

#### MONTHLY REPORT ON THE SURGICAL SECTION.

I have the honeur to report upon the Surgical work done in

this Hospital during the month of January 1918.

The great majority of cases admitted were slight and well advanced towards convalescence, many having been already classed for evacuation to England, before reaching this Hospital. In a number of cases re-classification was done, and so many marked for Convalescent Camps instead.

The number of cases admitted was 365, the discharges for the

same period were 499, the number remaining (3I-I-I8) was 340.

Septic Wounds. A certain amount of work results from Local Admissions these including cases of Acute Appendicitis. It is gratifying to note the excellent results obtained in this class of work.

There were Six (6) deaths during the months

(1) Multiple wounds; sepsis; Secondary Haemorrhage.

(2) G.S.W. Chest; Pneumonia.

(3) Comp. Fracture of Femur; Amputation; Blood Infection.

(4) Multiple Wounds; Sepsis; Exhaustion. (5) Multiple Wounds; Sepsis; Exhaustion.

(6) Multiple Wounds; Amputation of leg; Secondary Haemorrhage.

During the month an Order has been issued stating that in future Compound Fractures of the Femur are to be segregated in one Hospital in this Area which is fitted with a portable X Ray outfit. Also that "Clean" cases, such as Hernia, Varicocele etc., are to be segregated in this Hospital. This must be taken as a tribute to the work of this character done here.

In view of the above it will be necessary to consider the advisability of setting aside ward sapce for these clean cases.

Cases are very frequently in the Hospital which require and

would distinctly benefit by having massage and electric treatment.

No provision has been made for this. I would suggest

therefore, that at least two Masseuses should be appointed to the Staff.

The Nursing has been much more ardous and difficult owing to the severe weather conditions. Readings of the thermometer were taken and a report upon the same submitted.

An investigation into the action of the Reading Bacillus has been instituted. A pure culture has been obtained from the discoveries and Subcultures have been made. An opportunity for testing the same has not occured since obtaining the pure Culture.

All the Staff have been most attentive to their duties.

# REPORT OF THE MEDICAL DIVISION FOR JAN. 1918.

There has been a large number of Medical cases this morth, and 8 Surgical Wards were taken over for medical cases.

The number of cases admitted was 697 and 526 were discharged. At the end of the month, 477 patients remained in Hospital.

Among those admitted there were 245 N.Y.D.Gas cases; 168 of these have been discharged and the rest are still in Hospital.

The most serious cases under threament were those of Nephritis, Bronchitis and Pneumonia.

There were four deaths from Nephritis and one from Pneumonia. One case of Acute Rheumatism with Pericarditis has been in Hospital all the month and still remains.

Of notifiable diseases there were 10 cases of Pulmonary Tuberculosis, 2 of Malaria, 3 of Pneumonia, 1 of Chicken-pox and 1 of Scarlet Fever.

Two Medical Officers, Major Burge, S.B. and Major Powell, H. were sent into Hospital. The former was evacuated to England and the latter is still in Hospital.


Five Sisters were sent to Hospital and 2 were evacuated to England. Other Sisters have been under treatment for minor conditions but the health of the Sisters generally has been good.

21 Orderlies were admitted to Hospital and 21 were discharged; 6 were evacuated to England - 10 remain in Hospital.

wooden floors have been put in some of the Wards and have made those Wards more comfortable. Still more wooden floors are required to make the tents in the Medical Division suitable for the treatment of severe medical cases; also atleast, one more hut for medical cases is required.






#### REPORT OF PATHOLOGICAL LABORATORY FOR JANUARY 1918.

The number of pathological specimens examined this month was 205, being an increase of 29 on the previous month. Appended is a detailed list of the examinations carried out. The urines examined were mainly from cases of nephritis. The examinations of faeces is however much below the usual figure, mainly due to the less number of cases of dysentry or diarrhoea since the advent of cold weather.
