

The two reamputations were both double amputations in whom fitting was impossible satisfactorily. Both are doing well. Both appendix cases were urgent and both are doing well.

Herewith report as requested of Amputation Cases still in Hospital. The total number in Hospital at present is 246. Of these there are:-

Pegged and on Boat Roll .....	127
Unfitted and on Boat Roll .....	16
Returning with wives .....	34
TOTAL	177

Of the remaining 69:

16 have limbs delivered  
22 have limbs ordered  
26 have pegs ordered  
5 are fitted and working in the peg shops.

Twenty-six ordered pegs should be completed inside a fortnight. The remainder of these limbs delivered and ordered should be nearly all completed within a month.

Herewith also report on Double Amputations:

The total number of Double Amputations admitted to this Hospital is 101. This figure does not include those cases with loss of one arm and one leg. Of these 101, 57 are double below knee,  
21 one above and one below,  
19 double above knee,  
1 double above knee and amputation of arm,  
2 double arms  
1 double below knee and loss of one arm.

Two Officers are included in this list.

Of these 101, 76 have embarked leaving 25.

Of these 25, 7 are now on the Boat Roll, 1 is at Bulford fitted and passed, 1 fitted and passed is being discharged in England, 5 have limbs ordered and 7 have limbs delivered.

I should like your instructions in reference to the following double amputations:-

1. Pte. Baillie.

This double was reamputated recently and will be ready in a fortnight to be fitted with a new bucket which the reamputation will probably necessitate.

2. Pte. Brown.

This double has been satisfactorily fitted on one side, the other side has been reamputated after repeated attempts to fit an unsatisfactory Chopart. He will need a new bucket and should be ready for the same in about a fortnight.

3. Pte. Turner.

This boy is a double below knee and has lost an arm. He has been fitted with one leg and an arm. The other stump is still

unhealed but should be ready in a week for fitting.

4. Pte. Langgaard.

This double below knee has one limb. The other stump has only just healed. He is almost ready for fitting.

5. Pte. Stevens.

This double has one limb; the other stump, a lower third leg, has a chronic septic condition of the end of the fibula. It would not be safe to reamputate inside a couple of months. He should either be returned unfitted or an attempt should be made to fit with tuber bearing leaving the end of the stump free.

6. L/Cpl. Gillies.

This double above knee is just ready for an excision of scars of both stumps. He could not be fitted without this.. He does not wish to return unfitted.

In reply to your LM.1503/1/74 of the 26th inst. re  
Kirk arm, the three men fitted returned on the 25th inst.

The special feature of this arm is that the fingers  
are capable of exerting a very powerful grip. A ratchet  
mechanism is worn on the opposite arm and flexion extension  
of this arm closes or opens the fingers of the artificial arm.  
The grip is powerful enough to hold any implement used by a  
labourer, and by this means the Amputee is saved the trouble  
of continually taking off and putting on adaptors for different  
tools. Another feature is that the thumb can be moved round  
for different grips. The arm is not aesthetic, but represents  
the most practical replacement for the upper limb that has yet  
been brought to our notice.
