

 RAILWAYS:- Damage to stock and removal of fittings,- The following is an extract from a report on the condition of a leave train on its arrival at the Base:-

Dirty- Many stoves missing - Many stove pipes missing where stoves have been left. Benches have been burnt in several trucks, First class French coach D.P.Y. 140 has been entirely gutted : not only have cushions been taken but the general structure of the inside of the coach has been destroyed apparently with an axe. The coach is in a disgraceful state and is certainly of no use on the train.

The above is only one of many similar reports which have been received of damage being caused to railway stock of trains employed for the movement of personnel both for demobilization and leave.

The damage usually takes two forms, either damage done by carelessness, such as broken windows and doors of passenger stock, or damage due to deliberate abstraction of fittings, such as stoves, seat cushions, etc.

This damage has lately reached such proportions that it is impossible to effect repairs, or to replace fittings sufficiently quickly to maintain the stock in condition, and considerable hardship is inevitably caused to troops who have subsequently to use the damaged trains, more particularly in cold weather. Damage of this nature can be avoided. Deliberate damage is caused by a small minority who do not appreciate the hardships they inflict on their comrades by their action. Damage caused by carelessness is only the result of thoughtlessness. All ranks are therefore urged in the general to do everything in their power by loyal co-operation to maintain trains in the best possible condition.

This order will be repeated in all Unit Routine Orders.

4. LOSSES OF MOTOR BICYCLES.

G.R.O. 3377 is republished for information and necessary action and will be reproduced in all Brigade and Battery Orders.

1. Attention is called to the increasing prevalence of losses of motor bicycles. The number of motor bicycles on the "missing" list is considerable, and is steadily increasing. As only a few of these missing machines are subsequently traced, the majority represent not only a financial loss to the Public, but also an appreciable shortage in motor bicycle transport owing to the difficulty of providing replacements.

2. The following points in particular are impressed upon all concerned:-

(i) Motor bicycles will never be kept in places from which they can be removed by unauthorised persons without such removal being observed.

(ii) If being ridden on duty, a motor bicycle will not be left behind, e.g., owing to breakdown, bad roads, hostile shell fire, unless the urgency of the duty is superior to considerations of the safety of the machine.

(iii) If a motor bicycle is left behind in the circumstances indicated in (ii) it will always be rendered unusable, e.g., by removal of belt and sparking plugs, and will be taken to recover it at the earliest possible moment.

(iv) Orders are to be issued in every unit which has motor bicycles on charge, concerning the precautions to be taken by despatch riders and others to guard against theft, and steps are to be taken to ensure that such orders are strictly observed.

(v) When reporting the loss of a motor bicycle, the report should always state what steps were taken to safeguard the machine, and a statement from a qualified M.T. Workshop Officer who knew the machine, will be attached, giving its estimated value at the time of loss.

(3) O.C. Units having motor bicycles on charge are personally responsible that adequate steps are taken to safeguard them. Cases in which it appears that the steps taken to avoid loss

were inadequate will be referred to the War Office with a recommendation that the O.C. the Unit concerned be ordered by the Army Council under Sec 137 (4), Army Act, to pay the whole or a portion of the value of the machine at the time of loss.

ADMINISTRATIVE INSTRUCTIONS.No:-13

1. TOWN MAJORS.

- (1) With reference to AUSTRALIAN CORPS HEAVY ARTILLERY ADMINISTRATIVE INSTRUCTIONS NO:- 6 (dated 10th December 1918.) Brigades will report names of present TOWN MAJORS to this office and also direct to Area Commandant, BEAUMONT, by 15th inst.
- (2) In future reference will be made by Brigades direct to Area Commandant, Beaumont, before any changes are made in the appointment of TOWN MAJORS.
- (3) Notification of such changes will also be sent to this office.

2. CORPS AMMUNITION DUMP.

- (1) A Corps Ammunition Dump for storage of all Echelon Ammunition, (including S.A.A.) on charge to AUSTRALIAN CORPS has been formed at FORGES de REQUIGNIES, (MAMUR 3A).
- (2) 14 Brigade will detail 1 N.C.O. and 3 O.Rs, and 68 Brigade 3 O.Rs, to report to O.C. Dump, at FORGES de REQUIGNIES near REQUIGNIES station, on 15/2/1919. This N.C.O. and 6 O.Rs, will form part of the Dump Staff. As the collection of the Ammunition will extend over at least one month, personnel detailed should not be due for demobilisation for at least that period. Accommodation and rations for Dump Staff are being arranged by Area Commandant, and 3rd Australian Divisional Artillery respectively.
- (3) Ammunition will be sent to the Dump in accordance with attached Table "A". Not more than 24 tons will be sent in on any one day.
- (4) Ammunition will be struck off Brigade charge on delivery at the Dump, and will be taken on charge by O.C. Dump. Brigades will wire to this office the amount so struck off by 1100 hours on the day following its delivery at the Dump. A weekly return of ammunition on charge at 0900 hours Friday (based on actual count) will be rendered on proforma shown in Table "B" attached, commencing 14th inst, and will reach this office by 1st D.R. Fridays.
- (5) All 60 pounder ammunition will be sent by Horse Transport, heavier natures by lorry. Brigades will demand necessary lorries from this office by 1700 hours the day before required. Owing to the condition of the roads in the neighbourhood of REQUIGNIES, no lorry loads will exceed the following amounts:-

- (6) Should "THAW PRECAUTIONS" come into force the despatch of Ammunition to the Corps Dump, either by HORSE or MECHANICAL Transport, will automatically cease.
