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


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

BARLEUX	15th		Increased activity on the part of hostile Artillery is very marked. ROISEL and its vicinity - especially the valleys to the North and South where a number of our batteries are - have been subjected to almost continuous harassing fire, interspersed by frequent brief concentrations of considerable density. Various calibres have been employed, including 21 cm. howitzers. The free use of 10 cm. guns has also been noticed. High velocity guns generally have exhibited a decided increase in activity, operations upon villages and roads both in back and forward areas. Gas shelling mixed with H.E. was reported in MARQUAIX and K.17 23 during the night. Heavy harassing fire has brought to bear upon all known and suspected hostile battery areas throughout the period. In conjunction with the Corps on our left a heavy concentration was put down upon the quarries in F.27.c. and L.3.a. and b. this morning. Strong harassing fire has been carried out as usual, and movement and other targets engaged as opportunities were presented. 69th Brigade R.G.A. was transferred to-day from IX Corps to Australian Corps. 232nd Army Brigade R.F.A. marched into Australian Corps area to-day and are allotted to the 4th Aust. and 1st. Aust. Divisions respectively. Artillery Instructions Nos. 264 and 265 issued.	2 & 3.
	16th		Vigorous shelling on our front has again taken place throughout the period. Locations give a rearward tendence and ground observers confirm that during the past 2 days, enemy guns appear to be firing at longer ranges. ROISEL and vicinity has again received considerable attention while the active counter battery work carried out by the enemy has been very noticeable. Many NF calls have been answered and all known and suspected battery areas have been heavely harassed throughout the period. Harassing fire has also been strongly maintained on roads, valleys, woods, villages and communications generally. 41st Brigade R.G.A. marched into Australian Corps area last night and came under the orders of the B.G.H.A. Aust. Corps. Artillery Instructions No. 266 issued.	4.

In support off the attack this morning a barrage was put down by Field Artillery in accordance with the Barrage map and Artillery Instructions already appended. Heavy Artillery support consisted of :- 1. Destructive bombardment of strong points, to the assault. 2. A deep EXEMENTAR rolling belt of concentrated fire, covering centres of resistance strong points, headquarters and commanding ground - fire being finally lifted on to the Observation Posts and assembly areas within the HINDENBURG defences. 3. Vigorous counter battery work.	
			The areas for Counter battery fire were selected partly from information derived from current locations, partly from considerations of terrain, of evidence obtained from captured documents, and of probalities based on experience gained from the examination of actual hostile positions since our advance from 8th August to the present time. The programme was arranged so that full advantage could be taken of calls from the air occurring during the period of bombardment. After the operation many targets were engaged at the request of the Infantry, harassing fire on forward areas carried out, machine gun pests were engaged, harassing fire by 6" guns was directed on enemy communications, especially railways. The Field Artillery for the operation was allotted as follows: Right Sector. C.R.A. 4th Aust. Division. 4th Aust. Divnl. Arty., 6th Army Brigade A.F.A., 5th Aust. Divil. 	Plst		Although a number of instances of heavy fire have occurred, a general decrease in hostile fire has been reported. The reaction during the operation by the 1st Australian Division this morning consisted of a Field Gun barrage upon L.12 and L.18. Later in the morning G.7 and G.14 were vigorously shelled. The 10 cm guns have been active throughout the period. The minor operation this morning (in conjunction with operation of III Corps) was supported by Field and Heavy Artillery. 	24th		Hostile artillery activity shews a slight decrease for the period. VILLERET has been irregularly harassed throughout by 15 and 10.5 cm. Howitzers firing a proportion of gas during the night. The vicinity of HARGICOURT has been subjected to harassing fire especially the Sunken road in L.4.a and c. North West of the village. The TINCOURT - ROISEL road has been harassed by 15 cm. guns. Harassing fire has been placed on all known and suspected hostile bty areas. Several hostile batteries have also been successfully engaged with ground observation. Other fire has been distributed on the various enemy defences and zones of activity. A farm in A.29.c round which movement had been noticed, was engaged with good results, one of the first rounds obtained a direct hit on the farm, and men were seen to run from it. On definite lines where the enemy contemplated making a strong resistance, fire has been naturally heavy. Reports shew that these lanes with one exception, were well out, and provided good passage for the Infantry. 1. The Australian Corps intends to attack the enemy positions on the general line TEMPLEUX le MAISSEMY at a time and date to be GUERARD notified later.

The attack will be carried out on a two Divisional front, the 1st Australian Division attacking on the left, the 4th Australian Division on the right.

The attack of the III Corps on our left and of the IX Corps on our right is timed simultaneously with our own.

2. The attack will take place under a Field Artillery barrage. Map shewing times and distances of lifts will be issued later. After the capture of the Final Objective the success will be exploited. The exploitation will be supported by Field Artillery specially allocated for the task.

3. A Halt Line has been arranged upon which the Artillery barrage will halt for a minimum period of one hour (BROWN Line G.S.Map) During this halt, Field Artillery Brigados - the guns of which will be out of range on the Final Objective, will move forward to new positions from which to continue the support of the advance to the RED Line.

A proportion of Heavy Artillery will also move forward during this halt into such positions as to be capable of engaging hostile batteries which have been emplaced East of the Canal for the defence of the HINDENBURG Line.

4. The B.G.H.A. will, in consultation with Divisional Commanders, arrange to bombard special localities, lifting from these places in conformity with the Barrago Table to be issued later. These lifts will be so arranged as to give no fire within 600 yards of our advancing Infantry.

The usual attention will be paid to known or likely lines of approach or exit, likely assembly areas, O.P's and Headquarters.

The B.G.H.A. will submit his plan accordingly.

1. GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS.

Owing to the distance of the Final Objective from the Field Artillery Start Line, it will be necessary for C.R.A's to emplace Brigades very close to the Infantry Start Line, therefore the following points are again brought to notice:-

- (a) Movement by day in these positions is to be prohibited.
- (b) Careful camouflage of guns when emplaced, and ammunition when dumped, is to be arranged.
- (c) No firing is to take place prior to Zero day from these forward positions.
- (d) Resection of Battery positions is to be carried out.
- (e) Care is to be exercised in determining likely alterations in the angle of sight throughout the barrage.
- (f) Classification of ammunition will be arranged.
- (g) Expenditure of ammunition is not to exceed the allotment in force at the moment on the Corps front.
- (h) Sights are to be tested just prior to Zero day.
- (i) During the operation all sights are to be checked by clinometer.
- (j) Attention is to be paid to atmospheric conditions.

2. MOVEMENT BY DAY.

No abnormal movement is to take place on roads during daylight.

3. WAGON LINES.

Wagon lines are to be selected with a view to concealment from the air.

4. SELECTION OF A.R.P's, etc.

Forward sites for A.R.P's are to thought out, and likely lines of advance considered so far as the information available permits.

5. REHEARSAL OF BARRAGE.

The Barrage procedure is to be rehearsed and checked by each unit at least once prior to the operation taking place, without firing.

6. CORRECTOR LENGTH.

Corrector lengths are to be used which will give 50% of time shell on graze.

17.

EMPLACEMENT OF BRIGADES. 7.

Guns will be emplaced by C.R.A's so as to be capable of placing a barrage from 200 yards East of the Infantry Forming Up Line to 400 yards East of the RED Line.

RECUPERATOR BATTERIES. 8.

Batteries furnished with recuperators will be selected and emplaced by C.R.A's to cope with the most distant objectives.

ADVANCE DURING FIRST HALT.

In the event of Batteries being required to push forward during the first halt in order to efficiently cover the advance to the RED Line, positions will be selected and resected beforehand, if possible.

10. ALLOTMENT OF FIELD AND HEAVY ARTILLERY FOR EXPLOITATION.

- (a) The Divisional Artillery of Divisions concerned will be allotted to assist exploitation beyond the RED Line.
- (b) 15 minutes after guns of the above Brigades arrive on the Protective Barrage to the RED Line, Brigades will wease fire and will advance in close support of the units they have previously boen detailed to cover.
- (c) The C.R.A's will arrange for remaining Brigades of Field Artillery to be prepared to move forward in order to effectively cover the RED Line by at least 1000 yards.
- (d) The B.G.H.A. will instruct affiliated Brigade Commanders to be prepared to move forward the Mobile Artillery of their Brigades to better cope with any task they may be called upon to carry out by the Divisions during exploitation to the BLUE Line.

11. 'S.O.S.' AND COUNTER PREPARATION PLANS.

As zoon as the definite line has been established on which the Infantry intend to consolidate, C.R.A's and B.G.H.A. will draw up details for 'S.O.S.' and Counter Preparation Schemes.

ARTILLERY INSTRUCTIONS No.265 by G.O.C.R.A. AUSTRALIAN CORPS.

15th September 1918.

FURTHER TO OPERATION AS LAID DOWN IN ARTILLERY INSTRUCTIONS No. 263.

1. BARRAGE.

(I) FIELD ARTILLERY.

Times, lifts and distances of the Field Artillery barrage will be carried out in accordance with the Barrage Map issued herewith.

(a) The 18-pdr barrage will open at Zero, 200 yards East of the "Infantry Forming Up Line". At Zero plus 3 minutes the barrage will commence to advance. The first lift will be 100 at this rate. There will only be one lift

The rate of lift will then decrease to 100 yards in three minutes; there will be 9 lifts at this rate.

On the 10th lift inclusive, until the Protector to the "Infantry Halt Line" is reached, the rate of lift will be 100 yards each at 4 minutes interval.

As the barrage arrives on the "Protective Barrage Line" to the "Infantry Halt Line" it will halt till Zero plus 190 minutes. This "Protective Barrage Line" is 300 yards East of the "Infantry Halt Line".

At Zero plus 190 minutes the barrage will advance at the rate of 100 yards each four minutes until it arrives at the "Protective Barrage Line" to the Second Objective where it will the Second Objective.

This "Protective Barrage Line" is 400 yards East of the Second Objective.

Batteries will cease fire 15 minutes after arrival on this "Protective Barrage Line".

(b) The 4.5" Howitzer barrage will move 200 yards East of the 18-pdr barrage.

(c) RATES OF FIRE.

18-pdr. Throughout Creeping Barrage ... Rapid.
On "Protective Barrage Lines" ... Slow.

4.5" How. Throughout Creeping Barrage ... Rapid.
On "Protective Barrage Lines" ... Normal.

Whilst on the Protective Barrage to the Infantry Halt Line 50% of guns will search East.

For three minutes prior to lifting from the Protective Barrage Line to the Infantry Halt Line fire will be increased to 'Rapid'.

(d) AMMUNITION.

18-pdr. Throughout the barrage :- 10% Smoke if available.

If 10% Smoke is not available, H.E. will be used in its place.

4.5" Bow. 10% Smoke if available. 90% H.E. 106 Fuzes.

(II) HEAVY ARTILLERY.

(a) BOMBARDMENT.

No uniform creeping barrage will be laid down for the Heavy Artillery. Guns available will be employed on various trench systems, strong points, and centres of likely activity.

APPENDIX

Lifts from these points will be made in accordance

with instructions already issued.

(b) Rates of fire will be as laid down in Heavy Artillery orders to be issued by B.G.H.A.

(c) COUNTER BATTERY WORK.

The number of batteries allocated for counter battery work cannot be laid down, but will depend on the number of hostile batteries located up to the day prior to Zero.

ZONE CALLS. 2.

C.R.A's will detail at least one battery per Group (4.5" How. or 18-pdr.) to answer 'NF', 'GF' and 'LL' calls during the period Zero to Zoro plus 273 minutes.

Those calls will be answered with three minutes' "INTENSE" from

each battery by all the guns that can bear.

Arrangements will be made to prevent gaps being caused in the barrage when these calls are answered.

FURTHER TO OPERATION AS LAID DOWN IN ARTILLERY INSTRUCTIONS No. 263.

1. HEAVY ARTILLERY LIMIT OF WESTERLY FIRE.

From Zero plus 300 minutes no Heavy Artillery fire will be directed West of the Objective line of exploitation. (BLUE Line).

2. FIELD ARTILLERY IN SUPPORT OF EXPLOITATION.

With reference to Artillery Instructions No.264 of 15th September, paragraph 10, sub-paragraph (b):-

Two Batteries drawn from the Artillery allotted for exploitation on each Divisional front may move out in support of the attack beyond the 2nd Objective (RED Line) after Zero plus 230 minutes.

3. FIELD ARTILLERY TO COVER BLUE LINE.

C.R.A's will arrange, the capture of the 2nd Objective (RED Line), to advance if necessary and emplace all Brigades in such manner as to be capable of effectively covering the objective line of exploitation (BLUE Line).



At times and dates to be notified later the Australian Jorps, with the 2nd American Jorps affiliated, intends to attack the BINDENBURG Line in the Sector NAUROY - GOUY.

operations. The first, or preliminary, attack being dependent on the position of the front line when the new area is taken over from the Northern Corps.

If the front line is in such a position as to make the objective to be gained possible in one operation then the preliminary attack will not be necessary. On the other hand, if the above is not secured it will be necessary to carry out two operations. The first being planned for the capture of positions far enough forward to enable the final objective of the main operation to be carried out under a creeping barrage.

1. PRELITIARY ARTACK.

The preliminary attack will take place under a preeping barrage on a front of about 3000 yards extending from the Northern boundary of the Corps towards the South, and will entail the use of about 9 Brigades of Field Artillery.

This operation will be carried out about 48 hours before the main attack, and will synchronize with the hour set out for the commencement of the Lombardment mentioned later.

On the successful conclusion of this operation, Brigades of Field and Beavy Artillery will be pushed up into positions from which the barrage for the main attack can be carried out.

8. HAIN ATTAJK.

This operation will differ somewhat from those previously carried out on this front, the chief difference being due to the fact that there are many more strong points and trenches prepared for defence, and considerably more wire than has been met with latterly.

This necessitates a definite plan for the bombarding of these trenches and the cutting of wire prior to the day of the main attack.

The main attack is divided into two phases and will be delivered on a front of two Divisions.

(a) 1st Phase.

The 30th American Division on the right and the 27th American Division on the left attack under a creeping barrage accompanied by tanks, and have as their objective the GREEN Line.

(b) 2nd Phase.

After the capture of the GARAN Line, the 5th Australian Division on the right and the 3rd Australian Division on the left pass through the 50th American Division and the 27th American Division respectively in order to exploit towards and capture the RED Line. At the same time troops specially allotted from the 30th and 27th American Divisions exploit Southwards and Northwards respectively East of the TURNEL with a view to broadening the salient.

(a)

(c) The Field Artillery will be allotted as follows :-

- 2 -

Northern Divisional Front. ... 12 Brigades.

Southern Divisional Front. ... 11 Brigades.

Briefly the Field Artillery will be employed as follows :-

9 Brigades will be emplaced on the Northern Divisional Front, and 8 Brigades on the Southern Divisional Front, in such positions so that they can effectively carry out a creeping barrage up to the protector on the Final Objective. (GREEN Line)

Army Brigades, i.e. 3 Brigades on each Divisional Front, will be withdrawn from the line to wagon lines and will constituted the Artillery supporting the two exploiting Divisions. The two Army Brigades, however, will select positions from which they can place an effective enfilade barrage on the flanks of the area attacked on their own Divisional front. They will occupy these positions on the night prior to Attack Day.

The Divisional Brigades will move off with their respective exploiting Divisions to which they have been attached, i.e. one Brigade of Artillery to each of the two Infantry Brigades of its Division.

and. On completion of the flank barrage, the 2 army Brigades will draw out stand by ready to accompany the supporting Infantry Brigade to which it has been allotted as it moves forward in support of the two Infantry Brigades previously mentioned.

4 Brigades of Divisional Artillery will be allotted from the barrage Artillery on completion of the barrage, and ordered to move forward. These Field Artillery Brigades will be attached to the Regiments forming the protective flanks. (2 Field Artillery Brigades on each flank to assist in exploitation to the flanks).

The remainder of the barrage Artillery will remain in their positions under Corps orders and await further instructions.

(a) Special Gas (B.B.) bombardment. (b) Vigorous counter-battery work.

(c) Intense harassing fire.

(d) Cutting lanes in hostile wire defences.

(a) Bombardment of selected strong points and localities.


5. SPECIAL GAS (B.B.) BOMBARDMENT.

This bombardment will be sarried out by 18-pdrs and 6" Howitzers firing "B.B." gas shell, combined with E.E. during intermittent periods between Zero minus 56 hours and Zero minus 46 hours.

The rbjectives will be the hostile defensive system and artillery positions along the Corps front so far as the range of guns permits.

Subsequent to Zero minus 48 hours no "B.E." gas shell will be fired without the authority of the Army.

6. VIGOROUS COUNTER-BATTERY WORK.

This will commence at Zero minus 48 hours. Surprise attacks on hostile battery positions will be carried out with F.E. with Instantaneous Fuzes, and "C.G." and "N.C." gas shell.

For the methodical bombardment of fortified emplacements and

dug-outs, delay action fuzes should be employed.

INTENSE HARASSING FIRE. 7.

This will commence at Zero minus 48 hours immediately after the

cessation of the special gas "B.B." bombardment.

Definite plans will be drawn up by C.R.A's and B.G.B.A. for the direction of this fire. The keynote of its application should be variety and surprise, and plans must be so framed that throughout the 24 hours of the day and night the enemy should be permitted no immunity from shell fire.

Facilities of observation must be fully exploited in order to limit the area in which unobserved harassing fire will have to be maintained by day. Areas over which no observation is possible

must receive special attention.

In order to gain the full advantage from harassing fire, zones in depth are allotted. Field Artillery taking a zone of 2500 yards East of our front line, and Leyond a line 2000 yards East of our front line by Heavy Artillery, thus making an overlap of 500 yards.

Artillery positions are to be included in harassing fire tasks.

In shelling roads, H.E. with delay aution are NOT to be employed.

Use is to be made of gas shell ("C.G." and"N.J.")

CUTTING LANES IN BOSTILE WIRE DEFENCES.

This will commence at Zero minus 48 hours and will be carried out principally with 4.5" Howitzers and 6" Howitzers, and when possible with 6" NEWTON Mortars.

Arrangements should be made with Divisions to keep lanes open by means of rifle and machine gun fire once they have been cut.

BOHEARDHENT OF SELECTED STRONG POINTS AND LOCALITIES. 9.

This bombardment will commence at Zero minus 48 hours and will be continued until Zero hour, with a view not only to the destruction of defences but also to the demoralization of the defenders. Gas shell ("C.G." and "N.J.") are to be made use of.

It is not considered feasible to carry out a thorough destructive combardment of concrete dug-outs and machine gun

emplacements.

The tunnels themselves are impervious to artillery fire. Steps will be taken to concentrate a: heavy and unexpected fire on their entrances and exits on the day of fattle.

Telephone exchanges and specially defended localities such as LE CATELET, BELLICOURT, GOUY, NAUROY and BONY are to heavily bombarded.

O.P's should be engaged towards the latter end of the rombardment.

Blocks in communication trenches will be created where possible.







B.B. GAS BOMBARDMENT.

- 1. A gas bombardment will be carried out prior to the main attack on the HINDENBURG Line, in accordance with paragraph 5 of Artillery Instructions No.267 of 23rd September. The date will be night of 26th September, Zero hour will be notified later.
- 2. The periods of bombardment and periods of rest will be as follows throughout the gas (B.B.) attack, except that Heavy Artillery will continue each bombardment thirty minutes in place of fifteen minutes as ordered for Field Artillery:-

Zero plus 15 minutes to Zero plus 2 hours 15 mins. Rest.

- 5. B.B. Gas Shell only will be employed, and H.E. will be mixed in all cases in the preportion of approximately three gas shell to one H.E.
- 6. Gas Shell other than B.B. are not being mixed owing to the fact that B.B. affords the enemy very little indication of its presence. The mixture of other Gas Shell would at once apprise the enemy of the presence of gas in the area, and would cause him to adjust his mask more readily and thus lossen the effect of B.B.
- 7. H.E. is being mixed with B.B. in order to disguise as much as possible the smaller burst of the gas shell, and in order to lead the enemy to believe he is under a H.E. bombardment only.
- 8. 27 areas have been selected, and sufficient shell allowed to impregnate each one.
- 9. Our troops are safe from a cloud passed from this shell at about one mile if the wind is blowing directly towards them. The best effect is gained in a wind from 10 miles and under, but it can be used with effect in a wind up to 15 miles per hour.
- 10. The bombardment will take effect whatever the weather conditions may be at the time set out for it to commence.
- 11. Watches will be synchronized by Divisional Artilleries and Heavy Artillery four hours and one hour prior to Zero by telephone to Corps Headquarters. Millus carlin

ARTILLEY INSTRUCTION No.269 by G.O.C.R.A., Australian Corps.

24th September 1918.

1. (a) On the 27th September 1918 at a zero hour to be notified later, the preliminary attack referred to in Artillery Instructions No. 267 of 23rd September 1918, para 1, will be carried out by the Left (27th American) Division, with the object of Jaining the Infantry forming up line for the main operation as laid down in para 2 of the above referred to Instruction.

Tanks will co-operate in this attack.

- (b) The 30th American Division on the Right will co-operate with the object of gaining such portions of the Infantry forming up line on their front as they do not yet occupy.
- (c) The III Corps are co-operating in the advance by forming a defensive flank to the North of the 27th American Division.
- 2. BAINTAUE.

The attack of the 27th American Division will be carried out under a Field Artillery barrage. Lifts and distances will be in accordance with the accompanying barrage map.

(a) The 18-pr barrage will open at zero on the Artillery start line

200 yards East of the Infantry forming up line.

At zero plus 3 minutes the barrage will lift at the rate of a hundred yards in three minutes and will continue at this rate until it arrives at the protective barrage line which is 400 yards East of the objective line.

On arrival on the Protective Barrage Line the barrage halts and after firing on this Line for a period of 30 minutes all barrage fire

ceases.

- (b) The 4.5-inch Howitzer barrage will conform to the lifts of the 18-pr barrage but will move 200 yards East of it.
- (c) RATEL OF FIRE.

Throughout creeping Barrage and first 10 minutes on Protective Barrage ... RAPID.

On Protective Darrage to final objective (20 minutes) ... SLOW.

(d) AMMUNITION.

18-pr ... 40% H.E. non delay. 50% Shrapnel.

10% Smoke.

4.5-inch Howitzer H.E. 106 Fuzes.

3. HEAVY ARTILLERY.

Detailed instructions will be issued by B.G.H.A. as regards engaging points of importance within the area to be captured, conforming to the lifts as laid down in the Field Artillery barrage map.

Counter Battery work will commence at zero and as many guns as

possible will be allotted for this purpose.

All routes of approach, assembly points, etc. beyond the Objective Line will be kept under fire from zero to zero plus 75 minutes after which time the bombardment programme for the day will be adhered to.



ARTILLERY INSTRUCTIONS No.270 by G.O.C.R.A. AUSTRALIAN CORPS.



25th September 1918.

1. MAIN ATTACK.

The main attack referred to in Artillery Instructions No.269, paragraph 1, is designed with a view to giving our attacking Infantry the support of a creeping barrage for an average depth from the Artillery Start Line to approximately 4500 yards East.

This depth, although greater than has usually been demanded, is necessary in order to ensure the successful capture, with the maximum of Artillery support, of LE CATELET - GOUY on the North and

NAUROY on the South - two strongly defended areas.

It is essential, therefore, that the utmost care should be exercised in the preparation for the barrage in order to ensure its accuracy.

2. PRELIMINARY PREPARATIONS.

In this operation, as in those lately undertaken, accurate registration from Battle positions is neither possible, owing to the limit of time, nor advisable owing to the likelihood of the enemy gaining information of our plans.

For the above reasons the instructions previously issued are reiterated, and are to be adhered to with the utmost care so far as circumstances permit.

- (a) Positions are to be selected by C.R.A's which will enable a creeping Field Artillery barrage to be placed from the Artillery Start Line to a Protective Barrage Line which will be 400 yards East of the GREEN Line.
- (b) The accurate fixation of the battery positions and accurate determination of the exact height of the site selected are to be arranged.
- (c) Attention is to be directed to likely alterations in the angle of sight during the progress of the barrage.
- (d) The barrage is to be rehearsed without firing, prior to the attack taking place.
- (e) Lines of fire are to be checked by direct means where possible.
- (f) The Field Clinometer is to be employed to check the accuracy of every gun on the Start Line. Throughout the creeping and protective barrages an Officer must be told off to check the guns of his Battery at stated periods by the same means.
- (g) Corrector lengths are to be arranged in order to give 50% of time shell on graze.
- (h) So far as time permits, ammunition is to be sorted by lots and carefully checked and grouped.
- (i) The most careful attention is to be paid to atmospheric conditions.
- (j) It is essential to ensure that sights are tested the day prior to Zero day.

The enemy must be afforded as little opportunity of learning our plans as is humanly possible. This can be ensured by allowing no unnecessary movement by day on roads or at Battery positions.

Reconnaissance Officers are not to be permitted to expose them-

selves or their maps in view of the enemy.

Strict

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Strict attention is to be paid to the use of camouflage on all forward gun positions and dumps, and where work is being carried out the site is to be previously camouflaged.

TELEPHONES. As it is known that the enemy has very effective listening sets installed, vigilance must be exercised in telephone messages sent over lines within 3000 yards of the front line.

No information that would in any way give indication of impending attack, or times and dates of operations, should be sent in 'olear'.

3. ADVANCE AFTER CAPTURE OF GREEN LINE.

C.R.A's commanding Artillery detailed to cover the troops told off for exploitation beyond the GREEN Line will arrange for Brigade Commanders to carefully study from maps, air photographs, and, where possible, from visual observation, the country and routes they are likely to move over during the advance.

Every facility should at once be given for liaison between Infantry Brigadiers and the Artillery Brigade Commanders concerned.

4. FORWARD AMMUNITION DUMPS.

A.R.P's should be chosen, or forward sites selected, with a view to facilitating the supply of ammunition to the positions to be occupied for the main attack.

5. WIRE CUTTING. - BOMBARDHENT OF SELECTED STRONG POINTS AND LOCALITIES.

Plans for the wire cutting and bombardments referred to in paragraphs 8 and 9 of Artillery Instructions No. 267 of 23rd September will be drawn up by B.G.H.A. and C.R.A's concerned, in conjunction with the allotment of ammunition set forth in "Ammunition Instruction issued in conjunction with Artillery Instructions No.267."

PREPARATION TO MEET POSSIBLE ENEMY GAS CONCENTRATION JUST PRIOR TO "Z" DAY.

The B.G.B.A. will arrange to place at the disposal of the C.B.S.O. such guns as are considered necessary in order to meet an enemy gas shell attack just prior to Zero on "Z" Day, and arrangements are to be made which will provide a maximum of counter - battery fire for this purpose.

7. USE OF MOBILE 6" MORTARS.

C.R.A's of Artillery covering exploitation troops will consider the employment of the 6" Newton Tronch Mortars lately prepared for mobile warfare.

8. USE OF SMOKE WITH GAS BY DAY.

When gas shell are used by day they should be mixed with a proportion of smoke shell, thus educating the enemy to adjust his gas masks whenever smoke shell are employed.

9. CORRIGENDUM.

With reference to Artillery Instructions No.269 of 24th September, paragraph 4, for "84th Army Brigade R.F.A." read "86th Army Brigade R.F.A.".





I. FIELD ARTILLERY.

(a) The 18-pdr barrage will open at Zero on a line 200 yards East of the "Infantry Start Line".

At Zero plus 3 minutes the barrage will lift and will move forward at the rate of 100 yards in 3 minutes. There will be 6 lifts at this rate.

The rate of lift will then decrease to 100 yards in 4 minutes until the "Artillery Halt Line" is reached. The barrage halts on this line for a period of 15 minutes, i.e. Zero plus 85 minutes to Zero plus 100 minutes.

Smoke barrages will be placed by Flank Barrage Brigades on positions and for periods as shewn on the barrage map.

(d) RATES OF FIRE.

Throughout creeping barrage :-

18-pdrs. 3 rounds per gun per minute. 4.5" Hows. 2 rounds per gun per minute.

Whilst on protective barrage and "Artillery Halt Line" :-

18-pdrs. and } 1 round per gun per minute.

Except on the "Artillery Halt Line" between A.22.b.13 to A.28.b.40 where it will remain 3 and 2 rounds per gun and howitzer per minute respectively.



15 minutes prior to Zero 'S.O.S.' will be inoperative.

6. ADDENDUM.



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

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ARTILLERY INSTRUCTIONS No.273 by G.O.C.R.A. AUSTRALIAN CORPS.



27th September 1918.

1. ALTERATIONS - AUSTRALIAN CORPS AND IX CORPS SOUTHERN BOUNDARY.

With reference to Artillery Instructions No.272 of 26th September 1918, paragraph 2, first sub-paragraph "Southern Exploitation Sector" delete this sub-paragraph and substitute:-

- (a) The Boundary Line between the IX Corps and Australian Corps will be grid line through G.20.Central, G.21.Central, G.22 Central, G.23.Central, G.24.Central to sunken road in B.19.b. 5,0, thence along sunken road (inclusive to Australian Corps) to H.15.a.4.6, thence due East as shewn on Barrage Map.
- (b) The above boundary will be the dividing line for troops and all Artillery fire, except where the IX Corps barrage overlaps West of the Canal.
- (c) Should the G.O.C. Left Division of the IX Corps find it necessary he will arrange direct with the 30th American Division for this latter Division to cover South of the line referred to in sub-paragraph (a) above, and will at the same time make the necessary arrangements for lifting the IX Corps barrage.

2. ALTERATION IN SOUTHERN LIMITS OF BARRAGE WEST OF CANAL.

The Southern limit of the Australian Corps barrage West of the Canal will be the line G.20.b.5.4 - G.21.b.9.6, thence along road to Canal.

The Australian Corps Smoke Screen along this line will conform to the lifts of the 4.5" Howitzers in the Field Artillery barrage.

3. ENGAGEMENT OF HIGH GROUND EAST OF CANAL.

The B.G.H.A. will arrange for the high ground in G.23.b., G.24.b. and G.18.d. to be kept under fire from Zero, lifting this fire in accordance with the Field Artillery barrage time table.

4. HEAVY ARTILLERY PLAN - MAIN ATTACK.

With reference to Artillory Instructions No.271 of 26th September, paragraph 2 on first page - last line, for "800 yards" read "400 yards".

5. ALLOTMENT OF 18-pdr. BATTERY TO 5th CAVALRY BRIGADE.

'B' Battery 84th Army Brigade R.F.A. (Major BROWN Commanding) will be placed under the command of the G.O.C. 5th Cavalry Brigade from 11.0 a.m. on 'Z' Day.

Detailed instructions will be issued later by G.O.C. 5th Cavalry Brigade to J.R.A. 1st Australian Division for the movements of this Battery.



27th September 1918.

1. With reference to Artillery Instructions No.271 of 26th September, paragraph 1, the "Left" and "Right Divisional Croeping Barrage Brigades" mentioned in Artillery Instructions No.267, paragraph 2 (d), will remain under the command of C.R.A's 1st and 4th Australian Divisions until the Infantry of the 3rd and 5th Australian Divisions have passed Eastwards through troops holding the GREEN Line and until the Artillery covering this Infantry are in such positions as to be capable of supporting their advance.

C.R.A's 1st and 4th Australian Divisions will notify Corps R.A. as soon as this condition exists in order that these Field Artillery Brigades may pass, with the exception of those allotted to the Divisions for exploitation, into Corps Reserve.

When passed to Corps Reserve they Will come under command of C.R.A. 2nd Australian Division.
