



S U M M A R Y.

The month of January has been marked by the very few happenings other than the every day routine duties.

The 1915 men have been in the throes of excitement, expecting to receive demobilisation orders any day, but they were disappointed, and up till January 31st not one man had been demobilised from the Brigade.

The health of all ranks has been excellent.

The rations have not been up to the usual standard, but these have been supplemented by generous grants from the Regimental Funds, and in consequence the food has been good and plentiful.

The ration of coal has been very small, barely sufficient for cooking purposes, but by sending out fatigue parties to devastated areas, sufficient fuel has been provided to warm the billets and class rooms.

Sport during the early part of the month was very dead owing to the Imperial Units postponing and forfeiting matches.

Frost and snow during the latter days definitely put a stop to all out-door sports.

The Brigade Concert Party (Australian ZIZ ZAGS) toured COURTRAI, WATTRELOS and LANNOY during the month, and created a very favourable impression in all towns.

The Education has proceeded on satisfactory lines. The shortage of text books has proved a handicap to the Instructors, for with them, advanced classes could be formed.

The elementary and French Classes are well attended.

Full advantage is being taken of the opportunities offered by the Imperial and A.I.F. Authorities for men to gain or increase their knowledge of various professions and trades.

Numerous applications have been submitted for Non Military Employment pending demobilisation, but owing to this Unit being detached from Australian Corps, these seem to have been overlooked.
