I have the honour to report that I have been informed that Commissions are now being granted to Dentists who are doing dental and other duties in the A.M.C.

Should this be so, I strongly recommend Sergeant.H.S.Marshall who is doing duty with this Hospital.

This N.C.O. is in every way qualified for appointment to a commission, and since March 4th, when we arrived at Mudros, he has been acting as a dentist whenever he has been able to find time, and has been of great service to the forces that were collecting during the last three months.

He has mended many plates and bridges, besides stopping and extracting many teeth.

Since wounded have been coming to this Hospital, he has also attended many bad mouths, and the whole of his time could be easily taken up by dental work on this island.

I regret to have to report the following case:

7/377, L/C Moore.M.O. of C.Y.C. Regt has returned here on 2nd June as fit for duty.

His regimental M.O. sent him here at once, and on examination we found him to have a temperature of 101 degrees, and a bullet wound in the upper part of the chest on the right side at the back. The bullet could be easily seen and felt in front below the nipple.

The right pleura contained fluid, probably blood at first, and later pus. The bullet had penetrated the lung and lodged just under the skin, and had obviously been untreated by anyone with elementary medical knowledge. I sent him off immediately to the Hospital Ship.

Re Lce/Cpl Moore, Canterbury Yeomanary Cavalry.

This patient was admitted to F Ward under my care on May 28, having walked from the Australian Pier to the Hospital.

He gave the history that he had been injured 8 days previously and complained of pain on the right side of the chest below the nipple, where he said, a bullet had struck his bandolier. He said nothing whatever about being hit by a bullet behind the chest. I did not find any evidence of pleurisy or other lung involvement. I did not feel any foreign body beneath the skin, which was unbroken; nor would I have expected anything of this sort from the history he gave me. He did not seem at all seriously ill while in the Hospital, having a normal temperature and pulse during that time. He was kept at rest, and after a few days, his pain disappeared. He was allowed up on May 30th and discharged on June 1.

I enclose his temperature chart and diet and history sheet, which speak for themselves.

Attached explanation from Major Wilson forwarded herewith.

Major Wilson naturally took the man's explanation of his injury as correct. The patient was one of 84 admitted at the same time, and he had no note indicating the nature of his injury or of previous treatment. He was able to walk up a steep hill to the Hospital, and his pulse and temperaure showed no disturbance.

His temperature on leaving here was 98 deg., his pulse 56. and his respiration 18.

I need hardly point out that such symptons did not indicate a Pleura with fluid in - much less pus.

Medical Report on Private King. No 408, 5th L.H.

by Major Wilson.

Has a bullet wound going right through the left hand in the middle of the palm. It has been done over three weeks, and the X-Ray examination shows a fracture of the 3rd metacarpal bone about its middle. The wounds on the palm and dorsam of the hand ought to be healed in about 10 days time, but the index and long fingers have had their flexor axisting tendons injured.

With regard to Circular memo dated June 28th marked "Confidential" and "Urgent" which I received on July 1st, I enclose documents which give the admissions and discharges occurring in this Hospital over a period extending from May 21st for six weeks.

The O.C. Otago Regiment says that he has sent 82 men off from Anzac with minor ailments, and that up to June 22nd, only five had returned.

We have had 16 men of this regiment during the period referred to, and their average stay in this Hospital has been 8 days. Instead of being minor cases they include Enteric fever, pneumonia, hernia, Complicated measles and gonorrhoea, Of these 16 cases, 5 were sent to the Base, three to duty, (one in three days, one in five days, and one in 12 days) and six were sent to the convalescent depot within from three to 11 days. The statement that most of these cases went to the Australian Hospital at Lemnos cannot refer to us, as we have only had 16 out of 82 cases.

Now, one of the most reliable sergeant-majors of the Otago Regiment has made a tabulated set of charges, which I will reply to in the same order :-

(1) Is the Sergeant Major or the Medical Officer to be the judge of the fitness of the soldiers to return to duty. Omiting the serious cases in the 16 mentioned, the average stay of the remainder in this Hospital was 42 days.

About visiting the village.

That is outside my jurisdiction, as an Assistant Provost Marshall was appointed, whose duty it was to prevent any men without passes going into the village. Notices were posted in each ward, and also read out by wardmasters almost every day, and these pointed

out that the village was out of bounds and that men were liable to punishment if they so transgressed. Besides this, I applied for an armed guard to keep them in, but this was refused by the P.M. as he had not sufficient men for those duties.

This is absolutely incorrect, as each man is seen by a Medical Officer at stated times each day - many of them two and three times a day -. Such Medical officers report on their condition each day, and state whether they will be fit to return to the front or the convalescent depot, or whether they will have to go to the Base.

(3) The Embarkation Officer at the Pier distributes the incoming patients at the pier to the different hospitals. He sends word to the Aiffe each O.C. who prepares for the number specified, and who provides means for their conveyance from thep pier to the hospital.

All these cases pass through the Orderly Room, are entered in the Admissin and Discharge Book, and are then sent to the various wards under the special supervision of each wardmaster. All cases are then examined by the Medical Officers, and the nature of the injuries or diseases is entered upon the ward sheet from which the diagnoses are entered each evening into the Admission and Discharge book.

On departure, a nominal roll accompanies each batch, who are conveyed under the charge of an N.C.O. He sees them safely on to a minerweeper pinnace for the mine-sweeper which is to take them to the front, or conveys them to the convalescent depot. In the case of departure for the Base, a nominal is taken by the Medical Officer on board the steamer bound for the Base.

(4) This is answered by the preceding paragraphs, and as it affects this hospital, I must point out that not only is it axtotally untrue, but is exceedingly fairunfair and irresponsible.

I feel that such statements taken from irresponsible people, and not containing any specific facts, should not obtain credence so easily with 0.C.'s of regiments.



With regard to the statement of the O.C. 10th Light Horse Regt.

I enclose documents which give the admissions and discharges that passed through this Hospital. Of the 54 who have returned to duty, eights passed through this Hospital, three were sent to the Base, in three, five and seven days respectively, one is still in Hospital (on whom I will attach Major Newland's report) and four were sent to the convalescent depot in six, six, seven and 10 days giving an average stay in Hospital of 7½ days.

Of the 14 returned to duty, six were in this Hospital for an average stay of isseven days. One of the latter had a fractured meta: cappal bone and his stay was the longest.

With regard to the number of days absent for trifling illnesses, I Take it that the Medical Officer is the best judge of fitness or unfitness of a case, and, as applied to cases attended here, this is a gratuitous insult. It is very evident that no leakage has occurred here, nor any undue delay, either in passing patients too or from this Hospital.

I might suggest that whilst I was for a short time on Transport B.3. (Alaunia) after the O.C. of the ship had rounded up everyone he could find, there was a very large number of men on board who could not be accounted for, and, if this occurs on one boat, may it not occur on many others.

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
