Report on the Nursing Staff for the month of November 1918.

Though hostilities ceased on the 11th November, the work during the month has been extremely heavy, not so much as regards new surgical cases, but the continued Influenza Epidemic has kept many of our wards full, and many of the patients have been very seriously ill. The same precautions exercised last month to prevent the infection being conveyed to the staff, have been carried out. with the result that no member of the Nursing Staff has this month been affected.

The Surgical work in hospital has been very much less, the only heavy cases being those who are too ill yet to transfer acros the Channel.

The daily average number of patients in hospital has been 1284, our admissions being 3275.

LEAVE. Ordinary leave has been continued through the month; twelve Sisters and Staff Nurses have been granted 14 days leave to the United Kingdom.

Special Leave. One Sister has been granted 8 days in Paris.

ADMISSIONS,

were heavy, and included a large number of Surgical cases until Armistice Day, 11th November 1918, after which these cases rapidly declined. Medical admissions showed a gradual increase, mostly due to Influenza, and respiratory diseases due to exposure etc. At the beginning of the month the type was severe, and of the large number of deaths of occurring during the month, a big proportion have been due to Pneumonia complicating influenza. Strict precautions in the wards were taken, and constant care paid to their being carried out, in the way of Officers, Sisters and orderlies who were dealing with Influenza cases wearing gowns and masks. The comparatively small number of cases of Influenza amongst the Staff, is, in my opinion, attributable to these precautions.

THE WEATHER

was, at the beginning of the month, extremely cold.

There were heavy frosts, and some of the wards were very cold.

Extra stoves were indented for, and approved by D. D. M. S. Boulogne.

ADMINISTRATION.

Summaries of evidence in three cases of patients who were charged with being illegally in possession of clothing etc., were taken, and two men were recommended for Court-Martial.


I have, with deep regret, to record the death of Captain C.R. Lister from Influenzal Pneumonia. Captain Lister reported here for duty on the 13th and was sent to No. 14 General Hospital on the 14th November. He was probably sick when he arrived from England, and it would appear that he had contracted the disease there. On the 20th he was reported "Dangerously Ill" and at 11.30 pm. on the night of the 21st he died. The burial took place at Terlingthun Cemetery at 2.30pm. on 23rd November, the D.D.M.S. Boulogne and a large number of officers, (British, Canadian, American and Australian), Sisters and men were present

Drafts for reinforcing Field Units.

On 6.11.18 an urgent message arrived from 3rd Echelon to despatch 46 Other Ranks to 1st and 4th Anstralian Divisions. These men were held on the attached lists as reinforcements and had been here for







two months. Instructions received with the men prevented them being taken on strength, but they had been doing duty with the unit and train -ed in ward work etc. As the personnel of the unit was already under strength, and the staff of the unit had suffered casualties from sickness, the sudden withdrawal of so many men seriously dislocated the attendance on patients in the wards, particularly as the work was heavy from Influenza etc cases. Their places were partly filled by Convalescent patients, which made the work harder for those left, and was inefficient in character. The Base was informed, and reinforcements asked for urgently, but they did not arrive until the 17th November.

At 12.15pm on 13.11.16 a Phone message was received to send Sisters Crabb E.M., Crago B. and Simpson J. to Marseilles for transport duty to Australia. They were required to leave by train from Boulogne at 10.17pm. and Wimereux at 8.30pm. Sister Simpson was not able to proceed as she had no money, no paybook and insufficient clothing. After informing D.D.M.S.'s Office, Ivwas informed that I had better exercise my own judgment in the matter, and Sister Forsyth E.L. was then sent in place of Sister Simpson - Sister Forsyth having left Australia in 1914 and not having been back.



And I desire to put before you the position as regards the Medical and Surgical Staff of this Hospital, with a view to having reinforcements sent as soon as possible. Captain Thomas has just been evacuated sick with a Strangulated Hernia, which will require operation. Major Weedon has been boarded and recommended 3 weeks heave of absence. I do not anticipate that he will be returned as he has had two slight attacks of Haemoptysis, has evidence of Pleuris and in view of the danger of T.B. developing, should in my opinion, be returned to Australia. He will leave here at the end of this week. Lieut. Colonel Kay and Major Power both have Septic fingers and are not able to operate, although they do ward work. Captain Gratton Wilson will leave on the 14th Instant on special leave, no relief being advised for him during his absence. We are very busy at the present time owing to a large number of Influenza patients in hospital and arriving. Handling of these patients owing to infectivity, entails extra work. Our establishment in M. O's is 30, including the O.C. There are actually 17 at present on duty, three are away with Surgical Teams and two are on leave, so that we are 7 M.O's under strength. The necessity for extra Medical Officers at the present time is an urgent one. REPORT ON OPERATING ROOM (ENLARGEMENT)

The Senior Surgeon of this Hospital reports that the present Operating Room is not large enough for requirements in the event of large convoys of wounded arriving, and has handed me a plan for suggested enlargement, which is for your information and, if possible, approval.

The scheme is:
1. Appropriation of "G" Ward and converting it into an operating
Room with accommodation for 6 tables.

2. Retention of the present operating room for special cases.

The present operating room has accommodation for two tables only, which is not sufficient, when surgical cases are arriving freely. It is badly lighted and ventilated, and when both tables are in use the atmosphere is bad for both patients, Staff and attendants.






FRIDAY SEPTEMBER 6TH.

Left No 2 Australian General Hospital at 7-30 A.M. for Gazaincourt near Doulens for No 3 Casualty Clearing Station where I was to relieve Colonel Hurley; arrived that night and took over from Hurley the same day.

SUNDAY SEPTEMBER 8TH.

There had been no work for us to do and we were sent by car to No 59 Casualty Clearing Station at Verennes. Our team consisted of myself, Major Mitchell M.C., Sister MacDonald and Privates Banney M.M., and johns. We were put on day duty and began work almost immediately. Major Blair, the surgical Specialist, had everything well planned. The arrangement of the reception room, preoperation ward, and other wards was excellent. There were two teams on day duty and two teams on night duty. We were only able to operate on the very urgent cases. I cannot say exactly how far we were behind the front line but I know that we were too far back for abdominal cases. These cases as a rule did very badly. The jolting in a meter Ambulance over a long rough road was more than they could stand. Blood transfusion and gum Acacia injections were given in the operating theatre by the surgeon; the theatre Sister belonging to the unit was able to give blood transfusions herself and did this work extremely well. We stayed at this Casualty Clearing Station until the work slackened on the 15th of the month.

We had received orders from the D.M.S., 4th
Army to proceed to Boulogne and travelled by train reaching
our destination next day. On the 17th we left by ambulance for
No 47 Casualty Clearing Station at St Christ near Brie. Major
MacGillivray had replaced Major Mitchell as anaesthetist.
Arrived at No 47 Casualty Clearing Station we found an unit
thoroughly alive, and, although it had only been twenty-four
hours on its site, almost prepated to receive patients. We
worked here for three days, four teams being on day duty and
three on night duty. We were only nine miles behind the "Line"
and in consequence had more success with abdominal cases



than at any other Unit we visited. At this Casualty Clearing Station, an Officer was in charge of the resuscitation ward; he gave all the blood and gum which was required and so saved a good deal of time for the surgements in the operating theatre. The X Ray plant belonged to a mobile Unit; the hut was erected and X Ray work was being done before the "Stunt" was twenty-four hours old.

on Friday the 20th we left by motor ambulance for Boulogne arriving there at 6-45 A.M. on the following morning.

WEDNESDAY 25 TH SEPTEMBER.

Left Boulogne at 8 a.m., by motor ambulance and travelled through to No 49 Casualty Clearing Station atm Grevillers near Bapaume. The team had again been somewhat altered; Sister Fisher was team Sister; Private Hill had replaced Private Johns.

No 49 Casualty Clearing Station was not expecting us or any other teams. They had been on the ground for some days and were preparing for the "Stunt" which was supposed to start the following morning. We asked to be put on night duty with Major McKim, a Canadian Surgeon, who was there with his team. We had been with him at No 47 Casualty Clearing Station and had formed a very high opinion of his work.

The following merning the Casualty Clearing Station became very busy. There were three teams on day duty and two teams on night duty; a third team was put on accasionally to help us at night time. We were, when the push started, from fifteen to twenty miles behind the line and this again was too far back as we very seen came to find when we came to operate on abdominal cases.

We were on duty from 8 p.M. until 8 A.M. every night.

During these twelve hours we found that we were able to operate on
an average of twelve cases. These cases would be all major operations
and might include, one abdomen and four or five fracetures of
eather extremity. Blood and gum was given either in the theatre by
the operating surgeon or another surgeon would do this in the
resuscitation ward. No X Ray work was done in the Unit until the
9 th of October when the rush of work was beginning to quieten down.

the members of my team worked. Sister Fisher in particular showed untiring energy and ability, and I never saw her once in the least out of temper.

The wounds during the first part of our stay at No 49 Casulaty Clearing Station were nearly all shell wounds and nearly all severe. Later on, when the warfare was more open there were many more machine gum bullets wounds.

Before we left No 49 Casualty Clearing Station we must have been duiet thirty miles behind the front line. The patients had to be brought to us over a very long and a very rough road. For chests and abdomens this was hopeless.

22nd October for No 46 Casualty Clearing Station on Tuesday
attached to 3rd Army) at Delsaux Farm near Beugny. Here we
worked for nearly a fortnight on night duty. Patients were still
being brought by road because the railway line was being
blown up by time fuse mines, beyond Cambrai. In this
Casualty Clearing Station blood and gum were given by the
Officer in Charge of the resuscitation ward.

On Monday 4th November we were sent to No 1 Casualty
Clearing Station, 1st Army, at Esquedoevres beyond Cambrai.
We were here one night and operated on twelve cases. Here as
elsewhere, we had some trouble about a batman but everything
else went well. We were the most forward Casualty Clearing Station
at this point and we were sorry to leave next day.

On <u>Tuesday 5th November</u> we were sent to No 50

Casualty Clearing Station at Bohain, 4th Army. There was very little for us to do here, but we found a well equipped and efficient Unit. There was however, no X Ray plant attached.

WARK We received orders to return to Boulogne on the 14th November.


CONCLUSION.

(1). During my absence from Boulogne with the team I operated on 324 cases; a summary of these cases is appended.

- (2). Each team, in my opinion, should be supplied with a batman. Theatre orderlies, whose hours on team work are necessarily long, cannot be expected to do both kinds of work. Otherwise the personnel of a surgical team as it stands at present leaves nothing to be desired.
- (3). After visiting all these Units I came to the conclusion that there should be more uniformity in the arrangements and management of Casualty Clearing Stations, more particularly in the direction of X Ray work and blood transfusion. In those Casualty Clearing Stations in which one man took complete charge of the blood work, the work was more easy to do, more work was done, and the work was more efficient.
- (4). If a forward Casualty Clearing Station cannot move up quickly with the advancing front Line, there should, without doubt, be a small Unit, an abdominal surgical team which could move quickly and keep close enough to the scene of action to make abdominal operations more successful than they are at present.
- (5). There should be more exchange of information about cases between Surgeons who work at Casualty Clearing Stations and Surgeons who work at the Base. Eaxh does not understand the working conditions of the other sufficiently well and it would be for the ultimate good of the patient if C.C.S., Surgeons knew in what dondition their patients arrived at the Base.




