It is to be noted that All patients admitted have been housed, fed, & attended. and as quickly as possible evacuated to suitable destinations as ordered by D. D. M. S. FOR THE MONTH OF FEBRUARY 1918.

The work of the Hospital was carried on during the month with thoroughness and without difficulties.

INSPECTIONS.

The D.D.M.S. Rouen made his usual weekly inspections on Wednesdays, arriving between 2 pm and 3 pm. On February 16th. Col. J.J. Russell, C.B., A.M.S., paid his last visit as D.D.M.S., and introduced his successor (Col. J. Meek, C.B., A.M.S.). We are very sorry to lose Col. Russell (Now promoted Surgeon-General, D.D.M.S. Scottish Command), who has been very popular with Australians at this Base.

ADMISSIONS.

The number of Patients admitted during February was below the average. This was on account of the winter season, there having been less fighting, and further, because the weather conditions were more favourable there was less illness. Consequently in the Sectors that evacuate to this Base there were less Wounded and Sick. The Total admitted was 1083. The average number of admissions per month for a period of 22 months is 2559.

COST OF SUBSISTENCE.

The Cost of Subsistence per patient per diem was higher during the month of February than that of the preceding month. It was nearly one shilling and eightpence. (1s. 7.982d). The average cost of the daily subsistence per patient for all hospitals in France for January was 1s. 6.79d. For the same month the figures for this Hospital were 1s. 5.87d. per patient. The calories per patient amounted to 1925, the official suggested scale being 1828. The consumption for the month of January of Malt Liquors and Wines and Spirits per 100 patients in this Hospital was 2 ozs, and 2 ozs respectively. For the same period the U.S.A. Hospitals at this Base consumed 6 ozs and 3 ozs. respectively, these are quoted as a contrast because of the restrictions upon alcohol inculcated by the U.S.A. authorities.

MEDICAL CASES.

The Number of "Sick" admitted was 921. Amongst the patients treated there were cases of : D.A.H., V.D.H., Debility., Dysentery., Diarrhoea., Gassed., Goitre., Jaundice., Incontinence of Urine., Nephritis., Trench Fever., Pneumonia., Pulmonary Tuberculosis, Erythrocythaemia (1 case)., Bilharziosis (2 Cases). The Pathological Department has been of great assistance to the Medical Officers in charge of these patients. A report upon the work of the Medical Division is attached. Major Fairfax, Physician Specialist and Officer in Charge of the Medical Division was ill in Hospital at the end of the month, and the report was compiled by Lieut.Col. C. Shell-shear.

SURGICAL CASES.

The number of "Wounded" admitted was 162. The wounded arrived in better condition from the front owing to Military conditions enabling them to be retained comparatively longer at the Casualty Clearing Stations that evacuate to this Base. The report upon the Surgical work for the month is attached. Owing to the absence on leave of the Officer in Charge of the Surgical Division, (Lt.Col. Dunhill) Senior Surgical Specialist, the report was prepared by Major F.H.Langlands, Junior Surgical Specialist.

DEATHS.

There were 4 deaths during the month. The average number of deaths per month for a period of 22 months is - 20.5. Since last report and in answer to frequent enquiries we have received through the Consulting Surgeon of Rouen Base, (Col. H.Pilcher D.S.O. A.M.S.) a small supply 1 doz.phials, of "Sensitised Polyvalent Antisepsis Vaccine" (Sensitised streptococcus faecalis, S. longus and enterococcus, B.proteus, B.coli, B.lactis aerogenes) prepared by the Royal Army Medical College, Woolwich. In a leaflet accompanying the phials it is stated that the action of this vaccine is to stimulate the anti-bacterial forces of the body against infecting organisms of the groups indicated which are the common flora of all infected wounds. It therefore tends to counteract the infective process which determines secondary septic haemorrhage, and to inhibit the development of anaerobic bacteria. It is important in order to obtain the best results not to delay the use of the vaccine. It should therefore be administered as soon as possible after the case is seen. Arrangements have been made with the Surgeon Specialists to have this vaccine used. This is the first of its kind that has been received, and we welcome it. Rumours reach us from time to time that the enemy possesses some similar preparations that are of value.

PATHOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT.

This Department continues to be of the greatest service to the Surgeons and Physicians. The Report from the Pathologist (Major A.J.Brenan) is attached.

RADIOGRAPHY DEPARTMENT.

Work in this Department is increasing relatively to the number of patients admitted. Owing to the illness of the X-ray E.C.O. (Sergt. T.J.McNamara) I regret that it was necessary to evacuate him to England, he was a valuable E.C.O. in this work. With the approval of the D.M.S. the vacancy has been filled by Sergt. H.L.Norris.

RADIOGRAPHY DEPARTMENT (cont'd).

The Report from the Radiographer (Capt. A.E. Brown) is attached.

SANITARY OFFICER'S DEPARTMENT.

The Sanitary Officer, (Major A.J. Brennan) has submitted the attached report. The Sanitary condition of the Hospital is satisfactory. The snowfall and rainfall for February was light, and the consequent surface water was easily controlled.

V.D.

Four cases of V.D. occurred amongst the personnel during the month. Of these, one was contracted on "U.K." leave, one a recurrence in a man treated elsewhere, one did not make use of the ablution tent, one failed to use the ablution tent at time of infection.

REGISTRAR'S DEPARTMENT.

The duties of this department, though lighter during the month on account of the fewer patients admitted, required constant attention. The duties of Company Officer or Adjutant (carried out by the Registrar) require no inconsiderable amount of work in their performance. The report of this department for the month is attached from the Registrar (Major J.S. Verco)

QUARTERMASTER'S DEPARTMENT.

The attached report from the Quartermaster (Capt. H.M. Maughan) for the month of February indicates that good work has been performed.

From a patients point of view in a very large percentage of instances, a hospital is judged by the quantity and quality of food and by how it is served to the patients. These views have been impressed upon the Q.M. and Assistant Q.M., and the W.C.O's in Charge of kitchens under them. Improvement in these matters has been obtained.

Daily inspection is carried out with a view to greater efficiency and elimination of all wasteful practices.

AUSTRALIAN RED CROSS.

The A.R.C. Store continues to be of the greatest use to the patients of this Hospital. Lt. Col. E.W. Hayward, Commissioner of the A.R.C. in France called during the month and inspected the A.R.C. Store.

Appended is a list of the goods issued in February, for patients use, by the A. R. C.

FIRE ALARM.

At 8 pm on February 2nd. our alarm bell was heard and every officer rushed out to discover where the fire was situated. For a few moments it appeared to be in our hospital, but we were glad to find on proceeding rapidly a little further towards it that the trouble fortunately was not ours. The conflagration was in the hospital next door, viz: No 10 British General Hospital. Our men discovered the fire, had rung our alarm, and rushed to the scene and had the fire nearly extinguished before the neighbours had time to arrive there. A ward of two marquees was destroyed together with most of the contents. No casualties occurred amongst the patients. Most of the patients could help themselves, two or three were assisted in their escape. It was all over in a few minutes. We have received a very kind letter from the

Small Fires occur in tented Hospitals very often. In summer they may be expected to occur daily, and in winter weekly. The damage is usually very slight, mainly because the fire is quickly discovered and extinguished. In such cases the loss is exceedingly small. Occasionally however great damage results. Stringent rules and precautions are necessary throughout all camps. The frequent causes of fire have been, sparks from stoves and chimneys, careless use of pipes, matches and cigarette butts, the use of inflammable oils in igniting fires, inflammable material upon stoves, overheated stove-pipes, fused electric wires, etc. At No 10. General Hospital the fire was due to a vessel being left upon a stove to melt the contents which were a mixture of turpentine and beeswax !! In a fire here in September 1917, which started in the X-ray engine room, it was due to fusion of the electric wires.

SPRING CLEANING.

Owing to the reduced numbers of patients during the month, the opportunity was taken to give the two Operation Theatres and the numerous wards a thorough turning out and cleansing. The Theatres were repainted.

SISTERS' QUARTERS.

The heating of the Sisters' Quarters is much more satisfactory than it was last winter. We have taken steps, and have obtained additional stoves in each of the long huts and small huts occupied by the Sisters. What we have asked for has taken some time to complete. The delay has been the cause of some correspondence between A.I.F. and B.E.F. Headquarters, one of the minutes of the latter was characteristic of the writer, and worried our local authorities. The expression "got the wind up" appeared to be quite applicable.

The supply of hot water for baths has been improved?

The supply of "Beatrice" Oil Stoves (Blue Flame) Heating for Sisters, has been brought before D.M.S. A.I.F. in a special memo upon the subject.

Improvements to the Sisters' Kitchen have been asked for and have been approved by the D.D.M.S. The C.R.M. reduced the request considerably, with which H.Q. Rouen Base concurred.

BADGES GALLIPOLI SERVICE.

The A.I.F. Orders Nos 937 and 1084 of 6-11-17 and 25-1-18 respectively, entitling members of the A.I.F. who took part in the Gallipoli expedition from Egypt, to wear the letter "A" over their Unit 'Colour Patches' on both sleeves of the Service Dress Jacket and Greatcoat, were not availed of to any great extent until the publication of Circ.Memo 15/104 of D.A.G. A.I.F. Since that date (21-2-18) the compulsory wearing of the letter "A" by those who are entitled to wear it has been carried out. There was an objection to the badge as it was new, and out of the ordinary usages. A ribbon for the same services would have been preferred, it being an old method, and in the ordinary lines of indicating service. It is still a fairly general feeling.

DISTINGUISHING COLOUR PATCHES A.A.M.C.

The A.I.F. Order No 1051 of 1-1-18 authorising A.A.M.C. Unit colour patches has been carried out. The patches formerly worn by the personnel of the 1st. A.G.H. were a chocolate diamond with a red bar. These have been removed, and the authorised chocolate diamond with a green bar has been substituted.

CONFIDENTIAL REPORTS UPON SISTERS.

Confidential Reports are called for by Matron-in-Chief B.E.F. upon all Sisters and Staff Nurses. These are rendered by the Matron. They are then signed by the O.C. Unit, the D.D.M.S. of the Base, the Acting Principal Matron of the Base, and then the Matron-in-Chief B.E.F., France. In cases where the report is not favourable it is returned by the Matron-in-Chief B.E.F. for the Sister or Staff Nurse concerned to note, sign and return. Cases have occurred where Sisters have objected to statements contained in their reports. In every instance when a Sister has expressed her objections in writing, her protest has been forwarded through the usual channels to the Matron-in-Chief. B.E.F.

DESIGNS FOR HEAD-STONES FOR DECEASED SOLDIERS.

A circular correspondence (with proposed designs) was received through the D.D.M.S. Rouen upon the above subject. Remarks and other designs were called for. These were supplied, a copy of the reply sent is attached to this report.

WORKS UNDER ORDER AT 1st. A. G. H.

Owing it is stated to difficulties experienced by the C.R.E. in obtaining materials and workmen at this base, it is very hard to get works completed. To get them is like "getting blood out of a stone". And to hurry them up is like "flogging a dead horse". We recognise the situation. Fortunately we have an excellent Quartermaster who can get anything that is going, but opportunities are limited. We also have one or two good workmen who can construct when materials are available. It is much more difficult to obtain materials and works at a base than in the Army Areas.

HUTTING OF THE HOSPITAL. (PATIENTS HUTS).

Of the total number of Patients Huts (25) proposed to be erected here eventually, the first series of seven was promised at the end of November 1917. Materials began to arrive on December 2nd. Two "Adrian" Huts have been erected up to this date and are occupied by patients. Two "Nissen" Huts additional to the original scheme of hutting are in course of erection. The above two new patients "Adrian" Huts are giving satisfaction, and are appreciated by patients and staff.

MISCELLANEOUS.

DISCIPLINE. This has been maintained and the efficiency of the unit thereby kept up to a high standard.

UNDER-AGE BOYS. A few of these lads are turning out capable orderlies after some months of training.

INSTRUCTION TO ORDERLIES. A course of lectures to orderlies upon A.M.C. subjects has been going on for several weeks. The monthly lecture to male personnel upon alcohol and V.D. has been carried out.

Headstones for deceased Soldiers (Officers and Others).

Please to report that as far as designs for deceased
Australians are concerned:-

1. The device of "The Rising Sun" is the badge or
crest of the Australian Imperial Force, and is worn by all
Australian Soldiers (Officers and Others), and in my opinion
should invariably be most prominently displayed upon the
upper part of all headstones of all deceased Australian
Troops, of whatever rank, and of whatever arm or department
of the Service they may belong. It is a very simple and
distinctive design, and well known wherever Australian
Troops have served. It is of easy workmanship.

2. The only other device worn by Members of the
Australian Imperial Force is that upon all metal buttons of
their tunics depicting "The Continent of Australia with
Tasmania and Dependencies upon the upper part, the British
Empire Crown". This is also a simple and quite
distinctive design and well known to all persons who are
acquainted with a map of the Southern Hemisphere. It is
also of easy workmanship, but not as easy as The Rising Sun
design.

The design submitted upon the accompanying sheet
marked A.I.F. is not considered sufficiently distinctive.

D.A.H. Number of Cases. - 18.

These Cases were very similar to the previously reported ones. There were none noted after Gas, and many on arrival here presented no signs or symptoms. There were a few however with Tachycardia.

Practically all were sufficiently slight to go to Convalescent Camp Cardiac Section.

V.D.H. Number of Cases. - 7.

As was reported last month, there was no evidence of disease in several of these cases, and they were sent to the Convalescent Camp.

Erythrocythaemia.

One case of this interesting condition was observed, presenting high haemoglobin content, increase red blood cells and cyanosis.

Debility. Number of Cases. - 25.

These cases were of a similar type to those admitted last month, and shewed a similar divergency in character.

Most of them however were cases requiring a short period of rest and were not kept for any considerable period in hospital. The usual dental cases were in evidence.

Bacillary Dysentery. Number of Cases. - 2.

There were very few this month, as last, and they were transferred to No 25 Stationary Hospital. The preliminary bacteriological investigation being completed here and organism isolated.

Diarrhoea. Number of Cases. - 21.

This number will be noted to be more than 50% under that of last month, and were of similar type.

Practically all, after a few days treatment, were sufficiently recovered to be discharged to the Convalescent Camp.

Gassed.

Number of Cases 66.

As reported last month the cases were mild as compared with those for the previous months.

The number of cases with severe burns and eye symptoms was considerably diminished.

It is noted that when the patients are enabled to remain in the C.C.S. and receive attention during periods in which there is no rush of work, very few cases present a purulent conjunctivitis on arrival at No 1 A.G.H.

A good proportion sufficiently recovered to be discharged to Convalescent Camp, the cases that were evacuated being mainly those with cardio-vascular symptoms, due to phosgene.

Goitre.

Number of Cases. - 1.

This was a case of parenchymatous type.

Incontinence of Urine.

Number of Cases. - 4.

These were of a similar type to those recorded last month.

Pneumonia.

Number of Cases. - 3.

This represents a diminution of over $\frac{1}{2}$ compared with the cases last month.

Trench Fever.

Number of Cases. - 87.

This will be noted to be in excess of the number admitted last month, and were of a similar type.

Several of these cases were recurrent ones, and several had been treated for some time in the forward area.

These cases as a rule were very obstinate ones and required to be evacuated.

A considerable proportion, however, of the remainder showed rapid improvement, and after a period of observation, out of bed, were fit for the Convalescent Camp.

The usual symptoms were noted, being especially aggravated at night time, many cases feeling perfectly comfortable during the day.

We are still absolutely in the dark as to the etiology of this disease.

Pulmonary Tuberculosis.

Number of Cases - 1.

Number of Suspected Cases - 10.

As heretofore the cases with definite signs or with bacilli in the sputum, were evacuated as Pulmonary Tuberculosis, the suspected cases being evacuated as such.

Bilharziosis.

Number of Cases. - 2.

It will be interesting to note that the presence of bilharzia was noted in the urine in 2 cases, neither being sent down as such.

Nephritis.

Number of Cases. - 27.

The cases of Nephritis in Hospital this month have been similar to those admitted in January. They had been from 1 week to 3 weeks under treatment in C.C.S.'s before transference to the Base.

Most of them had respiratory symptoms in their early stages. Oedema has not been marked and soon reduced. Some have passed uring heavily blood stained and rather persistently. The hot air baths have proved efficacious.

Jaundice.

Number of Cases. - 2.

One of these cases occurred in the Staff. Both were epidemic jaundice.

REPORT OF WORK OF SURGICAL DIVISION FOR
MONTH OF FEBRUARY 1918.

From the operation list it will be seen that the Surgical work of the Hospital during the month of February has been of a more general type, and that, owing to the lessened activity at the Front, and consequently more continued and thorough treatment at the Casualty Clearing Stations, fewer operations have been required at this Base.

Many anxious cases have been received, requiring careful and constant attention in the wards, e.g.,

A man was admitted with a bullet wound in the left inguinal region. Both femoral vessels had been divided, and a suprapubic exploration had been done at the C.C.S. A tear in the base of the bladder had been sutured and the lacerated prostate gland packed, and the bladder drained by the suprapubic incision. At this Hospital the patient has been kept dry by bladder siphonage, and his general condition is becoming fairly satisfactory.

Another man buried by a shell has developed signs indicating severe spinal concussion with intradural haemorrhage but no fracture. Here again constant attention is necessitated by his bladder condition.

These cases exemplify conditions requiring considerable care and attention, rather than operative measures.

During this month, with the approval of the Consulting Surgeon (Colonel Pilcher) several cases of fractured thighs have been evacuated to England with satisfactory results. A small amount of deformity, good union, and scarcely any shortening in each case.

Captain Swanston R.A.M.C. demonstrated on February 14th, in Hut 1, the use of an ambulating Arm Splint designed by himself. It would no doubt be very useful under certain conditions of transport.

Please to report that as far as designs for deceased
Australians are concerned:-

1. The device of "The Rising Sun" is the badge or
crest of the Australian Imperial Force, and is worn by all
Australian Soldiers (Officers and Others), and in my opinion
should invariably be most prominently displayed upon the
upper part of all headstones of all deceased Australian
Troops, of whatever rank, and of whatever arm or department
of the Service they may belong. It is a very simple and
distinctive design, and well known wherever Australian
Troops have served. It is of easy workmanship.

2. The only other device worn by Members of the
Australian Imperial Force is that upon all metal buttons of
their tunics depicting "The Continent of Australia with
Tasmania" upon the upper part, the British
Empire Crown". This is also a simple and quite
distinctive design and well known to all persons who are
acquainted with a map of the Southern Hemisphere. It is
also of easy workmanship, but not as easy as The Rising Sun
design.

The design submitted upon the accompanying sheet
marked A.I.F. is not considered sufficiently distinctive.



23-3-18. To all Ranks of the British Army in France and Flanders. We are again at a crisis in the War. The enemy has collected on the front every available Division and is aiming at the Destruction of the British Army. We have already inflicted on the enemy in the course of the last two days, very heavy loss, and the French are sending troops as quickly as possible to our support. I feel that every one in the Army, fully realising how much depends on the exertions and stead-fastness of each one of us, will do his utmost to prevent the enemy from attaining his object.


