

MONTHLY REPORTS - JANUARY, 1919.

Herewith Monthly Reports of the Officers in charge of the various Divisions of the Hospital.

It will be seen that the work of the Hospital has very greatly diminished during the month. The number of patients in Hospital on the last day of the month was 551.

DISCIPLINE - . The discipline of the Unit has been good.

DEMOBILIZATION - Up to the present time there has, only been a few men demobilised from the Unit for Special and Urgent reasons. In this connection the 1915 men of the Unit are worried to a certain extent by the fact that men of their category, and in many cases, men of later categories have already left the various Units in the There are a number of men in the Unit who have had long service in the Field and who were transferred to this Unit for a rest within the last nine months; men from this Unit being sent into the Field to replace them. The result has been that the men going from this Unit to the Field after only a few months field service have already left their Units for return to Australia, whereas the men transferred to this Unit who have had very considerably longer service in the Field have to remain. This naturally causes a good deal ofdiscontent. It is difficult to say how the position can be rectified as, as long as the Hospital is to function as such, it is absolutely necessary to have an efficient staff to work it.

EDUCATION - It has not been possible to get any educational scheme working in the Unit. The personnel have still their ordinary work to do, and are not willing to give up their time off to educational Classes.

RECREATION - As much as possible is being done to give the men Entertainments and Recreation. Several Concert Parties have given Concerts in the Y.M.C.A. Hut. There have been 2 W.A.A.C Dances for the men, also Social Evenings as well as Whist Drives. It has now been decided to allot 100 Francs per week from Regimental Funds for buying Prizes for Whist Drives, which will be held weekly.

A Gymnasium has been fitted up in one of the Tented Wards which is now vacant, and classes in Boxing and various forms

of gymnastics are being held.

Owing to the snow and frost it has latterly been

impossible to arrange any Football or Hockey Matches.

Arrangements have been made with the G.O.C. Third Australian Division for Bands from that Division to be detailed for a weekly tour of duty with this Unit. This has helped very greatly towards the entertainment of both the Patients and Personnel of the Hospital.

EQUIPMENT. - On taking over the Command of the Unit on the 22-11-1918
I found that the Hospital equipment, etc. was in a most unsatisfactory state:

I. There were no Ward Inventories.

2. There was no record of there ever having been a thorough check of equipment since the Unit landed in France.

3. The Quartermaster states that there had been no check since he joined the Unit on April 12th 1918.

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I immediately arranged for a thorough check to be made and Inventories to be placed in every Ward, Office Building etc. in the Hospital. This was completed on 29-11-1918.

The Quartermaster was instructed to go carefully through

all his records and to report to me as soon as possible:-

Equipment on Charge. i.

Equipment actually in the Hospital. ii.

The amount of deficiencies, if any, or the amount of iii. surplus, if any.

This entailed a considerable amount of extra clerical work, and as the Quartermaster's Staff was under Strength and during the first part of December the Hospital was very full, the report was not ready until the 23-12-1918, on which date I proceeded on leave to the United Kingdom. On my return on 11/1/1919, I went thoroughly into the matter and found there were very sonsiderable deficiencies. The Quartermaster stated that he was not satisfied with the check made on 29-11-1918, so it was arranged for another check to be made. This has just been completed. I will report further in the next Monthly Report as to what action has been taken in the matter.

GENERAL - The Australian Corps Rugby Football Team was attached

to the Unit from 14-1-1919 to 17-1-1919.

This arrangement was made in order to enable them to continue their training here and to proceed to Paris the day before the Match against the French Team. The Team was thus able to arrive in Paris perfectly fit after a short three hours train journey. If it had been necessary for them to proceed direct from Corps Headquarters the train journey would have probably taken 36 hours and would have militated very strongly against their chance of success.

(d) HEALTH. 1 Sister has been admitted to Hospital during the month suffering from Influenza and sore throat. The Sister remaining in Hospital at the end of last month has been evacuated to England

WORK. There has been a very small amount of work during the month.

With the present staff it is quite possible for the Sisters to have every other day off duty.

RECREATION. Very little has been possible. The order was given for dancing to stop on January 3rd. Two Hockey matches have been played but the state of the ground has made sport practically impossible.

On January 10th, 25 Sisters were taken for a day trip to visit the Battle Fields in this Area.

MONTHLY REPORT OF THE SURGICAL DIVISION

FOR THE MONTH OF JANUARY, 1919.

The surgical cases treated during the month have been drawn from the patients admitted from the area with the addition of a few cases sent on in convoys from Casualty Clearing Stations and Stationary Hospitals. Some of the latter had been operated before admission.

The operations performed, 50 in number, were chiefly cases of hernia, haemorrhoids etc. with some cases of acute appendicitis. Results were all good and no deaths occurred among surgical cases.

A large number of fractures have been treated, chiefly of the lower leg, many of them the result of football accidents.

Many cases of hernia, sent for operation, were evacuated without operation in consequence of the order that these cases should be sent to England for treatment.

REPORT OF MEDICAL DIVISSION FOR JANUARY, 1919.

The Hospital was not busy at any time and towards the end of the month the amount of work became very small.

At the beginning of the month there were 963 patients in Hospital and in the course of the month, 1060 were admitted and 1492 were discharged.

Some cases of Influenza and a few of Broncho Pneumonia were received but the majority of the patients were suffering from mild or chronic conditions.

More cases than usual of nephritis were under treatment but only one of them was at all severe and after having fits for two days, he began to improve.

Severe cases of any description were infrequent.

Four patients died. Two had Broncho Pneumonia, the third had Broncho Pneumonia complicated by acute nephritis and the fourth had generalised tuberculosis in which the lungs, pleural and peritoneum were the principal sites of infection.

There were 49 cases of Trench Fever, 7 of Malaria and 5 of Tuberculosis.

The health of the Unit was very good.

There were seven other ranks in Hospital on January 1st and 13 were admitted during the month. Of these, eleven were discharged to duty and seven were evac justed.




