

### 4. REMARKS - Patients and Treatment -

During the month the personnel of the Medical staff has again undergone considerable change, three new Medical Officers having reported for duty, none of whom have had previous experience in organised treatment of venereal disease, consequently their services are for some little time of comparatively little assistance in expediting the discharge of cases from the Hospital. This has been a great handicap on the Hospital and on the Officers in charge of Treatment, as previous experience has proved that a Medical Officer is not capable of handling venereal cases properly until he has had two or three months continuous training and has given his whole attention to the method.

The number of admissions during the month shows a total increase of just over 100 as during the latter portion of the time the number diminished somewhat.

As regards complications, Prostatitis has increased somewhat, likewise Vesiculitis, while Epididymitis has slightly decreased. The figures are as follows:-

Prostatitis ... 16.1%
Vesiculitis ... 20.5%
Epididymitis (on admission) 5.3%

There have been 10 Periurethral abscess cases; 10 Balanitis; 4 Vasitis and 1 Cystitis. The average number of Massages and Sounds passed throughout the month has been :-

Of the 29 cases of relapses of gonorrhoea admitted to Hospital during the month, 16 cases were of men who were previously treated by Medical Officers who have since left this Hospital for duty elsewhere. This average is remarkably small considering that during the last three months 1,089 cases who were suffering from gonorrhoea have been discharged from No.1 A.D.H.

A large proportion of the 29 cases admitted, stated that they had celebrated on Armistice Day, and the balance admitted that they had "tried themselves out" with a view to ascertaining if they were properly cured before returning to Australia.

It would appear that as regards the use of Prophylaxia during sexual intercourse, a larger proportion of men are attempting to take some precaution. The percentages, on the statement of the patients, are 56.6% who used prophylaxis in some form, and 43.4% who did not.

On the 12th of the month (the day after Armistice Day) the G.O.C., A.I.F. Depots in U.K. visited the Hospital and addressed the patients and staff, and decided to send a combatant Officer who would act as permanent Orderly Officer, and if necessary Messing Officer, On the 15.11.18 Lieut.Edmonds, W.W., reported from O.T.B. for these duties and has been carrying them out fairly efficiently ever since.

A Court of Inquiry of which Lieut.Col. R.H.Beardsmore, D.S.O. was President, sat for several days at this Hospital to inquire into and report upon the disturbance which occurred on the night of 11/12th November in and near No.1 A.D.H.. The finding of the Court or its report has so far not been communicated.

#### 5. QUARTERMASTER'S DEPARTMENT -


This Department as a whole has been carrying out its duties satisfactorily. The new Laundry Contract has been kept under supervision, and all deficiencies acknowledged immediately by the Manager.

The shortages discovered by stock-taking in the Linen and Blanket portion of the Q.M's Department are being adjusted as quickly as possible, and as this is the first really efficient check since October, 1916, the deficiencies are remarkably small, and reflect considerable credit on all concerned.

#### 6. PHARMACEUTICAL DEPARTMENT -

The Pharmaceutical Officer, Hon. Lieut. A.M.RAMSEY, marched out to report to D.M.S., A.I.F. with a view to his return to Australia as a 1914 man, but no successor has so far reported and the Staff Sergeant Dispensers are practically new to the work, as one has only reported towards the end of October, and a second one on the 27th of this month, neither having had previous experience in dealing with Medical stores of a Hospital of any size.

7. LIEUT. P.W. JONES reported for duty as Educational Officer and commenced the formation of classes amongst both staff and patients He has interviewed as many as possible of both and has had very



So far, classes in Arithmetic, Shorthand, Bookkeeping, French, Latin, English, Chemistry, Geography, History, Algebra, Electricity and Magnetism have been formed and instruction is being given by the Educational Officer, some members of the staff and one or two patients. Enquiries have also been made for many other subjects which, at present, it is impossible to open classes for.

In addition, lectures are given by the Officer in charge of Treatment and the Commanding Officer once a fortnight for one hour on the reason for the treatment which is carried out in this Hospital for gonorrhoea, and the social aspect of the disease both to the men themselves and their wives and children.

#### 8. PATHOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT -

The Pathologist reports that the work of his Department has proceeded satisfactorily during the month. His detailed report is attached.

#### 9. GENERAL -

The cessation of hostilities, and the almost complete loss of actual A.M.C. personnel from the staff of this Unit is rendering the work very difficult and hard to carry out in a satisfactory manner.

The most uppermost thoughts in the minds of the majority of the staff is the possibility of a speedy return to Australia, and the men of B2a and C.l category are inclined to consider them-selves unfairly dealt with being attached to this Hospital instead of awaiting transport at Weymouth.

The frequent changes in Medical Officers has already been referred to as a very serious handicap.
