



# Appendix 1

The selection of men for the Stationary Hospital began on the 10th September 1914, the first men to be taken on were those applicants for positions in the 4th Field Ambulance who were not required for that unit. Additional men were called for by advertisements in the daily papers on and after the 16th September 1914.

Preference was given those fitted for special work, and who had received instruction in ambulance work (Outside of the lunatic asylum, there are no male numses in South Australia).

After enrollment a most careful examination and observation of the men was made, and theunit was not actually complete until prior to \*leaving Melbourne to embark.

A temporary base hospital was established at Keswick, and the arrangements made with the Adelaide Hospital for training the men in nursing duties helped greatly in the final selection.

We have now in the Unit an expert X-Ray man, an architect, as well as several others with a good knowledge of this and other branches of electrical work, motor and other mechanics, a carpenter and a plumber.

A fifth year medical student is in charge of the operating theatre, and a recorded dentist is sergeant in charge of nursing duties. The dispenser is an analytical as well as a dispensing chemist.

We were greatly indebted to the Board of Management of the Adelaide Hospital for permission to train our men there and to the Medical Superintendent, Sisters and nurses for the help given in that training. The men attended Hospital in two shifts, the first from 6-0 A.M. to noon, the second from 2-0 P.M. until 8-0 P.M.

Our cooks were also instructed in special, diet cooking, for Hospital purposes. In the temporary base hospital at Keswick, the men were instructed in general hospital duties. Formalities connected with the admission and discharge of patients, all clerical work, and the disinfection of clothing blankets, etc. Lectures were given daily on first aid and anatomical subjects; also instruction in Sanitation, and the general duties in camp life.

Instruction was also given in squad, waggon, stretcher, and company drill.

Some confusion occurred because of the necessity of procuring a portion of our equipment in Adelaide, and some elsewhere.

If all of our equipment could not be procured in one centre, why should that obtained in Sydney be sent on to Adelaide and then back to Melbourne (Hospital tents 34) or those made in Brisbane, (tables), not be shipped there, instead of sending them on to Adelaide and then back to Melbourne. The Head Office at Melbourne had ample time to look into this matter and were specially advised the tents and tables would be stopped at Melbourne. This was the cause of needless expense which might easily have been avoided.

### ORDERS

FQUIPMENT

Verbal orders were given to entrain on the 2th November, by the D.A.Q.M.G. and instructions to start on November 21st, and in answer to an urgent wire, a final word was given to entrain on November 27th. The answer to this wire was delayed 36 hours. Tents arrived in Adelaide too late to be taken to Melbourne, and had the Kyarra left at stated times, they would not have been taken at all.

Non-commissioned officers and men in our commands have made complaints that it is often impossible for them to obtain a bath of either fresh or salt water- between Reveille and the hour at which they must commence duty.

The causes would appear to be:-

- (1) the scarcity of bath accomodation.
- (2) The irregularity of the water supplies.

On several occasions the men have not been able to obtain sufficient water to wash the soap off their faces after shaving. This occurred this morning, and also on Tuesday and Wednesday of this week.

\*Complaints have also reached us from Non-Commissioned Officers and Men, who state that they cannot buy soft drinks and fruit from the mry canteen, and that for such goods as they do obtain, prices are unreasonably high.

The water available for drinking purposes is described as badly filtered, often warm and unpalatable. The inability to purchase soft drinks is therefore a hardship on the men.

As we will be experiencing further hot weather after leaving Colombo, we would respectfully request, that, if possible, arrangements be made which will remove these causes for complaint.

We would suggest that a ration of lime juice be issued daily, and that in addition, if permissable, corps be allowed to make up a drink ration containing say, Citric Acid, sugar and water, with a little Essence of Lemon, which would be issued to the men at a nominal price.

We beg to assure you, Sir, that it is our earnest desire to co-operate with you, and to assist you in every possible way in arriving at, and accarrying through any remedial measures considered desirable and practicable.

Lieut-Colonel Ramsey Smith, Lieut-Colonel White, myself, Major Barrett, Major Jackson, Major McLean and many of the stewards dining in first class saloon were all taken bad with Ptomaine poisoning. I myself was unable to take solid foods for three weeks, and had to live very carefully for the rest of the voyage.

A Board of Inquiry was held and came to the conclusion that the arrangements of the kitchen were bad, and that the position of same rendered it frightfully hot in the tropics. The facilities for thawing the food were bad, and the cleanliness of the place and the cooking utensils not good.

Mach Unit placed batmen at the disposal of the Steward (Chief) for waiting at tables; etc, but the staff of cabin stewards was as a whole most uncivil, and threatened to strike on several occasions.

I consider that the feeding accomodation of the Kyarra was quite inadequate, and that the ship was only suitable for short trips along the Australian Coast. I also consider that she should not carry more than 500 passengers, and that she was not intended for a long voyage such as she was used for on this occasion.

The weather luckily was mild nearly the whole way, or there would have been serious trouble from various sources.

Telephone Instruction received to take bedsteads as well as mattresses, and one days ration. Major Bagshawe communicating.

On the 27th, telephone message received from D.M.S. to take seven days ration less meat and bread. The supply officer was notified

Half unit personnel, epuipment, baggage and rations left as per instructions. On the 28th, applied to Light Horse Field Ambulance for transport and sent all cases fit for removal from house hospital to camp hospital, only keeping enough personnel at former place to look after any serious cases.

Have repeatedly asked for Brigade Orders but received no response.

In continuation of my telegram of this morning, the following arrangements have been made.

Four 30 ton trucks, and two flats for motor ambulances will be put down at Maadi by 7-0 A.M. 27-1-15 for loading.

These must be loaded with all baggage for Ismalia by 1-30 P.M. when they will be run to Cairo Main Station Yard.

Personnel to be at Cairo Main Station No 1 Platform by 3-30 pm 27th inst.

You must arrange for fatigue parties and transport.

Seven days rations will be placed on the train by

3-30 pm.

# Appendix 5

Jan 29th 1915

Received notice from Abbassia Barracks that two of my men had been arrested for being in Cairo after 10-30 although I had given them leave.

These were the first two to whom leave had been granted since our arrival, and they were sent in on duty.

On making inquiries I found that all leave had been stopped on the 28th instant in camp orders. As no camp orders were issued to us, I was not in a position to instruct my men accordingly.

Lance Cpl Pride was sent with a letter to Provost Marshall at Abbassia Barracks instructing them to release men.

I went into Cairo and interviewed Staff Paymaster re Stationery and forms not issued in Australia. He agreed to pay forall stationery obtained at Whitehead Morris and Co, Ltd, and also agreed to pay for coal, coke and drugs, that we have been unable to obtain, and which are absolutely necessary for carrying on hospital.

He recommended me to order what was at present necessary, and get quotations for future stock.

In-formed D.M.S.Staff Officer re Measles in camp, and that precautions should be taken to prevent spread of same to incoming troops. Suggested to Staff Officer of O.C.Brigade that steps be taken to prevent infection of new troops coming into camp. Recommended him to have tents sprayed with Formalin with McKenzie Spray, and closed up for one day, and ten opened to sun and air.

When new Brigade comes into camp, they should shift tents to new space of unused ground alongside their present positions.
