REPORT FROM O. C ..

FIRST AUSTRALIAN GENERAL HOSPITAL

FOR THE MONTH OF JANUARY 1918.

The first month of the year 1918 passed off satisfactorily as far as the working of this Hospital was concerned. The D.D.M.S. Rouen made his usual weekly inspections, spending from 2 of an hour to 2 hours in going round the wards and other portions of the Hospital.

ADMISSIONS.

The number of patients admitted was 2319.
The average number of admissions per month for a period of 21 months is 2419.23.

COST OF SUBSISTENCE.

The Cost of Subsistence per patient per diem was 1 shilling and 5 pence 3 farthings (ls.5%d.) which is slightly lower than last month.

MEDICAL CASES.

The number of "Sick" admitted was 2029. Of these there were several very seriously ill patients.

Amongst the patients treated were cases of D.A.H.,
V.D.H., Debility, Bysentery, Diarrhoea, Gassed, Goitre,
Jaundice, Incontinence of Urine, Nephritis(40 Cases).

Pneumonia, Trench fever and Pulmonary Tuberculosis.

One case of Nephritis complicated by Broncho-Pneumonia died.

The report of Major Fairfam, Physician Specialist and Officer in Charge of Medical Division, is attached.

SURGICAL CASES.

The number of "Mounded" admitted was 290.
The wounded arrived in better condition than during the months of November and December. This was owing to the remarkably mild weather of January.

and "Reveille" the weather becomes and important factor in the condition of the patient in his journey from the front to the Base as it also does in his later movements to the United Kingdom. Evacuations frequently occur between "Lights Out" and "Reveille".

The Report of Col. T.P. Dunhill, Surgical Specialist, and Officer in Charge of Surgical Division is attached.

DEATHS.

The number of Meaths was 14. This was less than the number for December. The average number per month, for 21 months, is 21.28 per month. There are still no new vaccines or serums or other kindred preparations supplied to combat the fatal effects of the common Septic Infections.

PATHOLOGIST.

The Pathological Department is in constant co-operation with the Surgeons and Physicians in elucidating the nature of the infections from which the patients are suffering. And the more this co-operation exists and is developed, so much the more thoroughly are the cases understood and the patients treated.

Post-Mortem examinations are made upon every fatal case. The nature of the cases is such that but few Museum Pathological Specimens can be obtained.

The report of Major A.J. Brenan, Pathologist, is attached.

RADIOGRAPHER.

The "X-ray" Department has continued to be of the greatest assistance to the Surgeons and Physicians.

The treatment of Fractures, especially Fractures of the Femur, is bound up now with regular and systematic rediography of the case.

The report of Captain A.E.Brown, Radiographer, is attached and it shows how the "X-ray" examinations of the long bones preponderate.

SANITARY OFFICER.

The Sanitary condition of the Hospital during the month has been good. There were no cases of infectious disease.

The report of the Sanitary Officer (Major A.J.Brenan) is attached.

V. D.

There were three cases of V.D. during the month. The cases were referred to in the reports of the Registrar and Sanitary Officer.

Two of these cases were contracted when on leave in the "U.K.", the other was contracted locally, and this one had not used the Prophylactic tent.

REGISTRAR'S DEPARTMENT.

The work of this Department in a General Hospital is very large. It has been performed in a highly satisfact-ory manner during the month. The numerous returns were rendered correctly.

The report of Major J.S. Verco, Registrar, is attached.

QUARTERMASTER'S DEPARTMENT.

The supplies have been good in quality and ample in quantity.

The Laundering of the Hospital articles is carried out by Messrs. Hardy & Co.

The washing of infected articles is performed by the Sanitary Laundry.

Messrs. Dany & Co. do the laundry and repair of certain

articles for subsequent re-issue.

The dealing with patient's clothing is a very large and important work in a General Hospital. It has to be collected, sorted, searched and disinfected. Then quantities are kept for re-issue to the patients to wear. And very large quantities are again sorted and sent to Army Ordnance.

The kitchens have been working somewhat better? The patients' food has been served in a hotter condition. Alterations are being made to the kitchens which are expected to contribute still further towards facilitating working.

Other important matters are referred to in the report by Captain H.M. Maughan, Quartermaster, attached.

DISPENSARY.

This Department is referred to in the Quartermaster's report. There is a shortage in the supply of certain drugs, and some drugs are not obtainable. The quantities ofo cotton dressings used during the month were less than in Sphagnum Moss Dressings are being used to replace December. Cotton Wool and so far the reports of its value are quite satisfactory. It is useful in cases where there are freely discharging wounds.

ANAESTHETICS.

A report upon Anaesthesias administered is attached from Captain G.C. Harper.

A Gas & Oxygen apparatus has been requisitioned for since October last.

INSTRUCTIONS IN ANAESTHETICS FOR SISTERS.

Following upon the short course of bectures and Practical Instruction and Examination held by ourselves here, a few of our Sisters have been selected to receive instruction in Administration of Anassthetics at a Sister's Class of Instruction in Anaesthetics, held at No 12 (St.Louis U.S.A.) General. Hospital, which Sisters from other Hospitals at this Base are attending.

SISTERS QUARTERS.

As a result of representations made by us, backed up by the D.D.M.S. - some improvements have been made by the R.E. in the provision of extra Stoves for heating The Sisters's Quarters, also extra stoves for supplying hot water for ablutions.

The Assistant Principal Matron, Rouen Base, (Miss M.M. Tunley) officially inspected the Sisters' Quarters on January 16th, and furnished a report to the Matron-in-Chief The report stated, amongst other matters, that B.E.F. "the quarters seem to be very comfortable and well arranged".

The Assistant Principal Matron, Rouen, visits the hospital weekly, and inspects along with the Matron, (Miss M.M. Finlay).

AUSTRALIAN RED CROSS.

During the month the A.R.C. has most generously supplied a Cinematograph and Films for the entertainment of Patients. The apparatus is most simply worked, and is kept under the charge of Miss Riggall, the A.R.C. Representative. New films are exchanged from the Pathescope Library as soon as the old films are returned. This excellent gift has proved of great interest to our patients.

DETAILING SISTERS FOR OTHER UNITS.

Orders arrive from time to time from the Matron-in-Chief B.E.F. (Miss E. McCarthy) detailing Sisters for duty at Australian Casualty Clearing Stations. The names selected have in some instances been such as would not have been selected by the Matron of this Unit. It is no doubt a large work for the Matron-in-Chief, B.E.F. to manage the British Nursing Service in France, and at the same time to know thoroughly all the Australian Sisters in France, and deal with their transfers to Units and their Leave etc.

The Canadian Army Nursing Service has recently completed arrangements whereby a Canadian Matron-in-Chief in France is located with the Matron-in-Chief B.M.F. at H.Q. L.of C., for

the object of taking over Canadian duties.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Efficiency has been kept up and discipline has been maintained during the month. . Nost of the defaulters are under-age boys from Infanthy Battalions. There are 114 under-age boys at present in the unit.

The Anniversary of the Foundation of Australia was observed on January 26th. when a Football Match was played in the afternoon, between a team from Australian Records Section, 3rd. Echelon, and a team from 1st. A.G.H. The Hospital Team won.

The weather throughout January was remarkably mild and calm The thermometer registered 32° F. on several occasions, but for most of the month the register was from 40° to 50° F.

APPENDIX 47 FIRST AUSTRALIAN GENERAL HOSPITAL. To. The Officer Commanding. First Australian General Hospital. REPORT OF WORK OF SURGICAL DIVISION FOR MONTH OF JANUARY 1918. During the month of January the Surgical work of the Hospital has not been so heavy, though there has been a steady intake of cases, - few nights passing without a convoy. Among these there has been a fair proportion of serious cases, Captain Scott has done the consulting work of one section as well as having charge of the big hut. The rest of the consulting work of the Hospital has been evenly divided between Lieut-Colonel Dunhill and Major Langlands. enables much more individual assistance to be given to Medical Officers, and enables principles of treatment to be more intalligently worked out in such conditions as joint and intracranial injuries. The lightening of the work has giventtime for more thorough work with some of the chronic cases, like the following:-A man with perforating wounds of the chest, and compound fracture of both bones of the leg immediately above the ankle joint was so ill in his earlier stages, that his legs could not be efficiently attended to, and union took place with much deformity. The bones have now been chisseled apart, and union has taken place in perfect alignment. A man whose knee-joint we had excised had developed a popliteal arterio-venous aneurysm. No collateral circulation was possible on account of the traverse incision which had been made for the excision following the original injury. Ligature of the artery would have meant gangrene of the leg. The vessels were separated from one another, and the lateral opening in the popliteal artery was sutured. The circulation remains good; there is pulsation in the anterior and posterior tibials. A sciatic nerve had been half divided, almost inside the sciatic notch, associated with comminution of the trochanteric region of the femur. The wounds having healed and the bone united, the sciatic nerve was defined, the ends trimmed, and suture performed. Other work of this kind has been done as occasion required and as time permitted. Major Sinclair R.A.M.C. gave a demonstration at the hospital on January 14th, on fracture apparatus and its method of application. This Hospital was chosen for the demonstration on that day because we had employed his apparatus and principles for a considerable time, and we had a good assortment of cases. There was a big attendance of surgeons and nurses from other hospitals in the district. The demonstration was most valuable. A list is appended of the operations performed in the hospital during the month.

> REPORT OF WORK OF MEDICAL DIVISION FOR THE MONTH OF JANUARY 1918.

Number of Sick Admitted. - 2029. Died. Discharged to Duty ("A" & "M.B") 265. " Conv. Depot. - 607. Transferred to Other Hospitals .- 25.

Number of Cases. - 31. D. A. H.

The majority of the cases were similar to those reported on previously. A few were the late effects of Gas poisoning, others the result of the febrile attacks of various kinds, (P.U.O.) among these Rheumatic Fever. Others had no definite history of illness previous to the onset of symptoms.

Tachycardia was the condition found in nearly all cases, from 100 - 120 per minute as a rule; the only common form of irregularity was due to premature beats, occasionally sinus arrythnia in some of the young men.

The blood pressure was usually low and the pulse

volume small.

Most of these cases were sent to the Convalescent Camp, Cardiac Section.

Number of Cases. - 15. V. D. H.

Only very few cases admitted as V.D.H. were found to have any evidence of valvular disease on examination. Of the cases which had valvular, the majority were lesions of the mitral valve.

There was one case of Congenital Morbis Cordis.

Number of Cases. - 40. DEBILITY.

A large number of different conditions came under this heading, from old men of 60 years without any teeth to boys of 19 without any organic disease, only under developed.

Many of the cases were under-weight and had indigestion, they improved rapidly when they had been fed

properly. Half a dozen cases had pyorrhoea alveolaris very marked, their gums were treated for a time and they were sent to the Convalescent Camp for Dental treatment. Others had deficient and carious teeth and their nutrition was evidently suffering in consequence.

Number of Cases. - 7. BACILLARY DYSENTERY.

In all these cases the bacillus of Shiga or Flexner was isolated and they were sent to No 25 Stationary Hospital.

Report of Work of Medical Division for January 1918 (contd)

DIARRHOEA. Number of Cases - 50.

These were cases in which no organism was isolated, nearly all the cases had ceased to have any diarrhoea by the timethey were admitted to the Hospital.

They were nearly all due to food or water poisoning according to the patient's history, they certainly ceased after a few doses of Ol Ricini and restricted diet.

GASSED. Number of Cases. - 97.

All the cases were mild compared to those in Hospital 2 - 3 months ago.

At the beginning of the month most of them were evidently Phosgene, from the absence of burns, slight effect on the eyes and characteristic cardio-vascular condition. Some of them were very sollapsed on admission but responded well to stimulation with 2 - 3 doses of pituitin followed by camphor in olive oil subcutaneously.

During the last week a number of cases have been admitted with very severe conjunctivitis, in some cases actually burning of the lulba conjunctiva, with intesse injection watery discharge, occasionally subconjunctival haemorrhage: there was rubefaction of the skin of the face neck and chest, pharyngitis, laryngitis, vomiting and pain after food. They have improved up to the present but their eyes are still intensely injected and painful.

GOITRE. Number of Cases. - 1.

This was a case of parenchymatous goitre, present for some years and not causing any symptoms.

JAUNDICE. Number of Cases. - 4.

These were all catarrhal jaundice of fairly sudden onset which gradually cleared up while in Hospital.

INCONTINENCE OF URINE. Number of Cases. - 4.

Two of these were of long standing, the condition having existed since early boyhood: no improvement occurred and they were evacuated. The other two were recent, a urethral sound was passed and they did not complain of any further trouble.

NEPHRITIS. Number of Cases - 40.

A smaller number of cases arrived in Hospital water logged and acutely ill than last month.

Some of these cases were very oedaematous and dysprroeic for 2 - 3 days, and passed very little urine, but they improved very quickly and were evacuated to England in good condition.

One case died, having developed Broncho-pneumonia two days after admission.

The hot-air bath carried out by means of a Primus stove and oil-drum, has at length been replaced by an electric light Radiator, which is more handy and efficient.

At the beginning of the month when the weather was very cold it was impossible to keep the patientsswarm in the tents, even with numerous hot water bottles.

PNEUMONIA. - CONVALESCENT. Number of Cases - 7.

These were cases admitted soon after their crisis in which the physical signs were beginning to clear up.

TRENCH FEVER. - Number of Cases - 70.

Many of these were admitted after the temperature had become normal, the shin pains, headache etc, remaining. Some of them did not have another febrile period, but the majority of them did; the cases in which the temperature persisted had to be evacuated, but in others the temperature only remained raised for a few days and they were well enough to be sent to the Convalescent Camp after the temperature had been normal for a week.

The pains in shins and thighs were very persistent in some cases, and the pulse became rapid on first getting up, these symptoms usually subsided in a week or ten days.

PULMONARY TUBERCULOSIS. Number of Cases. - 3.

Number of Suspected Cases. - 6.

The cases with fairly definite signs or in which tubercle bacilli could be detected were evacuated as Pulmonary Tuberculosis.

The Suspected cases in which no Tubercle Bacilli could be detected, but which had indefinite signs were evacuated as Suspect T.B.

The Sanitary condition of the Hospital during the past month has been highly satisfactory.

Special attention has been devoted to the drainage of the camp which is now in a much improved condition.

Destruction of rubbish, excreta etc., is carried out as usual. No case of infectious disease has occurred in the unit, but three cases of Venereal Disease were reported. Two of these were contracted in England and the third locally, and this man had not used the prophylactic tent.

Ten cases of Bacillary Dysentery occurred among patients, eight being of the B. Flexner type and two of the B. Shiga type. These were transferred to the Infectious Diseases Hospital and all necessary disinfection carried out. During the past month no case of Diphtheria has occurred.


