





QUARTERMASTER'S REPORT.

Rations for the month of July were good. Bread was a daily issue, and occasionally biscuits in lieu of bread. 25% of one day's bread ration, on examination by Medical officer was considered unfit for human consumption, and condemned. The issue on the whole of the month was very good.

Fresh meat and mutton although it was not a daily issue was good, bully beef being on issue when there was no frah meat. One day's ration of meat was condemned by the M.O., as well as approximately 200 lbs. of the Brigade's supply.

Taking into consideration the intense heat of the Jordan Valley, and the difficulties of transportation, et., the fresh meat has been a very good ration.

Vegetables have not been very good and there is room for improvement. The remaining rations lime juice etc., were good. Lemons and dried fruits were on issue at intervals.

The iron rations were turned over and a certificate rendered to that effect.


ORDHANCE.

For the past month wheels have been the one item, and still there is difficulty in keeping up our supplies as all wheels now in use are practically unserviceable and might prove dangerous if allowed to remain in their present condition. Indents have been furnished through Ordnance for these wheels to be replaced but up to date have not been supplied.

Reference G.R.O. 4115, wheels No. 159A to replace the rubber tyred wheels for light Ambulance Van were indented for and up to date have not been supplied.


