A. LOCATION OF MEDICAL UNITS.

3rd L.H.Fld.Amb. Dressing Station at J.40.b., with transport details at Auja Bridgehead.

Ambul. Ambulance Dressing Station moved out of Wadi bed on to high bank in Z.20.d.

Other units unchanged.

B. DISEASES. Percentage of admissions 3.87. Evacuations 3.64

All Brigades of Division over 2%. Analysis of diseases attached Weekly Summary of Sick. Dysentery and diarrhoea show marked decrease this week. Malaria, on the other hand, has almost doubled. N.Y.D. Pyrexia 43 cases; debility 15; diarrhoea 36.

Infectious Diseases.

Malaria is the chief cause. Of a total of 39 diagnosed in the Field, 24 are Malignant and 14 Benign Tertian.

C. SANITATION.

Sanitation during the week has undergone considerable improvement and has been assisted by the arrival of 173 portable buckets, 226 portable seats and 63 urine tubes, and units have now been brought up to an establishment of slightly over 4% sanitary equipment.

Practically all units in the Division are incinerating faeces, refuse and manure in the camping areas, but in the forward line it has not yet been found practicable to incinerate faeces on account of lack of fuel and labour.

Grease traps are in use in practically all units and Squadron cooking is being extended.

Flies are still very numerous, but slightly diminished.

Drinking Water.

Conditions have now greatly improved and may be regarded as fairly satisfactory.

Food.

Complaints are still received of broken and occasionally mouldy character of bread issue. Vegetables are poor in quality and quantity. The only vegetable which constantly arrives in good condition is the onion. Oranges are on issue.

Mosquito work.

This is being actively carried on. On the Wadi AUJAH 86 men have been employed constantly during the week, but still a large amount of urgent work is necessary to render the lower portion free from mosquito breeding.

The Wadi MELAHAH has had the attention of 1,000 men under Capt. Brisbane, Australian Engineers, since 28/5/18, and excellent progress made in clearing weeds, narrowing channels, and draining swamps along the whole course of the Wadi as far as and a little beyond, our own wire across the Wadi. A large amount of work requires to be done N. of this wire.

Inspection has been made of the head of the Wadi NUJAMEH where mosquitoes breeding was found in a swamp resulting from overflow of the main channel near its head. Major Austen was asked to visit this area and advise, and the result of his examination was that no mosquito breeding was only actively in progress in this one spot. An aqueduct on the South side of the Wadi which had formerly been cut off has been opened again by some person and is forming a dangerous swamp. Measures are being taken to turn the aqueduct back to the main Wadi above this area.

GENERAL.

The conditions remain much the same as in last week's report, except that sanitation is on a slightly better basis, and intestinal diseases show a gratifying decrease. The menace from Malaria is becoming more apparent as shown by increase in number of cases and by the discovery of new mosquito breeding areas.

Extremely radical measures, such as removal of the native population, the diverting of all aqueducts as well as efficient draining of swamps and ~~removing~~ canalising of Wadis, will have to be promptly carried out if this danger is to be averted. The difficulties of this course are self-evident, but the risk of great wastage of fighting troops occurring later in the Summer from Malignant Malaria justifies extreme measures being taken.

The practical certainty of introducing in the future Subtection Malaria into districts hitherto free, but which possess the necessary factors, such as a large portion of AUSTRALIA, should be considered in deciding the question of immediate drastic measures for prophylaxis. It is considered that the magnitude of the danger, though apparent to Medical Officers, is not yet fully appreciated by the executive branches of the service.

The men are still working hard at defensive works, road making, and anti-mosquito work under trying conditions of climate and heat.



Report on Mosquito Breeding Pool on East bank of JORDAN near AUJAH Bridgehead.

In compliance with your instructions, and accompanied by Major EVANS, A.A.M.C., D.A.D.M.S., Australian Mounted Division, I yesterday visited the above-mentioned pool, which is situated about $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles above AUJAH Bridgehead. The pool forms an arc of a circle, roughly 15 to 20 yds. in width, by 200 yds. or more in length. It is fringed with high reeds and other fairly dense vegetation, while in places tamarisk bushes and reeds are growing in the water itself; the water also contains much weed, forming cover for mosquito larvae.

At every point examined I found Anopheles larvae; Culicine larvae were also abundant, and while near the pool, Major EVANS and I were attacked by a peculiarly bloodthirsty Culicine mosquito (*CULEX TOTATUS DORSALIS*).

There can be no doubt whatever that, in its present state, the pool constitutes a serious menace to troops in the vicinity; such troops can scarcely fail to be severely bitten each evening by both Anopheline and Culicine mosquitoes, and no time should be lost in dealing with the breeding place.

If levels admit, probably the simplest mode of dealing with it would be to drain the pool from its lower end into the JORDAN. So far as could be judged, this would entail the digging of a trench some 130 yards in length; but an officer of R.E. should of course be consulted as to practicability and dimensions of trench; also as to working party and tools required.

Unless the trench drains the pool completely dry, it will fail in its object. An alternative plan would be to cut a broad communication (i.e. a channel 5 to 10 yds. in width) with the JORDAN at each end of the pool, so as to cause the latter to be scouring out by the river. If, after cutting such communications, the water at the margins of the pool remains stagnant, breeding will still continue, and it will be necessary to remove all weed, bushes, and other vegetation from the water. For this purpose a working party of from 50 to 100 men, provided with axes, billhooks, and rakes, as well as two or more pontoons, punts, or rafts would be necessary.

If neither a drain nor through communication with the Jordan can be made, all that can be done is to remove vegetation, and spray the water to a breadth of 6 feet all round the margin, at weekly intervals or as often as found to be necessary on inspection, with either of the following, -at the rate of $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. to 1 oz. per square yard:-

- (1). OIL. A mixture of equal parts of paraffin and heavy oil, or one third paraffin and two thirds heavy oil.
- (2). CRESOL. One teaspoonful to a gallon of water, or rather stronger (sufficient to make spraying mixture quite milky).

- (3). PANAMA FLUID, prepared as follows:-

150 gallons of crude carbolic acid (gravity 0.97) is heated in a tank to 212° F., when 150 lbs. of powdered or finely broken resin is poured in, and the mixture kept boiling until the resin is entirely dissolved, when 30 lbs. of caustic soda are added, and the solution kept at 212° F. until a perfectly dark emulsion, without sediment, is obtained. The mixture must be stirred thoroughly from the time when the resin is added until the end. For use, the emulsion is diluted one-sixth with water.

For even one treatment of the pool, the required amount of oil or Panama Fluid would, of course, be considerable.

Panama Fluid would have to be prepared either at the Base, or by the Divisional Sanitary Section. The above directions for preparing it are given for reference in case of need.

The only mosquito-breeding place found was close to AIN EN NUEJAMEN. Here, leakage from an irrigation channel has formed a small grass-grown swamp, which, when seen, was teeming with Anopheles larvae in all stages, and was undoubtedly a menace to troops camped in the vicinity.

No time should be lost in clearing this swamp (removing all vegetation) and draining the water-logged ground by means of straight, narrow, smooth-sided channels. If possible, before clearing and draining, the ground should be sprayed with a mixture of paraffin and heavy oil (equal parts, or one third paraffin and two thirds heavy oil) at the rate of $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. to 1 oz. per square yard. All leaks in the side of the irrigation channel should be sought for and stopped, and paths should be cut through the adjacent beds of high reeds in search of other swampy places, which, if found, should be treated as above.

The work detailed should be carried out by a working party of 20 - 30 men, provided with spades, billhooks, and baskets (for filling with dry earth places which cannot be drained).

An aqueduct some distance below AIN EN NUEJAMEN, choked in places with watercress and forming a swamp at the point where crossed by a road, looked a very likely Anopheles breeding place, although no larvae could be found in it. I understand that Major EVANS has caused this aqueduct to be closed.

The relatively small amount of Anopheles breeding at present discoverable in the head-waters of the NUEJAMEN is possibly to be ascribed to the coldness of the water.

Inspection of the upper portion of the Wadi NUEIAMEH on 31/5/18 and again on 3/6/18, and a pool on E. bank of the JORDAN in Auja Bridgehead shewed the following conditions:-

Wadi NUEIAMEH (upper portion).

Anopheles breeding in great numbers in swamp near head of stream resulting from overflow or leakage through its banks of the water near its origin.

Elsewhere no anopheles were found either in stream or aqueducts though many favourable places were found.

An aqueduct on the S. side of the Wadi, which had previously been cut off, had been opened again and was forming a large swamp. This has been turned into the main Wadi again.

50 men will be required for two to three days to clear out anopheles breeding near head of stream, after which the usual mosquito parties of 12 men per regiment will be sufficient to continue the work.

Pool in AUJA BRIDGEHEAD one mile N. of crossing over JORDAN.

This is surrounded by dense scrub and is semilunar in shape and about 300 yds long by 30 yds. wide. Its two ends are separated from the Jordan by about 120 yds. in each case. It is thickly overgrown with Algae and rushes, and anopheles and culex breeding is taking place in great numbers. It is about 5 to 6 feet deep and the level appears to be very much the same as that of the Jordan.

The only method of treatment would be as follows:-

To cut a wide drain at the Southern end of the Jordan and if this does not succeed in draining it completely, another drain should be made at its Northern end to connect it with the Jordan at this end also, so that there should be a constant flow of water through the pool. All weeds and Algae should be cleared away in this case, and some kind of raft would be necessary to enable men to reach the weeds. 200 men would be required for this work and more than a weeks work would be necessary.

An alternative method which later suggested itself would be to pump the pool dry. This would require a pump driven by an oil engine.

Sanitation Report for week ending 9/6/18

Camp site on Jordan recently vacated by brigade.

The camping areas fall into (with the single exception of that of the 10th L.H. Transport which was afterwards corrected) were left in thoroughly good sanitary conditions and tidy - this was especially so with regard to the camp area of the 8th L.H. Regt.

The burial of its dead horses was completed and a large notice - "Dove Burial Area" - erected.

Only a few carcasses could be burnt, by reason of their large numbers.

Camp site on Wadi Kueiweh

Drinking Water. - Excellent - all arrangements re chlorination, tanks and etc. satisfactory.

Bathtubs - 12 extra buckets and seats have come.

The 9th L.H., 10th L.H., 3rd L.H. H.A., Post Office and Brigade S.D. have satisfactory arrangements - the 8th L.H. and 3rd M.G. Squad have not been inspected yet.

Antimalarial Measures.

Under the direction of the D.A.D.M.S. large working parties have been engaged on antimalarial measures in the Wadi Kueiweh where such work is urgently needed.

Anopheles vivax at present breeding

in some of the water and the number of the streams and the thickness of the undergrowth will necessitate the action of large working parties for some considerable time.

4th. LIGHT HORSE BRIGADEWEEK ENDED 8th. JUNE. 1918.DRINKING WATER AREA.

The 5th.Mtd.Bde.filled the tank at 6pm.The water duty men from the 12th.Reg.(now on duty there) found that the tank ran dry before 10am.next day,causing big congestion of water carts etc.He intends running in one or two thousand gallons more at about 4am.Funnels are attached to the water taps but as none of them will fit into water bottles there is still as much wastage as from the taps alone.A small pool of stagnant water thus formed needs filling in and efficient funnels provided.

12th. Reg. WATER TANK

For several days this tank was leaking copiously and a pool of water thus formed has not yet dried up.I could see no Larvae yesterday.No pumps or any apparatus except jam tins are available for removing water from the tank.Considerable waste,undesirable exposure and dampness of ground resulting.

FORDING PLACES AND AUJA

The fording places across Auja are not yet supplied with direction notices and the custom is still too prevalent to cross at unauthorised places and allowing animals to stand in and drink from the stream.This must occur under the nose of the guard who apparently takes no steps to prevent same.Washing in too close proximity to the stream does occur but does not appear to be very prevalent.A native from 4th.B.H.Q. was reported to me as filling a fanatis from the stream.He stated that he had been doing it for three weeks He said that it was not for drinking purposes and later brought down to the water duty man an unsigned note authorising him to do so.

AQUEDUCT

This was twice broken down during the week,the second time was the night of the 5th.inst.The level has been so lowered that it will now take about an hours work to open it up again.The O.C. 11th.L.H.Reg.denies liability of his regiment on these occasions.The O.C. Sanitary Section thought that the 5th.Mtd.Bde.were probably responsible.

MOBILE VET. SECT.

Imperfect incineration of jam tins.Latrine are petticoated but are badly done and not in the least fly proof.

ANTI-AIR CRAFT

Apparently satisfactory.

4th. L.H. REG.

On the whole satisfactory.Latrine buckets are not fly proof They left their old lines in a satisfactory condition.

AMMUNITION COLUMN
(near Amb.)

Incineration satisfactory though there seems very little manure for the number of animals.Empty milk tins lying around the cook house thus creating an attraction for flies.Their Indian Transport were solving the question of latrine equipment by perching on the edge of a stone incinerator. This was apparently left exposed and only burnt once per day. This has since been corrected.

SIKH PIONEERS.

They had a big row of open latrine buckets with a sentry on guard who I was informed saw that the appointed native moved the bucket immediately after use.They are now providing lids and also incinerating stray tins left lying about.

4th. M.G. SQD.

On the whole satisfactory though too much individual cooking. The wadi in their area much improved.

Too many tins lying about and imperfect incineration, because the A

- A.I.F. CANTEEN. the Ambulance native empties their latrine bucket they seem to do nothing themselves.
- 11th.L.H.REG. Latrine buckets are not fly proof and manure burning is done in many scattered patches. The nature of the ground perhaps, makes this necessary.
- 4th.B.H.Q. Satisfactory.
- 12th.L.H.REG. Were just settling down in their new camp. Were starting satisfactorily.
- 11th.CAMEL TRANSPORT Left their previous camp site in an untidy condition but later went back and cleaned it up. The present site — incineration being neglected but promises to improve.
- 4th.L.H.REG. TRANSPORT Have at last got latrine buckets and appear to be satisfactory.
- 5th.L.H.REG. TRANSPORT Apparently could not or would not get latrine buckets or improvise same. They had latrine pits at one end of the line. Some men at the other end near the spread manure had apparently preferred the open ground and made it in a filthy condition. This was however cleaned up before they left.
- FIELD TROOP Satisfactory.
- 3.301.BATTERY (near 11th.H.Q.) Used buckets and buried faeces in deep pits. This would be more satisfactory than a trench latrine as used by the 4th. and 11th Regiments where the flies seem very bad.

There is throughout an insufficient supply of fly destructors or arsenic tablets and inefficient protection of food. The quality of the meat has been astonishingly good and much improved for the last two weeks.

Bivouacs.

Men of all units are in bivouacs. With the exception of the regiment at Anjah bridgehead, bivouacs are not covered with bushes or scrub. Bivouacs are fitted with mosquito nets. The lines are kept clean & tidy & generally satisfactory.

Horse lines.

These are more difficult to look after owing to the necessity of spreading out. All litter is incinerated. All the horse lines are at present in a satisfactory condition.

Cook houses.

With the exception of the Indian regiments no sort of shelters have yet been erected, but this is being done at once. Fresh meat is usually cut up & put into the pot immediately it is issued or kept covered as well as possible until cooked. Muslin or netting for meat safes has not yet been issued. All other foods are kept in boxes. Dixies &c. when not in use are kept thoroughly clean and the exterior sponge over with a solution of creasol.

Waste material. Solids are kept in a covered tin & incinerated. Liquids are poured down grease traps which are cleaned out twice daily.

Latrines

The 18th Machine Gun Squadron have no lids or seats for buckets - they were lost on the march from Belah. New lids and seats were indentured for some five weeks ago, but have not yet been delivered. Trench latrines (3'-4' deep & 1'-1½' wide) are being used & an orderly is on permanent duty to see that they are properly filled in. When filled to within 1' of the surface, creasol is sprayed over the earth & the trench filled in. The Med. Offices of the 6th Cavalry & 79th Lancers complain that they have an insufficient number of latrine buckets & lids & have applied to have the number increased from 14 to 16. Latrines of all other units are satisfactory.

Disposal of Excreta. Excreta is incinerated. Horse litter is also incinerated, horse litter &c. but at present is being spread out on the road with a view to diminishing the dust. Satisfactory incinerators have not yet been made by all units, but these should be completed at once.

Water

Water supply from the Wadi Anjah. The regiment on duty supplies water duty men. Tanks chlorinated at rate of 1 scoop to 100 gallons.





C. SANITATION.

Much improved. An issue of portable sanitary equipment has been made
and all units are now adequately provided for.

Flies have diminished. Spreading of manure on certain main roads is
being tried as an experiment.

More satisfactory, but it seems a pity that certain units of artillery
are allowed to remain camped in the bed of the Wadi AUJAH.

Anti-malarial work.

This has progressed well. The Wadi MELLAH has been drained and
partially cleared to junction with the Wadi RISHEH, and larvae are very
difficult to find. It is intended to push the work up the Wadi RISHEH
to a large swamp about 1 mile above its junction if possible.

Part of the Wadi AUJAH still requires attention and this is being
treated.

The breeding area at AIN ED DUK has been canalised and drained and the
work there is nearly complete.

After an inspection by Major AUSTEN and D.A.D.M.S., recommendations
for the treatment of the lagoon at AUJAH Bridgehead were submitted to the
R.E. and it is proposed to pump the dangerous spot dry. When this is
completed, all of the breeding places within reach will have received
attention.

No mosquitoes are still prevalent at the advanced posts.

E. GENERAL.

The increase of Malaria is the most disquieting feature this week. Conditions as to amount of work and comfort have slightly improved, but the men are certainly below par.

The Receiving Station experience difficulty in evacuating its cases to the C.C.S. owing to lack of motor ambulances. The Divisional FORD Cars are being used to supplement those of the 35th M.A.C., but cases have at times to be held over.

It is hoped that this matter may soon be remedied as pyrexial cases do not benefit by being kept in tents in the Jordan Valley, and also the FORD cars are very unsuitable for the journey between JERICHO and JERUSALEM and are in constant need of repair.

Work in the Wadi MELLAHAN has been pushed about 300 yds. up beyond its junction with the Wadi RISHEH, and for the same distance up the latter Wadi. By this means the large swamps have been tapped. The Wadi MELLAHAN, between its junction with the RISHEH and AUJA, is now practically free from larvae. Owing to enemy action work could not be continued further beyond our lines.

The canaling of the Auja is complete with exception of $\frac{1}{2}$ mile. The lagoon at Auja Bridgehead has been pumped dry.

Maintenance gangs are regularly employed on Wadis MELLAHAN, AUJA, and NUETAMEH, and little else remains to be done in this Sector.

Except for Malaria and N.Y.D.Pyrexia cases, sickness is generally low. Malaria, however, tends to slowly increase. Heat has been very great, and the dust nuisance grows worse day by day.
