

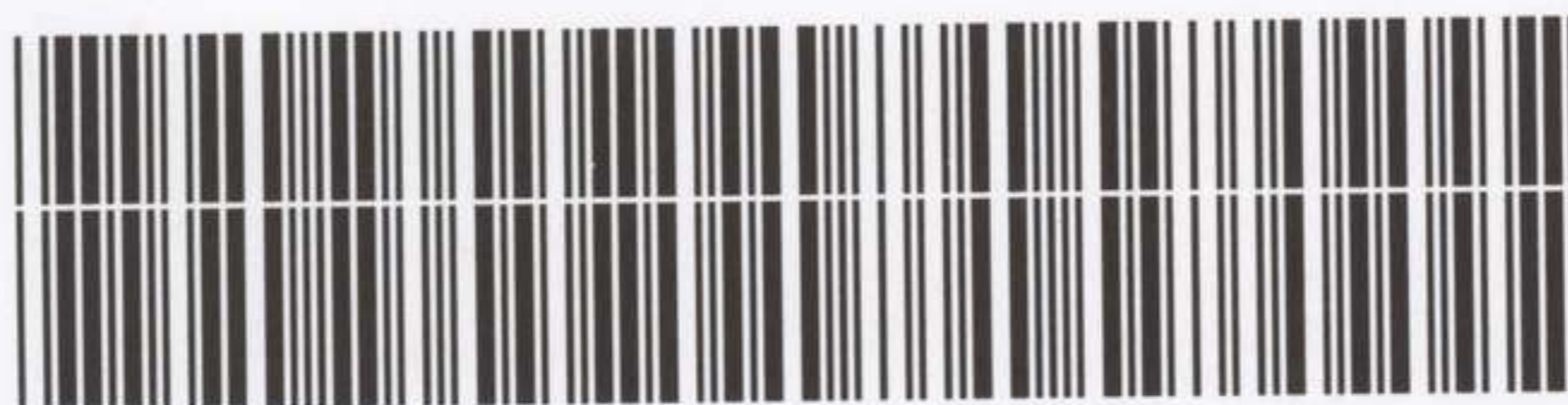

No. 3 AUSTRALIAN CASUALTY CLEARING STATION.

Surgeon Specialist's Report for Month of July...1918

During July there has been no great activity on this front and there has been correspondingly little surgical work at this C.C.S. A new operating hut was built and occupied during the month. It is much more convenient to work in than the tent operating theatre and it provides room for six fully equipped tables. As there have been three teams working during the day and two at night, each surgeon has at his disposal two tables. This arrangement expedites work to a very great extent.

There were no less than 13 cases of acute appendicitis nearly all of a severe type operated during the month.

Blood Transfusion was performed twenty-five times for severe haemorrhage in shocked patients. This procedure exceeds all others for the treatment of this condition in its efficacy, and its reviving effect in patients who appear to be moribund it is almost miraculous.

REPORT OF SISTER IN CHARGE FOR MONTH OF JULY

No.
Date..... This month there have been an unusual number of changes in the staff, chiefly due to a number of the Sisters having completed their six months, the allotted time at a C.C.S.

STAFF..... Now consists of :-

- 1 Head Sister
- 7 Sisters
- 7 Staff Nurses
- 2 Relieving Staff Nurses
- 2 Australian Sisters attached on Surgical Teams
- 2 Imperial Sisters attached on Surgical Teams.

WARDS..... The surgical work has been much heavier. From 9.7.18 to 17.7.18 the wards were very busy. The epidemic of Influenza subsided early in the month, which has made the work in the medical wards lighter. There are quite a number of Americans amongst our patients

OPERATING THEATRE..... On 11.7.18. they started work in the new Operating Theatre, in which there are six tables. The hut is a great improvement on the tents : the light is decidedly better and the hut is more convenient. Two British Teams were transferred to No. 10 C.C.S. and two Australian Teams took their place. The work has been fairly continuous - as a rule three teams have been kept busy during the day. From 9-7-18. to 17-7-18 there was a good deal of night work.

CHANGES IN CAMP..... On 17.7.18 extra tents were erected and we can now accommodate 1000 patients if necessary.

LEAVE On 4-7-18 I went for my 14 days leave, Sister Proctor relieving me. She managed splendidly during my absence. The Sisters are still getting their leave as it falls due.

HEALTH Has not been so good this month. S. Nurse D. Webb was evacuated on 5.7.18, being very ill with Pleurisy. She was evacuated to the Hospital for Sick Sisters, No. 11 C.C.S. For a fortnight she was very ill but since 19.7.18 she has been improving. We miss her from the Operating Theatre as her work was excellent. Sister McNulty has taken her place. Several of the sisters have been off duty for a day or so, but their complaints were slight and they soon recovered.

INSPECTIONS On 16.7.18 General Birdwood visited the camp. On 27.7.18 Major-General Howse, IMS, AIF, inspected the camp.

RECREATION We have the use of a tennis court, which is proving a great attraction. We share it with officers from the various surrounding Rest Camp.

Report of Quartermaster for Month of July
1918.

Rations.

General. Supplies obtainable during the month have been well up the the average so far as quantities are concerned. Owing to the warm weather the quality has in some cases been inferior. Margarine has lately been of poor quality.

This may of course be due to the scarcity of certain ingredients. Margarine packed in cartons (1½ lbs.) seems to stand carriage and weather better than when packed in butter-paper and boxes.

Vegetables. Potatoes and Onions have been plentiful during the past month, and patients have been well supplied.

Comparison of July percentage return with previous monthly returns shows a marked increase in the amount of Vegetables, tinned fruit etc. supplied to Patients.

Bacon has not been up to the usual standard. This may be due to the weather, and perhaps a different method of curing.

Bread & Meat. These two articles have been of first class quality.

Medical Comforts. Eggs. These have been supplied from time to time to Railhead by The National Egg Collection Society, and during the past few months the quality has improved, but it seems necessary for the period of transit from England to France to be reduced as far as possible for the rejects in a number of instances equal 10% in boxes containing approximately 250 eggs. As the present method of packing is good, the loss is almost solely due to the cases being exposed to the heat.

Soda Water. A great quantity of Soda Water is used, and at times it has been difficult to keep up supplies. The difficulty has now been overcome by the issue of Sparklets and the improvement has already been felt in the Wards.

Fresh Fruit. Lemons are generally obtainable, but other fresh fruit is difficult to procure except by local purchase.

Milk. Fifty litres of milk are obtained locally each morning. This is solely for ward use, and "Ideal" milk is used to augment the supply - the latter being used for hospital cooking.

Fresh Fish. During the month the indent for Fresh Fish

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Quartermaster's Report Contd..

was cancelled - the reason being that several consignments were unfit for consumption. Experience has proved that the present method of forwarding fish to a C.C.S. in the summer is unsatisfactory. Malt Liquors. As regards this item the consumption return shows a fair increase. Same is due to the fact that it has been considered advisable to supply Convalescent Patients and Donors with more Ale & Stout than hitherto.

Messing.

"Cooking in the Field" is taken as a basis when framing the menu for the day, but is not strictly adhered to the principal reason being that the number catered for (patients & personnel) will not allow of all the dishes mentioned in the manual being cooked. Variety of menu as much as possible is the main point borne in mind. Since complete repairs have been effected to the "Wiles Cooker" it has been giving complete satisfaction, and is found much superior to the Portable Oven.

Dripping etc.

The return of Dripping etc. to Railhead has been maintained, and during the month the sum of 472 francs odd was realised. Portion of this amount has been used in purchasing green vegetables for the Personnel, and same were appreciated.

Food Consumption & Percentage Returns (Patients).

These returns are also attached.

Water Supply.

Water is laid on throughout the Camp from four tanks. A Motor Lorry draws the water from a Sterilizer about one mile distant, and keeps the abovementioned tanks supplied. The average daily consumption is from 3000 to 3500 gallons - this covers the supply for the bathroom.

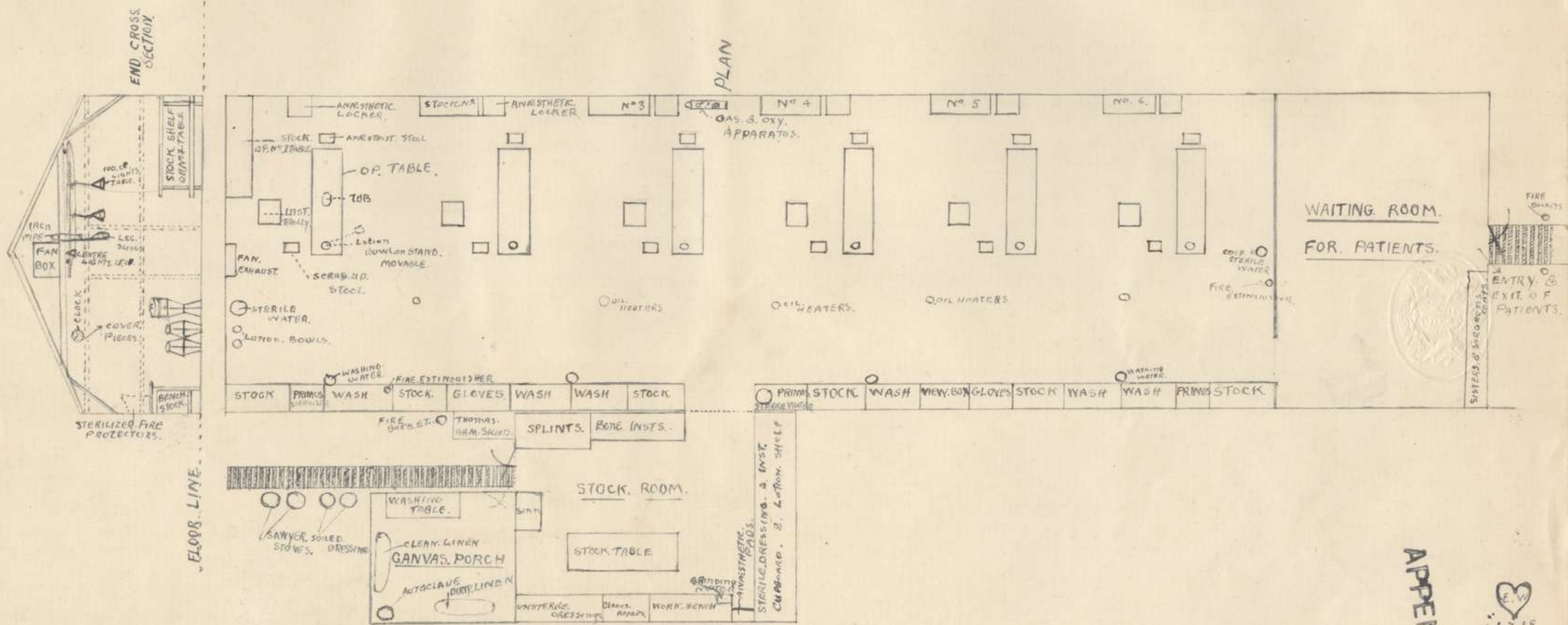

COMMANDING OFFICER'S COMMENTS

SURGICAL

The replacement of English Teams by Australian Surgeons confirms the national character of our hospital and is appreciated.

The practice of dosing half the wounded with anti-Welchii serum continues but no conclusions as to its value are available.

The application of blood transfusion continues to extend and there is a growing impression that other intravenous infusions are almost valueless when compared with blood.

MEDICAL

The influenza epidemic has subsided and the amount of serious sickness has diminished. The attempts to prevent preventable disease are bearing fruit - witness Trench Fever.

Efforts are being made to stimulate M.O.s. to diagnose their cases and avoid subterfuges such as P.U.O., N.Y.D., etc. The importance of this is not so much in the direction of accuracy of diagnosis as increasing the observation of individual cases.

GENERAL

20 Hospital Marquees were obtained from another C.C.S. These have enabled us to run a separate department for walking wounded and to improve the accommodation of the S.I.W. department.

This brief analysis shows the nature of this work.
