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

Herewith report of Q.M. Branch of this Unit for month ending 30th November 1918.

RATIONS. The rations for the month have been in the most cases up to the new ration scale.

VEGETABLES. The vegetable ra tion has been rather light and potatoes have had to be purchased to make up the required quantity.

FORAGE. The fooder ration for the month was quite up to scale.

FUEL. The fuel ration has been quite sufficient to meet all requirements.

SALVAGE BY-PRODUCTS. The undermentioned quantities have been return to Salvage and A.S.C.

Paper lbs 95. Cardboard lbs 73. Cartons 193 Hessian Packing lbs. 25.

Petrol cases and tins, drums, sa cks and empty cases, etc., 100% have been returned to A.S.C. and receipts held for same.

ORDNANCE STORES. All demands on D.A.D.O.S., have been satisfactorily and promptly met.

AUST. RED CROSS SUPPLIES. All demands on Aust. Branch, B.R.C.S. have been supplied in a most satisfactory manner.

Herewith report on Transport Section of this Ambulance for the month ending 30/11/18.

From the 1st to the 21st of the month we were in billets at FLESSELLES where little beyond the usual daily routine was carried out. The standings, owing to lack of facility for drainage, were rather muddy, but the horses were sheltered for from the cold winds prevailing at that time.

On the 22nd instant we entrained at VIGNACOURT in the early morning hours. Notwithstanding that it had been known for some days that the Brigade would entrain there no additional facilities for entraining had been made to supplement those already existing and which were of a very primitive type. As a consequence the process was only accomplished with a maximum of time and energy. At 11 p.m. on the Sunday same day we arrived at BERTMY, where the siding was made with a view to loading horses and vehicles with despatch. Having untrucked horses and vehicles without mishap we moved by road to BOHAIN, some 15 Kilometres away. Here we found fair stabling and very good billets en the 25th. On the 25th. we moved to MAZINGHEIN (some 9 miles) and as were again very fortunate in our billeting and stabling. On the 26th instant we moved to PRISCHES area, where at LINIERES we found ample good stable accommodation and billets. Throughout these various moves everything has gone along without hitch or accident of any kind.

Under instructions from the Veterinary Officer, and by arrangements with the O/c, 15th Ccy. A.A.S.C. we obtained a Stewart Horse clipping machine and managed to clip before the move, all heavy and Light draughts "trace high" and some of the hacks all over. This has greatly facilitated the work of Drivers and has enabled us to keep the horses in the usual high state of cleanliness that we have endeavoured to maintain throughout the year.

During the first half of the month the health of personnel was not as good as usual, quite a number being down with the prevailing epidemic. However, during the latter half it has been excellent. The harness is all in good condition and repair with all steel parts burnished.

We have been almost entirely free from minor injuries usually associated with stables this month.

Having regard to the number of drivers off duty owing to the prevailing epidemic or to being on leave - for some time only 11 out of 20 21 were available for duty - credit is due to the Transport N.C.O's, on whom most of the supervision has fallen and to the drivers and privates in charge of horses for the sustained effort and interest they have maintained throughout the month.

ADVANCE TO THE RHINE

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EDUCATION SCHEME.

PROGRESS REPORT 13/11/18.

The first classes in connection with the above scheme were held on the 12th of October last so that it has been in actual operation for almost a month. During that period over 90 classes have been held and the attendances have totalled almost 1000, so that the average attendance per class is about. Recently this average has not been maintained since a fair number found that they were attempting more than they could manage under the present conditions of work. The more exact and detailed summary below gives the present actual number of regular students in each subject.

Out of, say, 200 possible students in the Ambulance over 100 are taking

one or more subjects.

Instruction is being given in 17 distinct subjects viz:-Mathematics (Arithmetic, Algebra, Geometry, Trigonometry); English; French; Shorthand; Book-keeping; Latin; Greek; Philosophy; Biology; Pharmaceutical Chemistry; Physiology and Anatomy; Bee Farming; Photography; Dairying and Butter Testing.

Literary And Debating Society.

This society was established as a branch of the Education Scheme and has proved a decided success. Sofar there have been three lectures, one organised debate, and three nights for inpromptu speeches and general discussion. A debate was arranged with a team from another unit, but could not take place owing to the fact that one of the units changed its location unexpectedly. The sim of these meetings has been to give practice in public speaking to as large a number as possible, and they have seen a good many "maiden efforts."

It is felt that, apart from the cultural value of lectures, such debates and exercises in public speaking are of great value, not only on account of the facility in speech which they tend to cultivate, but also for the way in which they call for a more logical and thoughtful treatment than many subject

receive in the ordinary discussions of military life.

Library.

At the inception of the echeme a librarian was appointed and an appeal was made to the unit as a whole to hand in for general circulation, any books which the individual has finished with. In this way a unit library of about 70 books has already been built up without the purchasing or obtaining from other sources of a single volume. A very fair proportion are standard works.

Details of work done in various subjects.
MATHEMATICS.

Arithmetic has been taken in two groups, a preparatory and an advanced. The former has commenced at the beginning and is now treating fractions, decimals and percentages. The latter has travelled more quickly and is now doing stocks and shares. A comparatively few advanced students are doing algebra, geometry and trigonometry. The most advanced student in the laster subject is definitely working with Athe idea of taking up surveying and has already covered a good deal of ground.

ENGLISH.

The ground cover ed so far has been chiefly along the lines of grammer and composition, but a class for the study of literature will be commenced as soon as a few classical authors can be obtained. Already those available are being utilised to allustrate literary devices and methods. An attempt is being made to teach the essentials of good composition and the rules which govern good prose writing. Various pitfalls and common errors are being brought to light. Sufficient formal grammar is being given to make obvious the rules which are laid down from time to time. Exercises are devised which aim at increasing vocabulary and at impressing the exect connotation of various words.

FRENCH.

An attempt is being made to improve the ability of the students in French conversation and to give a good groundwork in the grammar. At present this class is being hindered somewhat by the lack of text books, but on their a own initiative a large proportion of the class are obtaining themfrom England and work will be greatly facilitated when they arrive.

Owing to the illness of the instructor this class was interrupted for about a fortnight but is now at work again. The consonants have already been taught and the vowels are now being treated.

BOOK KEEPING.

This class has been doing steady work and its students have shown a considerable amount of interest inm it. The following books of account have been dealt with and exercises worked in connection with them: - sales and purchase, cash, ledger, and journal. Cheques and Bills of Exchange have also been dealt with.

The limited number of students taking these subjects are doing so with a definite idea of matriculation or some such qualifying examination. Each student is being taken individually since all are not equally advanced. It is not found possible to devote as much time, under present circumstances, to these subjects as they should receive, but sufficient is being done to assist materially in a more intensive study which may be possible later.

The work being done at present is in the form of a brief outline of the nistory of philosophy. Commencing with athe early Greek philosophers the great thinkers of ancient times have been briefly reviewed, and an indication given of the contribution made by each of them to the evolution of speculativ; thought. The stages by which philosophy, science, and the other branc hes of learning were recognised as distinct spheres of enquiry have been carefully traced. A brief treatment of Plato and Aristotle has just been completed.

This name is given, for the sake of convenience, to a class (taken by one of the Ambulance M.Os. who was for some time a demonstrator in Biology at Sydney University) which is being held largely for those desiring a knowledge of agricultural chemistry and botany. After a brief study of the cell, attention is now being directed to the anatomy of the plant, and its different parts and their functions are being examined in turn. The work is being given a practical application wherever possible e.g.a demonstration was given in rose buddings when dealing with the structure of the stem.

Thism class is being taken by another of the Ambulance medical officers, and most of the students taken it are doing so for special purposes, such as the doing of a medical course proper. The work done is on very general lines since anything in the way of microscope work and the examination of specimens is obviously impossible. However the pathology of the various organs and histological structures is being taken along with a description and diagramatical illustration of them and in this way connection is made with the practical work done by the men as members of a medical unit.

Advantage is being taken of the presence of a dispensary and qualified dispensers as a part of whe unit for the giving of instruction in this work to those who desire it. One of the students is a man who **exexpassion to the students of a qualified dispense only a couple more examinations township as before being a qualified dispense Ground so far covered includes terms and processes used in connection with pharmacy, sources of drugs, chemical processes, incompatibility and its use in various analyses, main rules in practical dispensing.

This class is naturally limited to theoretic al work. It is taken by a man who is a photographer by profession and consists of those who have done sufficient photography to desire a more accurate knowledge of the operations and processes involved. Such things as the need for "balance" and "compositio in photographs have been illustrated out in the open. Other subjects which have been dealt with are, types of cameras, lenses, exposure, developing etc.

DAIRYING AND BUTTER TESTING.

A small class of those interested in this subject have been instructed by and held discussions under the supervision of a man who has had considerab practical experience. The subjects treated have been, grading of cream, Badcock system of testing, and butter making.

The topics so far treated have been as follows- general aims of the bee keeper, classes of bees, classes of hives, the initial steps to take in establishing a bee farm.
