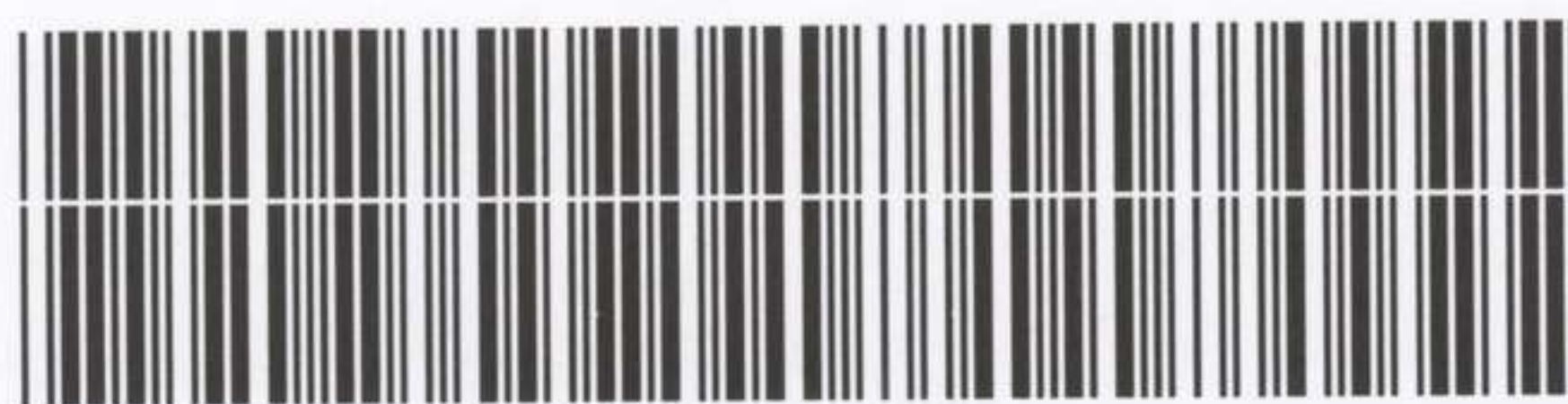

The high number of admissions was due to the early summer illnesses amongst the troops, and to considerable military activity. Further, after May 27th, consequent upon a large enemy offensive upon the Rheims sector there were more than the usual numbers of wounded admitted. The Battle Casualties produced by Gas continue to form a very considerable number and are amongst the wounded (Gassed). Some casualties are received not only wounded gassed, but also wounded by shrapnel or bullet or shell fragment in addition. The proportion of Sick to Wounded admitted for the month was about 2 to 1.

MEDICAL CASES.

There were 2240 Sick admitted, amongst these were cases of Anaemia, D.A.H., Debility, Diarrhoea, Bacillary Dysentery, Goitre, Pleurisy, Pneumonia, Trench fever, V.D.H., Nephritis, Pulmonary Tuberculosis and P.U.O.

Of the "Gassed" (wounded) cases, which are also treated in this department, more than usual were very dangerously ill patients. The Report of the Medical Officer in Charge of the Medical Division is attached.

SURGICAL CASES.

The wounded admitted during the month totalled 1111.

The Surgical Treatment of wounds has undergone a swing of the pendulum towards the stitching up of suitable cases as early as considered justifiable. For about two years the stitching up of wounds was almost prohibited in all Medical Units. Accordingly the suturing of wounds is a subject that is taking up much attention both at Casualty Clearing Stations and General Hospitals. Primary Suture and Delayed Primary Suture of suitable wounds is now performed as soon as the wound is clean enough. This decision being determined by clinical and by bacteriological indications. It is considered that a wounded man treated in this way gets back sooner to his unit than by other methods of treatment.

The Royal Engineers have been carrying out alterations in the accommodation for our surgical operations. A large theatre is being constructed in the building formerly known as Hut 1., and when completed it will be able to accommodate seven tables during a period of pressure, normally five will be installed. Accommodation is also being arranged for the pre-operative treatment of suitable cases.

The Report of the Medical Officer in Charge of the Surgical Division is attached.

DEATHS.

There were 36 Deaths during the month. This was above the average. The average number for the period in France being 23.68 per month. The percentage of deaths to admissions for the month was 1.074% which is above the average, the average for the unit's service in France being .92%.

PATHOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT.

The work of this department is becoming more important on account of the adoption of Primary and Delayed Primary Suturing of Wounds. Although in a number of cases the clinical symptoms are regarded as sufficient indication for deciding when a wound is clean enough to be sutured, still there are numerous cases where this cannot be decided till a bacteriological examination is made either by a smear or a culture or by both.

The Report of the Pathologist is attached.

X-RAY DEPARTMENT.

During the month this department has been of great service to the Surgeons and Physicians in the treatment of their patients.

The work was constant throughout the month and the amount done was above the average quantity. Major J.S. Verco performed the duties of Radiographer to the satisfaction of the Surgeons and Physicians in charge of the patients, and all others concerned.

The N.C.O. "X-ray" duties, (Sergt. E.L. Norris) has performed his duties to the satisfaction of the Medical Officer in Charge.

SANITARY OFFICER'S DEPARTMENT.

The Sanitary condition of the Camp Site was good throughout the month. The health of the personnel was also maintained. The Report of the Registrar shows the number of admissions to hospital during the month.

The Report of the Sanitary Officer is attached.

The treatment of all cases exposed to V.D. continues to be carried out. Four cases of V.D. occurred during the month, these are referred to in the Reports of the Registrar and of the Sanitary Officer.

The duties of this department were carried out satisfactorily throughout the month.

NURSING DEPARTMENT.

A Report from the Matron (Miss E. Cornwell) is attached.

QUARTERMASTER'S DEPARTMENT.

This Department carried out its duties efficiently during the month. The attached Report from the Quartermaster gives data concerning the Provision Store, Linen Store, Pack Store and Clothing Store. Also the Dispensary. Other items refer to Kitchens, Conservation of Fat, Housing and alterations of buildings. Also gardens and General Duties, Cost of Subsistence, Return of Dressings etc.

REPORT UPON ANAESTHETICS.

A Report upon the Anaesthetics administered in the two Operation Theatres for the month of May is attached.

The Directions of the D.M.S. A.I.F. concerning Sisters not administering Anaesthetics have been observed.

DENTAL UNIT.

Dental Unit No 98 (Capt. A.E. Clark and three other ranks) reported for temporary duty on May 4th. The Unit immediately commenced work in improvised quarters pending the provision of a more suitable place shortly to be provided. There is a large amount of dental work to be done in this unit and in the Australian Section 3rd. Echelon, also the Australian Bakeries.

The provision of a Dental unit by the D.M.S. is greatly appreciated.

HOSTILE AERIAL RAID PRECAUTIONS.

Following upon the extensive raids by the enemy upon Hospitals etc., at Etaples and other Bases, the Base Commandant Rouen, issued orders on the 28th. May directing that the patients and personnel of hospitals should be protected in case of aerial attacks. Since then entrenching and sand-bagging parties under R.E. Officers have been constructing trenches in various parts of our Hospital Site, for Sisters, other personnel and patients. The Hospital Huts occupied by patients are being protected by sandbags outside and extending to four feet above the height of the hut floor. These works when completed will be of considerable magnitude and cost, and it is expected that they should afford a large amount of protection in case of Hostile Air-raids.

PARADES AND DRILLS.

A Full Dress parade for N.C.O.'s and Men was held on May 28th, at 1-30 pm for all those whose duties enabled them to attend. Another was held at 7 pm the same day at which all the remainder were present. The men turned out well and had a smart appearance.

Fire Station Drill is carried out weekly.

At all Parades including, Early morning, Evacuation, Convoy and Tatoo, absence or lateness is regarded as a Military Offence and treated accordingly.

LECTURES TO PERSONNEL.

Lectures have been given upon elementary anatomy and physiology by Major Wooster.

Also the Monthly Lecture upon V.D. has been given.

HUTTING OF THE HOSPITAL.

It is probable that the present portion of the hutting scheme of the Hospital may be completed within a month. This subject is referred to in the Report of the Quartermaster's Department. The work has been going on for six months.

GARDENS. (VEGETABLE ETC..)

The Gardens and Lawns which were planted upon all available suitable sites have been doing well. Several meals of fresh vegetables have been obtained for the personnel from our own planting. Now the measures required for trenching and sand-bagging throughout the Hospital will necessitate the loss of almost all our gardens.

CAMP LINES.

In spite of difficulties the Camp Lines have been kept tidy and sanitary. The chief factors that hinder the fatigue parties are the want of rain, the hutting of the Hospital and the entrenching and sand-bagging.

UNIT POST OFFICE.

The Post Office of the unit is now located in a small hut constructed by ourselves from rough forest timber. The hut is better for work than the tent formerly used, and which had been occupied for about two years.

The Post Office and Postal Arrangements were inspected on May 9th, by The Deputy Assistant Director of Postal Services, A.I.F.? (Lt. C.C. Hadley).

RECREATION ROOM FOR A.A.M.C. MEN.

One of the huts erected by the Royal Engineers at the beginning of the year for our personnel is being used at present as follows:- One part for Men's Mess Room, the remainder as Men's Recreation Room. The latter has been very comfortably fitted up by the Men with the valuable assistance of The Australian Red Cross, and was opened on May 24th.

AUSTRALIAN RED CROSS.

During the month the A.R.C. Depot continued to be of the greatest usefulness to the patients in hospital. The Representative in Charge (Miss Riggall) together with her assistants (Miss Smith and Miss Alston) have very kindly assisted the unit in making the Men's Recreation Room (or Sitting-room) attractive and comfortable. The A.R.C. has also kindly contributed towards the furnishing of this room.

Appended is a List of Goods issued to the Hospital from the A.R.C. Depot.

DISCIPLINE.

Discipline has been maintained throughout the month. Most of the charges dealt with at Orderly Room are concerned with minor Offences.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Senior Chaplain C. of E. + The Senior Chaplain C. of E. (Col. F.W. Wray, C.M.G., V.D.,) visited the Hospital on May 31st.

Empire Day. - Empire Day (May 24th) was observed by holding a Concert in the evening in the Men's Recreation Room. The entertainment was a very good one. The Performers were all Members of the Unit. This Concert also celebrated the opening of the Men's Recreation Room.

Recreations. - Owing to the Summer Season the forms of out-door recreation are now Cricket and Tennis. Pressure of work prevented any great attention being given to these and other forms of out-door Sport.

Weather. - At the beginning of May there were about eight rainy days, after which dry weather set in and continued to the end of the month. The Temperature rose to over 90° in the shade on four occasions, and to 92° on the 21st. The lowest Temperature was 46° on the 12th, mostly the temperature was at 70°. Generally, the month was fine, and mild to warm or hot so that on the whole the weather was good for our patients.

REPORT OF WORK OF MEDICAL DIVISION FOR
MONTH OF MAY 1918.

Anaemia. - Number of Cases - 3.

Two cases of moderate secondary Anaemia with some wasting and general pigmentation; both improved considerably while in hospital.

One case of early Lymphatic Leukaemia with enlarged spleen and enlarged superficial lymphatic glands.

D.A.H. - Number of Cases - 49.

The majority of the cases under this heading were very mild, some had pain in the chest and complained of dyspnoea on exertion, but on examination had no physical signs of cardiac disease, abnormal acceleration of pulse rate on exertion, or apparent shortness of breath on exertion. A few had been in Hospital in France before for the same complaint and had had no form of treatment except rest in hospital. They were sent to Convalescent Camp, Cardiac Section. A small number gave a history of having been blown up or buried, the pain and dyspnoea coming on soon after, with tremor insomnia, and headache. A few also gave a history of a pyrexia and subsequent development of dyspnoea etc, on returning to duty.

DEBILITY. - Number of Cases - 49.

Defective teeth, dental caries, arteriosclerosis were the primary causes of a considerable number of the cases in this category. Several badly developed boys, thin and under-weight, who had had very little physical training. Men belonging to labour units, 45 - 50 years of age were also common. Many of them were sent to the Medical Board and for Dental Treatment, some were evacuated to England as not being likely to be fit for several months.

DIARRHOEA. - Number of Cases - 52.

Mostly cases of diarrhoea, duration 2 or 3 days to a week, which ceased to have any diarrhoea on arrival or within a few days after arrival at the hospital. Some had a history suggestive of dysentery, and their stools were examined on several occasions with negative results. Most of them were sufficiently recovered within a week to be sent to Convalescent Camp.

Bacillary Dysentery. - Number of cases - 3.

These 3 cases were found to be true dysentery on Pathological examination and were transferred to the special hospital.

GASSED. - Number of Cases. - 393.

229 sent in as Mustard Gas. The classes of cases were very much the same as last month, many were very mild, only had conjunctivitis, slight rhinitis, pharyngitis and laryngitis, which improved in a few days.

The conjunctivitis responded rapidly to treatment in most cases, a few of the more severe types had purulent conjunctivitis, some haziness of the cornea, and in about half a dozen cases actual vesication of the bulbar conjunc-

tiva and considerable oedema of the conjunctiva. Burns of the skin were numerous, some very extensive vesication and rubefaction of large areas of skin. Other slighter cases of rubefaction and subsequent of the usual areas, neck, axillae, scrotum etc. The deaths which occurred namely 21, were all due to broncho-pneumonia some within 3 - 4 days of being gassed, had extensive destruction of the mucous membrane from the epiglottis down into the smaller bronchial tubes, large areas of consolidation, showing scattered areas, suggestive of early broncho-pneumonia.

The cases which lived longer came in with the physical signs of bronchitis, later of broncho-pneumonia, the longer the cases lived after being gassed, the more definite the breaking down in the scattered broncho-pneumonic areas, which were mostly in the lower lobes. In several cases the posterior portions of all the lobes were consolidated, leaving only a small area anteriorly still crepitant.

Dilatation of the right side of the heart was very definite several days before death in the majority and this was confirmed P.M.

A few were apparently Phosgene Gas, slight conjunctivitis and pulmonary signs, low blood pressure, either slow or rapid pulse and marked dyspnoea on slight exertion.

GOITRE.

Number of Cases - 5.

Two cases had symptoms of Grave's disease of recent onset, one had a rather large flat thyroid, tremor, tachycardia, dyspnoea on exertion and sweating. The other two had thyroid enlargement without any other physical signs or symptoms.

PLEURISY.

Number of Cases. - 21.

Mostly cases of dry pleurisy of recent origin, a few had a history of previous attacks and evidence of thickened pleura, probably tubercular. Several had pleural effusion, and were aspirated before being evacuated to England. Others were admitted as Pleurisy, but were found not to have any physical signs on arrival.

PNEUMONIA.

Number of Cases - 15.

The majority were convalescent on arrival, a few had apparently developed during transmission to the hospital.

One case sent as alveolar abscess, developed pneumonia signs within 12 hours of admission, had ulcerative gingivitis and died four days later with a septic Broncho-pneumonia of the right upper and middle lobes, and septic-aemia.

TRENCH FEVER.

Number of Cases. - 88.

Most of the cases were of the milder type, but a few had high temperature 102 - 103.5 for several days, severe headache, back ache and skin pains. The majority had only a temperature of 99 - 100, back head and shin pains.

V. D. H.

Number of Cases. - 13.

About half the cases sent in as V.D.H. had a cardiac lesion which could be detected. These were mitral disease with dilatation.

NEPHRITIS.

Number of Cases. - 16. Deaths. - 2.

The two cases which died were moribund on admission, one lived a few hours, the other about 12 hours. The majority of cases were of moderate severity. Three cases were un-

common in that each had a temperature of 103 - 104 for 3 or 4 days, a considerable quantity of blood and casts. Three cases had a large amount of blood in the urine, as well as the usual casts and cells, persisting for over a week.

P.U.O. Number of Cases. - 446.

The majority had very little rise of temperature, not over 100, many were normal before admission and had no further rise.

The type which has been most frequent is that with a febrile period of 3 - 5 days, Temperature 102 - 103 for the first two days, headache, pains in back and legs and general lassitude persisting after temperature has fallen to normal.

Pulmonary Tuberculosis. Four Cases.

Suspect Pulmonary Tuberculosis in which Tubercle Bacilli was not found in sputum but the physical signs definite.

REPORT OF WORK OF SURGICAL DIVISION FOR
MONTH OF MAY 1918.

The Surgical Division of the Hospital, conformable to the expectant period at the front, has not been as busy as we expected it would be, until the last few days of the month.

There has been instituted the practice of "Delayed Primary Suture", this meaning the complete closure of wounds, - on arrival at a Base Hospital, - which had been excised but not sutured at a C.C.S.

The period between excision at a C.C.S. and complete closure at the base has varied from 24 hours to 5 days; but closure has always preceded the formation of granulations.

The reason for the delay until the cases reach the base is that the fear of the development of gas gangrene, or other morbid sequelae, preclude the immediate complete closure at the C.C.S., when patients have to be evacuated at once.

Progressively larger wounds have been treated in this way, and now open knee joints, involving bony damage and excised elbow joints have been completely closed after they have arrived here.

The cases must be selected, and judgment used, but a great number are now being done in this way, with an enormous shortening of the period of convalescence. As well as that, healing takes place with a soft cicatrix, instead of being formed of more or less dense scar tissue. It results in being able to send many cases to convalescent camp in France, who hitherto have been sent to England.

This hospital, with the 3 others of the racecourse group, has been selected to receive all the penetrating chest cases which come into this area. This has followed a request from the consulting surgeon for research work to be done on the possibility, or otherwise, of surgical interference with complete closure in certain types of penetrating wounds of the chest.

Evolution has been going on in the working out of apparatus for the suspension of limbs, in the effort to combine efficiency with simplicity.

In the last days of the month the work became heavy, and was continuing so when the month closed.

Several men upon whom we had depended for a considerable amount of surgical work have left the unit; viz, Major Williams DSO, Major Stephen, Major Wooster, Captains Field and Brown. The men who have taken their places are not yet of the same ability. Whilst Major Douglas and Captain Bush remain here we manage well, but when they leave with their teams, we will miss them.

The small hut (hut 1) is being altered in such a fashion as to make one central and convenient operating room, with space for a sufficient number of operating tables, in place of the two small and extremely inconvenient Operating Theatres which we have at present.

Portable Apparatus. - Twelve two-volt batteries have been obtained and this enables patients to be X-rayed with a much shorter exposure. Plates of thighs can now be taken with 45 seconds exposure as against 70 - 120 seconds with previous apparatus.

Improvements have been made in producing prints for records of surgeons in charge of the patients.

Now that penetrating chest wounds are being specialised in at this hospital, many interesting cases have been examined both by screen and plate.

The apparatus for examining the chest in upright position of patients has proved invaluable and we are hoping to make further improvements yet in this branch.

Rearrangement of furniture in X-ray room will be made as soon as alterations in space are made by completion of the new Operating Theatre.

Throughout the month endeavour has been made to use the X-ray department so that it shall be of the utmost value to physicians and surgeons.

Most of the urines examined were from nephritis cases and include general and microscopic examinations. Three cases of Dysentery occurred two being of Flexner Type recovered from faeces and the other a Shiga Infection diagnosed from blood agglutination.

The examination of wounds for closure is primarily to determine the presence of streptococci. For this purpose cultures are made into alkaline meat medium which grows streptococci and anaerobes equally well. Knee and chest fluids were nearly all from wounded and were examined cytologically and culturally.

The Mustard Gas Cases were all extremely severe with most intense necrotic laryngitis, tracheitis, bronchitis &c. All cases had Broncho-pneumonia.

Microscopic sections and cultures were made of material from many of the cases.

REPORT OF QUARTERMASTER'S DEPARTMENT FOR MAY 1918.

I beg to submit the following report for the month ending 31st. May 1918.

HOUSING.

Adrian Huts. Adrian Huts (7) have now been erected and equipped as wards, and are now in use as 40 bedded wards. This completes the first instalment of Adrian Huts for this Hospital.

Nissen Huts. Two more Nissen Huts have been erected and are being lined with corrugated iron instead of wood on account of the shortage of the latter. These differ from the previous two huts in that they are connected by a passage-way in the centre, with Sisters room and serving room on either side, thus making it considerably easier for working as a section.

This now gives 8 huts of 40 beds each, and on completion, 4 Nissen Huts of 23 beds each. Total 412 beds in permanent Buildings.

The block comprising X-ray room, Operating Theatre No 1 and Hut No 1 18 beds, is being altered so that a large Operating theatre capable of working 7 tables will be formed, and the old Theatre will form the waiting room for Operating Theatre and X-ray Room. No 2 Operating Theatre will then be used as Dental Rooms.

Extension to Sergeants' Mess Kitchen is completed.

Post Office of Forest Timber has been completed.

Sections 13 & 13 (Emergency) and 3 tents of Section 12 have been removed, and four tents erected as Section 13 on the system of Nos 1, 2, 8 & 16b. Four additional tents to form Section 12 are in course of erection.

The erection of extra huts for Sisters and alterations to Bath-room and Sanitary accommodation are very necessary.

The extension of Officers' Mess is likewise a necessity.

The alterations to Pathological Laboratory, to give better light and working facilities are in hand.

Engineers are now entrenching the hospital to afford cover for walking patients and personnel, and also the sandbagging of huts as a protection against Aerial activity.

This has meant the digging up of gardens and other ground around the camp, which at present presents a very upheavalled appearance.

REPORT OF NURSING DEPARTMENT FOR
MONTH OF MAY 1918.

PERSONNEL. - During the month several Nurses have been transferred to Casualty Clearing Stations, including Sisters Snelling Steele, Staff Nurses Meldrum, Campbell and A.M. Wilson. The four former to Australian C.C.S.'s and the latter to a British C.C.S.

On the 23rd. Staff Nurses Burns, McKenna and Rodgers left for Australia via England. Sister Jolly who was in the Sick Sisters Hospital, Rouen, was transferred to England and boarded as medically unfit for service abroad.

HEALTH. - Influenza in a fairly mild form was in evidence towards the end of April and beginning of May, but was sufficiently weakening for the Sisters who contracted it to have to go to the Sick Sisters Hospital. There being a goodly number of Sick nurses from other hospitals, notably Americans, our nurses were returned fairly early in convalescence and were given light duties in the Mess, and were soon strong enough for other work.

The Convalescent Home at Etretat is a specially great boon to our nurses and at times when one is apparently "off colour" without being sick, a few days at that beautiful spot works wonders for them.

WORK. - The work of the hospital kept steadily busy, and though convoys were not large there were many severely wounded and Gassed Cases among them. The giving of Anaesthetics by the Sisters of this Hospital has been suspended by instructions, though their services in this respect may be utilised in cases of extreme urgency should there be a shortage of Medical Officers.

We are looking forward to the completion of the new theatre which will be able to contain five to seven tables and should thus prove of great service in the training of adaptable nurses for theatre work in the forward areas.

LEAVE. - Special Leave was granted to one Sister to England early in the month, and on the 24th. general ordinary leave for a limited number was opened, and three Sisters left immediately and we are now trying to keep up the numbers steadily because a good deal of lee-way has to be made owing to all leave having been suspended for about six weeks.

SOCIAL. - On the 25th. of the month the Tennis Court was officially opened and as the weather was perfect and there was a good attendance of visitors a very enjoyable day was spent.

As president, The C.O., (Col. J.A. Dick) attended and the Medical Staff was well represented. A large Marquee was erected in which Tea was dispensed, and the Unit Band contributed musical selections. Our American and English neighbours were well represented.

CHURCH. - The Services held in the Orderlies Recreation Hall are largely attended by Sisters and Orderlies and are a great source of helpfulness to all.



605. MEASURES FOR SAFETY FROM HOSTILE AIR-CRAFT

A. When to be prepared to take Measures for safety?

Whenever Anti-Air-Craft guns are heard it is to be understood that a hostile air-raid is in progress, and a state of alarm exists, and all preparations to take "Measures for safety" are to be made.

B. When is danger to be apprehended and Measures for safety to be carried out? It is to be understood that when the bugle sounds the call known as the "alarm" Measures for safety are to be carried out. Also whenever danger is apprehended, & the call cannot be heard, measures for safety are to be carried out by those responsible for the patients or staff.

C. The "Alarm" will be sounded on the bugle when the C.O. or Senior Officer, or failing an Officer, when the senior W.O. or M.C.O. present considers that danger is apprehended. The Alarm may be sounded and followed by "at the double" if considered necessary.

1. SISTERS:- Sisters not on duty will proceed to their trenches in the Sisters' Compound. (See also Order published June 4th) Sisters on duty unless performing an act of duty will, whenever danger is apprehended lie down where they are and as close to the floor and ground as possible. Steel Helmets are to be worn by all Sisters on duty. (Orderlies at Sisters' Compound:- These will go to the trench immediately in front of Chief Entrance to Sisters' Compound)

2. PATIENTS:- (a) Walking Cases
(b) Lying Cases.

(a) Walking patients will proceed to the trenches set apart for the sections, where they will crouch or sit down. Medical Officers of sections will direct all their suitable patients to their trenches when danger is apprehended, and take shelter with them. When patients are left in the ward the M.O. will remain with them having directed the walking patients to their trenches.

(b) Lying Patients: UNABLE TO WALK TO THE TRENCHES will remain in their sections and be told to lie down by their Medical Officer who will also take shelter there. Beds are to be lowered to the floor where possible. M.B. As far as possible lying Cases and any other persons remaining in huts & Tents should lie down close to the floor, and near a wall of the hut or tent.

3. M.C.O.s and Men (For Fire Picquet, Stretcher Party, and Convoy Party these trenches for 70 Other Ranks)

Fire Picquet: Will proceed to Fire Picquet Trench behind the Fire Station in charge of the Orderly Officer (Trench for 31 men)

Stretcher Party: will proceed to the trench for this party behind the Matron's Office (2 Trenches accommodating 20 men in each (To

M.C.O.s and men not on duty will proceed to the trenches also to them round and in rear of Recreation Hut and in front of Serge Mess. (Trenches Total accommodation in these for 171 Other Ranks)

Others on duty will go to their posts and when danger is apprehended lie down flat as close to the ground as possible.

3685 OFFICERS:- Officers in charge of sections (Huts or Tents) will on their morning and evening rounds make out lists of their patients for Hostile Air-Craft Alarm purposes: (1) Those fit to take shelter in the trenches (2) Those unfit to walk to trenches. A copy of which will be kept in the section. When an alarm occurs Officers will proceed to their sections and see that the walking cases are ready to proceed to their trenches, and as soon as any danger is apprehended, will go to the trenches with their patients, or direct the walking patients to their trenches, and remain with those unable to walk. Patients who cannot walk will be ordered to lie down in the ward as close to the ground as possible. Where possible the legs or beds may be folded up and lowered to the floor. Officers not in charge of wards, sections, or huts, or not upon other duties will go to the trench allotted to Officers in Officers' Compound. Administrative Staff Those on duty will go to the trench in front of the Orderly Room.

GENERALLY

Every person should crouch or sit down in a trench or if not in a trench expose themselves as little as possible, by lying flat on the floor, and as close to the ground as possible and near a protected end of a hut. Steel helmets are to be worn by those on duty.

ALL CLEAR.

When a raid is over the bugle will sound "All Clear" by the call "Dismiss" it should be remembered that one raid may be followed shortly by another raid or raids.

ADDENDUM:- Officers and Sisters will lie down in the ward, if on duty, as close to the ground as possible. Orderlies will do the same. Bed-Patients incapable of being moved will remain in their beds and as close to the ground as possible.




