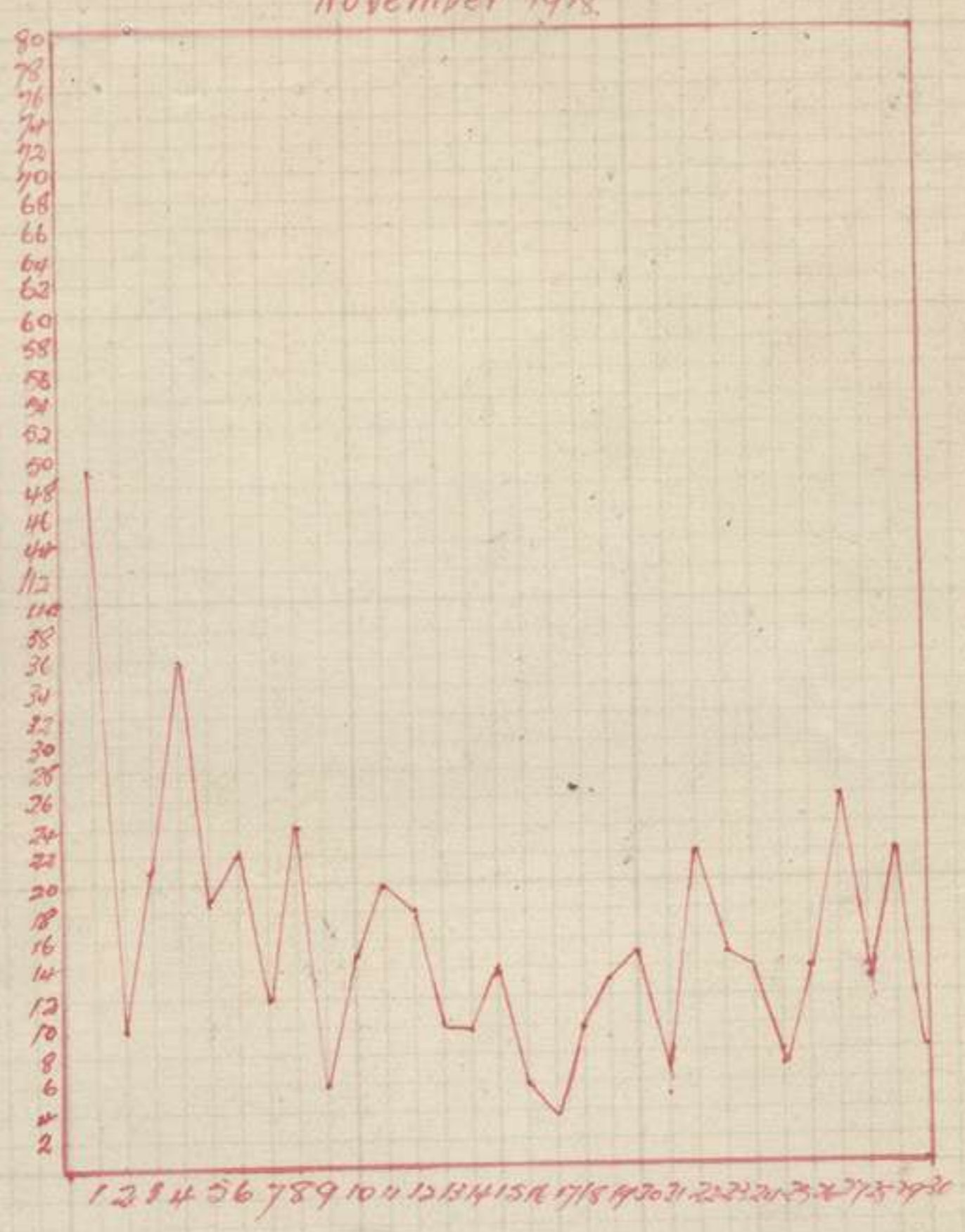

APPENDIX 1.

Graph and Analysis of Cases of Influenza, with notes.

The attached graph shows the incidence of Influenza in this Depot during the six weeks from October 1st to Nov 15th.

The following statistics analyse the cases from two points of view:-

(1) Total number of Cases 139, of which 7 were among Casuals, and 132 among Reinforcements. This shows the incidence among Reinforcements as compared with Casuals.

Almost entirely, Reinforcements newly arrived from Australia were the sufferers, while Casuals, acclimatised to Europe, escaped practically untouched.

(2) As regards the source of infection, 101 cases out of the total occurred among Reinforcements before they went on their leave. Whether the infection was caught in Camp after arrival, or on the transports would be difficult to say. Most of the transports on which these men came suffered more or less from the epidemic during the latter part of the voyage.

In the graph the sudden rises are to a certain extent explained by the arrival of fresh transports, and sudden falls by a party proceeding on draft or on leave.

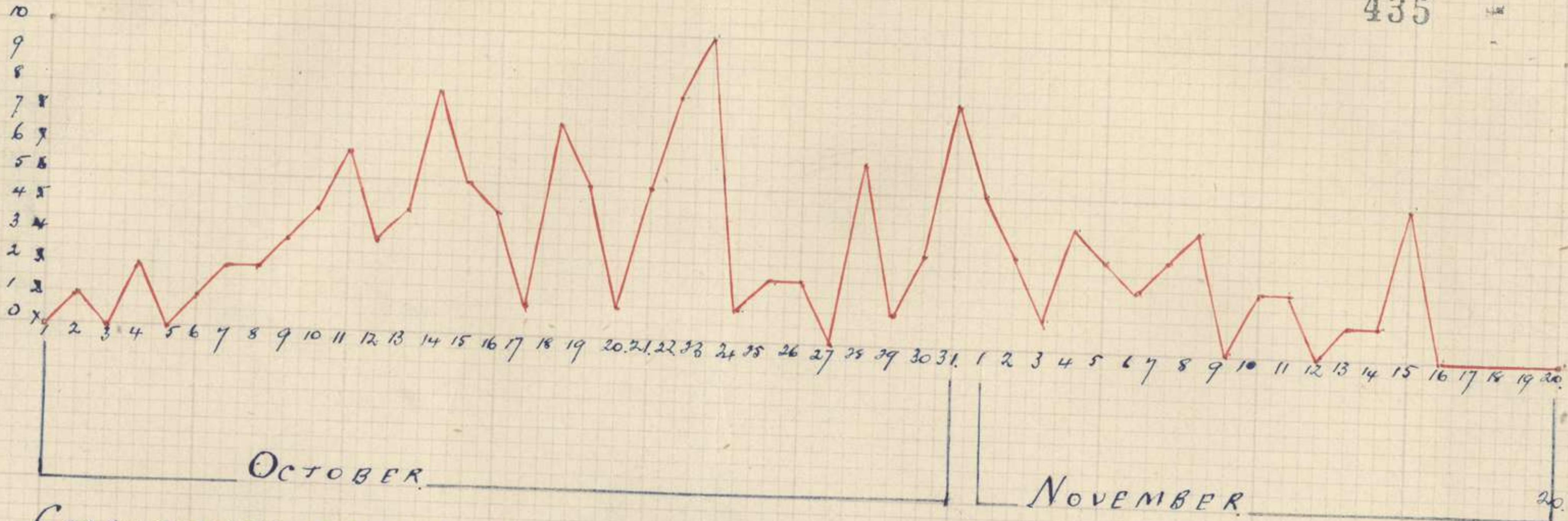
But the numbers are hardly large enough to provide sufficient data for arriving at the reasons for this irregularity of the curve.

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PROCEDURE FOR THE SELECTION, EXAMINATION, AND PREPARATION OF DRAFTS AT THE A. A. M. C. T. D.

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Now that the last draft has proceeded overseas from the Depot, it is perhaps advisable to record the routine that has been found most satisfactory to follow when a draft has been ordered.

The period between the ordering of the draft and the day it marches out is usually about five days. Until recently every draft ordered consisted either of Reinforcements only or of Casuals only, i.e. men who have already served in France and have a Unit there. The last few drafts, however, contained a proportion of each class.

(1). From the Card System which is kept in the Récord de Office, and a sample of which is attached to Appendix, a tentative nominal roll in quadruplicate is prepared of sufficient Casuals or Reinforcements to supply the draft as ordered, with emergencies. The Card system can be so worked by means of signals, or the use of several boxes, as to show Reinforcements and Casuals separately, and also to keep apart the cards of men in isolation or medically unfit or of low category. Names are taken for draft then from the cards of men to whose inclusion in a draft there is presumably no objection, and the order is that in which the men arrived in the Depot, from Australia in the case of a Reinforcement draft or from the Overseas Training Brigade or other Depots or Units in England in the case of Casuals.

(2). At the first morning general parade after the draft has been ordered, the draft roll is called, and the draft is separated from the remainder of the parade and formally warned for overseas: this warning implies that the men receive no further leave, but are confined to the boundaries of the camp; and any absence from camp or from any parade of the draft constitutes desertion.

(3). Medical inspection follows. This is fairly complete, but since, as indicated above, unfit men have been previously excluded, the number rejected at this examination is usually small.

At the Dental inspection, which succeeds the Medical, men who are dentally still unfit but can be made fit in the time before the draft is ordered to be ready, are considered as fit and their names are retained on the draft roll. The names of men found medically or dentally unfit are struck out.

One copy of the draft roll is retained by the Medical Officer, a second by the Dental Officer. Of the other two, one accompanies the draft to the Q.M.Store, one returns to the Records Office, and from this latter the final nominal roll is prepared.

(4). At the Q.M.Store the men are stripped of surplus kit and equipment, and have their equipment brought into complete conformity with what is laid down for A.A.M.C. personnel proceeding overseas. The Heel-and-toe-plate boots which the men have already broken in, are now reissued.

A slip is pasted in the back of every man's pay book signed by the man and by the C.O., certifying that he has been completely equipped.

At the same time the Gas N.C.O. is in attendance and every man is carefully fitted with a new small box respirator.

(5). Next morning a muster parade of the draft in full marching order is held when a thorough inspection is made by the C.O. or Adjutant. Instruction is given, if necessary, in the proper method of arranging, fitting and carrying equipment, and all identity discs (two per man) are examined.

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 During this day usually, the draft is put through poisonous gas in respirators by the Area Gas Officer and the fitting of the masks is checked by him. Any misfits are adjusted or replaced. Every man going overseas has a respirator which has been accurately fitted, which he has worn continuously for one hour and in which he has passed through poisonous gas.

(6). A difficulty that sometimes arises is that, while the draft is awaiting the order to move, men on it are evacuated sick or become contacts of a case of an infectious disease, which necessitates their being ~~fixed~~ placed in isolation. Such men are struck off draft, and further names as necessary are added to the draft roll in their place. These additional men go through the same routine of examination and equipment as is laid down above.

(7). When the move of the draft is ordered, men on draft, at a suitable time before the hour of marching out, return to the Quartermaster their bedboards, trestles, palliasses and blankets and, after the final meal in the Depot, their plates and pannikins.

Shortarm inspection by the Medical Officer follows and the unconsumed portion of the day's ration is issued to each man.

The draft then falls in in full marching order and after a check roll has been called and the draft papers have been finally adjusted, it is handed over to the Conducting Officer.

(8). Papers accompanying the draft are ^{as} laid down in Routine Orders A.I.F. Depots in U.K.. A note need only be made here as to the preparation of the draft nominal roll.

A preliminary or tentative nominal roll of the draft is made in the Records Office in quadruplicate (see para 1 above). After the medical and dental inspections, one copy is returned to the office with the names of those men medically or dentally unfit struck out. If the number of these unfits necessitates it, or if, before the draft is ordered to move, men on it are evacuated sick or are put into isolation or for any other reason are struck out, additional names are placed on the same tentative nominal roll (see para 6.).

The second or final nominal roll is not prepared until the move of the draft is actually ordered at a definite hour and is not commenced any earlier than is necessary in order that the chance of men having to be struck off after its preparation and the number of emergencies put on it may be as small as possible. When a man is struck off draft after this final roll has been prepared, his name has to be ruled out and the ruling out initialled: it is obviously desirable to reduce this work to a minimum.

PROCEDURE ADOPTED FOR MARCHING MEN IN
AT THE A. A. M. C. T. D.

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MARCHING IN

Upon marching in to the A.A.M.C. T.D. Soldiers are subject to the following routine:-

The Conducting N.C.O. reports at the Depot Orderly Room with his party together with their documents, i.e., marching out states, Medical History Sheets, Field CONduct Sheets, and A.I.F. Q 1.

The men and documents are checked with the nominal roll carried by conducting N.C.O. and a receipt given. The men then parade one at a time to the Records Clerk, who takes particulars from their paybooks and documents, and makes out a card for each man. These particulars ~~are~~ are shown on the specimen card, attached.

The party is marched to the Orderly Sergeants Office, - Here their names are taken again and they are allotted to huts and Camp Standing Orders (copy attached) are read - They are passed on from here to the Quarter Masters Store where they draw bedding and are acquainted of the time when they will be required for kit inspection.

They are given no further duty for that day except under exceptional circumstances.

On the first parade next day men who marched in the previous day are warned to parade at the Medical Hut for Medical & Dental inspection, ~~where~~ where they are classified. A copy of the roll in use A.I.F. Form 590 (A.M.C. 7) is attached.

This roll when completed is sent to the Orderly Room and each man's medical and dental state is entered on the card made out for him on the previous day.

CAMP BOUNDARIES.

South. Part of Fovant Burdett Road.

West. Edge of a copse west of entrance to Camp, thence by fence to wood beside Officers' Quarters, along southern and Eastern boundaries of wood and along hedge to Compton Chamberlayne Road.

North. Part of road leading to Compton Chamberlayne.

East. Barbed wire fence between Camp and Cultivation on E. side of camp down to Sgts' Mess, thence by road leading to starting point at entrance to Camp.

Certain villages are from time to time placed out of bounds at all hours and are notified as such in Depot Orders. The village of Bulford is out of bounds at all times. A pass is required to visit places outside a five mile radius of this Camp.

LEAVE.

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No man may leave camp without a pass until 4 p.m. daily and 2 p.m. on Saturdays and Sundays. Between 4 p.m. on week days and 3 p.m. on Sundays and Saturdays and 9.30 pm N.C.O's. and men may without a pass visit surrounding villages within a five mile radius, except Bulford. All N.C.O's. and men must be out of villages by 9.30 p.m. and, except Sergeants and higher ranks, must return to camp by 10 p.m. Sergeants and higher ranks must return to camp by midnight.

Railway Stations are out of bounds to troops, except men on pass to travel or on duty.

(a) Week end. A limited number of men are allowed week-end leave from noon Saturday till midnight Sunday.

(b) Disembarkation.

is available for men arriving from Australia.

Men with relations in Scotland	7 days
Men with relations in England and Wales over 200 miles away	7 days
Men with relations in England.	6 days.

(c) Good Conduct.

A month after disembarkation leave men without a crime lodged against them are allowed 4 days good conduct leave. A second good conduct leave will not be granted within two months of the first one.

All men with a clean charge sheet for two months, good conduct leave is available on written application. Leave granted to extent in time to catch the afternoon train from Devant on Fridays, returning from Waterloo by 1750 train on Tuesdays.

Note. This leave is good conduct leave only. Men who have a charge against them need not apply until two months have elapsed.

(d) Evening Leave.

Late passes are obtainable on written application from 4 p.m. till midnight on week days, and noon till midnight on Saturdays and Sundays.

(e) Special.

May be granted up to 48 hours in very exceptional circumstances only.

Applications for leave. Must be in writing. For week end, good conduct and disembarkation leave by 6 p.m. on the Friday previous. For Evening leave by 9 a.m. on the morning for which leave is desired. Applications except for evening leave must contain the following information: Reg. No. Rank. Name. Period for which leave is desired. Destination and address whilst on leave. Date of last leave. If the applicant is on permanent duty, the name of the person who will carry on for him. Reasons for applications.

No leave will be granted if the applicant is short of funds.

Dress.

It has been brought to notice that many Australians have been in Salisbury and other public places without belts or bandoliers. This practice brings discredit on the smartness of the Commonwealth troops. All ranks when out of camp will wear belts or bandoliers. When wearing greatcoats, belts or bandoliers will be worn outside. If it is not possible for men to obtain a belt, his pass will be endorsed accordingly.

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GAMBLING.

All gambling is prohibited in this Command. The only game allowed to be played for money is that known as "House".

SALUTING.

Great attention must be given to Saluting. It is the duty of every Officer to report a very man slack in this respect to his O.C. When overtaken by an Officer, E.C.O's and men must salute in the customary manner.

EARLY TREATMENT DEPOT.

An early treatment depot for the prevention, so far as possible, and early treatment of Venereal Disease is situated at the Dispensary. No names are taken, and the identity of soldiers reporting will remain unknown. All ranks will be urged to co-operate in trying to prevent Venereal Disease from increasing.

WASHING.

There are drying rooms in Camp for men's use. Every care is taken of articles in these rooms.

BATHS.

Baths are available every day from 0600 till 0800 and from 1730 to 1900. Hot baths are available every evening during these times. Owing to the shortage of water all ranks are urged to co-operate and prevent waste especially in seeing that the taps are correctly turned off after use. Any leaking taps should at once be reported to the Quartermaster.

ISOLATION.

Men arriving from Australia are placed in Isolation until orders are received that they are clear. Such men must at all times wear a yellow band sewn on the left sleeve. They must enter no Regimental Institute, Y.M.C.A. Hut or other institute whilst in Isolation. They must use only latrines and ablution places marked off for them. They will undergo training with other men in the Depot.

INFLUENZA EPIDEMIC.

The following report is forwarded in furtherance of my
GR.AIF.20765/144/LMS of 25th October 1918.

(1). INCIDENCE.

The numbers of soldiers admitted to hospital with Influenza from the whole Command has rapidly decreased since 24th October and were as follows:-

From the 27th September until 21st November 1918., 3,490 cases of Influenza or of Influenza complicated by Bronchitis, Pneumonia & Broncho Pneumonia ^{or} and Pleurisy ^{were} admitted to hospital.

(NOTE:- All cases of Bronchitis, Pneumonia and Broncho Pneumonia and Pleurisy admitted to hospital during this period have been regarded as Influenzal and have been included in the number 3,490.)

(2). MORTALITY.

The total number of Deaths from the onset of the epidemic

up to and including 21st November was 102. Of this number 44 occurred among reinforcements recently arrived from Australia and 58 occurred among returned B.E.F. soldiers. In this latter number is included 1 Nursing Sister.

The Mortality among Influenza cases occurring during the epidemic up to 21st November was 2.9%.

(3). THE INCIDENCE OF COMPLICATIONS.

In Sutton Veny, Hurdcott and Parkhouse Areas from the onset of the epidemic up to 21st November there were

(4). MEASURES TAKEN IN CONNECTION WITH THE EPIDEMIC.

These measures have been described in my report of 25th October 1918.

The following additional instructions have, however been issued:-

(A). "TREATMENT OF CONVALESCENT INFLUENZA PATIENTS.

- (1). Soldiers suffering from Influenza will not be discharged from hospital until their temperatures have been normal for at least 5 days.
- (2). Cases of convalescent Influenza discharged to the ir lines will be accommodated together in special huts set apart for the purpose. They will be retained in these huts for not less than 5 days or longer at the discretion of Regimental Medical Officers.

The huts will be kept warm and thoroughly ventilated according to existing instructions.

In order to lessen the risk of relapse, convalescents during the observation period, will spend a gradually increasing period each day in the open air.

All such convalescents will be examined twice daily by R.M.Os. during this period; their temperatures will be taken, and they will be re-admitted to hospital if their temperatures rise above 99 degrees."

(B). "INOCULATION WITH INFLUENZA VACCINE.

- (1). As supplies of Vaccine become available all A.I.F. troops in U.K. will be inoculated with Influenza Vaccine.
- (2). Troops will be inoculated in the following order of priority:-
 - (a). Reinforcements from Australia will be inoculated immediately on arrival in England.

- (b). All troops embarking to Australia will be inoculated prior to their departure. If the inoculation is not completed sufficiently, Vaccine to complete 3 inoculations will be put on board by S.M.O. of Camp they embark from. Nominal Rolls showing date of inoculation, dosage, and whether reaction normal or excessive, will be placed on board.
- (c). All reinforcements from Australia who have not been overseas.
- (d). All remaining A. I. F. Troops.
- (3). The directions issued with each bottle of Vaccine will be followed except in the case of Mixed Catarrhal Vaccine No.1 and No.2 already issued, which latter Vaccine will be used in accordance with instructions contained in this office 45309/154 of 21st October.
- (4). After each inoculation the soldier will be given 24 hours off duty, followed by 24 hours light duty. Longer periods will be given when considered necessary by a Medical Officer.
- (5). In all cases inoculated entries will be made on Page 19 of the Pay Book as follows:-

- the first, second or third inoculation. These entries will be initialled and dated by a Medical Officer.
- (6). Unless otherwise instructed, two inoculations only will be given. The second dose will be given 10 days after the first dose. If the reaction is severe the second dose will be given after an interval of 14 days.
- (7). Reactions which may occur:-
- (a). There may be no reaction, but in such cases, the immunity conferred may be efficient.
- (b). There may be a slight reaction. This is the most likely sequel and will probably occur during the 24 hours following inoculation. Apart from stiffness and tenderness at the site of inoculation, there may be general malaise, tiredness and slight headache. In cases with existing catarrhal discharge these may be temporarily aggravated.
- (c). There may be severe reaction. This is not expected except in a small percentage of cases. Such will develop during the 24 hours following inoculation, an aggravated condition of the symptoms described in (b) and for these cases at least 14 days should be allowed to elapse before the second dose is given.
- (8). Men obviously ill or suffering from severe colds will not be inoculated."

In cases with existing catarrhal discharge these may be temporarily aggravated.
 - (c). There may be severe reaction. This is not expected except in a small percentage of cases. Such will develop during the 24 hours following inoculation, an aggravated condition of the symptoms described in (b) and for these cases at least 14 days should be allowed to elapse before the second dose is given.
8. Men obviously ill or suffering from severe colds will not be inoculated.

During the month of November the total number of men who received treatment in Main Hall was 120. Of these 51 were for dressings, many of which had to be renewed twice daily.

The number of Bed Patients treated in the Infirmary and in Rooms during the same period was 25. Two of that number were serious cases, and were transferred to 2nd Eastern General Hospital, Brighton with the following complaints :- Hydrocele, and Appendicitis.

The latter case was subsequently readmitted to Detention. Amongst other cases treated, were Bronchitis, Diarrhoea, Gastritis, Tonsillitis. Puerisy, and Jaundice. The remainder of complaints were of a minor character.

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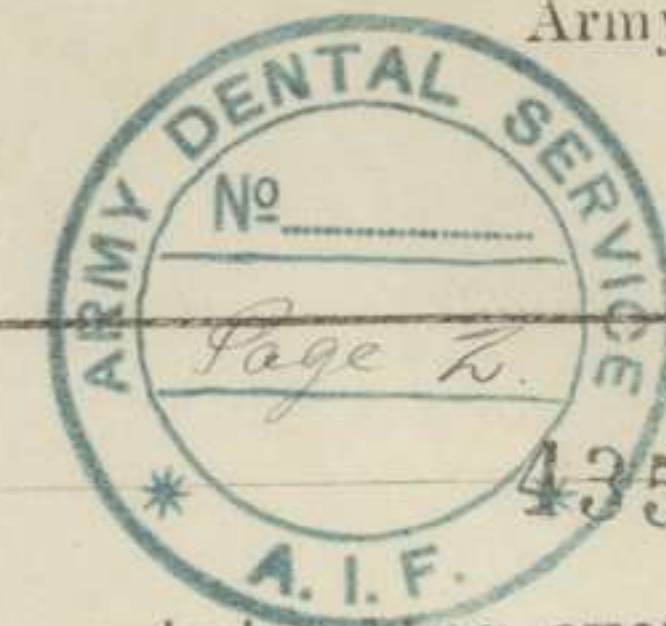
