



There are at present 1500 men in this Camp, and within the next two or three days this number will be considerably increased. (4) If I am not permitted to retain the whole of the two Camps referred to, I will be unable to carry out efficiently the necessary training of the men under my command. It will therefore take a considerably longer time for the men to become fit after marching into this Depot, and reinforcements will in this way be held back. lavre			(4) DISCIPLINE. The discipline of the Depot is satisfactory. The men all seem quite contented and the parties leave very little to be desired from the point of smartness and orderliness. This fact was especially remarked on by Colonel Barber, D.D.M.S., Australian Corps, and Lieut-Colonel Smith, A.P.M. Australian Corps, who witnessed the 9 o'clock parade on the 22nd instant, also by the D.A.A.G., 3rd Echelon who arrived at the Depot on the 23rd instant just prior to the 2 o'clock parade falling in. The difference the Band has made to the parades is most marked. On all general parades the Band falls in on the general parade ground and as soon as the "Advance on Markers" is sounded, the Band strikes up, and the Companies march in from their various parade grounds with an excellent swing and in almost perfect order. There is no doubt that a good Band helps very materially towards the general efficiency of a camp such as this. Crimes. Since the Depot opened, there have been 75 Orderly Room cases. The majority of these have been minor offences, the only really serious crime that has been committed is that of a man at present awaiting Court Martial; this man is accused of being mixed up in some trouble with the military police in Havre. The Depot has been in existence for 44 days, and the number of orderly room cases has therefore averaged under 2 per day. In this connection, it should be taken into consideration that, for the past four weeks the Depot has had an average strength of about 1600 men, that the population is a moving one; and that since the Depot opened, 3177 men have been admitted.

1. ALARM: The "alarm" will be a number of series of five (5) rings of the boll situated at the top of the General Parade Ground immediately in front of the Quartormasters' Store.

A pause of five (E) coconds will be made between each series. This Alarm will be continued until the order to cease is given. Alarm will be taken up by the Dep-ot Ordorly Bugler. The Depot Telephone Orderly will convoy all messages concerning sircraft to the The Adjutant will arrange for all concerned to be warned. Adjutant.

2. ACTION TO BE TAKEN BY TROOPS: On the Alarm boing given all ranks will immediately dress and, escept those mentioned hereunder, will fall in on their Company Parade Grounds.

No lights of any kind must be permitted.

All members of the Fire Picquet will fall in on the Depot Parade Ground immediately in front of and facing the Quartermasters' They will bring with them the Fire Appliances to which they have been allotted.

The Depot Orderly Room Serjeant and the Depot Orderly Bugler will proceed at once to the Depot Orderly Room. The Depot Orderly Room Telephone Operator will stand by the telephone. remainder of the Depot Staff will fall in on the Depot Parado Ground ten (10) yards in the rear of, and facing in the same direction, as the Fire Picquet.

The Depot Staff, togother with the Fire Picquet, will be

under the Command of the Orderly Officer.

As soon as all Companies and Details have fallen in as above directed, their Commanders will report at once to the Adjutant at the Depot Orderly Room.

On the order "Move" being given, Companies will move out

in file, at the double, as under :-

No. 1 Camp. Companies will move out in the following order :-

"T" COMPANY. "C" COMPANY. "B" COMPANY. "A" COMPANY.

They will move direct on to the road running East and West through the Depot. They will turn Wost when they reach this road (i.o. up the hill) and on reaching the Main Rouelles - Montivilliers Road, will proceed in the direction of Montivilliers (due North) past the Police Post and up the first turning to the Left past this Post, (a hairpin turning). The head of the column must gain contact with the rear of the Australian General Base Depot Column. After contact is obtained, they will conform their movement to those of the Australian General Base Depot. When the - column is halted, a distance of three (3) paces will be maintained between the files. No other route except that above detailed must be taken.

No. 2 Camp. On the order "Move" Companues whill double out on the road between the Australian General Base Depot and Convalescent Depot in the following order :-

The Depot Staff, other than the Depot Orderly Room Sarjeant, Depot Orderly Bugler and Depot Orderly Room Telephone Operator (but including the Fire Picquet without appliances) will occupy the trenches situated between the Depot Orderly Room and the Serjeants' Mess.

Should any fire occur in the camp at any time during the proceedings, the Fire Picquet will immediately leave the trench

occupied by them, and proceed to extinguish it.

- 3. On the bugle sounding "No Parade" the troops will be moved back to their lines.
- 4. Company Commanders will detail two (2) N.C.O's from their permanent staff to act as guides to the Companies. These Guides will thoroughly reconneitre the route to the position of safety of their Companies.
- 5. No lights of any description will be permitted after the alarm is given, until "No Parade" is sounded.
- 6. Tents will on no account be lowered.
- 7. The alarm given by the French Authorities for Aircraft attack will be two series of three guns fired at an interval of half a minute between each round and an interval of two minutes between each series. On the Alarm being given, all ranks on pass in Town will return to camp as soon as possible.
- 8. From nightfall to Dawn shuttors will be closed, blinds pulled down, and windows voiled so as to prevent the lights from being seen from outside.
- 9. Officers Commanding No. 1 and 2 Camps will be held responsible that all ranks under their command are thoroughly acquainted with these Orders.
- 10. It is impressed on all ranks that comparative safety from a bomb may be obtained by lying flat on the ground, even when there is but little cover, also that all the large drains in the Camp afford good protection for a man lying in them.


