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SCHEERPEN BERG.	11		<p>Capt A.W. Franklands A.A.M.C. reported for duty and took over command of unit from Major A. Goldstein A.A.M.C. who left to report to A.I.F. H.Q. ^{London} for duty.</p> <p>After reporting to Camp Comdt 1st Div H.Q. and Adms 1st Aust Division the rest of the day was spent in introduction to office routine.</p> <p>The H.Q. of the unit was established in a hut on the slope of Scherpenberg Hill and consisted of two sections, one the general office & the other the Q.M.S. office & store. The O.C.'s quarters consisted of a dugout close by. The unit with its cook house & workshop was accommodated in sand bagged shelters & sheds close to the Loce. Lablytle Rd about 150 yds from the office.</p> <p>The office organization included under the control of H7 Stewart W.O. - Sgt Dawkins I.Q.B. as general office clerk and Sgt Behrendt C. as Q.M.S.</p> <p>Office routine. Reports of inspectors from sub-areas on printed forms (Inspector Report) which has now been in use for about 4 months and brought to the office by D.R.L.S. in case of sub areas at a distance & by inspectors themselves in case of areas situated around H.Q. These reports are dissected by the W.O. & clerk a digest made of sanitary omissions, errors & defaults. This digest is then considered by the O.C. who decides whether recommendations which have practically in all cases have been already made to benefits by inspectors themselves, should be made a subject of a personal interview between the O.C. of the area and the M.O. of the unit, or the L.O. or adjutant of the unit.</p>	

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SCHERPENBERG			<p>or whether a memo should be written to the Co of the unit, or whether action should be recommended through Adms of the Division or in exceptional cases through D.D.M.S. Aust Corps.</p> <p>Regarding constructive work, necessary or according to these reports. A decision is made as to whether or not taking local circumstances ^{and material available} into consideration, the unit can be recommended to do the work, if not whether the section should supply having better facilities for construction, but generally with no greater facilities for obtaining material, ^(actual work done by Brigade Carpenter) or whether an indent should be passed to engineers.</p> <p>Inspectors weekly returns of sanitary improvements -</p> <p>Back inspector sends on Friday night a weekly return of sanitary improvements effected in each of the camps in his sub-area. This return shows:-</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> (a) Latrines dug & screened. (b) Seats on completed latrines. (c) Urinals erected. (d) Latrines under construction. (e) Urine pits under construction. (f) Incinerators erected. (g) Refuse pits dug. (h) Grease trap and soakage pits constructed. 	

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SCHERPENBERG			<p><u>Office Routine (contd)</u> <u>Water inspectors reports</u> - These are made on pro-formas (Specimen attached) and dissected in the office in the same way as the ordinary inspectors report. <u>Correspondence regarding sanitation.</u> Memos from Army, Corps, Division, and units are dealt with. Matters requiring interview are arranged for early attention - other matters dealt with by correspondence. Orders for sanitation material are approved and forwarded. Whilst being administered by Corps the following routine returns are made (Copy attached) <u>Office record of sanitary work.</u> An indexed journal containing the sanitary history of units under the sanitary supervision of the section, is kept. In this book units are indexed showing as main heading the formation such as Div Art. Infantry, Bnys, Machine Gun Coy, Adm C, Asl etc, and specialists such as Anti Aircraft Sect, Labour Coy, Salvage Coy, Mob Vet Sect, etc. Then as sub-headings - A.D. Batteries - Battalions, Coy, Section, etc with numbers.</p>	

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Schepenberg			<p>Each unit has a page or more. Entries are made daily in this journal, the date being extracted from reports. Entries show location, strength, existing sanitary conveniences with defects and other insanitary conditions, defects remedied, by whom, key works necessary, whether to be effected by unit, section or by indent on Engineers or Ordnance.</p> <p>The journal shows the completion in construction of sanitary work and appliances.</p> <p>It is at any time a useful reference with regard to the sanitary condition of a unit, and shows generally whether or not due attention is paid to the maintenance of a good standard in this respect.</p> <p>It shows plainly which are the units who only need advice and which are the units who require 'regulations'.</p> <p><u>Numerical record of inspections -</u></p> <p>A book is kept showing the daily number of inspections made and by which inspector.</p> <p>This information is used on the monthly report to Corps.</p> <p><u>General Office Routine.</u></p> <p>The unit being a self contained one which can move independently, the usual internal organization</p>

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SCHERPENBERG			<p>all the qualities essential in a good NCO added to special knowledge which can only be acquired by a man of good intelligence. Together with the valuable qualities of personality, an easy method of approach, an authoritative but unaggressive manner, which are rarely found well developed in men who have not yet made some mark in their career, (this type of man has generally passed his earlier youth)</p> <p>In the opinion of the present CO, the above facts indicate that to induce men so qualified to become applicants for duty in a sanitary section, a more liberal establishment of NCOs could be made with advantage.</p> <p>at present, the best types of men for the section can get practically no advancement as a reward for industry and keenness.</p> <p>There are Anzac men of good record at present in this unit who are still holding acting unpaid rank without much chance of advancement.</p> <p>These men naturally look for and apply for transfers to formations where better hopes of advancement are obtained. Thus there is a tendency to lose the services of the men best fitted for inspectors duty if these transfers are recommended. and if not recommended.</p>	

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SCHERPENBERG			<p>their services are retained with at least some loss of keenness for their work.</p> <p><u>Method of Reinforcing</u></p> <p>When vacancies in the section occur, reinforcements are demanded through the medium of a return submitted to D.D.M.s. Aust Corps, it is then forwarded on to A.G.B.D. and reinforcements selected from A.A.M.C. details awaiting to be drafted.</p> <p>Although men suitable for inspectorial or mechanical duties may be specially asked for, the indication seems to be that there are difficulties in the way in the way of obtaining the right class of men under the existing system.</p> <p>When Sanitary Sections were administered by Divisions, reinforcements were generally obtained by a choice of suitable men from Field Ambulances.</p> <p>Under present arrangements this transfer from a Field Ambulance might be arranged, but there is no authority for doing it, also it might cause confusion if demands for reinforcement returns were sent weekly as now directed by Corps.</p> <p>27/3/18 (arrangements now made with D.D.M.s Aust Corps to obtain reinforcements for ambulances.)</p>	

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Scherpenberg			<p><u>Detail of Personnel</u></p> <p>The following is the disposition of unit as at 11th inst. (Map of Area attached)</p> <p>Personnel are located in sand-bagged shelters on main hore - La Clytte Rd, about 100 yds from Div HQ approx location M17b Cent. Sheet 28SW. Spacious Cookhouse (fitted up with stove capable of cooking for an infantry Coy) Mess Room & Workshop is provided, situated about 20 yds from sleeping quarters. Ablution Shed and Sanitary conveniences also provided in camp.</p> <p>Attached is nominal roll of section showing the various duties performed by each member.</p> <p><u>Daily routine</u></p> <p>Reveille 6-30 AM Breakfast 7- " " Parade 8-30 " " Dinner 12 to 12-30 PM Parade 1-30 PM Tea 5-30 PM</p> <p><u>Area Boundary Sheet 28SW</u></p> <p>Northern - from I.28 to I.31. thence to H 36 to M.3 to M.7 to M.9 turning SE to M17 thence through N13 to N20 up to N17 to O.1 to O.12. taking in the Dezon - La Clytte, Ridge wood and Toornezelle</p>	

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Scherkerberg			<p>Areas administered by Area Commandants -</p> <p>The whole of this Area, independent of area Command boundaries is sub-divided into eight sub-areas individually inspected by one or more inspectors.</p> <p>For convenience, three front line posts were established, one at Larch Wood Tunnels and two at Spoil Bank Tunnels. (HQ. of Brigade in line)</p> <p>An intermediate post was established at area Command, Brasserie corner near Blzenwalle. The remainder of area was administered from HQ of section, Scherkerberg.</p> <p>This sub-division enabled contact to be maintained between section HQ and all detached inspectors, D.R.L.S. being used.</p> <p>This was the situation on the 11th March 18 when Capt. H.W. Franklands received Major Goldstein.</p> <p>During the period from 11th to 25th inst, CO visited all parts of the area, familiarising himself with the area, noting condition of camp, a system of water supply.</p> <p>Inspectors in the meantime continued their inspectory duties.</p> <p>This area had been practically that of stationary warfare, as military conditions in</p>	

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Schepenberg			<p>for many months camps were generally in well found condition. Permanent sanitary structures were well distributed in all but most forward points about the middle of March, action was taken by corps to organize on standard lines the disposal of horse manure. During the winter manure had been taken to fields or as in many cases, dumped in an irregular way in the corner of some field as near as possible to horse lines. A steady campaign of advice regarding the proper method of arranging and siting of manure dumps was instituted and a steady progress was made up till the 25th inst, when unit departed from that area.</p> <p>About this time it was also noted that units forward, complained of material such as biscuit boxes being unprocurable for conversion into latrines. This unit endeavoured to procure boxes for the use and found a similar difficulty. Requisition to G.H.Q. was then made for suitable material, which was not supplied. about same time DDms Aust. Corps called for an estimate of latrine seats required for the next twelve months. This was furnished.</p> <p>21st inst a detail inspection of Spoil Bank Tunnel</p>	

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Scherpenberg	24		<p>System was made by O.C. and report submitted by the request of D.D.M.s. This system of tunnels was used by rear/front line relief troops who remained therein for an average of 48 hours, at the same time furnishing front line fatigues. The system was an extension of one found at the end of Winter to be very damp. Tonsilitis and throat affection was common. The position of ground being in the soil from canal waterway.</p> <p>A short period of occupation by Battalion units had not tended to improve the standard of general cleanliness. Pan system latrines were found to be existing in bays off passage ways, near sleeping quarters. Suggestions were made regarding the better draining of passage ways and quarters into sumps and the institution of pumps. Also that latrines should be constructed outside the bank near tunnel entrances, well protected, but communicating by through ventilation with the outer air. As a result of this, latrines were shifted and the suggestion carried out.</p> <p>On 24th inst. movement orders to move with 4th Aust Div were received from D.D.M.s Aust Corps, and under the administration of A.D.M.s 4th Aust Div.</p>	

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Scheperberg	24		<p>Division was under orders to move "mobile", the section was attached to the 13th Aust Inf Bde Group.</p>	
	25		<p>Movement orders also contained instructions that all surplus stores were to be dumped at 4th Aust Div Dump. Meteren, all essential equipment possible to be transported in 750lb Ford Box Car. The move was south in the first place to Hermaville, near Arras, final destination unknown.</p> <p>Lieut moving 25th inst. N.C.O. driver by motor lorry. Ford box car and side car combination moved independently.</p> <p>As regards transport of equipment, it was found that after essential office material to carry on with cooks equipment, medical pannier, a few items of O.M. stores and O.C. baggage with motor driver's kit, were loaded, the tall other stores including office records, the whole totalling about 30cwt, had to be dumped at Meteren.</p> <p>Stores dumped included six cycles which were left principally by reason of O.C. want of experience of field conditions. It is since presumed that all this material is lost. Attempt made later during the La Bassée Pres Offensive, to recover these stores by 4th Aust Div, were futile, the dump being under severe shell fire.</p>	

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Gouy-en-Artois Acheny	25		The evening of 25 th unit arrived Gouy-en-Artois with 13 th Aust Inf Bde, and billeted awaiting further instructions.	
	26		Evening of 26 th unit moved in battle order with 13 th Bde to Forgeville (Somme). O.C. in box car, moved independently to Forgeville that evening. Side car combination had broken down at Bethune, reporting to Div Supply Col for repairs.	
FORCEVILLE	27		Unit arrived with 13 th Aust Inf Bde at Forgeville 8:30 AM. O.C. received instructions from ADMS Div. then at Baizieux for unit to report and be attached to 4 th Aust Fld Amb at Baizieux. Arrived that afternoon, reported and billeted.	
BAIZIEUX			Steps were taken to locate and examine wells at Baizieux, notice posted showing quality of water. Apart from this, practically no sanitation duties were carried out.	
TOUTENCOURT	29		On 29 th unit section moved with 4 th Aust Fld Amb to Toutencourt and there supervised sanitary duties at Ambulance Collecting Station, examining water supply in the village. At the same time instructions from ADMS were given through O.C. 4 th Aust Fld Ambulance

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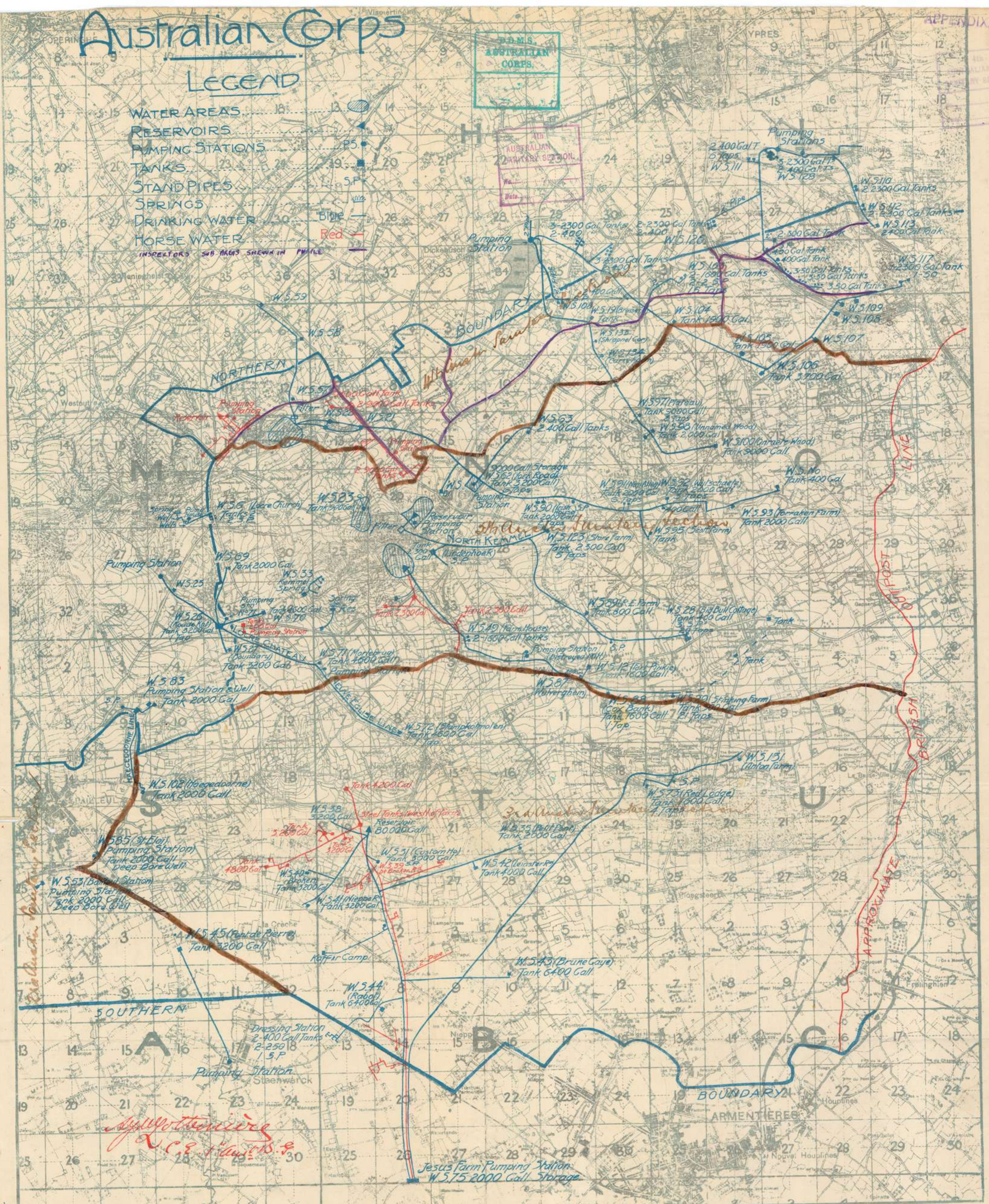

SANITARY ADMINISTRATIVE MEMORANDUM No. 5.

1. The following re-arrangement of Sanitary Section areas will come into operation forthwith.
2.
 - i. 1st Australian Sanitary Section will administer the Lumbres Area, occupied by 2nd Australian Division.
 - ii. 2nd Australian Sanitary Section will administer the Bailleul and Merris areas, less that portion of the former east of the railways running north and south from Bailleul.
 - iii. 3rd Australian Sanitary Section - That portion of the Bailleul area east of railways mentioned in ii. the Ravelsberg, Neuve Eglise, Kortepyp, Nieppe and Ploegsteert Areas.
 - iv. 4th Australian Sanitary Section - The De Zon, La Clytte Ridge Wood, and Voormezele Areas.
 - v. 5th Australian Sanitary Section - The Locre, Dranoutre, Beaver, Wulvergem, Kommel, Messines, Red Chateau and Grand Bois Areas.
3. The following routine returns only are required at this Office.
 - a. Weekly reinforcement return made up to noon on Saturdays, to reach this Office by D.R.L.S. on Saturdays.
 - b. Monthly report on area, in triplicate, as hitherto, to reach this Office not later than 2nd of each month.
