



1/20,000.WARNING ORDER - 24.2.1918.Right Group.
Left Group.

A raid will shortly be undertaken by the 9th. Infantry Brigade on or about 3.3.18. - About 300 men will take part.

The points of entry and the objective are the same as undertaken previously by the 10th. Infantry Brigade on 10th. February. 1918.

The 6th. Army F.A. Brigade will be available as before for reinforcing this Divisional Artillery and will occupy the same positions as previously occupied.

Two batteries of the Right Group will reinforce the Left Group and will occupy the same positions as before.

The 18 pounder barrage will be slightly altered, and will open 50 yards short of the enemy's front line trench; jump to his front line trench; jump 100 yards; jump to the support line; and from thence jump to the box.


Wire cutting will be done as before by 4.5" Hows. and will be covered by a bombardment of the whole area.

Between now and "Y" day the Left Group can arrange to put over rounds of 4.5" How. with 106 fuzes on the wire, this need not be made noticeable, and not more than 50 ~~yards~~ pounds per day will be fired on this wire cutting until further orders.

NOTE ON HOSTILE RANGING BY AIR BURSTS.

Interesting information has been received from the Left Group Artillery (3rd A.D.A.) respecting the ranging by air burst, last night (24th Feb) of two Hostile batteries.

The ranging series is reported by an observer at U 13 b to have begun at 9.10 pm. High air bursts of time H.E., probably 105 How, occurred over U 8 central at an average interval of 3 minutes; and the relative positions of the bursts gave the observer the impression that corrections were being applied.

After several single rounds, a salvo of three bursts was observed. The Battery then ceased fire. Flashes from the battery firing were picked up, and found to be on a bearing of 67° 30.

At 10.20 pm, another battery, on a bearing of 86°, began a similar series in precisely the same manner; and, when the latter series was completed, both batteries opened on battery fire, with percussion fuze, at a fairly vigorous rate.

The first definite location received by the Counter Battery office was at 10.7 pm upon a battery in P 33 a 1470, reported as probably 105 How shelling U 7. This result was a trisection by No 8 Group Observation Section.

Later, evidence confirming this was received; and, in addition, another battery in the neighbourhood of VW 52 was located.

Strong repressive measures were adopted to discourage these batteries, but it was found that though they immediately ceased firing when neutralized, they recommenced when our fire stopped. Eventually, however, it was found that a concentrated fire from several of our Brigades successfully silenced them.

----- OPERATION ORDER No. 47. -----

1. Two raids will be carried out on successive nights by the 9th Australian Infantry Brigade, each raiding party consisting of approximately 300 men. The 1st raid will take place on a date to be notified, which will be known as "Z" Day; the 2nd raid the following day, to be known as "A" Day.

Zero Hour for each operation will be notified later.

On each occasion the enemy trenches will be raided between the following points :-

U.12.c.00,20.
U.18.a.28,55.

U.12.c.33,37.
U.18.a.70,85.

and penetrating along communication trench to U.12.c.75,05.

The objects of the raids are as follow:-

- (i) To capture or kill as many enemy as possible.
- (ii) To damage or destroy material and defences.
- (iii) To obtain identifications, documents and other information.

2. Simultaneously, the Division on our Left intends carrying out raids on enemy trenches opposite its Divisional front.

The 11th Australian Infantry Brigade will carry out an operation against the enemy on their front on the same day and at an hour to be notified.

3. The 3rd Australian Divisional Artillery, reinforced by the 6th Army Brigade, A.F.A., will cover the raids. - Positions as per Appendix I, attached.

The B.G., H.A., is arranging assistance to be given by the Corps Heavy Artillery on each occasion.

4. All Field Batteries taking part will be attached to Left Group (C.O., Lt-Col. W.G. ALMSOP, D.S.O.) - Headquarters at T.21.d.20,10. - who will allocate the tasks to the Batteries under his command.

5. Command of the Artillery during the raids will devolve upon the C.R.A., 3rd Aust. Division. - Headquarters - RAVELSBERG.

6. Wire cutting is being carried out gradually as per Warning Order, dated 24.2.1918., and will be completed by "Y" Night, when the gaps will be inspected by an Infantry Officer who will render a report as to whether the wire has been satisfactorily out.

7. The artillery action will be exactly similar for both raids. Calibration will be checked where possible on datum points not on front to be raided. Necessary registration, reduced to a minimum will be carried out under Group arrangements and every effort made to avoid giving indication of forthcoming operation.

The 18-pdr barrage opens at Zero Hour 50 yards West of the German front line; remains for 1 minute; lifts to enemy front line; remains for 3 minutes; lifts 100 yards; remains for 1 minute; lifts to support line; remains for 3 mins; lifts 100 yards; remains for 1 minute; lifts to form a box round objective for 36 minutes, then searching beyond for 5 minutes to a depth of 500 yards.

8. Counter Battery work will start at Zero Hour and cease at Zero plus 60 minutes, unless requested to continue.
- Each raid will last until Zero plus 50 mins, when all guns except those on C.B. work cease fire unless orders regarding their continuance are received.
10. No instantaneous fuses will be used during the raids, except during the last 5 minutes, as shown in Task Table for 18-pdrs.
11. Incoming Batteries will dump their echelons at their positions.
12. The S.O.S. Signal will be inoperative on the front to be raided from Zero minus 30 minutes to Zero plus 60 minutes.

13. The O.O., Left Group, will detail one Officer, not above the rank of Captain, as Liaison Officer to accompany the O.O. of the Raid, (Lt-Col. MILNE, D.S.O.).
Lt-Col. W. CHURCHUS, D.S.O. will act as Liaison Officer at 9th Aust. Infantry Brigade Headquarters (U.20.a.50.90), during both raids.
14. R.A. Signalling Officer will arrange for a direct line from both Liaison Officers to 3rd Aust. D. A. H.Q.
15. Direction and velocity of the wind will be phoned from this office every hour from 7 p.m. on "Z" Day. If gas shell are not to be used, the code "Ref. Appendix 'A' NAPOC" will be sent through by phone.
16. Watches will be synchronised by a Staff Officer from 3rd Aust. D.A.H.Q., who will visit Left Group Headquarters at 6 p.m. on "Z" Day and "A" Day.





The issue of

educational literary matters is liberal and it is noticed that there is an enormous leakage as these documents find their way down to Juniors.

SITUATION.

The situation is that the German Government now talk peace and then of an offensive. Will the enemy attack? If he does - When? Where? How?

The Germans have not achieved a great concentration on the Western Front, this is proved by their own statements, and we know that he has no more than 20 Divisions more on this Front than he had at the same time last year.

The Allies strength is steadily growing, due chiefly to the arrival of the Americans in the theatre of war, and it is perfectly safe to say that we have more field artillery and more heavy artillery than the Germans, - and they know it. They know too what an offensive means and that an undertaking of this description cannot be carried out until such time as they have the men, munitions, equipment and general resources to bring it to a successful issue, and these are not now in their possession.

In the East Germany is involved to a very large extent in connection with the Russian trouble, and, although men of the most efficient age and usefulness have been transferred from East to West, it is not likely that any big move on his part will take place until such time as a greater force can be transferred, particularly artillery.

General opinion has it that he is not likely to attack until forced to do so by the internal situation, and this we know to be particularly critical just at the moment. The recent strikes are an example of this.

It is well known that certain big attacks have been undertaken to conciliate the feelings of the German people, for instance, the attack on the Isonzo Valley. As a result of this battle the Austrian Peace Party lost its influence. Internal affairs and troubles of an economic nature mean a lot in anticipating the likelihood of an offensive. If internal affairs are quiescent, and if he can feed his people by improved methods, then it is more than probable that he will wait until stronger forces are available before he launches his attack.

He can transfer his forces more expeditiously than can America. From the East to the West ten Divisions can be transferred monthly whereas America can only reinforce the Allies to the extent of four Divisions per month. Furthermore he can concentrate more quickly than we.

It may be that all talk of an offensive is bluff, and although telegrams telling of a great offensive and concentration are going over the wire daily, up to now nothing has happened. There are times when it would seem that his offensive would not materialize, and that his real purpose is a defensive one, and we may find that our defensive work has been all in vain and be switched on to an early offensive. It would be unwise, however, for us to suppose such a thing, and it is safer by far to assume that his idea is to make one big offensive and crush us on the Western front. If his idea is an offensive, then, an analysis of the courses open to him reduces the question to two clauses :-

1. A deliberate, long sustained attack over a wide front with ample preparation including a preliminary bombardment of two or three weeks, e.g., the methods adopted by us at Messines and Passchendaele. The latter offensive commenced on July 31st. and was carried on until well into November

November when the rigors of Winter prevented anything further being done. Such an attack as this requires an enormous accumulation of resources, guns, concentration of air services, railway communications, the last thing in Intelligence etc.etc.

- 2. SURPRISE ATTACK. General opinion is inclined to the belief that this will be his most likely form of attack. He tried it at Cambrai and we know he failed badly in spite of anything to the contrary that may have appeared in the press. At Riga he succeeded, the Isonzo attack was also a success, and his methods were always the same. Study carefully the captured orders in which the methods of the Germans are disclosed. Imagine yourself in the position of Russia and endeavour to meet the onslaught. It implies the Mons attack. A surprise attack cannot succeed when carried out by a weak force. The only successful attack of this nature must be carried out by from 50 to 100 divisions. Expect line upon line of men coming on shoulder to shoulder. We must expect surprise methods, e.g., The first gas attack, then the Flammenwerfer, and our surprise tactics at Cambrai. First we had tanks, then numbers of troops covered by a line of aeroplanes firing 300 machine guns, the moral effect of which was tremendous. All these were surprise methods and can be classed under the one heading. From a killing point of view these may be valueless, but the moral effect is great. Sir. H. Wilson said that nobody could tell him that he knew of a single man who had been wounded by machine gun fire from aeroplanes. At Cambrai there was not a single case of this but the moral effect was so great that some men turned and ran. Our artillery and our defences are strong enough to meet any surprise that the enemy may spring upon us, and there is not the slightest need for pessimism on our part.

OUR OWN SITUATION.

At Gorizia the Army was disorganised, the troops were underfed, and, above all, artillery support was weak. At Riga no aeroplanes were employed, and no attempt was made to re-organise the army after the revolution. Although the Bosche has persuaded his people that he is very strong we know that he has never been up against anything of a really serious nature, and that we are stronger in Artillery and Infantry, also that we are masters of the air (This is particularly applicable to the last ten days.) The railways behind our lines are also up to standard. The moral of our army is higher now than ever before, and we are quite ready for this threatened offensive. We feel that this is going to be our great opportunity.

Both the British and French high commands are of the opinion that the Bosche cannot strengthen his forces further, but on the other hand, his strength from day to day must diminish. An offensive must, and will, leave him worse off unless the result of such an offensive lowers the moral of the allies. This I may say is impossible in regard to the Americans, unlikely to happen in the British army, and, although possible, it is most improbable that such a state of affairs will ever come to pass in the French and Italian forces. Encourage our troops to inflict casualties. Territory does not matter. Teach them to look forward to the opportunities of inflicting casualties that will come their way and with this spirit we will win through.

Our answer to a surprise attack will simply be our alertness against surprise.

THE FORMS OF ATTACK.

Development of our fire power. The Germans fear our fire power.

Develop the moral of the men. Read the notes published by 4th. Army in connection with the attack at Cambrai to them (S.G.43/54.) Let them know "The Story of a great Fight" as an example of the power of fire.

Each C.O. should think out the different forms of attack

and how he is going to face them.

Perhaps the attack will come when we are in the line.

It may come when we are in the line but not on our particular front. We may be asked to take over a wider front and hold on for an indefinite period without relief.

We may be in support when the attack comes.

We may have to go forward in counter attack and recover lost territory or hold a rear zone indefinitely

If we should happen to be in a back area when an attack develops we may be sent into territory we know, but into fresh positions

where no organised defences exist. On the other hand we may go to some part of the line which was hitherto unknown to us.

We must be prepared for any of the above emergencies.

Undertake an Offensive.

(a) When in the line.

(b) When not in the line.

Mobile training is involved in every case. We have never yet been confronted with so many possibilities, and never has a higher demand been made upon our leadership. All must sit down and methodically work out the action to be taken in all cases.

DEFENSIVE POINTS.

(a) Plans.

(b) Defences.

(3) Tactics.

In addition to the above perfection of intelligence is a strong factor, and the necessity of keeping higher commands thoroughly conversant with the activities on the front cannot be overrated. Report the smallest incidents, and, if thought necessary resort to a telegram instead of delaying, what might perhaps be splendid information, by means of an ordinary despatch. Observers wires regarding destructive shoots, whether on our front or on our flanks are most important. Ten times too much information is far better than too little.

A new book S.S.135 to which a supplement is to be issued early in March entitled "A Division in Defence" should be read by every Officer.

The Commander in Chief impresses upon us the necessity of husbanding our resources. We cannot afford to waste our man power or resources of any description. Notice boards are being used for firewood. This practice must cease at once. Each notice board denotes something important

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NEW MACHINE GUN ORGANISATION.

Under new arrangements there will be four Machine Gun Companies each with 10 machine guns to be organised under a Lieutenant Colonel

ANTI AIRCRAFT DEFENCES.

In future each battery will have two Lewis guns to provide the with a defence against enemy aircraft. These will have to be man o. from the existing personnel. Anti-aircraft and Lewis Gun Officer will advise Unit Commanders and train men.

G.S.C.1.

Lieut. Col Jess D.S.O. dealt with the following questions :-

Successful assault on adjoining front. In the event of this what action should be taken.

How is Artillery fire to be brought to bear on portion of trench occupied by the enemy.

The question of keeping a "B" Echelon of reinforcement Officers and men.

"Q" Address.

Administration. Mobilization stores up-to-date. Question of keeping vehicles properly packed for quick mobility. Each responsible person in Batteries and D. A. C. to have a thorough knowledge of his duties 24 hours rations to be packed in Wagons.

G.C.C.

Attention was drawn to the general appearance of cooks. Instead of being the cleanest men, in the majority of instances they were the opposite. Out of fairness to the men for whom they cook they should make every effort to be clean in themselves and in their methods. Every G.C. is asked to join with the G.C.C. to endeavour to bring about an improved state of affairs in this connection.

In connection with this question the C.R.A. asked that aprons be supplied to cooks.

A.D.M.S.

Dealt with the question of wastage of man power and mentioned that of an average of 121 per week being rendered casualties. 23 of these were suffering from venereal disease. Every endeavour should be made to educate M.C.C's and men to take every care of themselves in this connection, and to make use of the facilities provided for the avoidance of venereal disease.

C.R. .

Brought up the question of a retiring barrage, and stated

that it could not be brought back on a local front until situation is cleared up.

G.C.C.

Said that the barrage could be re-arranged after the situation was cleared up only.

Continuing the G.C.C. said that first consideration was to be given to the Signal protection.

C.R.A.

Asked that the Divisional Artillery be given an opportunity of carrying out mobile training. Up-to-date no such opportunity had come the way of the Divisional Artillery although the Infantry had had several.

Examined on the following day, it was discovered that the men affected had an increased pulse, but no other symptoms were noticeable. Burst of the shell is similar to H.E. Apparently enemy Blue Cross gas shell.

New work has recently been carried out on trenches running towards the river in close proximity to these bridge-heads.

OUR FIRE.

During the day 13 pdrs. fired on enemy movement at C.12.a.47.40. and C.12.b.00.90. 40 rds. expended. 30 rds. were fired on a working party in V.19.a. - dispersed. 5 rds. were fired on target U.12.c.04.45. A small party of the enemy were working in this vicinity. 4.5" Hows. fired 25 rds. on targets at D.1.d.99.30. and V.25.a.35.65. 30 rds. were directed against cookhouse at C.18.b.12.23. Five direct hits reported and building extensively damaged. A M.W. emplacement located by infantry at C.11.c.80.70. was engaged - 33 rds. fired - shoot reported effective. - 44 rds. were fired on a Granatenwerfer at C.17.a.55.65. which has recently been troublesome to our Infantry. This shoot was carried out in conjunction with an Infantry Intelligence Officer and proved satisfactory. Several sheets of corrugated iron were thrown into the air. 4.5" Hows. fired on a suspected M.W. at U.12.c.30.50. and off shoots to semi-circular trench at this co-ordinate (See aeroplane photograph 3.B.A.198 of 16.2.18.) - 125 rds. expended. When this shoot commenced three men were observed pumping at this point and one casualty was inflicted. Four men were afterwards seen carrying this man away. A considerable number of direct hits were obtained during this shoot and works considerably damaged. At intervals during the night light harassing fire was maintained against this target - 40 rounds expended. Five men were observed to enter ruins at U.12.a.95.07. 25 rounds were directed against this target and 3 direct hits reported. During the night 18 pdrs. fired on active M.W's at C.11.c.61.83., C.11.a.82.02., and U.30.a.15.10. 30 rounds light harassing fire were directed against tracks and approaches in V.7.a. and b. This shoot was repeated at 11.30 p.m. and 11.45 p.m.

MORTARS.

M.T.M's. fired 8 rds. on target C.11.b.20.60.

STILE FIRE.
