



BI	ERTANGLES	4th		Only moderate enemy artillery activity has been shewn. At 3.5 a.m. a barrage was put down on our trenches in C.4.c. This barrage which lasted for 3 minutes and lifted on to DOMART, covered a raid on three of our posts. Some of our battery positions were involved in a shoot with all calibres on the areas between FOUILLOY and VILLERS BRETONNEUX. Counter-battery work and other shoots have been carried out as usual - a successful shoot with aeroplane observation on a dug-out in P.33.c. being reported. The 77th Brigade R.G.A. moved into Australian Corps area and comes under the orders of the B.G.H.A. Australian Corps.	
		5th		Enemy shelling has consisted chiefly of light intermittent harassing fire on our front line with occasional short bursts in VILLERS BRETONNEUX on which a little Gas has been used. Unfavourable weather conditions have prevented observed destructive shoots on hostile batteries being carried out. At 10.0 a.m. to-day the command of the sector at present held by the 4th Australian Division passed to the Canadian Corps, the responsibility for the artillery covering the front passing to the G.O.C.R.A. Canadian Corps, at the same time. The Australian Corps boundaries being now - on the North the River SOMME, and on the South a line from W.l.b.76 along North side of railway to 0.35.a.70, thence West along grid line through 0.34.central to N.31.central. BERTANGLES.	8th		During the last 8 or 10 days active Counter-battery work and harassing fire has been maintained but fire has all been from old positions, which would not be utilised to-day. The increase in the number of guns on the front has been carefully concealed. All movements of artillery into the Corps area have been carried out during the hours of darkness when guns have been moved forward and ammunition brought up. At 5.20 a.m. this morning an attack in conjunction with the III Corps on the North and the Canadian Corps on the South was launched on this Corps front - Field and Heavy Artillery firing a barrage as detailed in the Artillery Instructions and barrage maps already appended. High velocity guns have also been fairly active, mainly on BAYONVILLERS and HARBONNIERES. Our artillery has carried out harassing fire on all suspected and known hostile battery positions. A programme of general harassing fire on villages, roads, bridges, valleys, approaches, and centres of activity in the enemy's lines was also carried out. The operation referred to in Artillery Instructions Nos. 256 and 257 has been postponed sine die. Field Artillery barrage maps for this operation have therefore been withdrawn from all units.	
	15th		Hostile shelling has keen maintained its activity. This morning the neighbourhood of FRAMERVILLE and VAUVILLERS and the areas X.4, 9 and 10 were shelled with Blue and Yellow Cross gas, Mustard gas shelling in R.3 was also reported. The MORCOURT valleys and battery forward areas generally have received considerable attention. Our fire has been very strong and directed on all possible targets. 	20th		Hostile fire shews a slight decrease in volume, but in nature is much the same. The 32nd Divnl.Artillery reinforced the front in 'B' Sector - the command of the Artillery in that Sector passed to the C.R.A. 32nd Division at 10.0 a.m. this morning. 8th Brigade R.G.A. withdrew to wagon lines last night preparatory to muingxxx moving to another Army. After the attack a brisk re-action developed at several points along our front. Battery areas have been rather heavily harassed during the period especially those South of VAUVILLERS and in the valleys South of MORCOURT. A little gas shelling during the night was also reported. Support was given by our Artillery to the operation of the 3rd Australian Division North of the SOMME by a barrage, intensive counter battery work and harassing of selected areas. Other fire during the period has consisted of intense harassing fire, including gas concentrations and the neutralisation and destruction of hostile batteries. At 12 noon today the Australian Corps took over from the Canadian Corps their sector at present held by the 4th Canadian Division. The following Artillery passed from G.O.C.R.A. Canadian Corps to G.O.C.R.A. Aust. Corps lat and 4th Canadian Divisional Artilleries, 8th Army Brigade C.F.A., 12th Divnl.Arty. and Canadian Corps Heavy Artillery. The Southern Boundary of the Australian Corps, that is the Boundary between the Australian Corps and the 31st French Corps is now LA CHAVETTE- LIANCOURT - FOSSE, HERBY - NESSE (all exclusive to Aust. Corps.)	
	23rd		Until the attack was launched this morning, hostile Artillery was active along the whole Corps front. Before Zero enemy guns carried out intense harassing fire, especially on our front line system in the PROYART sector. Latterly a diminution in the fire of 15 c.m. guns has been noticeable, whilst increased activity on the part of 7.7 c.m. guns and 10.5 c.m. howitzers has been apparent. A not unlikely explanation being, that after his losses on August the 8th the enemy found it necessary to increase the 15 c.m. guns on this front until he was able to replace his Field Artillery, and that this has now been effected. Support to the Infantry attack South of the SOMME today was given by a Field Artillery barrage (reference Barrage map already appended), by heavy Artillery bringing concentrated fire to bear upon selected positions such as trenches, machine gun centres, approached, valleys, possible assembly points, command ground, and centres of activity generally, and by strong counter batter work involving 71 hostile battery areas. ARTILLERY INSTRUCTIONS No.249 by G.O.C.R.A. AUSTRALIAN CORPS.

1st August 1918.

ARTILLERY PLAN.

1. At a date and time to be notified later the Australian Corps will attack the enemy positions on the front bounded on the North by the River SOMME inclusive, and on the South by the VILLERS BRETONNEUX - GUILLANCOURT Railway exclusive.

This attack will be extended on the North by the III Corps, and on the South by the Canadian Corps.

2. The initial attack will be launched by two Divisions, to be known hereafter as "C" and "D" Divisions with dividing line between Divisions in accordance with the maps already issued.

The second and final objectives will be carried by two Divisions to be known hereafter as "A" and "B" Divisions.

One Division will be retained in Corps Reserve, and will be known as "E" Division.

The allotment of Field Artillery will be as follows :-

(i) Initial Objective. (GREEN LINE).

- 3. The artillery will co-operate in such manner as to conform with the movements of the DivisionScarrying out the three phases of the attack, which are :-
 - (i) The capture of the GREEN LINE which is roughly at a distance of 3500 yards East of our present front line system, and is so arranged as to include the capture of the enemy guns emplaced in the valley CERISY ABANCOURT.
 - (ii) The advance beyond the GREEN LINE to the RED LINE, an approximate distance of 2000 yards.
 - (iii) The exploitation of the area East of the RED LINE, and, if possible, the capture of the enemy defences on the grid between the "Q" and "R" squares to be known as the BLUE LINE.

4. Capture of the GREEN LINE.

"c" and "D" Divisions attack this line, supported by two groups of Field Artillery each consisting of 9 Brigades :-

- (i) The Infantry advance to the GREEN LINE will be covered by a Field and Heavy Artillery barrage organised in depth. (Maps to follow) It will be the duty of the Commanders of "C" and "D" Divisional Artilleries, as constituted for the initial attack, to emplace this artillery in such a manner as to render it capable of providing a creeping barrage from the Artillery Start Line to a distance 500 yards East of the GREEN LINE.
- (ii) On arrival at the GREEN LINE plus 400 yards the barrage halts, forming a protector to the Infantry during their consolidation, for a period of 30 minutes.
- (iii) During the halt on the GREEN LINE "A" and "B" Divisions advance with the intention of moving through "O" and "D" Divisions, their Divisional Artillery accompanying them, and in addition the 6th Army Brigade A.F.A. and the 16th Army Brigade R.H.A. have been allotted respectively to these Divisional Artilleries. These Brigades will be so disposed as to be capable of closely supporting the advance to the RED LINE.
 - (iv) Arrangements will be made in the Barrage Plan to admit of the removal of the Artillery mentioned in (iii) without materially affecting the defence of the GREEN LINE.

5. Capture of the RED LINE.

- (i) Prior to the movement of our Infantry to the RED LINE the field gun fire ceases. Long range harassing fire by Heavy Artillery continues.
- (ii) The Artillery mentioned in para. 4 (iii) will support the Infantry advance by fire with direct observation, and Brigades of Field Artillery will be allotted to Brigades of Infantry in the attack, thus forming Brigade Groups.
- (111) One Battery of 60-pounders will be placed under the orders of each "A" and "B" Divisions.
- (iv) When "A" and "B" Divisions advance to attack the RED LINE the following six Brigades move under the orders of "A" and "B" Divisions respectively, to positions from which they can cover the RED LINE.

6. Capture of the BLUE LINE.

- (i) When captured, the RED LINE will be consolidated by two Infantry Brigades each from "A" and "B" Divisions, whilst the remaining Infantry Brigades advance to the BLUE LINE; the Artillery of "A" and "B" Divisions moving to such positions as will cover their forward movement.
- (ii) 60-pounders and 6-inch guns continue to harass centres of likely assembly and approach in back areas.
- (iii) When the BLUE LINE is captured, the whole of the Field Artillery, less "E" Divisional Artillery, is to be in such positions as can cover its consolidation.
- 7. The disposal of the Artillery allotted to "E" Division is placed in the hands of the Corps, and will be allotted as the battle develops.
- 8. When the GREEN LINE has been captured, the Heavy Howitzers move as opportunity offers to such positions as will admit of the final objective being covered effectively.

ARTILLERY INSTRUCTIONS No.250 by G.O.C.R.A. AUSTRALIAN CORPS.

1st August 1918.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS BEARING ON THE ATTACK REFERRED TO IN ARTILLERY INSTRUCTIONS No.249.

1. The operation referred to is entirely dependent for its success on the enemy being kept in complete ignorance of our intentions, or indeed in preventing him from becoming aware of any unusual activity, or even inactivity.

It is essential that the Corps front shall, as nearly as is possible, remain normal. The slightest divergence is liable to create anticipation and suspicion which may lead the enemy to investigate further and so learn our plans.

2. Next in importance to being normal is to admit of as few Officers and men being in possession of important information until the last possible moment.

It should be remembered that civilians are liable to gain intelligence from troops in back areas and thus pass information through enemy agents.

Remember "Walls have ears"

3. The most carefully thought out orders and perfectly framed instructions alone will not ensure the degree of secrecy desired.

Commanding Officers must, therefore, detail Officers who will, both day and night, move over their areas in order to ensure that the orders are being obeyed.

These Officers will not hesitate to have very stringent disciplinary action taken in cases of carelessness or disobedience.

It must be emphasized upon all ranks that on the secrecy of this operation depends the lives of their comrades.

4. When additional Units arrive, their wagon lines should be chosen and maintained in areas as far back as possible ready for moving to the forward areas on the night of the attack.


No extra movement of guns or wagons is to occur by day.

5. Guns are to be calibrated, battery positions resected, and guns placed in position and left strictly without any movement in their vicinity by day.

No registrations are to be carried out which would in any way divulge the fact that now batteries are in position.

- 6. The issue of maps and orders is to be reduced to the absolute minimum, the normal distribution of which should be closely checked.
- 7. Normal harassing fire is to be adhered to until Zero hour. This can be accomplished by leaving Sections in old positions until the last moment.
- 8. C.R.A's of "A" and "B" Divisions will arrange for gun teams and firing battery wagons to move from wagon lines in time to arrive at Battery positions at the time specified for the capture of the GREEN LINE. Batteries of these Brigades should be ready to move forward immediately the first objective is gained.

The



The batteries first to move will be so superimposed in the creeping barrage as to allow of their being withdrawn without leaving gaps in the protective barrage when they lift off.

9. C.R.A's will make every effort to see that the Officers under their command study the country from O.P's, maps, aeroplane photographs, etc., so that they will be familiar with the country over which they will be called upon to advance.

Routes should be thought out and marked on plans shewing the likely lines of advance and the probable areas to be occupied.

- 10. In order to facilitate the passage of obstacles, both Field Artillery and 60-pounder batteries will carry a supply of trench bridges, wire cutters, fascines and hurdles; distributed to Units in accordance with likely requirements.
- 11. Steps must be taken to ensure that sufficient telephone wire is taken forward in order to cope with immediate needs.

The arrangements for F.O.O's and the provision of C.W. sets and their employment is to be exploited to the fullest possible degree.

It is pointed out that the proposed movement anticipates a far greater advance than has heretofore taken place, consequently reliance must be placed at the outset upon visual and improvised means of communication. The ground lends itself for this purpose especially on our Northern flank.

12. Care is to be taken to avoid incoming units unnecessarily using new telephone systems except for testing purposes.

Similarly no new wireless sending sets are to be used prior to Zero hour.

- 13. The greatest care is to be exercised-in camouflaging any position prior to work commencing upon it. Tracks, if made, should not converge but should be made to pass-selected positions.
- 14. Instructions will be issued separately in regard to the supply of ammunition prior to and during the operation.



AMMUNITION.

Reference Artillery Instructions Nos. 249 and 250

of 1-8-1918.

FORWARD DUMPS. 1.

(1) C.R.A's will select sites forward of their present battery positions for dumps to be established which will act as A.R.P's. On the commencement of the advance of the Artillery the D.A.C's will move up and dump ammunition at these points and them proceed to original battery positions to collect the unexpended rounds which they will dump at these A.R.P's.

(2) As far as possible these sites should be selected with a view

to their being accessible by motor transport.

(3) On vacating original battery positions a gunner must be sent from each battery to the selected A.R.P. to act as a guide to the wagons told off to collect the ammunition from the particular battery position. He can also supply the information as regards amount of ammunition to be collected.

(4) An Officer should be specially told off to take charge of each

of these forward A.R.P's.

(5) No ammunition will be dumped at these points prior to the

advance of the Infantry.

(6) It is suggested that these temporary A.R.P's should be selected on the scale of one per Divisional Artillery, and one for the Army Brigades attached to each Divisional Artillery Group.

(7) Heavy Artillery will select A.R.P's on similar lines.

2. AMMUNITION TO BE HELD AT GUNS.

(1) At Zero hour on the day of the attack the following ammunition will be held at battery positions (exclusive of echelons) :-

18-pdr. ... 600 rds.per gun. 8" How. ... 400 rds.per gun. 4.5" How... 500 9.2" How. ... 400 do. do. 6" How. ... 400 do. 12" How. ... 200 do. 60-pdr. ... 400 do. 6" Gun. ... 400 do.

(2) As large a percentage of 106 fuzes as possible will be held for 4.5" Hows.

(3) 25% of Shrapnel will be held in pits for 18-pdrs. Echelons will carry 50% Shrapnel and 50% H.E.

3. GAS SHELL.

(1) Very little of this will be required. Each D.A. Group should have 2000 rounds distributed amongst their Howitzer batteries. (2) 6" How.batteries should have a total of 12000 rounds amongst them.

(3) SMOKE. 10 rounds per 18-pdr gun and 4.5" How. will be held in each battery at the pits.

ARTILLERY INSTRUCTIONS No.252 by G.O.C.R.A. AUSTRALIAN CORPS. APPENDIX 4

2nd August 1918.

FURTHER GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS BEARING ON THE ATTACK REFERRED TO IN ARTILLERY INSTRUCTIONS No.249.

1. In order not to discharge our plans, it will be necessary to rely largely upon theory than actual trial for the accuracy of our barrage. Infinite pains must therefore be taken to use every means at our disposal in order to ensure greatest accuracy.

The following notes are reiterated as they have been found valuable on previous occasions :-

- (i) The exact fixation of the battery positions by the Field Survey Coys., and the checking of lines by direct means. The latter will probably be possible in view of the semi-covered positions batteries are likely to occupy.
- (ii) The exact height of batteries to be checked and the accuracy of contours as far as possible ensured.
- (iii) Gun platforms with trail butts should be constructed,
 - (iv) An Officer is to be specially detailed at each Battery to check with a Field Clinometer the Q.E. when laid on the "Start Line", on each subsequent lift, and while on the final "protective barrage". A 'Q.E.' column will be added to the ordinary 'switch' and 'range' columns of each battery "Barrage Table".
 - (v) The whole barrage procedure will be rehearsed and checked (without firing) by each battery as often as practicable before Zero day.
 - (vi) The 'angle of sight' will vary considerably during the progress of the barrage. This must be carefully calculated and necessary relative 'corrector' correction made.
- (vii) A corrector length must be used which will give 50% of time shell on graze.
- (viii) 18-pounders are not to use 106 Fuzes in the barrage, either when moving or standing; nor at any time when firing within 400 yards of our Infantry in the open.
 - (ix) Ammunition for the actual barrage is to be carefully sorted and arranged by 'lots' of fuzes and propellants.

 The number of Time Shrapnel, H.E. and Smoke required for each lift is to be unmistakably and conveniently arranged with the time fuzes of the former set and checked.
 - (x) Sights are to be tested immediately previous to Zero day.
 - (xi) The closest attention is to be paid to atmospheric conditions.





2. NOMENCLATURE OF FIELD ARTILLERY.

The following terms will be applied to the Field Artillery Brigades taking part in the operation :-

3. OBJECTIVES.

With reference to paragraph 3 (ii) of Artillery Instructions No.249 of 1st August, for '2000' yards read '6000' yards.

4. PROTECTIVE BARRAGE. CAPTURE OF GREEN LINE.

On arrival at the GREEN LINE the Protective Barrage will continue for a period of 15 minutes without moving. After this poriod the Field Artillery will search forward to a distance not exceeding 1000 yards in the form of bursts of fire until plus 4 hours when fire will cease and the further advance of our Infantry to the RED LINE will be supported by the Field Artillery Brigades and 60-pounder Batteries specially detailed for that purpose. This cancels paragraph 4 (ii) of Artillery Instructions No.249 of 1st August.

5. FIELD AND HEAVY ARTILLERY POSITIONS TO COVER FINAL OBJECTIVE.

- (i) After the advance to the RED LINE the area East of the GREEN LINE is allotted to Field Artillery, and the area West of that line to Heavy Artillery.
- (ii) Should circumstances arise which prevent the emplacement of Artillery in accordance with the above, reference is first to be made to Corps R.A. before any position is occupied which does not conform to the instructions contained in sub-para. (i) above.

6. ANTI-TANK GUNS.

Arrangements are to be made for anti-tank guns to move to new positions to cover the final line of consolidation immediately its position is known.

7. MOVEMENT ON NIGHT PRIOR TO OPERATION.

D.A. and H.A. Commanders will arrange routes and times for any necessary movement of guns or wagons on the night prior to the operation in such manner as not to interfere with the approach march of the Infantry. The least possible possible traffic should take place on this night. A plan is being prepared by the C.E. showing the routes which will probably be available in the captured area.



8. MARKING OF PROPOSED POSITIONS.

Headquarters of Artillery Brigades and Battery positions chosen but not immediately occupied are to be clearly marked by boards which will indicate the units for which they are reserved. Similarly, proposed A.R.P's and Dumps are to be clearly marked,

the routes to which must be known to all concerned.

These instructions especially apply to units whose arrival in the area takes place shortly prior to the date set out for the operation to take place.

9. DUMPING AMMUNITION.

Ammunition is not to be dumped forward of existing A.R.P's during the hours of daylight.

Every endeavour is to be made to complete dumping ammunition in Battery positions on the night 5th/6th August.

10. WATERING HORSES.

The times and places for watering horses are to be so regulated as not to expose abnormally large numbers, at any given time, to possible enemy observation.

11. SELECTION OF WAGON LINE SITES.

Wagon lines are to be chosen with a view to concealment from view, or placed as far as possible in areas lately occupied.

ARTILLERY INSTRUCTIONS No. 253 by G.O.C.R.A. AUSTRALIAN CORPS.

3rd August 1918.

FURTHER GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS BEARING ON THE ATTACK REFERRED TO IN ARTILLERY INSTRUCTIONS No. 249.

BARRAGE. 1.

(I) FIELD ARTILLERY.

Times, lifts and distances of the Field Artillery barrage will be carried out in accordance with the barrage map issued herewith.

(a) The 18-pdr barrage will open at Zero, 200 yards in front of the Infantry "Forming-up" Line. At Zero plus 3 minutes the barrage will commence to advance: lifts will be 100 yards at 2 minute intervals. There will be two lifts at this rate.

The rate of lift will then decrease to 100 yards in 3 minutes: there will be eight lifts at this rate.

On the eleventh lift inclusive until the GREEN LINE is reached, lifts will be 100 yards each at 4 minute intervals.

- (b) The 4.5" Howitzer barrago will move 200 yards in advance of the 18-pounder barrage.
- (c) The Protective Barrage will be maintained in front of the GREEN LINE until Zero plus 240 minutes, when all barrage fire will cease.

As each gun arrives at the Protective Barrage line 3 rounds of Smoke will be fired in quick succession.

15 minutes after the Protective Barrage line is reached 50% of guns will search to a distance not exceeding 1000 yards East of that line in bursts of fire.

(d) Rates of fire will be :-

18-pounders. Zero to Zero plus 51 minutes .--- Rapid. Zoro plus 51 minutes to Zero plus 87 minutes. ----- Intense. Zero plus 87 minutes until arrival at the Protective Barrage line. ----- Rapid. Whilst on Protoctive Barrage line. ----- Slow. Guns searching East from the Protective Barrage line, in bursts of fire .---- Rapid.

4.5" Hows. Zero to Zero plus 51 minutos .--- Rapid. Zero plus 51 minutes to Zero plus 87 minutes. ----- Intense. Zero plus 87 minutes until arrival at the Protective Barrage line. ----- Rapid. Whilst on Protective Barrage line, and whilst searching .--- Normal.

On arrival of the barrage on the 'Lift' Zero plus 51 minutes, and until Zero plus 87 minutes, the rate of fire

fire is quickened in order to increase the volume of fire in the Valley CERISY-ABANCOURT where the majority of the hostile batteries opposite our front are sited.

The rate of fire on the Protective Barrage will be reduced to one round per gun per minute after firing 3 rounds Smoke.

(e) Ammunition.

18-pounders. Start Line.

3 rounds Smoke in the proportion of 1 in 3 will

be fired.

From Start Lino to Protoctive Barrage line.

H.E. with delay fuzes.

During Protective Barrage, and in the advance to the BLUE LINE.

75% Shrapnel, 25% H.E.

4.5" Howitzers.

106 Fuzes throughout.

(II) HEAVY ARTILLERY.

- Bombardments. No uniform creeping barrage will be laid down for the Heavy Artillery. Guns available will be employed on various trench systems, strong points, and centres of likely activity. Lifts from these points will be made at times to ensure that a distance of 600 yards is always maintained East of the 18-pdr barrage line. A map shewing these targets in zones and giving the times of lifts from each zone will be compiled by the B.G.H.A.
- (b) Rates of fire will be as laid down in Hoavy Artillery orders.
- (c) Counter-Battery. About two-thirds of the Heavy Artillery will be allotted for counter-battery work. Orders will be compiled in conjunction with the barrage map shewing clearly the times when counter-battery guns are to lift from the enemy batteries which are being engaged in the areas over which our Infantry will pass, until they reach their final objective.


In order to assist in compiling the instructions in regard to the Heavy Artillery bombardment map and counter-battery programme, information will be furnished later shewing the times at which Infantry will reach certain intermediate lines between the GREEN LINE and the BLUE LINE.

2. 'S.O.S.' AND COUNTER-PREPARATION PLANS.

Definite schemes for 'S.O.S.' lines and counter-preparation must be prepared by the B.G.H.A. and C.R.A's 4th and 5th Australian Divisions so that these schemes can be put into force on the arrival of the Infantry on the final objective.

3. COMMAND.

- (i) At Zero plus 240 minutes the responsibility for the battle front passes to the G.O.C. 5th Australian Division on the Right Sector, and to the G.O.C. 4th Australian Division on the Left Sector.
- (ii) The 5th and 4th Australian Divisions are timing their advance so that leading troops cross the GREEN LINE at Zero plus 240 minutes.



4. ADVANCE AFTER THE CAPTURE OF THE GREEN LINE.

- (i) It will be borne in mind that "Offensive Brigades" (as detailed in Artillery Instructions No.252, para.2) will cease firing in the barrage as soon as they have fired 3 rounds of Smoke on the Protective Barrage line, and will act in accordance with Artillery Instructions No.249 para.4, sub-para.(iii).
- (ii) "Defensive Brigades" (as detailed in Artillery Instructions No.252, para.2) will draw out ready to move to cover the RED LINE at Zero plus 240 minutes in accordance with Artillery Instructions No.249, para.5, sub-para.(iv).

ARTILLERY INSTRUCTIONS No.254 by

G.O.C.R.A. AUSTRALIAN CORPS.

5th August 1918.

WIRELESS MASTS. 1.

(a) J.R.A's will detail at least one battery per Group (4.5" How. or 18-pdr.) to answer NF, GF, and LL calls during the period Zero to Zero plus 240 minutes. Those calls will be answered with three minutes' "INTENSE" from each battery by all the guns that can bear.

Arrangements will be made to prevent gaps being caused in the Larrago when these calls are answered.

(b) For use after the GREEN LINE has been captured, one battery of each of the "Offensive" and "Defensive" Brigades shall be allotted a wireless mast which is to be erected immediately the battery comes into action, ready to take calls from tho air. In the case of LL or GF calls being received the message should, when possible, be passed to adjacent batteries.

This latter is a precaution in case messages are not received through the Brigade.

The "Offensive" and "Defensive" Brigades should be given preference in the distribution of masts when spares exist.

AMMUNITION. 2.

- (a) In case of unforeseen circumstances arising, arrangements are to be made whereby ammunition columns of "Offensive" and "Defensive" Brigades can be diverted from the pre-arranged advanced dumps in such manner as to enable battery positions to be replenished in their original sites.
- (b) Reserve Brigades are to have a minimum of 150 rounds per 18-pdr gun and 100 rounds per 4.5" Howitzer at battery positions at Zerc plus 240 minutes. This may be on wheels

- * (a) J.R.A's will arrange for four Field Artillery Brigades, or an equivalent number of guns, to fire on 'S.O.S.' lines at any time up to Zero minus fifteen minutes.
 - (b) From Zero minus fifteen minutes until Zero hour 'S.O.S.' arrangements will be inoperative.

4. ZERO HOUR.

Zero hour will be notified in writing from Australian Corps Headquarters by noon on the day prior to Zero.





13th August 1918.

Further to Artillery Instructions No.256.

. 1. BARRAGE.

(a) The 18-pdr barrage will open at Zero on a line 200 yards East of the "Infantry forming up line".

At Zero plus 3 minutes the barrage will lift and move forward at the rate of 100 yards in 3 minutes for 3 lifts.

The rate of lifts will then decrease to 100 yards in 4 minutes until the "Infantry halt line protective barrage line" (400 yards East of the "Infantry halt line") is reached.

Fire will be maintained on this line for a period of 15 minutes, when fire will cease.

As each Brigade arrives on the "Flank protective barrage line" 50% of the guns will be used on this line, the other 50% searching for a distance of 1000 yards beyond. This fire will cease 30 minutes after each Battery arrives on this line.

The "Flank protective barrage line" may be taken to extend from North to South as far as a point in line with the "Infantry halt line". Beyond this point the line is known as "Infantry Halt Line Protective Barrage Line".

(b) The 4.5" Howitzer barrage will conform to the lifts and times of the 18-pdr barrage, but will move 200 yards in advance of it.

Each gun will fire 3 rounds of Smoke on the "Artillery Start Line"; and subsequently 15% of Smoke will be used throughout the barrage.

(c) Smoke Barrage.

The C.R.A. 2nd Australian Division will arrange for a Smoke barrage to be placed from Zero to Zero plus 60 along the line S.8.central to S.16, and from Zero plus 60 to Zero plus 140 along the line from S.16 to S.24.

(d) Rates of fire.

18-pdrs. Zero to Zero plus 3 minutes. 4 rounds p.g.p.m.

ADVANCE TO CAPTURE OF MAIN OBJECTIVE. APPENDIX

C.R.A's 4th and 5th Australian Divisions will each detail three Brigades to support the Infantry advance from the Halt Line to the main objective.

These Brigades will move as follows :-

- (a) 1 Brigade from each D.A. will cease firing in the barrage at Zero plus 90 minutes and will immediately move to closely support the advance.
- (b) 2 Brigades from each D.A. will advance at Zero plus 140 minutes to such positions as will enable them to cover the Final objective.

These Brigades come under the command of Divisions concerned at Zero plus 90 and Zero plus 140 respectively.

The three remaining Brigades of the 4th and 5th Australian Divisional Artilleries will come into Corps Reserve at Zero plus 140 minutes under command of the C.R.A. 1st Australian Division from that hour. They will be disposed as the battle demands.

COMMAND. 3.

The C.R.A's 4th., 5th and 2nd Australian Divisions will be responsible for the emplacement of their Artillery in such manner as to carry out the tasks required by these instructions.

In the case of the 4th and 5th Divisional Artilleries, responsibility for the defence of the front will pass to them concurrently

with that of the Divisions concerned.

In the shorter ranges in which H.E. is used, delay fuzes; and in the longer ranges non delay fuzes age to be used as far as possible.

1. HEAVY ARTILLERY.

An operation is being carried out in conjunction with the III Corps on a date and at a time to be notified later.

The attached map gives the times of lifts, etc. of the III Corps barrage, and also shows the objective lines.

The Heavy Artillery will assist in this operation mainly with counter-battery work, assisting the III Corps as much as possible; and at the same time protecting the advance of our own troops.

The bombardment of strong points and harassing of roads and approaches, O.P's, etc. will be directed East of our final objective line. The area to be captured being dealt with by Field Artillery alone.

(a) The 18-pdr barrage will open at Zero on the Artillery Start Line 200 yards East of the Infantry Forming Up Line. At Zero plus 3 minutes the barrage will lift at the rate of 100 yards in 2 minutes for 3 lifts (except as shewn on barrage map for the first 4 lifts on the extreme right flank)

From the 4th lift inclusive the barrage will lift at the rate of 100 yards in 3 minutes up to the Protoctive Barrage to the Infantry Halt Line where it halts from Zero plus 48 to Zero plus 63.

At Zero plus 63 the barrage will advance at the rate of 100 yards in 3 minutes until arrival at the Protective Barrage Line to the final objective.

As each battery arrives at the Protector to the final objective the barrage halts, and after firing for 15 minutes ceases fire. All fire ceases at Zero plus 105 minutes unless asked to continue by Divisions concerned.

- (h) The 4.5" Howitzer barrage will conform to the lifts and times of the 18-pdr barrage, but will move 200 yards East of the 18-pdr line.

2. SMOKE SCREENS.

The C.R.A. 'D' Divisional Sector will arrange to place a Smoke screen along the line L.17.c.5.0 to L.24.a.5.0 from Zero to Zero plus 105 minutes.

3. ADVANCE. 'S.O.S.' and COUNTER PREPARATION.

When the Final Objective has been captured, in order to place effectively the 'S.O.S.' and to admit of Counter Preparation being put into force, C.R.A's and B.G.H.A. will arrange to advance Field and Heavy Artillery in depth to conform with that line.

4. HEAVY ARTILLERY.

Detailed instructions will be issued by the B.G.H.A. as regards engaging points of importance within the area to be captured, conforming to the lifts as laid down in the Field Artillery Barrage Map.

Approximately two-thirds of the Heavy Artillery will be allotted for Counter-Battery work. Counter-Battery work will commence at Zero hour.

All routes of approach, assembly points, etc. boyond the objective line will be kept under fire from Zero to Zero plus 120 minutes, when it will cease if instructions to the contrary are not received.

5. ZONE CALLS.

C.R.A's will detail at least one battery per Group (4.5" How. or 18-pdr.) to answer NF, GF, and LL calls during the period Zora to Zero plus 105 minutes. These calls will be answered with three minutes' "INTENSE" from each battery by all the guns that can boar.

Arrangements will be made to prevent gaps Leing caused in the tarrage when these calls are answered.




