

on the first of the month three new Medical Officers reported with a view to acquiring some practical experience in the Treatment of Venereal Disease (Lt/Col Upjohn. Lt/Col Hurley and Capt. Newton) (by order of D.M.S. A.I.F.) Other members of the Staff marched out by the same order.

The work, however, has progressed fairly satisfactorily, and the discharges are more than double the admissions for the month. The average stay in Hospital for cases suffering from Gonorrhoea (65.9) days, is remarkably, good, in the opinion of the Officer in charge of Treatment, considering the high standard, set as a Standard of cure; and it will be noticeable that only one relapse was admitted during the month, which is certainly a record for this Hospital, and I feel justified it claiming it as a record for all similar Hospitals.

4. REMARKS. (cont.)

least examined once Urethroscopically, and all cases are dilated. This Treatment has been criticised, and I believe that it has been stated that the patients are over treated, but the fact remains, since Urethroscopic examinations of all cases and routine dilation has been introduced, relapses have dropped from between 4 and 5%, to less than 1%. It will also be noticed that by comparing previous reports with this, that Polypi are far fewer in the Urethra, or at any rate, Polyoid conditions of the Posterior Urethra, are greatly reduced, and the Officer in charge of Treatment is perfectly certain that this is due entirely to the systematic use of Curved sounds, which prevents the growth of granulation tissue oninflamed surfaces.

Great care is also taken in the instruction of patients regarding Irrigation, and also with the increase in the Medical Staff, much more personal supervision is given to the dressings of sores admitted for treatment. Those efforts have already shown good results, especially by reducing the number of cases complicated by organisms, other than Gonococci and Penile sores and Buboes, which are healing with greater rapidity owing to greater care in ante-sepsis.

5. QUARTERMASTER'S DEPARTMENT.

Owing to N.M.E. and Repatriation Orders, the personnel of this Officer's Department, has changed considerably, and the lack of a 2nd quartermaster has been acutely felt, nevertheless, the large emount of work has been carried out, and systematic Inspections continued right throughout the month to anticipate as far as possible any leakages in stores and equipment. The quartermaster and Represe tative were ready on the 17th of the month to hand over the whole of No. 2 Camp. Parkhouse, but no one in authority could be prevailed on to take over before 28.7.19. (11 days waiting). The necessary receipts were obtained from the Barrack Warden, and a list of damages claimed by the Engineers. The latter have been submitted to the A. to be dealt with, amounting to slightly over 270., including cost of labour. This covers a period of 62 months, during which time 3392 patients have passed through the Extension. The deficiencies, according to the long roll, shows the amazingly small sum of 22.16. which reflects great credit on the supervision exercised on all those responsible there for. sent Unserviceable Stores are being direct to Salvage Unit, Thelsea. Quarterly Certificate re surplus and deficiencies at No. 1 A.D.H. were forwarded to A.D.M.S. on 31st instant; the delay in doing this was due to the authorities failing to take over No. 1 A.D.H. extension

During the month the work in this Departmen has been carried out satisfactorily, and checks on instruments and stores have been made weekly.

258 Prescriptions were dispensed.

A small quantity of drugs were taken over from C.T.D. and added to our stocks.

A full list of all instruments on charge, which were originally bought with a special grant given by the Australian Red Cross, was forwarded to A.D.M.S. and instructions asked for as to disposal of same.

7. PATHOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT.

This Department is carrying out fair work, but a serious delay occurred owing to the lack of Haemolytic Serum, which completely prevented Blood-tests for some days.

Owing to the higher standard of cure in the Hospital.

Complement Fixation Tests for Conorrhoea were performed in 446

During the month the work has proceeded on the whole, fairly 8. satisfactorily, notwithstanding the considerable chhange in personnel, of both Officers and other ranks. All patients at No. 1 A. D.H. Extension, Barkhouse were transferred to this Hospital on the morning of 16.7.19., and the whole of the staff less the after party of 27 other ranks As already referred to in para. 5., great difficulty was experienced in getting any responsible authority to take over the Camp, although ample intimation had been given both to A. D.M. S. and A. J.M.G., and it was ot until 11 days later (28.7.19) that the necessary receipts were obtained. As the Camp, when taken over by No. 1 A.D.H. in January, was handed over from O.C. C.T.D. it seems difficult to understand why he could not have been instructed to take it back, but this was strongly objected to by the A. L.M.G., who insisted it should be handed over to the British, and this, to a great extent, was the cause of the deby in getting Clearances, as the two long rolls did not correspond (British and Australian). A less marked diminuation in admissions during the latter half of the month occurred than was expected. This was due chifly to delays in the sailing of transports for Australia, as men who had had coitus just prior to embarkation were held up sufficiently long to develop Venereal touble, and be struck off the boat roll before the transport actually sailed, It is, however, anticipated that an average discharge of at least 100 per week will be kept up until such time as the Hospital is handed over, and as far as can be judged, admissions will drop 50% during the coming month.
