THIRD AUSTRALIAN DIVISIONAL ARTILLERY

INTELLIGENCE SUMMARY from 4 p.m. 2.6.18. to 4 p.m. 3.6.1918.

Ref. Map. 62 D.1/40,000.

OUR FIRE. At 4.35 pm. 18 Pdrs. of the Left Group brought fire to bear on VALRE WOOD in F.14.d.

18-pdrs of the Right Group carried out registrations.

During the night the usual harassing fire was maintained on enemy's roads, approaches, and centres of activity, while from 10 pm. to 5 am. 700 rds. were directed against area P.31. P.32. and P.26. Attention also paid to enemy's roads and tracks in U.6.c. & d. and trenches in V.7.a. & b. and V.2.c.

At 10.30 pm. 10.50 pm. 12.10 am. and 12.45 am. selected targets in V.2.b. & V.3.d. were subjected to Gas shelling by 4.5" Hows. - 190 rds. fired.

A hostile battery at P.22.c.2.8. was engaged by 4.5" Hows. during the day.

HOSTILE FIRE. The enemy's Artillery has again been active throughout the period, and a further slight increase in hostile fire during the night is reported. Shelling, however, has again been well distributed over the whole front. Main features were as follow :

From 5 to 6 pm. 50 rds. 15 cm. fell in O.32. and from 7 to 10 pm. 50 rds 10.5 cm. fell in CACHY. From 10. to 10.30 pm. 40 rds. 10.5 cm. HE and Gas fell in O.27.a. & c. From 9.30 pm. to 11.30 pm. 100 rds. 15 cm. and 10.5 cm. fell in V.2.a. & d. and V.3.c. from the direction of WARFUSEE ABANCOURT, and at midnight heavy shelling of our Front Line and forward areas in the vicinity of VILLERS BRETONNEUX took place, while O.28. and O.22. were subjected to intermittent shelling throughout the night, from 15 cm. and 10.5cm. Hows. - 200 rds., a proportion of Gas shell being used. On the Left Group front between 4 and 4.30 pm. 50 rds. 15cm. fell in O.10., and between 8 and 9 pm. 62 rds. 15cm. and 10.5 cm. fell in O.10.c. & d. and O.16.a & b. At 10 pm. 20 rds. Gas were directed against O.21.c. & d., while between 11.30 pm. and 3.45 am. P.19.c. was intermittently shelled by 15 cm. and 10.5cm. Hows. At 5.30am 20 rds. 10.5cm. fell in P.19.c. and from 9.45 am. to 10.45 am. 40 rds. 10.5 cm. fell in O.10.c., O.16.a., and O.22.

ENEMY ATTITUDE. With the exception of a slight increase in harassing fire during the night, no change in the enemy's attitude is noticeable.

HOSTILE BATTERIES ACTIVE. Hostile batteries have been active from the BOIS des TAILLOUX and WARFUSEE ABANCOURT. Sound Bearings of these batteries were 86, 94, and 120 degs. G.B. from P.19.c. 05.95.

INTELLIGENCE.

AERIAL ACTIVITY. - Enemy's aircraft have been comparatively inactive throughout the period. At 11 pm. 7 bombs were dropped in O.15.- damage not ascertained. At 4.25 am. 1 E.A. was brought down near our Support Line on the Left Group front.

MISCELLANEOUS. - At 8.40 pm. an enemy dump exploded on a bearing 109 degs. T. from O.29.d.0.4., probably in V.5.d. An enemy searchlight was active throughout the night on a bearing 92 degs T. from O.29.d.0.4. At 3.20 am. the enemy sent up six red light signals on the Left Group front. These were followed by light shelling off our F.L. system.

INTELLIGENCE SUMMARY from 4 p.m. 3.6.1918. to 4 p.m. 4.6.1918.

OUR FIRE. 18 pdrs. and 4.5" Hows, carried out further registrations during the day. 15 rds. were directed against a M.G. position at Tank in U.5.b. - one direct hit being reported. During the night the usual harassing fire was maintained by 18 pdrs. and 4.5" Hows, on enemy roads, approaches, centres of activity, and known enemy defences.

At 9.30 p.m. 35 rds. BNG were fired on targets at V.1.b.85.65 - 80.10. and 10.60.

At 2.5 a.m. Hows. and 18 pdrs. of the Right Group in reply to an S.O.S. signal observed on the front of the Right Battalion, Right Brigade, opened on their S.O.S. lines. Fire ceased at 2.20 a.m. Selected targets in P.31.d. and V.1.a. and b. were engaged by 18 pdrs. during the day - 180 rds. fired. -

An enemy Listenin Post at P.30.c.5.2. was also fired on with effect by 18 pdrs.

T. MORTARS. M.T.Ms. fired 10 rds. and 5 rds. on targets U.6.a.4.3. and U.6.a.5.8. respectively.

HOSTILE FIRE The enemy's artillery again showed considerable activity during the hours of darkness, fire being mainly directed against our forward areas and VILLERS BRETONNEUX. No gas shelling or counter battery work on the part of the enemy was carried out. Hostile fire during the day was light and scattered and mainly of a harassing nature from 15 cm and 10.5 cm Hows.

Main features as follow :-

From 5 p.m. to 6.30 p.m. 110 rds. 15 cm from direction 141° T.B. (Sound) fell in T.6.b. and U.3. and again at 10.30 p.m. U.3. was shelled by 10.5 cm Hows. firing from the same direction - 70 rds. - From 8.30 to 10.30 p.m. FOUILLY was shelled by 15 cm Hows - 50 rds. - At 10, 15 p.m. 40 rds harassing fire were directed against roads in O.14.a. - direction of fire MARCELCAVE. - At 11 p.m. CACHY was shelled by 15 cm and 10.5 cm Hows. 40 rds. and at 11.15 area N. of the village in U.2. and U.3. received attention from . Hows. of the same calibre - approximately 100 rds. -

From 1.30 a.m. to 1.45 a.m. approximately 300 rds 15 cm and 10.5 cm were directed against VILLE S BRETTONEUX and area to East of the town. Other areas receiving light attention were O.11. (30 rds. 10.5 cm) O.10.a., O.3.a., O.4.c. 40 rds 10.5 cm from 112° G.B. from O.9.d.4.4. - O.9. a. and b. and O.11.b.

At 9.55 a.m. a H.V. gun shelled AUBIGNY-20 rds- and at 11.30 a.m. a further 50 rds 15 cm were directed against CACHY, while O.11.a., O.21. O.22. and O.6.c. were lightly shelled at intervals during the day by 10.5 cm Hows.

INTELLIGENCE.

AIRCRAFT. E.A. were active during the afternoon of 3rd. inst. At 10.40 a.m. an enemy machine dropped 8 bombs on O.31., N.36.d., and T.5.b. damage not ascertained. Hostile planes were active over our back areas during the night on bombing operations. At noon 4th. inst. one E.A. crossed our lines on the Right Group front but was immediately driven off by A./. fire. E.A. otherwise inactive.-

ENEMY DEFENCES. New work is being effected on trench from P.26.d.9.0. to P.26.d.9.4.

HOSTILE BATTERIES ACTIVE.

At 6.30 p.m. flashes from a 77 mm battery were observed 130° Grid bearing from O.30.b.3.0.

MISCELLANEOUS. At intervals during the night an enemy searchlight was active on a bearing 90° T. from O.29.d.8.5. and at 8 p.m. a signalling lamp was observed 110 deg. T.B. from O.29.c.8.5.

ENEMY ATTITUDE. There is no apparent change in the enemy's attitude. Visibility poor - improving,

INTELLIGENCE SUMMARY from 4 p.m. 4.6.1918. to 4 p.m. 5.6.1918.

OUR OPERATIONS.

ARTILLERY. During the period 18 pounders fired 100 rds. on selected targets in V.2.b. and at V.1.b.5.6., V.1.b.9.5., 85.00., 4.2., and V.1. Central. 60 rds. were directed against Cross Roads at U.6.c.75. 30 and U.6.b.7.6. while further registrations were carried out by 18 pdr. and 4.5" Hows. during the day.

During the night the usual harassing fire was maintained on enemy's road, approaches and centres of activity, the following targets receiving special attention :- Railway Cutting in V.1.a. and M.G. at U.6.b. 9.8. - 60 rds. - tracks in U.6.b. and road junctions at U.6.b.7.6. & V.1.b.5.6. 60 rds. railway cutting in V.1.b. and selected targets in U.6. - 250 rds. - V.1.a.3.2., road junction at U.6.b.7.6., V.1.b.85 00. and U.6.b.91.20. - 180 rds. - V.6.a.80.94. and M.G. posts at U.5.a.4.3. and V.1.d.4.2. - 90. rds. while a further 700 rds were expended on enemy works opposite the ^{RIGHT} Group front during the night. At 12.10 a.m., 12.40 a.m., 1.15 a.m., 2.10 a.m., and 3. a.m. bursts of fire were directed against enemy works opposite the Left Brigade front.

During the period 4.5" Hows fired 32 rds. on houses in V.9.b. - several direct hits were obtained.

At 9.45 p.m. 50 rds. BNC and 20 rds. BX were directed against M.G. emplacement at V.1.b.1.7. and at 11.15 p.m. and 12 midnight 100 rds. BNC were directed against trench junctions at V.1.b.8.1. and V.2.a.45.10. At 2.40 a.m. and 3.20 a.m. 50 rds. BNC were directed against Cross Roads in MARCELCAVE, V.10.d.2.8. and V.9.d.5.3. and at 4.45 a.m. 50 rds. BNC were fired on trench system at V.1.b.88.78.

TRENCH MORTARS. NIL.

ENEMY OPERATIONS.

ARTILLERY. A slight decrease in hostile fire as compared with the previous 24 hours is noticeable. The bulk of the enemy's shelling occurred during the hours of darkness. No gas shelling during the period was observed. VILLERS BRETONNEUX and the western outskirts of the town were intermittently shelled by 15 cm and 10.5 cm Hows. during the night, and BLANGY TRONVILLE and railway in the vicinity also received attention.

Fire during the day was again light and scattered, and mainly directed against roads and tracks in the vicinity of our battery areas. One instance of hostile Counter Battery work was recorded, viz., at 2.45 p.m. 20 rds. 15 cm on 4.5" Howitzer Battery position at 0.20. d.54.50. from the direction of WARFUSSE ABANCOURT (Probably P.35.) No damage, however, was sustained.

Main features as follow :-

From 6.15 to 6.20 p.m. the enemy put down a barrage of 15 cm, 10.5 cm, and 77 mm on our forward trenches in the neighbourhood of VILLERS BRETONNEUX. From 2.20 a.m. to 4 a.m. approximately 320 rds. 15 cm and 10.5 cm were directed against VILLERS BRETONNEUX and Western outskirts in 0.27., 0.28. and 0.34. - direction of fire MARCELCAVE. Other areas receiving attention during the night were U.2.b., U.3.a., 40 rds. 10.5 cm, road in 0.13.c. 35 rds. 15 cm, 0.15 and 0.8.c. light, 0.16 a. and b. 50 rds 15 cm, 0.8.a. 40 rds. 15 cm, 0.10.a. 40 rds. 10.5 cm, 0.11.c. 50 rds. 15 cm.

During the day 70 rds. 15 cm were scattered over area 0.14.a. and 0.15.c. from a direction 78 deg Grid bearing from 0.9.c.20.25. and at 10 a.m. 100 rds. from the direction of MARCELCAVE were directed against 0.21. Central This appeared to be an observed shoot, probably carried out with balloon observation.

ENEMY ATTITUDE. No change is apparent in the attitude of the enemy.

GENERAL.

AIRCRAFT. Enemy aircraft has shown more activity during the period. At 8 p.m. 3 enemy planes flew over our forward areas on the Right Group front but were driven off by anti-aircraft guns.

At 8.05 a.m. one E.A. was brought down as a result of an aerial combat and fell in the direction of U.10.a. and at 9.30 a.m. another

came down on a bearing 95 deg. True from 0.21.a.39.88. This is believed to have been a hostile machine.

At 12.30 p.m. 7 enemy machines crossed our lines and passed over VILLERS BRETONNEUX. Anti-aircraft succeeded in driving off these planes.

OBSERVATION OF THE ENEMY

At 10.15 a.m. a party of 6 men of the enemy was observed in P.23. b. Parties of 2 men were frequently seen at the same place at intervals during the day.

BALLOONS.

Grid bearings have been taken of hostile observation balloons as follows :-

From 0.29.a.20.25. 09, 98, 119 deg. 30 min., 131 deg, 141 deg 30 min., 149 deg, 30 min. From 0.15.a.2.4. 93.deg 30 min. From 0.9.d.5.4. 90. deg. 188. deg., 133 deg., from 0.15.a.60.98., 120 deg., 139 deg, 150 deg., 155 deg., 170 deg., and 164 deg 30 min.

MISCELLANEOUS.

A stationary searchlight was active at intervals during the night on a bearing 92 deg. True from 0.29.d.8.1.

About 11.30 a.m. a fire believed to have been caused by hostile shelling occurred in VILLERS BRETONNEUX - apparently an S.A.A. dump.

Visibility fair - low at intervals owing to haze.

INTELLIGENCE SUMMARY from 4 p.m. 5.6.1918. to 4 p.m. 6.6.1918.

OUR OPERATIONS.

ARTILLERY. During the night harassing fire was maintained on enemy roads, approaches, dumps and centres of activity, special attention being paid to selected targets in V.1.b. and d., V.1. central, and Cross roads in V.1.a - 170 rds. - M.G. at U.6.b. and road at V.1.b.9.4. - 100 rds. - railway crossing at V.1.b.5.6. and centre of activity at U.6.b.30.34. and railway cuttings and tracks in V.1.a., U.6.a. and b. - 500 rds. - 200 rds on approaches and defences in Squares P.31. and P.32. In addition to the above bursts of fire by 18 pdrs. of the Left Group were directed against enemy works at 9.30 p.m., 9.45 p.m., 11.10 p.m., 2.15 a.m., and 3.30 a.m. At 10.15 p.m. 4.5" Hows. fired 25 rds BNC on MARCEL CAVE in V.9.d. and at 11 p.m. 25 rds. BNC were directed against V.9.b. From 12.15 a.m. to 5 a.m. 192 rds. BNC were directed against railway cuttings in V.1.b and V.2.a. At 3.30 a.m. a short concentration of BNC gas shell was fired on the outskirts of MARFUSEE at P.29.c.6.8. and P.29.c.1.4. During the day 18 pdrs. fired 60 rds. on limber in U.6.b. and 60 rds. on railway crossing in V.1.b., trench in V.1.c. and road in V.1.d. - registrations for fleeting opportunity targets. Registrations were also effected on hangar at P.32.a.30.45.

TRENCH MORTARS.

M.T.Ms. fired 5 rds. and 13 rds. on targets Q.36.d.95.95. and U.5.b.65.15 respectively.

ENEMY OPERATIONS.

ARTILLERY. During the period under review a slight decrease in hostile fire is noticeable. The enemy's attention was again confined to night firing and our battery areas received little attention. One instance of gas shelling was recorded. Our forward areas (0.35. and U.5.) on the Right Brigade Front were heavily shelled at intervals during the night; apparently in reply to operations of our Right Flank Division., whilst on the Left Group front the enemy shelled our trenches and forward areas in 0.22., 23., 24., P.13 and P.19. Fire however was light and well distributed, mainly from 77 mm guns firing from the direction of MARFUSEE - ABANCOURT. Other areas receiving attention during the night were 0.9., 0.10., 0.11., 0.15. a. 0.16. Central 10.5 cm and 77 mm light. FOUILLOY 10 rds 21 cm, 0.29.c., re-entrant in 0.22. and 0.25. - 50 rds. 15 cm - 0.22.a. and b. 0.35. (15 cm and 77 mm) At 10.45 p.m. 110 rds 77 mm H.E. and T.S. (nature not ascertained) were directed against CACHY and U.2.d. from the direction of HANGARD WOOD. VILLERS BRETONNEUX was also lightly shelled by 15 cm Hows. 30 rds. approximately - During the day 0.15., 0.27.b. and 0.16 Central 15 cm and 77 mm light. U.2.b. and d. VILLERS BRETONNEUX 0.28. 60 rds 15 cm, 0.27.a. 65 rds. 15 cm.

APPARENT REGISTRATIONS CARRIED OUT BY THE ENEMY.

At 4.30 p.m. a few rds. high air bursts from 10.5 cm Hows. were observed over 0.11.c. - apparently registering. -

ENEMY ATTITUDE.

Apart from a slight decrease in hostile fire and less activity on our battery areas, there is no change in the enemy's artillery attitude.

GENERAL.

AIRCRAFT. Hostile aircraft have been active over our lines on several occasions during the period, but fire from our A.A. guns succeeded in driving off these machines. At 10 p.m. enemy planes dropped bombs on VILLERS BRETONNEUX. At 11 p.m. our machines were active over MARCELCAVE and MARFUSEE ABANCOURT on bombing operations.

INTELLIGENCE SUMMARY from 4 p.m. 6.6.1918. to 4 p.m. 7.6.1918.

OUR OPERATIONS.

ARTILLERY. During the night harassing fire was maintained on enemy's roads, approaches and centres of activity, the following targets receiving special attention :- V.1.b.9.4., V.1.b.5.6., 85.00., V.1.a.9.7., road junction U.6.c., M.Gs. U.6.b.9.8. and 30.34., track junction U.6.b.6945., M.G. at U.6.a.61.12., road and trench junction in V.1.a. and U.6.a.80.94. - 690 rounds expended. In addition to the above 400 rds. were directed against selected targets in P.26., 27., 31., and 32 while 18 pdrs. of the Left Group fired short bursts on enemy's roads and defences at 10.10, 10.40., 11.30 p.m. and 1.30 and 2.40 a.m. At intervals during the night 4.5" Hows. fired on trench junction at P.26.b.5.5., P.27.c.0.6., P.21.d.8.4. and P.22.c.2.3. 100 rds. BNC were fired on railway cutting from V.1.b.00.70. to 60.50. 80 rds. BNC on P.31.d. and P.32.Central and 150 rds. BNC on trench and railway junction in V.2.b. and buildings in V.9.d.

During the period enemy movement at P.27.d.8.3. was effectively engaged by 18 pdrs and a small party of the enemy (10 men) observed along road in V.14.a. was fired on and dispersed while a further 37 rds. were expended on enemy movement at the following points :- V.1.a.9.4., V.1.b.5.6., V.1.b.85.00., and V.1.a.4.2.

TRENCH MORTARS. M.T.Ms. fired 11 rds. on buildings in U.6.a. and 5 rds. on derelict tank at U.5.b.65.15.

ENEMY OPERATIONS.

ARTILLERY. A further slight decrease in hostile artillery fire is reported, this was particularly noticeable during the afternoon and evening of the 6th inst when our front remained quiet. No gas shelling and no counter battery work were carried out by the enemy. Main features were as follow :- At 5.30 p.m. CACHY was lightly shelled by 77 mm guns from a direction 140 deg T.B. from U.2.b. 98.10. - approximately 50 rds. - From 10.35 to 10.45 p.m. our front line and support trenches on the Right Brigade front were subjected to heavy shelling by 77 mm guns - approximately 500 rds. - are reported to have fallen during this shoot. At intervals during the night 0.20. and 0.21. were shelled by 10.5 cm Hows. - 200 rds. Other areas receiving attention were VILLIERS BRETONNEUX, 0.35.c and d., 0.27.a., (50 rds. 15 cm.) U.2.d., U.3.c., 0.16.a., 0.34. and 0.10.c. Fire, however, was light and scattered mainly from 10.5 cm Hows. and 77 mm guns. During the day BOIS L'ABBE was lightly shelled by 10.5 cm Hows. while CACHY received customary attention from 77 mm guns. At 9.45 a.m. 20 rds. 10.5 cm fell in 0.20.a. and b. and a few rds. 15 cm and 10.5 cm and 77 mm were scattered over area 0.9. a. and b., 0.10.d., 0.20.b. and c., 0.11.b. and 0.15.a. The bulk of the enemy's fire appears to have come from BERTHE and HANGARD WOODS and WARFUSEE ABANCOURT.

ENEMY ATTITUDE.

With the exception of a slight decrease in the enemy's artillery activity particularly during the afternoon and early part of the evening, no change in the attitude of the enemy is apparent.

HOSTILE BATTERIES ACTIVE.

At 7.10 p.m. an A.A. battery was observed in action on a bearing 141 deg True from 0.29.d.9.2.. At .8 p.m. a flash from a H.V. gun was observed 105 deg T.B. from 0.29.d.85.10. Time from flash to report gun 16 seconds. C.B.S.O. was informed immediately.

At 5.30 p.m. flashes of hostile guns were observed 84 deg Grid Bearing from 0.24.b.8.3. - area shelled 0.27. - no. of rds. 30 - calibre 15 cm.

GENERAL.

AIRCRAFT.

Between 6 p.m. and 9 p.m. enemy aircraft were more active than usual. At 7.30 p.m. 2 E.A. crossed our lines at a high altitude. These were driven off by A.A. fire. At 8.30 p.m. an enemy plane flew low over our lines in the vicinity of VILLERS BRETONNEUX but was driven off by two of our machines. Hostile bombing planes were active about 11 p.m. and 3 bombs were dropped about 0.25.a. Central. At 9.30 p.m. two enemy planes patrolled our trenches at a low altitude.

BALLOONS.

Enemy observation balloons were up at 125 and 134 deg. Grid bearing from 0.24.b.8.3.

OBSERVATION OF THE ENEMY.

Individual movement was observed during the afternoon in V.14.a. At 4.45 p.m. a train was observed in W.8.a., and when fired on by our Heavy Artillery moved off behind LA MOTTE. At 4.15 p.m. a wagon was observed in P.27.d.

MISCELLANEOUS.

At 4.15 p.m. a large fire was started by our heavy artillery at V.10.c.10.75. and in buildings in this vicinity. Visibility good.

INTELLIGENCE SUMMARY from 4 p.m. 7.6.1918. to 4 p.m. 8.6.1918.

OUR OPERATIONS.

ARTILLERY. During the night the usual harassing fire was maintained on enemy roads and centres of activity, special attention being paid to the following targets - roads in V.1.a. and b; railway cutting in V.1.a.; road and trench junctions in U.6.a. and b., rifle pit in U.6.b., M.W. in U.6.b., roads in P.33., V.2. and V.3., P.26. and P.27. 1300 rds expended. In addition to the above short bursts of fire were directed at intervals during the night against enemy defences opposite the Left Brigade Front. At 12.40 a.m. 18 pdrs. fired 60 rds. on enemy M.Gs at 0.36.d.8.8. and working parties at U.5.b. 9.6. Other targets engaged during the night were selected tracks in P.24. and P.30. and M.G. post at P.25.c.8.5. and M.G. position at P.24.c.84.63. - 77 rds. OUR OPERATIONS.

ARTILLERY. During the night harassing fire was maintained on the following areas and targets :- V.1.b.9.4., V.1.a.4.2.; V.1.b.9.8., V.1.b.9.5., tracks in V.1.a., centres of activity U.6.b.23.34., M.G. U.6.b.9.8., trenches in U.6.a. and b., roads in V.1.b., railway cutting in V.1.a., P.31.b. and d., P.32.a. and d., and P.26.d.. Special attention was paid to Monument Wood in U.6.a. 1380 rds. expended. In addition to the above 18 pdrs. of the Left Group carried out short bursts of fire on enemy defences at 9.10 p.m., 10.15 p.m., 11.20 p.m. 12.30 a.m., 1.15 a.m., and 2.5 a.m. Harassing fire was also maintained by forward guns on area P.29. 15 rds. were fired on M.G. active at 0.29.d.9.9. and a further 15 rds. on M.G. at P.36.d.9.8. 4.5 Hows. carried out the following gas bombardments : - 370 rds BNC on centres of activity in V.3.d., P.32.d.; and P.22.d., 21 rds. BNC on suspected H.Q. and dugout at V.2.c.05.25. and 20 rds. BCG on the same target whilst the following targets were subjected to short gas concentrations by Hows. of the Left Group. :- Copse in V.3.a., assembly trenches in P.32.a. and dugouts in P.22.d. During the day enemy movement observed in V.14.a. was effectively engaged by 10 pdrs - 55 rds. expended. - whilst 4.5" Hows. carried out a destructive shoot on an enemy observation post at V.1.d.10.90. and tower at V.9.d.3.8. where movement had previously been observed. - 100 rds expended and many direct hits were obtained on each of these targets.

T.MORTARS. M.T.M.s fired 10 rds. on suspected M.G. position at U.5.b. 25.40., 14 rds. on M.W. at U.6.b.3.3., 20 rds. on 0.36.d.9.9. and 10 rds. on new work at 0.36.d.95.72.

ENEMY OPERATIONS.

ARTILLERY. With the exception of a light barrage of 10.5 cm in 0.23.c. and d at 8.15 p.m. 8.20 p.m. and 8.30 p.m. and light scattered shelling of a harassing nature our front remained comparatively quiet until midnight when the enemy opened a heavy bombardment of our front and support lines of the Right Brigade in 0.35., 0.36. and U.5. At 12.30 a.m. this shelling extended to our Left Brigade Front and at times became intense, particularly in squares 0.27., 0.28., 0.22., and 0.23. VILLERS BRETONNEUX and Western outskirts (0.29 and 0.30.) also received considerable attention and a heavy concentration of blue and green cross gas shell was put down. Our battery areas, chiefly in T.6. and valley in 0.15 and 0.21., were subjected to heavy H.E. shelling, while a large proportion of gas shell was employed. At 2.30 a.m. the enemy's fire had considerably slackened, and at 3 a.m., except for desultory shelling of our forward areas, our front was again quiet. During the day the enemy's fire has been light and scattered areas mainly effected being 0.19., FOUILLOY, 0.36.a., 0.9. a.b. and c., 0.8.b., 0.11.b., 0.15. mainly 15 cm, 10.5 cm and 77 mm whilst between 1 and 2 p.m. a H.V. gun shelled 0.18.a. firing 20 rds. These guns have shown increased activity during the period, fire being of a harassing nature directed against our rear lines of communication.

HOSTILE BATTERIES ACTIVE.

At 5.55 a.m. and 8.15 a.m. flashes of a railway gun were observed 125 deg and 121 deg 30 min Grid Bearing from P.19.c.1.9.

ENEMY ATTITUDE.

Between midnight and 5 a.m. the enemy's artillery showed increased activity and a large proportion of gas shell was used. During the remainder of the period the enemy's attitude remained unchanged. The enemy's action during the early part of the evening gave an indication that a probable raid about 0.36.d. would take place but nothing eventuated. OUR OPERATIONS

ARTILLERY. During the period 18 pdrs. and 4.5" Hows. carried out further registrations. Harassing fire was maintained throughout the night on enemy's roads, approaches, defences and centres of activity, special attention being paid to targets in V.2.b., U.6.b., V.1.a.b. and c., V.3.d., P.31.b.c. and d., and P.32.b. - 1820 A. and AX and 205 rds. BX expended. In addition to the above 18 pdrs. of the Left Group carried out bursts of fire/during the night on tracks, trenches, and assembly positions opposite their front. A forward section of 18 pdrs also brought harassing fire to bear on targets in P.24. and P.30.

At 9.45 p.m. 18 pdrs. and 4.5" Hows. carried out a diversion assisted by our Right Flank Division. ENEMY OPERATIONS.

ENEMY ATTITUDE. Quiet - no apparent change.GENERAL.AIRCRAFT and BALLOONS.

Between 4.30 p.m. and 6 p.m. one E.A. was observed patrolling our lines apparently observing shoot by 15 cm battery on O.29.d. ARTILLERY. 18 pdrs. of the Right Group carried out further registrations.

During the night the usual harassing fire was maintained on enemy roads, tracks, M.G. positions and centres of movement, special attention being paid to M.Gs. at 0.36.d.9.9., P.31.a.35.25., P.31.a.05.25., new trench at U.6.c.70.40., roads in V.1.a. and b., U.6.b., P.22.b., and 23 a. At request of Infantry one battery fired 4 rds. gun fire on target P.31.a.8.2.

4.5" Hows. engaged special targets at P.22.d.20.90. and P.32.d.80.80. with NC gas shell - 100 rds. fired. -

A working party at U.6.c. Central was engaged by 18 pdrs. and dispersed.

From 12 to 12.30 p.m. 100 rds 10.5 cm on FOUILLOY from bearings 45 deg. and 55 deg Grid from P.19.c.1.9. From 3.30 p.m. to 7.30 p.m. fire from 15 cm, 10.5 cm and 77 mm was scattered over areas CACHY, BOIS 1' ABBE, VILLERS BRETONNEUX from the direction of MARCELCAVE. From 8 p.m. to midnight areas, 0.34., U.2., P.19., 0.30., 0.15., P.13., 19. and 25 received attention from 10.5 cm Hows. and 77 mm guns. Our Front Line and support trenches in 0.36.d. received 60 rds. 10.5 cm at 11 p.m. From 1 a.m. to 11 a.m. scattered shelling by 15 cm, 10.5 cm and 77 mm over areas 0.4., 0.15., 22., 24., some of which came from the direction of WARFUSEE, took place. At 12.30 p.m. an H.V. gun shelled back areas from the direction of MARCELCAVE station and at 6.30 p.m. 12 H.V. shells fell in N.13. from the direction of MARCELCAVE. OUR OPERATIONS.

ARTILLERY. During the night 18 pdrs. and 4.5" Hows. carried out the usual programme of harassing fire on enemy's roads, approaches and centres of activity - the following targets were engaged :- Monument Wood in U.6.a., Railway cutting V.1.a., road junctions at U.6.b.7.6., V.1.a.4.2., V.1.b.85.00., V.2.b.85.91., V.2.b.5.1., V.1.a.9.7., M.G. at U.6.b.9.8., dugout at V.1.c.25.35., trench system in U.6.c., tracks in U.6.b., roads in V.1.a. and house at U.6.a.50.22. - 620 rds. A. and AX expended. In addition to the above 18 pdrs. of the Left Group carried out short bursts of fire at intervals during the night on enemy trenches and defences opposite their front, whilst during the night 4.5" Hows. of the Left Group carried out gas concentrations on the following targets :- V.10.a., P.22.a. and P.27.c. 4.5" Hows. of the Right Group fired 110 rds. BNC on target P.22.c.7.2., 50 rds. BCG on P.27.c.50.15., 68 rds. BNC on P.27.c.2.2., 50 rds. BCG on Cross Roads at V.10.a.1.6., and 60 rds. BNC on billets in MARCELCAVE-V.10.a. - A forward section of 18 pdrs carried out harassing fire on roads and approaches in P.35.b. An 18 pounder battery of the Superimposed Group occupied a forward position during the night and carried out harassing fire on the enemy's rear lines, the following targets being engaged :- P.29.c.8.8. rods at P.29.c.8.8. and P.30.b.0.3. and from P.28.d.8.4. to P.29.d.0.4. railway gun position in W.7. Central with 106 fuzes, BAYONVILLERS, Q.32.c.4.5., W.2.a.4.8. 250 rds. expended. After completing its task this battery withdrew to its normal position.

During the day further registrations were carried out by 18 pdrs and 4.5" Hows. 58 rds. were expended on Monument and Monument Wood in U.6.a., 73 rds. on Cross Roads in U.6.b. and V.14.a.

During the afternoon 4.5" Hows. of the left Group engaged M.G. positions at P.26.a.9.1. and P.26.c.8.8. Infantry report the shoot on these targets as very effective, and targets were completely demolished.

ENEMY OPERATIONS.

ARTILLERY. During the period under review there has been a marked decrease in the enemy's artillery activity, this was particularly noticeable throughout the hours of darkness. During the day hostile artillery has shown a slight increase, but was generally scattered and of a harassing nature; the bulk of this shelling being directed against area between our support trenches and battery positions.

HOSTILE BATTERIES ACTIVE.

Three flashes from an enemy gun of large calibre were observed 112 deg. T.B. from U.2.b.85.10. At 10 p.m. flashes were observed 110 deg. Grid bearing from P.19.c.05.95. and at 7.5. a.m. 131. deg. 30 min from the same location.

ENEMY ATTITUDE.

Quiet. No apparent change.

GENERALAIRCRAFT AND BALLOONS.

Enemy aircraft showed normal activity during the period. His bombing machines were active over our lines during the night and at 12 midnight 7 small bombs were dropped on CACHY. Between 1.30 p.m. and 2 p.m. 3 E.A. were active flying low over VILLERS BRETONNEUX. These machines were subsequently driven off by A.A. and Lewis gun fire.

Enemy Observation Balloons were up during the period as follows :-

From 37th. French Divn.- Between MONTDIDIER and L'OISE the Germans have again begun to push forward during the day aaa On the French Left all his efforts have been in vain aaa The French have advanced in the area of BELLOY WOOD and ST. MAUR and captured 400 prisoners several guns and many Machine Guns. There is no change on the front of ST. MAUR - ANTHEUIL aaa On the French right the Germans have again begun to attack aaa On the River MARTZ with heavy losses they have taken the southern bank in the village of MELICOCQ and on the hills of GROIX-PICARD aaa East of the OISE the French troops have retreated during the night before last on the line BAILLY - TRACY LE VAL East of NAMPEREL aaa In the area HAUTE BRAYE the French have pushed back an enemy attack and captured prisoners aaa South of the AISNE severe fighting has taken place between the river and the forest of VILLERS COTTERET aaa The Germans have advanced slightly on the hill West of DOMMIERS and CUTRY aaa North of the MARNE the French have retaken MONTECOURT and the woods North of ELOUP and the south part of BUSSIERES.

From Fourth Army. Following from GHQ timed 10.35 am. (13th) aaa our line advanced last night S.W. of MERRIS 36 prisoners captured aaa E. of DICKEBUSCH LAKE French regained whole of Ridge Wood with 30 prisoners aaa French secured 300 additional prisoners in mopping up woods S. of BELLOY aaa French retook MELICOCQ this morning aaa 100 prisoners and some M.Gs. captured.

During yesterday evening and night enemy did not renew attack opposite MONTDIDIER and in region of ANTHEUIL the French troops have consolidated their positions aaa On right the French counter-attack has pushed enemy across River . On the Right of MARTZ they have re-occupied Hills of CROIX-RICARD and MELICOCQ and captured number of prisoners and M.Gs. Heavy fighting continues between LAISNE and Forest of VILLERS-COTTERETS aaa Germans have advanced as far as River E. of LAVERSINE and have been repulsed in attempt to set foot in COEUVRE and ST. ARTILLERY. During the period 4.5" Hows. and 18 pdrs. carried out registrations. From 10.15 p.m. to 10.35 p.m. Counter Preparation Scheme Phase 1. B. was carried out by 18 pdrs. and 4.5" Hows. on the enemy's lines opposite the Divisional Front. In addition to the above the usual harassing fire was maintained on enemy's roads, approaches and centres of activity during the hours of darkness, the following targets being engaged. Roads and tracks in V.1.a. and b., V.2.b., road junctions in U.6.b., trench at V.1.a.85.60., centres of activity at U.6.b.52.13., dugout at V.1.c.25.35., railway embankment in V.1.a. and b., MARCELCAVE (V.10.a.), Headquarters at V.2.c.05.35., trench crossing railway line in V.2.a., P.31., 32., and 27.c., while 4.5" Hows. and 18 pdrs. of the Left Group brought short bursts of fire to bear on enemy defences at 12.15. a.m., 12.40 a.m., 1.20 a.m., and 2.30 a.m., the following areas receiving special attention. P.33.a., P.21.b., and P.22.a. A forward section of 18 pdr. harassed enemy's rear lines in P.29.a. and b. At intervals during the night short concentrations were carried out on targets V.3.a.4.3. by 4.5" Hows. No gas shell were expended owing to unfavorable weather conditions. ENEMY OPERATIONS.

ARTILLERY. The enemy's artillery has again been comparatively quiet. His fire during the night, with the exception of a moderately heavy bombardment of the front line of the Right Brigade between 3 and 4 a.m., was confined mainly to light intermittent shelling of a harassing nature directed against our intermediate areas, chiefly between our battery positions and support lines. Fire during the day was light and well distributed over the whole front. Main features were as follow :- At 6.10 p.m. VILLERS SWITCH was shelled by 77 mm guns - approximately 100 rds. from the direction of WAREUSEE. Other areas receiving attention were VILLERS BRETONNEUX and Station, 0.22.a. and d., 0.21.b. and c., C.26.a., U.3.a., 0.27.a., and T.6.b.; whilst during the day U.2.d, BOIS d'AQUENNE, 0.12., 0.29.d., and VILLERS BRETONNEUX and vicinity were lightly shelled by 15 cm and 10.5 cm Hows. and 77 mm guns.

HOSTILE BATTERIES ACTIVE.

At 9.15 a.m. and 9.30 a.m. flashes were observed 116 deg. G.B. from 0.30.b.3.0. Area shelled 0.12. Flashes were also observed 96 and 88 deg. T.B. from U.2.b.98.10. At mid-day a gun of large calibre was seen firing on a flash bearing 109 deg. True from U.2.b.25.10.

ENEMY ATTITUDE. Apart from increased harassing fire during the night there is no apparent change in the attitude of the enemy.

AIRCRAFT and BALLOONS.

During the afternoon of the 13th inst enemy aircraft made repeated attempts to cross our lines in the vicinity of VILLERS BRETONNEUX. On each occasion these machines were driven off by A... Fire. E.A. were inactive during the morning of the 14th. inst. Enemy Observation Balloons were up 120, 143, 148, and 80 deg. T.B. from U.2.b.98.10. Balloons were also observed 131, 134 and 158 deg. T.B. from Q.30.b.3.0. and 130 deg. 30 min. T.B. from Q.21.e.39.88. The latter balloon was subsequently brought down in flames.

OBSERVATION OF THE ENEMY.

At 5.30 p.m. considerable movement was observed in V.14.a. and V.7.b.. This was engaged on several occasions by 18 pdrs. and casualties inflicted. At 7.15 p.m. 3 men were observed running along road from V.2.c. to V.8.a.. At 11.35 a.m. a small party of the enemy was observed proceeding towards V.14.a. A Headquarters is suspected close to group of sis trees in this vicinity. Abnormal movement has been observed during the day in the enemy's rear lines, chiefly about BAYONVILLERS and Q.31. and 32., while considerable train activity has been observed in rear of MARCELCAVE.

MISCELLANEOUS.

During our Counter Preparation shoot at 10.25 p.m. an enemy ammunition dump was blown up on a bearing 85 deg T. from T.6.b.40.70. The same dump was observed on a bearing 98 deg. T. from Q.25.b.00.85. probably in P.33.

From 37th Division (French).-

FRENCH COMMUNIQUE. - During the day the Germans have launched a powerful attack from COURCELLES to the North of MERY. Caught in the French fire they did not pierce the French line but were thrown back after suffering heavy losses. During the attack the French captured 10 guns of which 4 were heavies, and a very large number of M.Gs. To the South of the AISNE the Germans have continued the attack this morning between the AISNE and the forest of VILLERS COTTERET. The enemy has been repulsed at most points, but has succeeded in setting foot in the village of VERSINE. All their attempts to capture COEUVRES and to advance to the West of the farm of VERTFEVILLE have completely failed. The attacks to the North of CORCY were not renewed during the afternoon, but the French, whose line had been momentarily pierced have re-established themselves. The Artillery battle is fairly lively in the L'OURCQ region towards CHAMPLAT and the POMPEILLE. The day has been quiet on the remainder of the front.- 5 a.m.

ARTILLERY. From 5 p.m. to 6.30 p.m. 18 pdrs. carried out a bombardment of enemy front line trenches from P.26.a.0.5. to P.20.a.7.0. At 9.30 p.m. an 18 pdr. Battery (402nd. Battery, 14th. Brigade R.F.A.) occupied a forward position at O.17.d.1.8. and engaged enemy routes and approaches as follow : - P.23.a. Central to P.23.c. 9.5. - P.22.Central to P.29.a.2.2. - P.28.b.5.3. to P.29.c.05.30. - P.28.b.4.4. to P.29.a.2.2. 200 rds. (Shrapnel in bursts of fire) were expended during the operation. At 12.15 a.m. this battery withdrew to its normal position without suffering any casualties. Between 10.15 p.m. and 10.35 p.m. Counter Preparation Scheme Phase 1. B. was carried out by 4.5" Hows. and 18 pdrs. on enemy's assembly areas and tender spots opposite the Divisional Front. In addition to the above, in anticipation of an enemy relief, intensive harassing fire was maintained on enemy roads, approaches and centres of activity during the hours of darkness, the following targets receiving special attention : - Dugouts in V.1.c., trenches in U.6.c., Cross Roads in U.6.b., V.1.a. and b., V.2.b.85.91., V.2.b.50.10., roads leading to MARCELCAVE, Cross Roads in P.31.d. and selected targets in P.31., P.29.d., P.32., P.35.a., P.33.b., P.21.b., P.34.c. and d. 2100 rds. expended by 18 pdrs., while 18 pdrs. of the Left Group fired short bursts of fire at frequent intervals during the night on enemy roads, approaches and defences opposite their front.

During the night gas and H.E. bombardments by 4.5" Hows. were carried out on the following targets : - H.Q. at V.2.c.05.35., assembly areas in P.32.a., P.32.d., P.27.c., P.33.a., dugouts in P.22.c., billets in V.10.b., roads in P.33.b., trenches in V.3.a. and c., - approximately 1,080 rds. BNC and BCG gas shell expended. In addition, a large proportion of H.E. was also expended on the above targets.

ENEMY OPERATIONS

ARTILLERY. A slight increase in hostile fire as compared with the previous 24 hours is noticeable. Shelling, however, has been well distributed and mainly directed against our forward areas, although two instances of registration of our battery positions were reported.

Light gas shelling took place during the night. The enemy's reply to our Counter Preparation scheme carried out at 10.15 p.m. was light and scattered and chiefly directed against our most forward areas.

H.V. guns have been comparatively active during the period shelling our back areas, while AMIENS received intermittent attention during the night. Main features were as follow : -

At 8.15 p.m. O.22.d., O.27.a. and b. and O.28.a. were subjected to a heavy area shoot by 10.5 cm Hows. and 77 mm guns firing from a direction 98 deg. T.B. from O.29.d.8.5. Approximately 200 rds. were reported to have fallen in these squares, a large proportion of which was gas shell. H.V. guns have been active during the period shelling O.16.a. (24 rds. 15 cm), O.13. Central. (6 rds.), O.27.a. (20 rds. 10.5 cm) and AMIENS(10 rds. 24 cm) from 96 deg T.B. from U.2.b.95.10.

HOSTILE BATTERIES ACTIVE.

At 7.15 a.m. a flash from a railway gun was observed firing from V.12.a.8.8.. The same gun was also observed firing at 10.10 a.m. on a bearing 96 deg. T. fro U.2.b.95.10. - engaged and silenced by our heavy artillery. A hostile battery on a bearing 110 deg. T. from O.29.d.8.5. (approximately P.34.b.) was effectively engaged by our heavy artillery. Three explosions and one fire were caused. At 11.35 a.m. a 15 cm How. was observed firing from the direction of WIENCOURT. Time from flash to report of gun 15 seconds.. Observed from U.2.b.95.10. Sound bearings of a 21 cm How. shelling U.6.b. were taken 128 and 131 deg T.B. from U.2.b.95.10.

COUNTER BATTERY WORK.

At 1.30 p.m. an enemy 21 cm battery (2 Hows.) opened on 25th and 27th battery positions in T.6.b. Shelling was still continuing at 4 p.m., but no damage up to this hour had been sustained - approximately 70 rds. fired from a direction 131 and 128 deg. T.B. sound from U.2.b. 95.10. The 27th. battery position in T.6.b. was registered by 10.5 cm Hows. between 11 a.m. and 1.30 p.m. on 15th inst. Ranging being carried out with aeroplane observation.

ENEMY ATTITUDE.

Increased fire in the vicinity ^{of battery} areas otherwise no change.

AIRCRAFT. & BALLOONS.

A considerable amount of railway activity was noticed about HARBONNIERES and BAYONVILLERS during the period. Smoke from the engine of a train leaving the latter place was observed at 11 a.m.

OUR OPERATIONS.

ARTILLERY. During the afternoon of the 16th. inst. 18 pdrs fired 100 rds on MARCELCAVE, railway culvert at V.1.b.5.6., and roads leading to MARCELCAVE village. Further registrations and calibrations were carried out by 18 pdrs. and 4.5" Hows. during the period. At 8.25 p.m. and 8.30 p.m. NF. calls at P.24.c.87.32. and P.24.b.37.07. were answered by 18 pdrs. No. result. 2400 rds. were expended by 18 pdrs. on enemy roads, approaches, dumps and centres of activity during the hours of darkness - harassing fire. - 4.5" Hows. fired 225 rds. NC. and CG. gas shell on selected targets in V.3.a. and V.2.b., P.27.c., R32.b., and P.22. Central. At 9.40 p.m. an 18 pdr. battery occupied a forward position at O.18.a.6.1. and engaged targets as follows :- P.24.c.85.15., P.24.d.4.4., P.30.c.3.0., P.30.c.80.05., LA MOTTE (P.36.a. 6.8) - 200 rds. AX expended. - This battery withdrew to its normal position at 10.45 p.m.

At 4.25 a.m. a small party of the enemy observed in P.21. was engaged by 18 pdrs. and dispersed. A considerable amount of individual movement was observed during the day in V.14. This was effectively dealt with by fire from 18 pounders.

T. MORTARS. M.T.Ms. fired 52 rds. on enemy front line and wire from U.5.d.70.80. to U.5.b.95.45.

ENEMY OPERATIONS.

ARTILLERY. A marked decrease in the enemy's artillery fire for the period is noticeable. Light shelling of VILLERS BRETONNEUX and O.28.a.b. and d. took place during the night, and three instances of gas shelling were reported. Otherwise hostile artillery has been comparatively inactive. Main features were as follows :- At 8.40 p.m. 60 rds. 10.5 cm H. E. and gas (Phosgene) fell in O.13.d. and N.24.b. - direction of MARCELCAVE.. At 9.20. p.m. a further 50 rds. were directed against O.20.a. and O.14.c. At 3 a.m. 50 rds. 10.5 cm fell in BOIS d'AQUENNE.. At 9 a.m. 100 rds. 15 cm H.E. and gas (Nature not ascertained) were scattered over O.14.a. b. and c. Other areas receiving attention were O.15., O.22., O.13.d., O.14.c. (50 rds. 10.5 cm) O.10.a.c. and d (50 rds. 15 cm and 77 mm), O.16.a. and c. and CACHY (55 rds. 15 cm and 10.5 cm). During the day the enemy's artillery was abnormally quiet. With the exception of a Counter Battery shoot by 15 cm H.V. guns on one of our 6" gun batteries in N. 27.d. no shelling of importance was recorded.

HQ'S TIE BATTERIES ACTIVE.

Flashes from an H.V. gun were observed 90° T.B. from U.2.b.98.10. - time from flash to report of gun 29 seconds. - area shelled not ascertained.

ENEMY ATTITUDE. No apparent change.GENERAL.AIRCRAFT AND BALLOONS.

Considerable aerial activity on both sides took place during the period. At 7.35 p.m. approximately 40 of our machines crossed the enemy's lines flying due East. Hostile anti-aircraft fire was very heavy but ineffective. At 7.40 p.m. 1 E.A. was brought down in enemy territory by one of our scouts after a long chase. At 10.50 p.m. 20 bombs (small) were dropped on the Western outskirts of VILLERS BRETONNEUX. At 7.30 a.m. 2 E.A. flew over one of our battery positions in O.26.a. but were immediately driven off by A.A. gun fire. At 10 a.m. one of our planes was driven down and crashed at V.9.b.9.5. and at 1.25 p.m. a single seater enemy scout was driven down as the result of an aerial combat and forced to land at U.2.b.8.1. The pilot was wounded but the machine was intact. Enemy observation balloons were up during the period as follow :- 87, 104, 132, 155, 149, T.B. from U.2.b.95.10. Other bearings taken were 80, 116, 137, 145, and 159 degs. G.B. from O.30.b.5.4.

OUR OPERATIONS.

ARTILLERY. During the period 18 pdrs. checked registrations of S.O.S. lines, while both 18 pdrs. and 4.5" Hows. carried out further registrations opposite the Divisional front.

Harassing fire was maintained throughout the night on enemy roads, approaches and centres of activity in V.1. a. and b., V.2.a. and b., U.6.b., P.31., and P.32. - 1400 rounds expended. In addition to the above 18 pdrs. of the Loft Group brought short bursts of fire to bear on enemy's lines in P.20., 21., 25., 26., and 27 - ammunition expended 1,200 rounds. While a forward section of 18 pdrs harassed the enemy's lines in P.28.a. and c. and P.29. At 9.45 p.m. an 18 pdr. battery occupied a forward position at O.17.a.9.1. and engaged the following targets - P.23. Central to P.23.c.9.5., P.22. Cent. to P.29.a.2.2., P.28.b.4.4. to P.29.a.2.2., P.28.b.5.3. to P.29.c.63.30. - 200 rounds (shrapnel) in short bursts were directed against the above targets. This battery withdrew to its normal position at 12.15 a.m. 4.5" Hows. fired 478 rds. NC. and OG. gas shell on selected targets in P.22.a., P.32.d., and V.2.b. while 52 rds. EX were directed against pillbox at V.2.a.45.40. and 26 rds. on occupied house at V.2.b.30.15.

T. MORTARS. M.T.Ms. fired 60 rds. on enemy's front line and wire from U.6.a.6.8. to O.36.d.45.10. and 30 rds. on enemy's Front Line and wire from U.5.b.95.45. to U.5.d.70.80.

ENEMY OPERATIONS.

INFANTRY. Under cover of a heavy bombardment an enemy party of an estimated strength of 2 Officers and 40 O.Rs. attempted to raid our trenches in U.5.b. at 1.45 a.m., but was completely repulsed leaving 5 wounded prisoners in our hands.

ARTILLERY. No change is noticeable. Shelling has been well distributed over our front, VILLERS BRETONNEUX receiving considerable attention during the night, while between 1.30 and 2 a.m. our front and support lines in U.4. and U.5. were subjected to a comparatively heavy bombardment, under cover of which the enemy attempted to raid our trenches in U.5.b. Light gas shelling (approximately 50 rds. 10.5 cm H.E. and Phosgene gas) took place at 7.30 p.m. H.V. guns were again active on our rear lines, particularly in the SOMME VALLEY West of GLISY. Areas shelled were :- During the night. O.29.d., O.36.a., O.34.b., O.27., O.28., O.20.d., GACHY, O.15.a. and b., O.20.b. - mainly by 15 cm and 10.5 cm Hows. and 77 mm guns. harassing fire. - During the day O.13.d., (100 rds. 10.5 cm) O.23.a. and c., O.20.b., O.16.a. and b., and O.24.b., while our forward lines received customary attention.

APPARENT REGISTRATIONS CARRIED OUT BY THE ENEMY.

Between 5 and 8 30 p.m. a 15 cm How. registered house at N.35.b.5.3. This locality was again shelled by 15 cm Hows. at 10.30 a.m. to-day - approximately 10 rds. fired. - At 8 a.m. 2 Rty. positions at O.14.c. 34.07. & O.20.a.50.51. were registered by 10.5 cm Hows. No damage.

ENEMY ATTITUDE. H.V. guns have shown slightly increased activity and heavy shelling of our front and support lines took place between 1.30 and 2 a.m. prior to attempted raid on our lines in U.5.b.

GENERAL.

AIRCRAFT AND BALLOONS.

Considerable aerial activity on both sides during the period is reported. E.A. crossed our lines on several occasions during the day patrolling our forward and battery areas until driven off by A.A. and Lewis gun fire. Enemy observation balloons were up 147, 150, 155, and 78 deg. T.B. from U.2.b.98.10. Hostile observation balloons were also observed 85, 90, 96 and 118 deg. G.B. from P.19.c.12. One of our observation balloons was brought down in flames by an enemy aeroplane about 2.15 p.m.

Two instances of gas shelling are reported, viz., 12 rds. 10.5 cm Blue Cross on 0.26.a. from the direction of MARCELCAVE and 50 rds. 10.5 cm H.E. and Blue Cross gas shell on 0.25.b. at 11.a.m. Areas mainly affected were :- During the night VILLEURS BRETONNEUX 70 rds. 10.5 cm and 77 mm, 0.20.a. and b., T.6.b., 0.33.d., 0.34.c., 0.27.a. and b., 0.21.a., 0.19. and valley in 0.15., while our most forward areas were subjected to light harassing fire at intervals. During the day, with the exception of light scattered shelling of 0.29.a. and b., 0.23., 0.15.b., 0.27.d. and 0.25.b., the enemy's artillery remained quiet.

COUNTER BATTERY WORK.

Between 12.30 and 1 p.m. battery positions in T.6.b. were lightly shelled by 15 cm firing from a direction 130 deg. T.B. from U.2.b.95. 10. (20 rds. neutralizing fire.) OUR OPERATIONS.

ARTILLERY. Between 4 and 5 p.m. 21st. inst 18 pdrs. put down a barrage 100 yards West of enemy's front line from P.25.d.4.4. to P.25.b.4.3. and from O.36.d.5.3. to P.31.a.0.0., while 4.5" Hows. bombarded enemy's front line between the above co-ordinates. This operation was observed to have been most effective and a number of casualties are definitely known to have been inflicted on the enemy. Harassing fire was maintained during the night on enemy's roads, approaches, dumps and centres of activity - 2400 rds. being expended. Between 9.45 p.m. and 12.45 a.m. 4.5" Hows. fired 210 rds. NC and CG gas shell on targets V.10.b.6.7. and assembly trenches in P.32.a. and P.22. Central.

The following from Australian Corps at 3.37 p.m. 24.6.1918. begins as Italians counterattacked the Austrians yesterday. Austrians sustained severe defeat and are re-crossing PIAVE in disorder from MONTELLO. to the sea, a frontage of approximately 40 kilos.

OUR OPERATIONS.

ARTILLERY. Between 9 and p.30 p.m. on 23rd. inst., while 18 pdrs. of the Left Group were carrying out their harassing fire programme, bursts of fire were directed against roads in P.28.b. At this time a large column of ammunition and G.S. wagons were proceeding along this road in a Northerly direction. Many direct hits were observed, seven explosions caused, three wagons set on fire, and the remainder scattered.

During the afternoon 24th. inst. 4.5" Hows. fired 20 rds. on M.G. at P.20.c.8.3. and 18 rds. whilst checking registrations.

At 12 midnight 250 gas projectors were successfully discharged against enemy's front line trenches in P.25.b. and d. 18 pdrs. and 4.5" Hows. of the Left Group supported this operation. At 9.50 p.m. an 18 pdr. battery occupied a forward position at O.18.a. 6.1. and engaged enemy's rear lines in P.24.d., P.30.a.b. and c., and roads in P.36. - 200 rds. fired.

During the night 4.5" Hows. fired 420 rds. gas shell on targets in P.22.d., P.33.a. and V.3.b., 102 rds. on trenches in V.1.a. and b., 50 rds. on tracks in V.2. a. and c., 48 rds. on H.Q. at V.1.d. 99.58., 50 rds. on cross roads in P.33.b. and 50 rds. on ration dump at P.33. central.

Targets engaged during the day were as follow :-

MARCELCAVE Station (12 rds.), selected targets in V.11.d. and V.17.b. (20 rds.), hostile batteries at P.35.e. 00.25., P.22.b. 7.7., and P.22.a. 10.25. (50 rds.), movement in V.11.d. and V.14.b. (35 rds.), movement in the vicinity of dugout in V.14.a. (45 rds.), while 18 pdrs. and 4.5" Hows. carried out further registrations.

T-MORTARS. Medium Trench Mortars fired 20 rds. on building at O.36.d. 9.8., seven direct hits were observed and a small ammunition dump blown up.

ENEMY OPERATIONS

ARTILLERY. During the night a marked increase in the enemy's artillery activity was reported. Several area shoots were carried out, and a large proportion of all natures of gas shell was employed. No reply, however, was made to our gas projector attack carried out at midnight. H.V. guns were intermittently active throughout the night shelling our back areas.

During the evening an area shoot was carried out on O.21., O.22., O.26., and O.27. Main features were as follow:-

At 5.15 p.m. approximately 200 rds. 15 cm and 10.5 cm were scattered over O.35.d., O.36.c. and O.27.a. and b. - direction of fire ABANCOURT and MARCELCAVE. At 7 p.m. a heavy area shoot was carried out on O.27. and O.28.a. and b. - 300 rds. 15 cm H.E. mixed with blue and green cross gas shell falling in this area. At 9.5 p.m. 100 rds. 77 mm from the direction of MARCELCAVE fell in valley in O.34.b.

Between 9.30 p.m. and 10 p.m. approximately 100 rds. 10.5 cm fell in O.29.a. while 50 rds. from Hows. of the same calibre mixed with phosgene gas were scattered over O.21.d. At 12.30 a.m. our front line and support trenches in P.25. and O.30. were shelled by 15 cm and 10.5 cm Hows firing from the direction of WARFUSEE - ABANCOURT.

Other areas receiving attention were VILLERS BRETONNEUX 70 rds., 10.5 cm and 77 mm, CACHY 110 rds 77 mm, BOIS 1'ABBE, O.28.d., O.12.a., O.15.d., and O.21.

During the day roads in O.25.c. and d were lightly shelled by 15 cm Hows firing from MARCELCAVE direction while the usual scattered shelling of O.16., O.29.b., O.30., P.25., O.34.c., and BOIS 1' ABBE by 15 cm and 10.5 cm Hows. was reported.

HOSTILE BATTERIES ACTIVE. Flashes from a H.V. gun were observed 120 deg. T.B. from O.30.c. 85.90. Area shelled SOMME Valley E. of GLISY.

GENERAL.

AIRCRAFT. At 5.40 p.m. one E.A. flew over our battery positions in O.20.

At 8.25 p.m. one E.A. patrolled the enemy's front line, and at 8.55 p.m. one E.A. flew North over our support lines, turning East over P.19.c.

Between daylight and 8 a.m. 8 hostile machines crossed our lines at intervals until driven off by anti-aircraft fire.

OBSERVATION OF THE ENEMY.

At 4.25 p.m. 2 men were observed walking through crops in P.29.c. When engaged by 18 pdrs. these men took cover in a trench and were not again seen.

MISCELLANEOUS.

During our Heavy Trench Mortar shoot on Monument Wood about 4.30 p.m. one white light was sent up by the enemy. This was followed by 10 section salvoes from 15 cm Hows. on O.35.d.

At 7 p.m. a large fire, apparently caused by our heavy artillery, was observed on a bearing 93 deg True from O.30.b.3.0.

OUR FIRE.

OUR OPERATIONS.

ARTILLERY. During the period 18 pdrs. and 4.5" Hows. carried out harassing fire on enemy's roads, approaches, dumps and centres of activity opposite the Divisional Front - 2,200 rounds fired. -

Between 10.37 and 11 p.m. 18 pdrs. and 4.5" Hows. of the Right Group fired 750 rds. and 270 rds. respectively on enemy trenches in U.11.b. and U.5.d. in conjunction with a minor Infantry enterprise carried out by the 37th. French Division. During the night 460 rds. NC. and CG. gas shell were expended on targets in P.22.c., P.27.c., and V.2.b.

Between 9.45 p.m. and 12.15 a.m. an 18 pdr. battery occupied a forward position at O.17.d.70.55. and engaged enemy road lines as follow :- P.30. a.b. and c., La Motte - on Santerre, MARCELCAVE Station and approaches to the village - 200 rds. expended. - During a burst of fire on La Motte - en Santerre an enemy dump was exploded and burnt for half an hour.

A forward section of 4.5" Hows. searched enemy billets in WARFUSEE from P.25.a.3.5. to P.25.a.6.5. to P.25.a.6.3. to P.25.a.3.3., while hostile battery positions at P.29.d.0.7. and P.22.b.7.7. were also engaged by 4.5" Hows.

Further registrations were carried out by 4.5" Hows. and 18 pdrs. during the period.

Other targets engaged were :- Dugouts at V.1.b.20.76. (83 rds. BX), H.Q. at V.2.c.05.25. (33 rds. BX.), Cross Roads at V.10.d.20.70. (100 rds. BX.) dugout and battery position at V.14.b.2.8. (56 rds. A and AX), dump at V.8.d. (90 rds A and AX.)

A forward section of 18 pdrs. of the Left Group engaged Battalion H.Q. at P.21.b.9.3. (48 rds.), trench from P.22.a.2.1. to P.22.a.5.2., dump at P.27.b.75.10. and WIENCOURT Village, while 4.5" Hows. fired 100 rds. on new work from P.26.a.4.7. to P.20.c.4.0. When this shoot commenced three of the enemy were seen to run from the former co-ordinate. This shoot appeared to be very effective and many O.Ks. were reported. At 11.15 a.m. an active hostile 77 mm battery at P.22.d. 3.8. was engaged by 18 pdrs. of the Left Group and silenced. This Battery did not open fire again during the day.

Movement observed at P.20.c.7.0. was engaged by 4.5" Hows.

T. MORTARS. M.T.Ns. fired 42 rds. on suspected enemy O.P at U.6.a.35.35.

ENEMY OPERATIONS.

ARTILLERY. Hostile artillery was again active during the evening, heavy air. shots being carried out on 0.21., 22., 26 and 27, for the purpose of hampering our transport, while intermittent shelling of our forward and battery areas was maintained throughout the night.

Main features were as follow :- At 4.10 p.m. 60 rds. 15 cm and 10.5 cm from the direction of MARCELCAVE fell in O.35.d., while at 6.30 p.m. 30 rds. 77 mm fell in O.35.c. At 8 p.m. 80 rds. 77 mm were directed against BOIS AQUENNE and trenches in U.3. from 106 deg. T.B. from U.2.b.98.10. At 8.5 p.m. At 8.5 p.m. 50 rds. 10.5 cm fell in O.27.a. and at 8.35 p.m. VILLERS BRETONNEUX received attention from 10.5 cm Hows., 50 rds. being fired; whilst at 9.15 p.m. a further 150 rds 77 mm, at 1.5 a.m. 100 rds 77 mm, and at 4 a.m. 50 rds. 77 mm were directed against this town. Other areas shelled during the night were O.35.c. 30 rds. 77 mm., O.20.d. 20. rds 10.5 cm, O.19.d. and O.26.b. 50 rds. 10.5 cm, O.27.b. 50.rds. 10.5 cm, trenches in O.36.b. and d 50 rds. 10.5 cm., U.3. and U.9. 60 rds. 10.5 cm and O.30.b. and d 40 rds. 10.5 cm.

During the day the enemy's artillery has been comparatively inactive. Light shelling of O.27.b. 15 rds. 10.5 cm, O.10.c., 10.rds. 15 cm., and P.19.a. by 77 mm guns took place, while at 10.40 a.m. 15 cm air bursts (approx. 15 rds.) were observed over MONT du BOIS l'ABBE in O.26.c. and d. interval, of 5 minutes between each round - apparently ranging.

ENEMY ATTITUDE. Several area shots on our battery areas were carried out during the evening. - otherwise quiet.

INTELLIGENCE SUMMARY from 1 p.m. 26.6.1918. to 4 p.m. 27.6.1918.

OUR OPERATIONS.

ARTILLERY. During the afternoon and evening of 26th. inst 18 pdrs. of the Right Group harassed enemy defences in V.1., V.10., V.11., V.2., U.6.b., P.31., P.32. and V.8. firing 690 rds. From 5 to 6 p.m. 4.5" Hows. carried out a short sn fortified shell holes in P.20.c. and P.26.c. This shoot appeared to be very effective. During the night harassing fire was maintained on enemy's lines opposite the Divisional Front, 18 pdrs. of the Left Group paying particular attention to the following targets :- Tracks and roads in P.22.c. and d.; trench in P.28.b. and dumps in P.22.c., bursts of fire being directed against the above areas at 10 p.m., 11.30 p.m., and 12.30 a.m. - 600 rds. expended. - In addition to the above 18 pdrs. of the Right Group fired 2,000 rds. in short bursts of fire, at irregular intervals during the night on enemy's lines opposite their front. At 11.20 p.m. 45 rds. were directed against traffic reported by our Infantry on road in P.31.c. At irregular intervals during the night 18 pdrs. of the Left Group brought searching fire to bear on enemy's lines in P.32., P.33., P.20., P.26., P.21., and P.27. from S.O.S. plus 100 yards to S.O.S. plus 1000 yards. During the night a forward section of 18 pdrs. harassed the enemy's rear lines in P.23.d., P.29.b., Cross Roads in P.29.d., and P.29.a. and H.Q. at P.30.c.55.45. Between 9.50 p.m. and 12.5. a.m. an 18 pdr. battery occupied position at O.17.d.7.3. and engaged the following targets :- Valley in Q.19.a. and b., roads in P.36. and BAYONVILLERS. At 2.35 p.m. a forward section of 4.5" Hows. of the Left Group fired into ARCELCAVE SQUARE. During this shoot a fire was caused and burnt for 10 minutes. Other targets engaged were Battalion H.Q. at P.22.b.8.5. (120 rds.), battery position at P.22.b. 2.7. (12 rds.), trenches in P.21.a. and P.15.c. (12 rds.), active hostile battery at P.27.a.1.5., while a party of men at P.27.b.5.9. was fired on and dispersed. In addition to the above 4.5" Hows. fired 20 rds. on H.Q. at P.30.c.55.40., 20 rds. into WIENCOURT, 20 rds. on active hostile battery at P.35.a.00.25., and billets at P.30.c.1.3., while 310 rds. were expended on selected targets in P.33., V.1., V.2. and V.3. During the night 604 rds. NC and CG gas shell were directed against targets as follow :- Dump at P.21.b.7.7., H.Q. at P.21.d.central, ration dump at P.33. Central, and roads in P.29.a. and P.28.b.

MORTARS. M.T.Hs. fired 10 rds on suspected O.P. at U.6.a.35.35. and 20 rds. on strong point at O.36.d.8.9.

ENEMY OPERATIONS.

ARTILLERY. During the period under review a slight increase in the enemy's artillery activity is reported, fire being mainly directed against our forward areas in O.30., P.25., O.36. and U.5. The usual evening area shoots on O.21.22.26. and 27 were not carried out. Three instances of gas shelling occurred during the night - 50 rds. and 60 rds. H.E. and gas (nature not ascertained.) on O.30.a. and b. and O.29.b. and d. respectively and 100 rds. 10.5 cm Blue Cross gas shell on FOUILLOY at 3 a.m. Light harassing fire was again maintained on our battery areas. Main features were as follow :- VILLERS BRETONNEUX received intermittent attention from 10.5 cm Hows. approximately 190 rds. From 4 p.m. to 1.45 p.m. 100 rds. 10.5 cm fell in U.4.b. and U.5.a. and at 5.45 p.m. our trenches in in U.4.b. and U.5.a. and b. were rather heavily shelled by 15 cm Hows. firing from WARFUSEE - 150 rounds. At 6 p.m. 50 rds. mixed calibre were directed against our trench system in O.36.b. and d. At 12.50 a.m. and from 1.30 a.m. to 3 a.m. our trenches in O.29.b. and O.30. a. and b. were shelled by 15 cm and 10.5 cm Hows. - approx. 120 rds. being fire from the direction of WARFUSEE. Other areas shelled were O.16., O.17., and O.22. 15 cm and 10.5 cm, BOIS 1' ABBE 50 rds. 10.5 cm, O.21.b. 50 rds. 10.5 cm, CACHY 30 rds. 10.5 cm, O.30.b., P.19.c., and P.25.a.b. and c. 50 rds. 10.5 cm H.E. O.23. and O.24.a. and c. 10.5 cm. H. . with a small proportion of gas shell. Hostile artillery showed little activity during the day, and with the exception of light harassing fire our front remained comparatively quiet.

ARTILLERY (Cont.)

Between 10.30 and 11 a.m. a 15 cm H.V. gun shelled A.R.F. at N.19.d.7.5. 10 rds. delay action were fired. One round fell on a bay of AX ammunition and destroyed 12 rds. Direction of fire 103 deg. T.B. from N.20.d.7.7. and 94 deg. T.B. (Sound) from U.2.b.95.10 Counter Battery were immediately informed and succeeded in silencing this gun.

HOSTILE BATTERIES ACTIVE. At 4 a.m. a 77 mm battery shelled 0.36.c. Flashes were observed 90 deg. T.L. from 0.30.d.2.3. At 11 a.m. flashes were also observed from a 77 mm battery at 88 deg. T.B. from 0.29.d.60.75. Area shelled 108th. Now. Battery position in 0.20.d. - 30 rds. being fired.

ENEMY ATTITUDE. A slight increase in artillery fire particularly on our trench system in 0.30., 35., 36. and U.5.

GENERAL.

AIRCRAFT & BALLOONS.

Slightly increased aerial activity is reported during the period. At intervals during the afternoon hostile machines were active over our forward lines. Between dawn and 9.30 a.m. 27th inst. enemy planes were active over our lines. At 9.30 a.m. 6 Fokker Scouts crossed our lines and engaged a flight of our S.E.5s. with the result that 2 of our machines were driven down, one of which landed in N.30.a. undamaged, and the other in U.S.a. As soon as the pilot left the latter machine it burst into flames and was totally destroyed. During the night one of our bombing planes landed in O.25.a. owing to engine trouble.

Owing to engine trouble.
Energy observation balloons were up 113, 130 136, and 1-2 deg T.L.
from 0.30.b.3.0.

OBSERVATION OF THE ENEMY.

At 11 a.m. a train was observed in W.7. and V.12. proceeding in a S.W. direction. At intervals during the period energy reverent was observed in P.27.b. and P.28.b.

Smoke was observed rising from trench at P.28.b.5.2. approx.
Considerable enemy movement was again observed during the period in vicinity of H.Q. in V.14.

ENEMY DEFENCES. A hostile A.A.M.G. was located at U.6.c.6.6. approx.

MISCELLANEOUS. At 1.20 p.m. a smoke screen 200 yards in length was observed in front of wood in V.17.c. This screen lasted for half an hour. At 11.20 p.m. transport was heard in P.31.c. by one of our listening posts. This was immediately engaged by our 18 pdrs. and Infantry report satisfactory results. At 10.10 p.m. a large enemy dump exploded on a bearing 102 deg T.B. from U.2.b. S5.10. Visibility fair to good.

OUR OPERATIONS

ARTILLERY. During the evening of the 27th. inst. a forward section of 18 pdrs. of the Right Group harassed enemy works and movement in V.7.b., V.11.d., V.19.w., V.14.d., and V.16.a. firing 130 rds. From 5 to 7 p.m. 18 pdrs. fired 100 rds. on Hangar at P.32.a.45.35. and 30 rds. on target V.2.b.5.S. From 9.30 p.m. to 12.40 a.m. 600 rds. were directed against selected targets in U.6.b. and V.1. a. and b. - harassing fire by 18 pdrs. while 4.5" Hows. engaged the following targets :- H.Q. at V.2.c.05.25., 40 rds., roads in P.21.d. 40 rds., strong point at V.2.a.40.45. 40 rds., dugouts in V.1.c., house at P.29.e.0.3. 40 rds., and Cross roads in P.27.d. 40 rds., while a forward section of 4.5" Hows. fired on MARCLLCAVE station, battery areas in P.22.d. and P.23.b., dump at P.27.b.75.19. Between 10.30 p.m. and 11 p.m. 18 pdrs. of the Left Group engaged selected targets in P.26., P.27., P.28., and P.33 firing 130 rds. Between 1.30 a.m. and 1.45 a.m. whilst affording covering fire for a minor Infantry enterprise 18 pdrs. of the Left Group brought fire to bear on enemy's trenches in P.20.d. and P.26.b. At 10 p.m. an 18 pdr. battery occupied a position at P.17.d.1.8. and fired 200 rds. on WARFUSEE, while a forward section of 18 pdrs. engaged VILLENCOURT, LA MOTTE-ON-SANTERRE and billets in P30.c. At 3.10 a.m. 18 pdrs. of the Left Group brought searching fire to bear on enemy's lines from S.O.S. plus 200 to S.O.S. plus 600 yards firing 1,300 rds., and then concentrated on selected targets in P.32.a. and b., P.26.a. b. and c., P.27.a., P.32.b.. and P.33.a. Between 3.50 a.m. and 4.5 a.m. 4.5" Hows. fired 200 rds. gas shell and 20 rds. smoke shell on P.27.a., P.26.d. and dump at P.27.b.6.2. In addition to the above 18 pdrs. of the Right Group, commencing on Counter Preparation start line, searched Eastwards in P.31. and P.32. and V.1. and V.2. firing 480 rds., while 4.5" Hows. expended 60 rds. NC and 50 rds. BX on selected targets in P.32.a. and d. Further registrations were carried out by 18 pdrs. and 4.5" Hows. during the period.

T. MORTARS. M.T.Ms. fired 18 rds. on enemy front line at 0.36.d.55.40, 12 rds. on suspected N.G. position at 0.36.d.4.3. and 22 rds on buildings at U.6.a.40.30.

ENEMY OPERATIONS

ARTILLERY. The enemy's artillery was less active during the period. During the night our forward areas in Q.35.b. and d. and Q.36.c. were lightly shelled by 15 cm and 10.5 cm Hows. approximately 65 rds. fired. Between 6.15 p.m. and 6.45 p.m. 40 rds. 10.5 cm and 7.7 mm were scattered over Q.20.a. and Q.27.b. From 9.30 to 10.10 p.m. Q.21.a. and c. received attention - approximately 75 rds. 10.5 and 77 mm falling in this area. At 1.45 a.m. the enemy opened a bombardment of our supports in U.3. Shelling ceased at 1.55 a.m. At 4 a.m. 50 rds. 10.5 cm H.E. and Blue Cross gas shell were directed against VILLERS BRETONNEUX. Other areas shelled were BOIS L'ABBE, Q.21.b. 50 rds 10.5 cm, roads in Q.21.b. 30 rds. 10.5 cm., P.19.c. 32 rds. 10.5 cm and 77 mm. During the day, with the exception of light scattered shelling of our forward areas, Q.27.a.b. and c. 50 rds. 10.5 cm, and Q.9.b., Q.10.d., and Q.16.c. by Hows. of the same calibre, our front remained quiet.

ENEMY ATTITUDE. No change.

GENERAL.AIRCRAFT AND BALLOONS.

During the afternoon of the 27th. inst. enemy planes were very active, frequently crossing our lines in large formations. At 8 p.m. 8 E.A. flew over VILLERS BRETONNEUX but were driven off by A.A. fire. At 8.30 p.m. an air fight occurred over enemy's lines, as a result of which one of our planes was driven down in flames and one E.A. forced to land, both falling in enemy territory. At p.m. 6 E.A. were over our forward lines and attacked one of our planes without success. At 4.20 p.m. to-day a hostile machine (AIFALZ scout) flew over N.21., N.25. and N.25. at an altitude of about 1000 feet. This machine

4 mounted men were seen galloping in Q.19.c.

At 4.30 p.m. individual movement in V.7.b. was engaged by our 18 pdrs. and casualties inflicted. A party of men observed at 5 p.m. near clump of trees in W.2.c. was engaged by our heavy artillery and dispersed.

ENEMY DEFENCES.

New work is reported at U.6.d.4.3. and V.11.b.50.65.

MISCELLANEOUS.

At 1.5 a.m. and 2 a.m. our artillery opened fire on S.O.S. lines when rocket was reported by Observers at O.P.s. On each occasion it was ascertained that these rockets were not fired by the Infantry of our own Division and that the F.L. was quiet, though Infantry Observers report seeing signals similar to our S.O.S. rockets. It was thought therefore that the enemy is using a rocket similar to our S.O.S. signs and is taken for such by our observers.

A small dump was exploded in P.24.c. apparently caused by artillery fire of the Loft Group.

GENERAL INTELLIGENCE.AIRCRAFT AND BALLOONS.

Our flights were particularly active over enemy lines during the evening of 28th., but E.A. were slightly less active than during the previous 24 hours. Night bombing planes were extremely active on both sides. At 11.25 p.m. 4 bombs were dropped in ARQUENNE FOREST, and at intervals during the night the main road between AMIENS and VILLEURS BRUTONNEUX was bombed. At 9 a.m. a flight of 6 E.A. flew over GACHY and U.2. and U.3., using their M.Gs. on our trenches.

Between 10.15 p.m. and 1 a.m., while a 18 pdr. battery was carrying out special harassing fire on enemy's rear lines in Q.19.a. and c. from a forward position in O.18.c., a hostile plane dropped 3 large bombs within 100 yards of this battery but no damage was sustained.

Hostile balloons were observed at T.Bs. of 108, 130, 147, 159, and 161 deg. from O.36.c.35.65., 00, 135, and 145 deg. from O.30.b.3.0., 159 deg. from P.19.c.1.9., and 96 deg. from O.15.b. 52.61.

OBSERVATION OF THE ENEMY.

Beyond the usual individual movement in V.13 d. and V.14.a. and b. nothing of importance was observed.

MISCELLANEOUS.

GUNNERY.

AIRCRAFT AND BALLOONS.

At 7 p.m. 3 hostile machines were seen over the enemy's lines but were driven back by A.A. and Lewis gun fire.

At 8 p.m. L.A. were very active, but were prevented crossing our lines by our fighting machines.

At 4.5 a.m. hostile planes dropped 3 bombs in U.2.b..

Both our own and the enemy's bombing planes were very active throughout the night.

At 9.30 a.m. 5 L.A. were observed over VILLERS BRUTONNEUX. These were driven back by A.A. fire.

During the night bombs were also dropped in O.15.

Enemy observation balloons were up 77, 83, 105, 125, 138, 149, and 155 deg. T.B. from U.2.b.95.10. Balloons were also observed 245, 266 and 262 deg. T.B. from O.15.b.52.61.

OBSERVATION OF THE ENEMY.

A party of the enemy observed at V.14.c.50.10. was engaged by our 4.5" Hows. Three men were wounded and these were afterwards seen being carried away on stretchers.

The usual movement in V.14.a. and b. was again observed during the period. On all occasions this was engaged by a forward 18 pdr. gun in VILLERS BRUTONNEUX.

MISCELLANEOUS.

At 5 a.m. a fire caused by hostile artillery shelling started in VILLERS BRUTONNEUX and burnt for half an hour.

Visibility during the afternoon good, but poor during this morning and during to-day.
