With the month of April the 1st. A. G. H. completed its second year of Active Service in France. The month was an active one for the hospital, and the figures indicate that it stands, so far, amongst the six busiest months in the history of the unit.

INSPECTIONS ETC.

The Commandant Rouen Base, (Bdr. Genl. L. F. PHILLIPS, C.M.G., D.S.O.,) inspected the hospital on April 21st, accompanied by the D.D.M.S.

The D.D.M.S. Rouen (Col. J. Meek, C.B., A.M.S.,) paid his regular weekly visits of inspection on Wednesday afternoons between 2 & 3 pm.

The Acting Principal Matron, Rouen Base, (Miss M. Tunley) paid her weekly visit of inspection on Monday mornings at 10-30 to 11-30 am.

COST OF SUBSISTENCE OF PATIENTS.

The Cost of Subsistence in hospital per patient per diem for the month of April was under one shilling and six pence halfpenny (1s.6.41ld). This was lower than for the month of March.

ADMISSIONS.

The number of admissions was 4047, which is far above the monthly average for the past two years. The monthly average of admissions for the period of 24 months in France being 2540. The average number of admissions per month from all sources for the period of service in Egypt (viz: fourteen months) was 1718. The higher number of admissions has been maintained during April on account of the continuation of extensive enemy offensives. A larger number than usual of Australian Soldiers both sick and wounded have been evacuated to this Base, and we have received our proportion of them. Amongst the patients have been the wounded from the Villers Brittonneaux engagements. Although many were dangerously wounded the morale of the A.I.F. patients is excellent, and that of the remainder is also very good.

MEDICAL CASES.

There were 2127 Sick admitted during the month. The Cases treated consisted of V.D.H., D.A.H., Debility, Diphtheria, Pulmonary Tuberculosis, Pleurisy, Pneumonia, Dysentery, Malaria, Trench Fever, Enteritis, Jaundice, Nephritis, also 370 cases of "Gassed" (wounded). The report from the Officer in charge of the Medical Division is attached (Major E.W. Fairfax, Physician Specialist). The Consulting Physician of this Base, (Col W. Pasteur) visits the hospital regularly.

SURGICAL CASES.

The number of wounded admitted was 1920. The report of the Officer in charge of the Surgical Division is attached (Lt. Col. T.P. Dunhill, Senior Surgeon Specialist). The Consulting Surgeon of Rouen Base (Col. E.M. Pilcher) visits the hospital regularly.

DEATHS.

There were 50 Deaths during the month. This number is much beyond the monthly average. The average number of deaths per month for a period of 24 months in France is now 23.16. The percentage of deaths to the number of patients admitted (France) has gone up and is now .91%. On only one other occasion has the number of deaths been so great and that was 50 for October 1916. The increased number for April is due considerably to the number of wounded admitted in March who ultimately succumbed to the wound infections received at the time they were injured. A new double serum for Tetanus and Gas Gangrene is spoken about, it contains Tetanus Antitoxin of the ordinary strength, and, in addition, antibodies to one of the commonest organisms of Gas Gangrene. The value of this double serum is still under consideration.

PATHOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT.

Good work continues to be performed by this department. We are endeavouring to have some improvements made by the R.E. to the accommodation of the microscope room. An articulated skeleton has been obtained for the purpose of instructing the A.A.M.C. orderlies. It has proved to be of the greatest use in this matter. The Medical Officers also find it of great use. The Pathologist is in charge of this skeleton. There is a Rouen Base, Pathological Club, the membership of which consists of the Pathologists of the different hospitals here, from twelve to fifteen. Monthly meetings are held alternately at the different laboratories. The meeting for April took place on 1st. A (Major A. A. Laboratory). The monthly report of the pathologist is attached.

V.D.

Prophylactic measures are still maintained. There were three cases of V.D. reported during the month, one was a recurrence. The subject is referred to in the reports from the Sanitary Officer and the Registrar.

X-RAY DEPARTMENT.

This Department performed excellent work during the month. The "Chest Stand" referred to in the attached report from the Radiographer (Capt. A.E. Brown) - (Now struck off the strength of this unit) - has proved to be of great use in taking radiographs of cases that are unable to be down. The simplicity and small cost of our device attracted the attention of the party of visiting Radiographers from England, referred to in last month's report, also of Major Cooper, Consulting Radiographer B.E.F., also of Capt. Ferguson R.A.M.C. the Advisor in Radiography, Rouen Base, and of others.

On April 30th. Capt. Brown was ordered to proceed and report to the A.D.M.S. 4th. Division A.I.F., but completed the monthly report of the X-ray department before leaving. The X-ray work is being performed by Major. J.S. Verco and Sergt. E.L. Norris, to the satisfaction of the surgeons.

ANAESTHETICS.

A report upon the Anaesthetics administered in the two operation theatres for the month, is attached from Capt. J.R. Williams (Anaesthetist of A.I.F. Surgical Team doing duty at 1st. A.G.H.)

In addition to the foregoing, general anaesthetics are frequently required in the wards for the dressing of patients.

Three of our Sisters ^{performed} useful work during the month as anaesthetists.

REGISTRAR'S DEPARTMENT.

The work of this department continued to be heavy throughout the month. The additional accommodation provided for the Records Office two months ago proved to be most useful.

Attached is the report for the month from the Registrar (Major J.S. Verco).

QUARTERMASTER'S DEPARTMENT.

The report of the Quartermaster (Capt. H.M. Maughan) attached, indicates the progress of the hutting of the hospital which has been going on during the month. Large numbers of articles were laundered during the past two months. Orders have been issued for the strictest economy to be observed by all ranks, in the matters of supplies, clothing, linen, coal and articles for laundry. More strict supervision is also carried out as regards refuse for the "Swill" tubs.

NURSING DEPARTMENT.

The Acting Principal Matron, Rouen Base (Miss M. Tunley) visits the hospital on Monday forenoons, and inspects along with the Matron.

A report from the Matron (Miss E. Cornwell) is attached. The largely increased staff mentioned therein is principally of Sisters ordered to this Base from ~~Army~~ and other Medical Units temporarily out of action.

DISPENSARY.

This department carried out its duties satisfactorily during the month. The Dispenser (Hon. Lieut. T. W. Longville) has supplied figures for some of the items which are mentioned under "Dispensary" in the Quartermaster's report.

SANITARY DEPARTMENT.

Distinct Spring conditions prevailed during April. The existence of Small-Pox in Rouen necessitated the re-vaccination of the whole personnel of the Unit.

The occurrence of Diphtheria in two dangerously wounded cases caused some slight temporary inconvenience, as it also did when one of the orderlies was affected. On these occasions the advice of the Sanitary Officer is carried out. The Chief Sanitary Officers of this Base also consult with our Sanitary Officer when necessary. The monthly report of the Sanitary Officer (Major A.J.Brenan) is attached.

AUSTRALIAN RED CROSS.

The A.R.C. Depot situated in the grounds of the hospital continued to be exceedingly helpful to the patients during the month. The A.R.C. ladies connected with the depot have done good work there, also they have been most occupied in visiting many Australian Sick and Wounded in various hospitals at this Base.

Attached is a list of articles issued by the A.R.C. Depot, to this hospital.

A.I.F. SURGICAL TEAMS FOR C.C.S's.

Major R.O.Douglas (Surgeon) and Captain J.R. Williams (Anaesthetist) of the one team, and Capt. H.S.Bush (Surgeon) of the other team, have been doing duty in the hospital throughout the month.

Several Medical Officers of the hospital have been ordered to the A.I.F. Divisions during March and April so it has been most fortunate that the three team officers have not been ordered to proceed to any C.C.S. Their presence here has enabled us to keep up the efficiency of the professional work of the hospital.

HISTORICAL RECORDS.

Lieut.Col. A.G. Butler DSO., visited the unit on April 25th. and remained till 27th, during which time he investigated several matters of interest to the Medical Department of the Australian Historical War Records Section.

ANNIVERSARY OF THE UNIT'S ARRIVAL IN FRANCE.

April 5th. was the Anniversary of the Unit's arrival at Marseilles in 1916 from Alexandria per H.M. Hospital Ship "Salta" since sunk by enemy action.

April 12th was the Anniversary of the Unit's arrival in Rouen at this present site in 1916.

The Hospital was opened to receive patients here on April 29th. 1916, and has now completed two years of service in France.

ANZAC DAY.

The commemoration of Anzac Day was duly observed on April 25th. Owing to pressure of work, also owing to Small-Pox in Rouen the day was extremely quiet. A combined religious service for Protestant denominations was held at 8-45 am to 9-15 am., at which the A.I.F. Service Book was used, and the two Chaplains officiated (Rev. T. McKeon, C.of E., and Rev. J.Nicholls, Pres.) There was a large attendance of personnel and patients.

HUTTING OF THE HOSPITAL. - (R.E. WORK).

The hutting of the Patients Wards has made progress during the month. This subject is referred to in the reports from the Registrar's Department and the Quartermaster's department.

CAMP LINES.

In addition to the work of the hospital, there has been a considerable amount of work performed in making orderly the Camp Lines, where the new huts have been erected, and in various other portions of the Camp Site. Accommodation for patients has to be found, patients have to be moved, and marquees struck and ground cleaned for the huts. This "shuffling" process has required fine adjustment at times, especially when the inflow of patients was great; and there were occasions when the work had to be discontinued temporarily until the numbers in hospital decreased sufficiently to allow the closing of the canvas ward so that it could be replaced by a hut.

GARDENS. (VEGETABLES ETC).

The small patches that are available on our hospital site are making good progress.

TRANSPORT.

We are still without any attached Motor Transport, and the want of this is very greatly felt. The local Authorities concerned have not responded to our requisitions.

MISCELLANEOUS.


DISCIPLINE. - The Discipline of the unit has been very good throughout the month. There have been several offences most of which were breaches of Corps Orders, such as lack of punctuality in attendance upon early morning parades, or convoy duty or evacuation duty.

AMUSEMENTS & RECREATION. - Tennis Courts have been prepared upon the Racecourse Track for the Sisters, also two others for Officers & N.C.O's and Men. A Cricket Pitch has also been prepared. Football is almost over for this season.

WEATHER. - The weather during April was milder than that of the corresponding month last year. The minimum temperature was 32° to 41° and the maximum 50° to 58°. The mean temperature was about 41°. There was no snow, and but one frost. There were many cloudy and misty days with rain and not much wind, also several days with sunshine.

D.A.H. Number of Cases. - 28.
 At least half of these had been in Hospital before with D.A.H; the symptoms - dyspnoea, palpitation, giddiness etc., had returned. Very few had any abnormally accelerated pulse rate on exertion or after; they were all sent to Cardiac Section, Convalescent Depot, except 4 with evident cardiac dilatation.

DEBILITY. Number of Cases. - 35.
 The majority following P.U.O. or Trench Fever, some had defective teeth and pyorrhoea, others were men over 50, who had been out in France for some time in Labour Units

Diphtheria. Number of Cases. - 3.
 One man with infected haemothorax and septicaemia had been in hospital for nearly a month, developed some tonsillar patches, in which K.L. bacilli were found; another man, mustard gas, with extensive vesication developed a sore throat with K.L. bacilli after being in nearly three weeks. The first patient had left the hospital before the second came in, and there did not appear to be any connection between the two cases. The third case developed a few days after admission. None of these cases had typical patches, and they would not have been detected had not all cases with sore throats been swabbed and examined.

PULMONARY TUBERCULOSIS. Number of Cases - 4.
 These cases had definite physical signs, and were evacuated to England.

PLEURISY. Number of Cases. - 16.
 No other definite Pulmonary signs were detected, and they were evacuated to England.

PNEUMONIA. Number of Cases. - 5.
 All were evacuated convalescent with normal temperature and physical signs improving.

DYSENTERY. Number of Cases. - 1.
 The specific organisms were isolated and the case transferred to the Special Hospital.

MALARIA. Number of Cases. - 1.
 The diagnosis was confirmed by finding the parasites in the blood.

TRENCH FEVER. Number of Cases. - 53.
 The cases were admitted earlier than usual, and

many had the typical temperature, headache and shin pains.

V.D.H.

Number of Cases. - 7.

Three cases had definite valvular disease and cardiac dilatation, and were evacuated to the Special Hospital. No cardiac disease could be detected in the others and they were sent to the Convalescent Camp.

ENTERITIS.

Number of Cases. - 6.

Diarrhoea, without blood or mucus, ceased before or soon after admission in the majority of cases. No specific organisms could be isolated after several examinations in the other cases.

GASSED.

Number of Cases. - 370.

Most of the cases were only slightly affected, showing slight conjunctivitis and pharyngitis, which cleared up in a few days.

The conjunctivitis was severe in some cases for a few days and cleared up, leaving only slight injection of the conjunctiva.

Pharyngitis and laryngitis developed 3 or 4 days after being gassed in a great many cases, and resulted in some loss of voice and an irritating cough.

Typical Mustard Gas lesions of the skin were fairly common, in a few cases the vesication was extensive in the usual situations, face, neck, axillae, back, penis and scrotum. A few cases had discrete areas of vesication on the limbs and trunk.

Some cases had bronchitis as well as laryngitis and pharyngitis on admission 24 - 48 hours after being gassed, the majority were not severe and did not become any worse, in others the bronchitis increased and developed into broncho-pneumonia.

Other cases were admitted with diffuse bronchitis signs, or definite broncho-pneumonia within 48 hours of being gassed, most of these died and at the post-mortem there was early broncho-pneumonia and intense oedema of both lower lobes.

These cases with Bronchitis or early Broncho-pneumonia had marked pharyngitis and laryngitis.

A few cases with bronchitis had definite signs of dilatation of the right side of the heart, though their colour remained fairly good until a short time before they died.

Several cases died 4 or 5 days after being gassed, they had physical signs of diffuse bronchitis or early broncho-pneumonia and severe laryngitis on admission, they quickly developed signs of consolidation or oedema of their lower lobes. Other cases died after a week or ten days and had developed definite patchy broncho-pneumonia 2 & 3 days before they died. Five cases had some signs of bronchitis on admission and three or four days later definite signs of dilatation of the right side of the heart developed, they had a small rapid pulse and quiet respiration, 4 have died already and the remaining one is still alive, but does not look as if he would live long.

These four cases had a soft dilated right auricle and ventricle post-mortem, and oedema of the lower lobes of both lungs.

The cases which were fatal 4 or 5 days after being gassed all had a condition of superficial necrosis of the trachea spreading down into the bronchi and intense oedema of the lower lobes, much more marked than any cases we have seen here during the last ten months.

There were a few cases which appeared to be Phosgene Gas they had a low tension pulse, no dilatation of the heart, and dyspnoea on slight exertion, they improved after being kept at rest for a week or ten days.

JAUNDICE. Number of Cases. - 2.
Catarrhal Jaundice which cleared up while in hospital.

NEPHRITIS. Number of Cases. - 11.
Four cases were severe with persistent oedema, superficial and pulmonary, headache and dyspnoea they were much improved when evacuated to England, but the urine still contained albumen and casts.

The other cases were much less severe when admitted and were not kept in hospital long before being evacuated to England.

-----REPORT OF WORK OF SURGICAL DIVISION FOR
MONTH OF APRIL 1918.

During the month of April the Surgical Division has been kept busy, but only on several short occasions has the work been difficult to cope with.

Each surgeon has been able to deal with the work from his own section, without the theatres and sections becoming banked up; though when the pressure is high it takes a good deal of arranging to insure that there is no waste of time, and no banking up of cases.

In order to get through efficiently, lunch and dinner hours are eliminated, by arranging for the afternoon and evening men respectively to take their meals half an hour before the others, so that they may carry on from the men whom they are relieving without any loss of time.

The nursing and orderly staff are arranged for in a somewhat similar way. The plan has worked well.

The surgical staff has been arranged into teams, so that, should the work become overwhelming, the system could be put into operation immediately. The best and most capable men would then, with similar shifts to alternate with them, keep the operative work going continuously; but as long as the work can be coped with efficiently by each surgical officer operating upon his own cases, - the cases whose subsequent dressing he himself will be responsible for, - it is thought best to continue in this way.

We are trying to arrange to have the theatre accommodation remodelled, by having the two theatres combined under one roof, and the work centralised. Both theatres are much too small, and extremely inconvenient for working. We are given to understand that the superior authorities will pass this plan. It is urgently needed.

Some Adrian and Nissen huts have been erected, allowing us to nurse a greater number of patients under better conditions.

We feel that more system and continuity of purpose is being evolved in the surgical division of the hospital. This cannot be brought to its best results until the rebuilding work which is being carried on at present, is completed. In the course of another month or two we hope that the work will be on a better planned bases, and that continuous progress will then take place along sound lines.

Evacuations have been pushed as much as possible, on account of the ever-present possibility of big intakes of wounded. For this reason worse cases than usual have been evacuated during the last month.

X-RAY REPORT, APRIL 1918. (continued).REMARKS.

PLANT. The plant has been uniformly satisfactory. The "Chest Stand" has been adapted for chest radiography without removing the patients from the stretchers, which has greatly improved the chest work. The table has also been adapted for work with the patients remaining on the stretchers, and this greatly facilitates work during a heavy rush.

WORK. The work during the past month has been of a fairly steady daily average with less total patients than in March by 116.

The greater number of Foreign Bodies and Normal cases proportionately to fractures, indicates a generally lighter type of case dealt with.

The relatively low number of plates used is due to the fact that the department was drawing on the reserve of plates for three weeks, while awaiting the arrival of plates despatched from Boulogne. This also explains the high proportion of 1 x 1 plates used, which is the reverse of usual.

REGISTRAR'S REPORT FOR MONTH OF MARCH 1918.

During the early part of the month of April the work in the hospital continued to be very heavy. There being only a short stay in hospital for most patients. It was attempted to deal with incoming convoys in such a manner that urgent cases were operated upon promptly and of the remainder, those who were fit for and needed to be evacuated, were classified as such as expediently as possible.

A larger proportion of walking cases was admitted. The arrangement of having special sections for these patients was adhered to, and enabled them to be dealt with promptly.

The hutting of the hospital has gone ahead with more rapidity during this month. The bed accommodation is as follows:-

The Sanitary condition of the camp continues to be satisfactory. The gradual hutting of the Hospital greatly facilitating Ward Sanitation.

Two patients developed Diphtheria and one contact gave a positive swab. Two cases of Scarlet Fever and one each of Mumps and Bacillary Dysentery also occurred. All necessary isolation of contacts and swabbing has been carried out.

STAFF. During the past month all members of the staff have been vaccinated.

One of the staff contracted Diphtheria and three of his contacts gave positive swabs necessitating the isolation of one hut and repeated swabbings of 67 members of the staff. This has been carried out.

Three cases of Venereal Disease reported, one being a recurrence.

REPORT OF NURSING DEPARTMENT FOR MONTH
OF APRIL 1918.

PERSONNEL. During the month of April, owing to the continued stress of work, the following Sisters were taken in the strength from No 5 Stationary Hospital, Dieppe.
Staff Nurses. A. Cuskelly. A. Morehead. F.M. Auld.
K.M. Taylor. S.J. Proctor. A.M. Toft.
B.M. Donaldson. F. Kay. C. Collins.
B.E. Williams. on the 3rd.
of April, and on April 26th. Head Sister A. Kidd Hart reported from No 5 Stationary Hospital and is now acting as Assistant Matron. Sisters Camerons & McNulty and Staff Nurse Graham - who had been finishing their course in Anaesthetics at No 12 (St. Louis U.S.A.) General Hospital, returned to this unit on the 24th April, and have since been employed almost solely in giving Anaesthetics, owing to the shortness in the number of M.O's.

Two other Sisters are being instructed in this work at present, and one of them is now entrusted with her own cases.

LEAVE. No ordinary leave has been given, in accordance with instructions. One Sister who was telegraphed for proceeded to Boulogne to see a wounded relative, who however died before she arrived there.

HEALTH. Until the last week of the month the health of the staff has been remarkably good; since then a good deal of Influenza has existed, and although it has in most cases been of a mild character (a day in bed restoring to normal) three members of the staff were sent to the Sick Sisters Hospital (No 8 General) Two have returned, but were too weak for duty immediately, the third is awaiting transfer to Etretat to recuperate.

WORK. During the first fortnight of the month the work continued nearly as heavy as it was towards the end of March; one interesting feature was the large number of Australians admitted after the Villers-Bretonneux Battle. I feel here I must record the marvellous joyousness (no other word describes it) of these men after that battle. It made one's heart throb to see them.

The changing of numbers of the tent sections into huts, which is in process now, while in many ways very beneficial, entails a larger nursing staff, three huts accommodating only the same number of Beds that 2 Tent Sections did before.

HOUSING. Owing to the largely increased staff, a number of tents had to be erected, 18 Sisters now being accommodated in these. They are of course not quite so comfortable as cubicles, but do very well as a temporary measure.

The Messing arrangements have been quite satisfactory, the increased kitchen and service accommodation enabling us to cope comfortably with the increased demand on it.

SOCIAL. The Tennis Court on the Racecourse having been put into fairly good order, is now in use and is availed of regularly by the Nursing Staff, who later hope to challenge members of other hospital teams.

One Sunday afternoon we had the honour of a visit to afternoon tea by the Base Commandant, Rouen, General Phillips. And several visits by the D.D.M.S. Rouen, Colonel, J. Meek.

The Nursing Staff assembled as fully as possible at the Commemorative Service held on Anzac Day, and now that Divine Service is held regularly on Sundays in the Recreation Hut, they attend there also.

REPORT UPON ANAESTHETICS ADMINISTERED IN
OPERATION THEATRES FOR MONTH OF APRIL 1918.

Herewith report on anaesthetics used and number of anaesthesias for the month of April 1918.

I have found that the Ether used, Burgoyne Burbridge & Coy's to be quite satisfactory.

The chloroform used Duncan & Flockharts' Blue Label is also satisfactory in spite of the comparative large amount necessary to produce surgical anaesthesia.

The Ethyl Chloride, Hedleys Green Capsule is quite good and up to high standard.

Nitrous Oxide and Oxygen given by Hewitt's apparatus is available. Local Anaesthesia, 1% Novocaine and Adrenalin is being used with excellent results in head cases by one surgeon.

The Sisters trained in giving anaesthetics and those learning are performing their work to the satisfaction of all concerned.






