			<p><u>DIARY OF MEDICAL SECTION, HEADQUARTERS A.I.F. DEPOTS IN U.K., FOR THE MONTH OF APRIL, 1918.</u></p>	
			<p>During the month of April, the strength of A.I.F. Depots in U.K. decreased from 40807 to 33797.</p>	
			<p><u>Medical Officers.</u></p>	
			<p>There has again been a considerable number of changes in the posting of Medical Officers; on April, 1st. there were 80 on duty in this Command. During the month 6 have marched in, of whom 4 were newly arrived reinforcements from Australia. On 30.4.18 the strength of Medical Officers was 70, 6 having reported to the D.M.S. for passage Overseas, and 10 having embarked for return to Australia.</p>	
			<p>This further reduction in the strength of Medical Officers has resulted in certain units at times being somewhat understaffed. The situation has been met by:-</p>	
			<p>(1) By Reducing the staff at No. 1 A.D.H., Bulford from 11 to 9 this having been possible owing to the further fall in the number of patients in Hospital (v. Under Venereal Disease)</p>	
			<p>(2) The amalgamation of 5th. and 6th., 12th. and 13th., 14th. and 15th., and 1st. and 2nd. Training Battalions, thereby reducing the number of R.M.O's by 4.</p>	
			<p>(3) The work of R.M.O. at Headquarters, formerly the whole time duty of a Medical Officer is now being done by Major K.H. Grieve, M.C., in addition to his other duties in the A.D.M.S. Office.</p>	
			<p><u>APPENDIX A.</u> (Attached) Shows the weekly distribution and posting of Medical Officers for the month of April.</p>	Appendix A.
			<p>The S.M.O., 3rd. Training Brigade, Captain W.J. Binns marched out on the 29.4.18 to the D.M.S. for passage Overseas - his place has been filled by Captain S. McLennan, formerly at No. 1 Command Depot.</p>	
			<p>Colonel D.M. McWhae, C.M.G., the A.D.M.S. returned from France on the 4th. instant.</p>	
			<p><u>General Health.</u></p>	
			<p>The General Health of the Troops has shown a gradual progressive improvement during the month as was only to be expected with advent of warmer weather. For the five weeks ending 28.3.18, 4.4.18, 11.4.18, 18.4.18 and 25.4.18, the total numbers in Hospital were respectively.</p>	
			<p>2355, 2135, 1918, 1761 and 1749; owing to the decrease in the strength of the Command,</p>

DEPOTS IN U.K., FOR THE MONTH OF APRIL, 1918.</u></p> <p>the percentages represented by the figures have not fallen so markedly, the figures being 5.78%, 5.72%, 5.44%, 5.26% and 5.20% respectively. In this connection it should be pointed out that in this Command, to prevent so far as possible the possible development of dangerous illness, men are sent to Hospitals on comparatively little provocation, e.g. if a man presents a temperature of over 100° for more than 12 hours he must go to Hospital. Thus many of those in Hospital are suffering from very mild complaints.</p> <p>The amount of serious disease has been very small - there have been three cases of pneumonia and one of Cerebro-Spinal Meningitis. There have been nine deaths from all causes.</p>	
			<p><u>Infectious Disease</u></p> <p>Measles and Mumps are still fairly prevalent in the Command, though the total number is much less than last month, the figures being 489 cases in March and 289 in April.</p> <p>The numbers of soldiers in Hospital with Infectious Disease for the weeks ending 28.3.18, 4.4.18, 11.4.18, 18.4.18, and 25.4.18, were respectively 81, 65, 81, 75, and 68, and the number of soldiers isolated as contacts for the same periods were 1822, 1537, 1427, 1244, and 1158.</p> <p>For statistical Details as to the health of Troops see <u>APPENDIX B.</u>, which consists of copies of the weekly reports on this subject submitted to the D.M.S.</p>	<p><i>Appendix B.</i></p>
			<p><u>Venereal Disease.</u></p> <p>The number of patients in No. 1 A.D.H., Hospital, Bulford, has again shown a marked decrease, the figures for the last weeks in February, March, and April, being respectively 1128, 880, and 436. This somewhat remarkable fall is due to four causes, viz:-</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> (1) The introduction of the standardized treatment for Gonorrhoea (v. Appendix B. of last month's report) (2) The special examination of all Gonorrhoeal patients by Lt. Colonel Grigor (O.C. of the Gonorrhoea Division) who are uncured at the end of 28 days - <u>Note.</u> last month this period was given as 35 days, but it has now been reduced to 28 days. (3) The decreased rate of admission, the average weekly admissions for the months of January, February, March, and April, being respectively 189.6, 204.75, 178.5 and 133. 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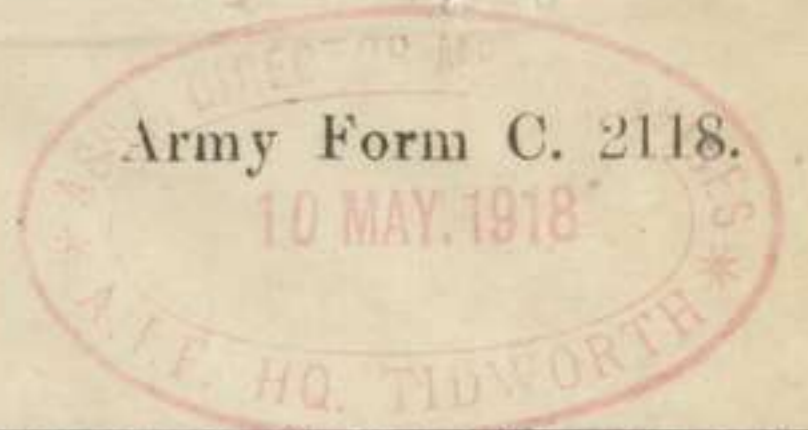

			<p>(4) The deceased total strength of the Command. During April 684 cases of Gonorrhoea were discharged from No. 1 A.D.H. Exact figures as to the number of relapses are not available this month. Instructions have been issued that all cases where there is any reasonable doubt as to whether the disease is completely cured be sent on discharge, not to their Units but to the Convalescent Training Depot. Here they receive graduated training for a week. The programme of the training being as follows:-</p>	
			<p><u>1st. day;</u> Practically nothing.</p>	
			<p><u>2nd. day.</u> One mile march twice a day. half an hours physical training. light fatigues.</p>	
			<p><u>3rd. & 4th. days.</u> 3 miles march morning and evening. half an hours physical training. light fatigues.</p>	
			<p><u>5th. & 6th. days.</u> 3 miles march morning and evening. Half an hours physical training. light fatigues.</p>	
			<p><i>men</i> <i>any</i> The medical are examined by the Medical Officer on the 1st, 4th, and 7th. days and if they present any discharge, a microscopical examination is made, and if gonococci are found the men are returned to Bulford Hospital for readmission.</p>	
			<p><u>Early Treatment of V.D.</u></p>	
			<p>Attached as <u>APPENDIX C</u> is a copy of a report submitted to the D.M.S. on the results of <i>Appendix C</i> Early treatment as carried out in this Command for the first quarters of the year. In connection with this report it must be pointed out that probably certain cases, viz:- those which presented symptoms of meatal and urethral irritation without actual discharge have been included, which were not actually incipient cases of Gonorrhoea, but it is considered advisable to err on the safe side and regard these cases in the same way as those actually showing discharge. Even allowing this slight inaccuracy in the statistics from a scientific point of view, the percentage of cures is certainly very good. This return definitely shows that the earlier a man reports for treatment the greater is the likelihood of the disease being aborted.</p>

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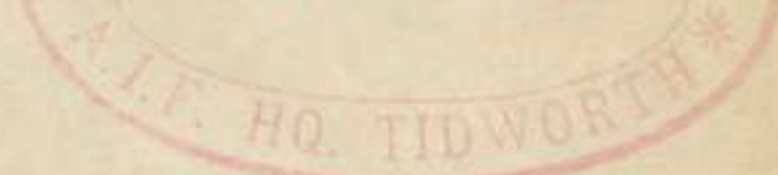

			<p><u>A.A.M.C. TRAINING DEPOT</u></p>	
			<p>This Depot has decreased in strength during the month from 726 to 495. 15 other ranks have arrived as Reinforcements from Australia and 58 men have marched in from O.T.B.. 326 "A" Class men were despatched as reinforcements to France during the month; of these 94 were casuals, i.e. men who were had been invalided from France but who had again become fit for Service, while the remaining 232 were recent arrivals from Australia.</p>	
			<p><u>Training.</u> In the training particular attention is paid to march hardening the men, and includes two ten mile route marches weekly, physical exercises daily, and squad, company, and stretcher drill. In addition lectures and practical demonstrations are given in first aid and bandaging and special attention has been paid to the method of using Thomas' Splint for injuries to the lower limbs.</p>	
			<p>The six Home Service Infantry sergeants mentioned in last month's report have proved very useful as drill instructors.</p>	
			<p>A small Camp Hospital of 40 beds has been opened at Parkhouse, along similar lines to the Group Clearing Hospital to take slightly sick men - 72 patients have been treated during the month.</p>	
			<p>On the 24th. instant Major Fraser, the O.C. at A.A.M.C. Training Depot, Parkhouse, was evacuated sick to Hospital. His place is being filled temporarily by Capt. C.W. Stump.</p>	
			<p><u>Command Depots.</u></p>	
			<p>During the month the number of soldiers received, in Nos. 1, 3, and 4 Command Depots from Auxilliary Hospital, either direct or after furlough has increased as compared with last month. although the accomodation at Command Depots is still more than ample to cope with requirements. vide, <u>APPENDIX F.</u> which consists of the Consolidated Weekly Command Depot returns</p>	Appendix F

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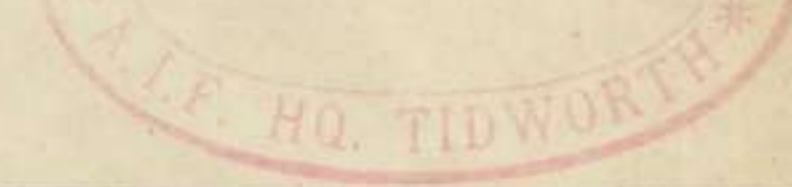

			<p>Hospitals or after furlough, while No. 2 Command Depot has received 758 soldiers from these sources.</p>	
			<p>3096 soldiers have been transferred to the Overseas Training Brigade as fit for Active Service again.</p>	
			<p>The A.D.M.S. has during the month paid several visits to Nos. 1, 3, and 4 Command Depots. He noticed that approximately 60-70% of the soldiers of B1 class were diagnosed as gas poisoning. The men give a history of having been exposed to gas, chiefly Mustard Gas, and having at the time suffered from severe conjunctivitis, coryza, and laryngitis, but were in the majority of cases well enough to be discharged from Hospitals to Command Depots within four to six weeks. ^{Some of} these soldiers complain of shortness of breath on exertion, dizziness, and ^(usually) partial loss of voice, but objectively nothing abnormal can be found.</p>	
			<p>In order to prevent the marked sick wastage which will result if too much attention is paid to subjective symptoms, Medical Officers have been instructed to classify these soldiers up to A3 within approximately four weeks, so that they may then receive three weeks' training at the Overseas Training Brigade. The great majority should then be fit for General Service within 7 - 8 weeks of date of admission to the Command Depots.</p>	
			<p>At the Overseas Training Brigade during the four weeks ending 25.4.18, 138 men had to be retrograded to lower Medical Classifications; compared with the rate of inflow, viz, approx. 3000 a month this number is not unduly large. Particulars of all such cases are now forwarded weekly to the A.D.M.S. by the S.M.O., O.T.B. The Command Depots where the soldiers were treated prior to transfer to the O.T.B. is notified of all such cases and a report is obtained from the S.M.O. concerned of these men's histories while at their Depots.</p>	
			<p><u>Orthopaedic Treatment at No. 2 C.D.</u></p>	
			<p>Last month brief reference was made to the importance of the Orthopaedic work carried out at No. 2 Command Depot. A Special report drawn up by Captain E.B. Thomas the Officer i/c of Orthopaedics is attached hereto as <u>APPENDIX G.</u>; This indicates very clearly the scope and extent of this Department</p>	<p><i>Appendix G</i></p>
			<p><u>Embarkation of Invalids from No. 2 Command Depot.</u></p>	
			<p>3243 Invalids have been embarked from No. 2 C.D. Weymouth - Three Hospital Carriers</p>	<p><i>9</i></p>

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			<p>taking respectively 1066, 900 and 1091, while 186 embarked on a Hospital Ship. The first of these carriers took approximately 800 Orthopaedic cases and in order that the treatment these cases were having might be continued on the voyage, 10 masseurs were embarked seven of whom were trained at No. 2 Command Depot under the system outlined in last month's report. In addition 8 Remedial Gymnastic Instructors, and six electrical Operators were embarked, the necessary Gymnastic equipment and six combined Scholl batteries being placed on Board.</p>	
			<p><u>APPENDIX H.</u> is a copy of a report submitted to the D.M.S. on 7.4.18 proposing that an entirely new Administrative system be adopted with regards to the embarkation of invalids. This report is self explanatory - the matter is at present pending.</p>	Appendix H
			<p><u>Training Units.</u> There is nothing special to report about the Medical work in Training Units. During the month 1596 reinforcements arrived from Australia; physically the standard was high, only 7 having been boarded as Unfit for General Service. 			<p><u>General.</u> Attached as <u>APPENDIX K.</u> is a copy of a report forwarded from No. 2 Command Depot on the treatment of Scabies as carried out at the Verne Citadel Sub-Depot. With the report is a somewhat amplified A.A.M.C. Circular Instruction No. 40, describing the treatment adopted - the results achieved are remarkably good.</p>	Appendix K

A.A.M.C. Orders:-

"EARLY TREATMENT OF GONORRHOEA.

In order to obtain definite information as to the success of the Early Treatment for Gonorrhoea, as carried out in this Command it is desired that a return be submitted to this Office on the attached pro forma by all units whose records are sufficiently complete to enable this to be done.

In future all units will keep these records in duplicate and will submit one copy to this Office every three months, the first to be rendered at the end of March 1918.

In order that the figures may be standardized, a man will be considered to be suffering from Gonorrhoea if, on his reporting, there is:-

- (1). An urethral discharge or
- (2). No discharge but a complaint of scalding and frequency of micturition, with a history of recent exposure to infection.

If there is no discharge and no frequency, but slight irritation, the case will not be included in the above mentioned Return, unless it subsequently shows the signs described in (1) or (2) above.

In the case of men reporting from furlough to Command Depots with a discharge, it should be borne in mind that statements as to onset of the disease are often unreliable, and every effort should be made to obtain correct information on the point.

APPENDIX G

REPORT ON ORTHOPAEDIC DEPARTMENT "A" SUB-DEPOT,
No. 2 AUSTRALIAN COMMAND DEPOT.

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The work of this Department is to carry out any Orthopaedic treatment necessary for the men passing through the above Depot. This treatment is carried on while men are awaiting boats to Australia. The average stay of men in this camp is about 2 months, so that much improvement can be brought about in their condition while they are awaiting a boat roll.

The Department consists of :-

1. GYMNASIUM - Fitted with the latest appliances for remedial gymnastics.
2. MASSAGE DEPARTMENT - Consisting of several huts equipped with electrical apparatus for the treatment of patients by massage and electro-therapy.
3. SPLINT MAKER'S SHOP - Where any special splints can be manufactured.
4. SURGICAL BOOTMAKER'S SHOP - For manufacture of surgical boots for special cases.

For statistical purposes the period extending from January 1st to March 31st 1918 has been used as the records are quite complete for these three months.

During this three months a total number of 2308 were treated. The average number under daily treatment being 903.

These cases were distributed between the Massage Department and the Gymnasium, many of the cases getting treatment in both the Departments.

During this same period nine Hospital Carriers returned to Australia, five of them taking orthopaedic cases from this Depot. These boats were the ~~felle-~~ "W", "V", "X" "BB" "D.1". The number of cases and the treatment they were undergoing was as follows :-

These boats were all specially fitted up so that orthopaedic treatment could be continued during the voyage. In addition a staff of masseurs and gymnasium instructors was placed on board to carry the treatment under the direction of the S.M.O. of the boat.

The staff sent on these boats was as follows :-

No staff was placed on "V" Carrier, with exception of one Gymnasium Instructor, as practically all the cases were only slight, no serious cases embarking.

The equipment of these boats was on the scale as laid down by A.D.M.S., A.I.F. Depots in U.K. in order of January 25th 1918. The only exception to this order being that on recent boats instead of a combined Schall battery a modified form of Pantostat for use with the ship's current, has been placed on board for electrical treatment.

2

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ORGANISATION.

The routine followed in ordering treatment for cases admitted to the Depot has been as follows :-

The morning following the admission of patients, they are paraded before a medical officer (Captain Badock) and examined. The treatment required is then ordered, and the men are sent either to the Gymnasium for Remedial Gymnastics or on to the Massage Department for Massage or Electrical treatment. Many men will require treatment in both Departments, and times for this are arranged accordingly. A card is filled in by the medical officer giving a brief history of the case, and treatment required. If required special splints or surgical boots are ordered.

In the Massage Department a further card is made out for each case, a brief history taken, and a more detailed examination made. Electrical reactions are taken out in all cases of any nerve affection, and massage, galvanism, faradism, ionisation, radiant heat etc., are ordered if necessary. A time is then arranged for the men to come for treatment. A roll is made out, and sent to the companies, giving names of men, treatment, and time for their treatment. The companies are made responsible that the men come up for treatment at the time indicated.

Gymnasium. - In the case of men needing remedial gymnastics, the men are split up into classes, those cases needing special individual attention being placed in a ~~class~~ separate class. A nominal roll is sent to the companies of the men in these classes and their time for treatment, and the companies are made responsible that the men parade daily at the Gymnasium at the time indicated.

In each of the above Departments, an N.C.O. is detailed by ~~the~~ each company, whose duty it is, to see that the men parade for their treatment at the proper time.

At the end of each day a nominal roll is made out of the absentees in each Department, after checking the attendances and this roll is forwarded to Sub-depot Headquarters. If these absentees have no valid excuse they are crimed for missing their parades.

In each Department all cases are reviewed weekly, and any alteration in treatment required is then ordered. Notes are made on the patient's card at each review showing any improvement or alteration in treatment.

REMEDIAL GYMNASTICS.

The apparatus (installed by the Australian Red Cross Society) consists of the following :-

- 2 Nautical Wheels (frictional) - for active back, lateral, shoulder, and intercostal movements.
- 5 Plinths. For abdominal, back, leg, and all manipulated movements.
- 5 Stationary Cycle Exercisers. - For leg cases generally.
- 2 Wrist Rollers (frictional) - for active hand and wrist movements.
- 3 Rotary Wrist Machines. - For pronation and supination.
- 1 Set of Wall Bars. - For active back, shoulder, arm, and dorsal exercisers.
- 1 Zander Mechano-therapy Machine. - For passive movements of fingers and wrist.
- 4 Inclined ladders. - For stiff shoulders, arms, and back movements.
- 1 Sargent Pulley Weight Machine with attachment. - For all active and turning exercises.
- Accessories. 12 pairs Terry's Spring Grips (weak).
12 pairs Terry's Spring Grips (strong).
6 Terry's Wall Developers (weak).
6 Terry's Wall Developers (strong).
- 2 Hydraulic Rowing Machines (on order).

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STAFF. Consists of :-

- 51
- 1 W/O. (2nd class)
 - 4 Sergeants
 - 4 Corporals
 - 2 Other ranks. *of rank of Sgt.*

All the members of the Staff consist of men holding the Aldershot Certificate in physical training, and in addition have been through a special course of instruction in the following subjects :-

1. Elementary Anatomy and Physiology.
2. Passive, Resistive, and Manipulative work.
3. Theory of exercise, and Swedish movements.
4. Knowledge of war wounds and injuries.

In addition to the Staff, there are always a varying number of trainees undergoing instruction. These men, ~~are~~ either of the home service or Australia class category, are sent on Hospital Carriers as Gymnasium Instructors for the treatment of cases on their way to Australia. These trainees go through the same course of training as outlined above, the course extending over a month. All this time they are doing practical work under supervision.

METHODS OF TREATMENT.

Active exercises are carried out as far as possible, in every case the patient being encouraged to use the affected part. Even where only a small amount of voluntary movement exists, patients are encouraged by working against a slight resistance to develop the weak muscles.

As already pointed out, the men are divided up into classes. In each class, the men are further divided up into groups, according to the type of case, eg. Hand cases in one group, Plinth cases in another group, and so on. The Instructors are allocated to the various groups so that each Instructor becomes efficient in treating his particular type of case. At the end of each class, the patients, having each carried out the exercises needed for the disability, are formed up, and go through some Swedish Drill movements for about 5 minutes under an Instructor. Of course these exercises will not be fully carried out, but as far as their disability will allow, they follow the movements.

Cases needing special individual treatment, eg. - Functional disabilities are placed in a special class under an experienced Instructor.

Recently a further class has been formed consisting of men ordered a further period of orthopaedic treatment by the Consultants in the final review of the case. Special attention is given to these men, and a report submitted to the Consultant.

CLINICAL NOTES.

A great variety of cases have come under treatment in this Department, affections of the hand being by far the most common, due frequently to the splint having been kept on for too long a period, so that the fingers become stiff from disuse. Knee joint affections are also very common, partial ankylosis of the joint being a frequent occurrence. Many of these stiff knees resulted from quite slight wounds due to the men not being encouraged to use the knee in the early stages of treatment. Chronic synovitis of the knee, associated very often with some affection of the internal semilunar cartilage, was quite common, and these cases made very slow improvement.

Wounds about the shoulder with often no involvement of the joint itself were frequently met with. In these cases there was great limitation of movement in the shoulder joint, ~~the~~ ~~scapula~~ the scapula moving with all movements of the shoulder no movement, or very little, taking place in the joint itself. Functional cases were also of common occurrence, those in which the back had been affected formed the majority. Under a good Instructor, these men showed rapid improvement.

MASSAGE DEPARTMENT.

Number of cases treated - 1292

Contained in Average number under daily treatment - 470.

1. For treatment with galvanism and ionisation.
2. For faradism and massage.
3. For massage and radiant heat.

Apparatus.

- 3 Combined C. & F. switchboards.
- 3 Galvanic switchboards.
- 11 Bristow Faradic Batteries
- 6 Radiant Heat Baths.
- 4 Galvanic switchboards (with accessories) are on order.
- 4 Metronome Interrupters (for use in giving galvanism).

These switchboards are worked off the main supply in the Camp, which gives a 220 voltage.

STAFF. - consists of :-

- 1 A/W.O.
- 2 Staff-Sergeants
- 1 A/Corporal
- 13 Other ranks.

The Warrant Officer and Staff Sergeants are certificated Masseurs. Several of the men have now been on the staff for a long period, and have become very efficient in their work.

Trainees. - As in the Gymnasium, in addition to the permanent Staff, there are always a number of men (B2s or C1 classification)

undergoing instruction, so as to act as masseurs or electrical operators on Hospital carriers returning to Australia.

These trainees are all given a course of instruction, including lectures and practical training, the following being the subjects :-

1. Theoretical and practical Massage
2. Theoretical and practical Electro-therapeutics.
3. Elementary Physiology.
4. Elementary Anatomy.

Their course of instruction extends over six weeks, and as far as possible is made 2 months or longer.

METHODS OF TREATMENT

As already pointed out, the patients attending this Department are all given a time at which to attend for treatment. Every case gets daily treatment for a period of at least 15 minutes, in many cases the time extending to half an hour.

Galvanism. - For use in all the more serious nerve lesions where it helps in maintaining the action of the muscles affected so preventing further wasting. The constant current has also been used for many cases of trench feet, and also in the treatment of painful scars.

Faradism. - This has been carried out by the Bristow Battery which gives a graduated contraction of the muscle, the amount of contraction being easily controlled. Its chief use has been in the less serious nerve wounds where it restores the action of the muscle affected. This form of treatment has also been used to a large extent in the treatment of ~~the~~ wasted quadriceps extensor, so commonly associated with affections of the knee joint. As Captain Bristow has shown, the Vastus internus is especially affected in these cases. This type of case has done very well when treated in this way.

Ionisation. - Used chiefly on callous unhealed wound surfaces. The constant current passed through a pad of sodium chloride (saturated solution) or zinc sulphate (2% solution) has been of great benefit in promoting healing. About 153 cases have been treated in the time under review, and in practically every case have shown marked improvement, many old standing wounds having been completely healed. Trophic ulcers, too, have done particularly well.

A good supple scar results different from the dense adherent scar produced in healing by ordinary means.

Ionisation has also been used in some cases of sciatica and rheumatism, but not to any extent. Results have been variable and it is difficult to lay down any definite conclusions. Sodium salicylate (2% solution) has been used in ~~many~~ these cases.

Radiant Heat - This form of treatment has not been used very extensively owing to the difficulty of obtaining sufficient current to keep the heaters in action. It has been found in those treated, that swollen joints especially an acute synovitis whether traumatic or arising from other causes benefits greatly by this treatment. Swelling is reduced and pain eased after a few applications. Oedema of the lower extremities also improves greatly, many cases that will not yield to massage making rapid progress under radiant heat.

Massage - Massage is used very largely. All cases undergoing galvanism and the great percentage of those undergoing faradism, receive massage in addition to their electrical treatment. Its use in promoting ~~the~~ the circulation of the part affected and in loosening up stiff joints and adherent scars is well known. Any oedema present is rapidly reduced. In many cases remedial gymnastics are combined with the massage, and the two methods of treatment produce good results.

Baths. - In the case of practically every patient before treatment the part affected is bathed in hot water for a short time. By this means the circulation is improved, and the skin is in a better condition for electrical treatment. This warming of the part was especially efficacious in the cold weather.

Functional cases. - A special class for these cases under A/Corporal Cilento has been instituted. These patients are treated separately in a room set apart for that purpose. Suggestion enters largely into the treatment and with the help of massage and electro-therapy some very good results have been obtained. Injuries to the back and spine, eg. as in the case of a man buried by a shell explosion, have rapidly recovered in a few weeks treatment. Cases, too, ~~amputated~~ with wounds of the leg and with a tendency to talipes deformity are commonly met with, and have done well under this treatment.

NERVE CASES -

A large percentage of the cases under treatment in this Depot (about 50%) are nerve wounds. In these wounds the nerve is injured to varying degrees. In many cases there is only a slight injury causing merely some loss of sensation in the area supplied by the affected nerve, but in a large proportion there is some serious lesion causing wasting of the muscles and degeneration of the parts supplied. In practically all these cases an exploratory operation has been performed generally within the preceding two months. On account of no record of the condition of the nerve found at the operation accompanying the patient, it has been difficult to draw any deductions from any improvement the patient may have made. In addition as a rule patients are only under treatment for an average period of two months, so that not much improvement can be looked for in so short a time. In a few cases that have had longer treatment distinct improvement has been observed, eg. in two cases a distinct recovery of voluntary power was observed about five months after the operation on the injured nerve, (unfortunately there was no record as to say what the original condition of the nerve was.)

An analysis of 251 cases treated from January 1st to March 31st 1918, gives the following proportion among the nerves affected :-

It will be seen that the musculo-spiral was by far the most frequently affected, especially its posterior interosseous branch in the forearm. Injuries to this nerve were very commonly associated with fractures of the humerus. The ulnar too, was very frequently affected, wounds involving the elbow joint being very common and in these the ulnar would generally be involved to some extent. Quite slight affections of the ulnar too were very common, in which there was some loss of cutaneous sensation, but no other signs. It will be noticed that it was quite common for two of the nerves in the arm to be affected. Injuries of the arm, especially the forearm, were ~~so~~ common as compared with injuries to the lower extremity, many of them severe, and causing extensive destruction of tissue and so injury to more than one nerve.

In treating these cases, our main endeavor has been to see that whatever treatment is required is carried out regularly and thoroughly, so as to keep up movements of the muscles concerned and the nutrition in the parts affected. If this treatment is carried on during the voyage to Australia (and a staff is sent on the boat for that purpose), then the nerve has a good chance of recovering, though of course in all nerve lesions, especially a serious one, convalescence is always tedious, eighteen months to two years treatment being often required.

CONCLUSION.

In concluding this report there are several suggestions I should respectfully like to bring before your notice.

1. Some arrangement is required by which records of operations, XRay plates or Prints, or other special notes about cases, could be sent on to this Depot. Innumerable ~~xxxxxx~~ cases are admitted in which there have been fractures of extremities or affectins of joints, and in which skiagrams have been taken, but no report arrives with the patient. It is absolutely essential if the case is to be thoroughly understood that prints and skiagrams and reports of operations must accompany the patient. Could not some arrangement be made whereby this could be done.
2. Massage Staff. The staff of the gymnasium, the Surgical Bootmaker, and Splint maker, have now all

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been placed on a definite footing, but the establishment of the Massage Department has not been altered. While the Gymnasium has a staff consisting of 1 W/O (2nd class), 4 Sergeants, 4 Corporals, and 8 Other ranks, the Massage Department staff consists of 1 A.W/O., 2 S/Sergeants, 1 A/Corporal, and 13 Other ranks. Many of the men of the Massage Staff have been in the Department for a long time (in three cases over 12 months) and are now very efficient and capable. Seeing what an amount of important work is carried out in this Department, could not an establishment similar to that of the Gymnasium be provided. I should beg to recommend the following :-

- 1 Warrant Officer (1st class)
- 2 Staff-Sergeants
- 2 Sergeants
- 2 Corporals
- 10 Other ranks

Considering the valuable work done, I think Staff Sergeant Looming is well worth the promotion to Warrant Officer (1st class). He has been in charge of the Department for over two years, and in that time has carried out the instructions and training of a great number of masseurs for orthopaedic boats, and has also trained the present staff.

Two other men I should like to specially recommend for promotion are, 1124^a Corporal Cilento, B.R. - 1st A.C.C.S. and, 2958 Private Horton, R.G. - 5th Pld.Amb.

A/Corporal Cilento has been on the staff of the Department for over twelve months, and is now in charge of all the functional and special cases under treatment in the Massage Department. He has done very good work, and has well earned some promotion. Private Horton has also been in the department over twelve months, and in this time has been ~~in charge~~ responsible for the upkeep of all the ~~fix~~ apparatus. He is as well an expert masseur, and has done very good work, and proved himself very capable and efficient. He, too, is deserving of promotion. I hope that these recommendations will receive your earnest consideration and approval.

3. XRay Plant.

At present all cases for XRay are sent to the Burdon Hospital, Weymouth. Cases are sent to this Hospital from all the surrounding districts, so that there is always a great delay in forwarding a report on the case. If a small plant could possibly be erected in this Depot, much delay would be prevented, and more skiagrams could be taken, and so assist in the treatment of orthopaedic cases.

4. In order that electrical operators may become more familiar with the apparatus placed on board, could a Schall Battery or Fantosta be placed on the boat from this Depot. If this were done it would greatly help the trainees.

Embarkation of Invalids to Australia.

I desire to bring under the notice of the D.M.S. the following defects which result from the present system of evacuating invalids to Australia.

The period which has elapsed between the date of submission of tentative Boat Roll to Administrative Headquarters and the departure of the Transport has averaged 21 days. (This average is based upon the last 18 Invalid Transports).

Owing to this finalizing of the Boat Rolls 21 days before the departure of Transports the following has resulted:-

1. Today (7th instant) there are 200 Orthopaedic cases at Weymouth who arrived subsequently to submission of Roll for "D.4.". Nevertheless this Boat embarked on 6th instant with 83 non-orthopaedic cases on board because when rolls were submitted for "D.4" all orthopaedic cases then in Weymouth were used and they were not sufficient in number to fill the ship.
2. On 15.1.18 on Orthopaedic Transport "W" all available Orthopaedic cases = 514 were submitted to Administrative Headquarters on Nominal Roll.
The boat departed on 30.1.18 with 792 non-orthopaedic cases on board, although on this date an additional 558 Orthopaedic cases had arrived at Weymouth.
3. Tomorrow (8th instant) 312 Berth Cases are required from Weymouth for "D.5": (Excluding Orthopaedic cases, West Australian Berth Cases and 26 Berths on Supplementary Roll for "D.7") 40 Berth cases only are available at Weymouth. The number 312 will therefore be made up by Converted Hammock cases, ~~sitting~~ although when boat departs probably 300 more true berth cases will have arrived at Weymouth.
4. All soldiers whose names are on Supplementary Rolls are unavailable for Invalid Transports for an average period of 28 days.
Thus 120 names on Supplementary Roll for "V" submitted on 13.1.18 missed Transports "W", "X" "Y" and "BB" as they did not become available for other Transports until 9.2.18.
Further, Transport "Y" was half filled by cases marching in during the week prior to departure of Transport, although many of the soldiers on Supplementary Rolls of other ships had been waiting embarkation many weeks.
5. The Supplementary Roll having to supply deletions from Nominal Roll over a period of 3 weeks has to be 3 times as large as if this roll existed only for 1 week.
6. There is a difficulty in making profound alteration in Boat Rolls as these alterations have all to be made by Administrative Headquarters.

Such alterations are common. - e.g.

- (a). Roll for "V" submitted 13.1.18.
On 14.1.18 270 Victorians and Tasmanians were deleted.
- (b). Roll for "DI" submitted 28.2.18.-
On 28.2.18 after Roll forwarded 120 Orthopaedic cases deleted.
On same day 45 Measles Contacts deleted.
On same day Hammocks decreased from 880 to £ 780.
On 7.3.18 Hammocks increased to 920.
Boat sailed on 12.3.18.

7. After submission of Boat Rolls some Hammock cases become Berth cases and vice versa.

I recommend that the following procedure be adopted as it would remedy all the abovementioned defects in the present system:-

1. Board findings reviewed by Consultants at Weymouth.
 2. Board Papers forwarded to Administrative Headquarters for
 - (a). Approval by D.M.S.
 - (b). Verification of soldiers' particulars by Records.
 3. Board Papers returned to Weymouth.
 4. Adinaust notified boat available, together with approximate date of sailing, giving accommodation allotted for -
 - (a). Different types of invalids.
 - (b). Soldiers returning to Australia for "other reasons" from No.2 Command Depot.
- NOTE: Accommodation to be reserved by Administrative Headquarters for their own nominees. If all accommodation so reserved not needed by Administrative Headquarters letter to notify Commandant, No.2 Command Depot, who will fill the unused balance.
5. Tentative Roll, in alphabetical order, forthwith prepared by the S.M.O. No. 2 Command Depot, in accordance with these figures, shewing berths, hammocks, tubercular cases &c, and passed to Depot Commandant for promulgation.
 6. Actual date of sailing notified by Adinaust.
 7. Final Roll, as corrected after allowing for deletions, alterations in accommodation &c., made out again for checking on embarkation. Copies sent to Adinaust. If necessary this Roll made out according to units.
 8. A.F.s B.178 and A.F.s.B.179 (in duplicate) for each man included on this final roll passed by S.M.O. to Commandant, No.2 Command Depot.
 9. A.F.B.178 and one copy of A.F.B.179 for each man embarking forwarded by Commandant to Port of Embarkation, and there handed to Embarkation Officer.
 10. Second copy of A.F.B.179 forwarded by Commandant to Administrative Headquarters.
 11. A.F.B.178 and A.F.B.179 (in duplicate) for men who failed to embark returned by Depot Commandant to S.M.O.

APPENDIX J

Report on soldiers arriving from Australia on 30.4.18.

The H.M.A.T. "Nestor" arrived in England with 1303 troops for this Command and an additional 293 troops, who had proceeded from Australia to Suez in H.M.A.T. "Wiltshire" arrived in England on the same day via Taranto.

1. Medical Unfits.

These reinforcements were of a very good type physically, and it was only found necessary to immediately reject 7 as permanently unfit for General Service.

A Nominal Roll of these seven unfits, together with brief description of the disabilities is attached.

A number of men who complained of inability to march or train owing to some slight disability, such as moderate or slight flat feet have been instructed to carry on as "A" Class, but it is probable that some of these may break down after they have been tried by training.

This is the best draft of reinforcements which has yet arrived from Australia in so far as their Medical fitness is concerned.

2. Dental Unfits.

Of 1396 men dentally inspected 790 were classified Dentally unfit. Of this number:-

- 97 required Extractions.
- 601 required Fillings
- 286 required Dentures
- 62 required Prophylaxis treatment.

3. Infectious Disease

Except for 2 cases of Mumps on "Nestor" no cases of Infectious Disease occurred on the voyage.

150 men ex "Nestor" have been isolated as Mumps contacts, as one case of Mumps occurred in this Company a fortnight before arrival in England.

During the 14 days since troops arrived only one case of Mumps has occurred.

4. Reports from S.M.O's, have already been forwarded to the D.M.S.

5. T.A.B. Inoculation.

All these troops have been reinoculated with an additional c.c. of T.A.B. vaccine as they had not received the necessary dosage of T.A.B. vaccine prior to arrival.

APPENDIX K.
REPORT ON TREATMENT OF SCABIES AT VERNE
FROM 1st APRIL 1917 to 31st MARCH 1918.

From 1st April to 5th August 1917 the old treatment by baths and sulphur ointment was used; from 5th August 1917 to 31st March 1918 the new routine treatment laid down in A.A.M.C. Circular Instruction No 40 of 4.7.17; has been strictly followed in all cases.

The results are shown by the following figures:-

(1) OLD TREATMENT.

Time in Hospital:-

Under 5 days	28 cases

Average time in Hospital $9\frac{1}{2}$ days

Unfortunately there is no record of the number of relapses during this period.

(2) NEW TREATMENT.

A total of 622 cases were treated. 10 of these were readmitted to Hospital; 6 within 3 weeks of first course of treatment, 2 after two months, 2 after three months. The 6 that returned within 3 weeks were probably true relapses, the remaining four had become re-infected, so that the percentage of relapses may be taken as less than 1%.

The treatment in all cases lasts 5 days, the programme being:-

1st day	Bath and rubbing 1st time.
2nd day	2 rubbings (morning and afternoon).
3rd day	Bath and 4th rubbing.
4th day	Powder and change of clothes.
5th day	Final bath, Discharge.

(A few patients are shown on records as remaining in hospital longer than 5 days, but these have been retained on account of other diseases or wounds).

It has been found that the irritation disappears entirely after the second day's treatment in the majority of cases. In a few it persists after 5 days, and these are treated with Lassar's Paste. There has only been one case of severe dermatitis due to the treatment, that necessitated the patient remaining in Hospital. There have been a few cases of mild dermatitis, but it is rare. The rash usually disappears in 7 to 14 days. Cotton underwear is now being used for patients undergoing treatment, as it was found that the ointment rendered the flannel garments unservicable in a very short time.

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TREATMENT OF SCABIES

TREATMENT.

There are four main indications:

- (1) Breaking up of burrows
- (2) Destruction of parasite
- (3) Relief of subjective symptoms
- (4) Prevention or cure of secondary lesions.

METHOD OF TREATMENT

Where lesions are very inflammatory it is advisable in every case to apply soothing applications, until the acute symptoms have somewhat subsided.

Use Starch-boracic poultice, Boric Acid lotion or lotio. Liq. Carb. detergenta.

Then commence the bath - ointment cure.

- (a) Preparation for bath. Rub the entire body from neck downwards with soft soap for 15-20 minutes, using a soft brush or flannel. The brush is dipped into Vlemingx's Solution, which is diluted with an equal quantity of hot water, and all lesions are especially scrubbed.
- (b) Preliminary Bath. Get into a Bath of Temperature 96-100 Fahr. to which Vlemingx's solution has been added (1 tablespoonful to each gallon of water).

The Vlemingx's Solution recommended is as follows:-

VLEMINGX'S SOLUTION.

- a. 1 part of CALC. OXIDE slaked with 1 part of water and mixed with 2 parts of SULPH. PRAECIP.
- b. Of the foregoing mixture 2.5 parts are boiled with 20 parts of water until it is so reduced as to yield 10 parts by weight when strained.

Sig.

1. For Bath. Add 1 tablespoonful to each gallon of water.
2. For lotion. To be scrubbed into lesions. Dilute with an equal quantity of hot water.

(c) Inunction of ointment.

After drying thoroughly, rub in the following ointment for ten minutes:-

Bota 0000 Naphtoll	dr	1
Sulph. Praecip.	dr	2
Ung. Porci.	dr	6
Sapon Virid.	dr	2
Cret. Alb. Pulv.	dr	$\frac{1}{2}$

Patient then puts on flannel underwear, stocking and gloves, and gets into bed between blankets. Altogether three rubbings are carried out at intervals of twelve hours.

Twelve hours later patient leaves his bed and is rubbed with a simple dusting powder.

Finally he puts on clean linen and dresses in pyjamas, having the entire body well powdered:

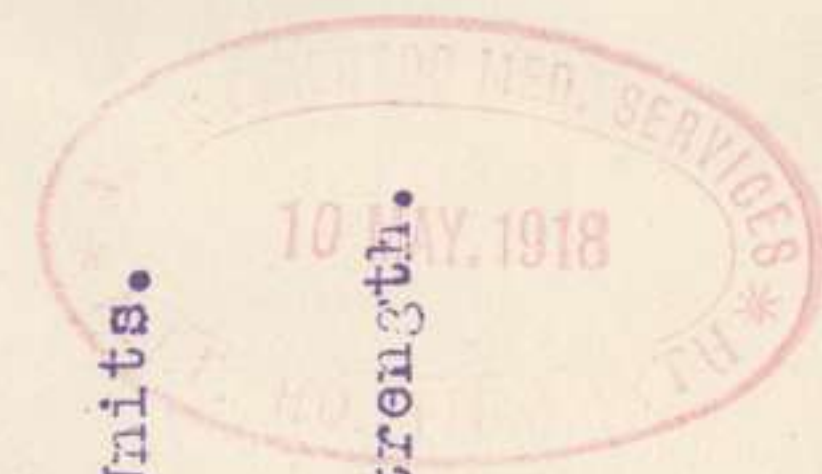
