

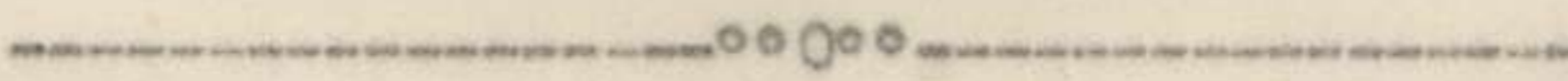

1. Start made on the Whitewashing and cleaning up of the kitchens generally.
2. Working parties now scrubbing and whitewashing the building throughout.

5. Boiler in the Engine Room in order, and tried out with good results. With this boiler in order we will be able to supply hot baths (showers and plunge) for men and patients and also do some disinfecting of blankets and bedding.
6. O.C. 351 E. & M. Co., Lille has promised a 200 Gallon Tank and a force pump. Water arrangements not very satisfactory.
7. A party of 20 Labour men reporting daily for cleaning up purposes. The place now presenting a more tidy appearance.
8. A brick drain laid whole length of road; more gravel required to complete the road.

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GENERAL ITEMS.

1. Arrangements have been made with the O.G. 26th Field Ambulance to draw water for drinking purposes for this Station.
2. Instruction received from D.A.G., A.I.F. to the effect that Major Rennick and Major Matthews were required for transport duty to Australia and should report to D.M.S., A.I.F. at an early date. Later arrangements made for Major Matthews to proceed to Australian Corps, and take over management of Football Team going to Paris.

MEDICAL REPORT

Report on Medical Cases admitted to No.2 Australian C.C.S. for the month of January 1919:-

Excluding Skin, Eye and Ear cases 173 medical cases were admitted during the month.

INFLUENZA Admissions gradually decreased during the month. The type of disease was also milder than in December 1918- Complications were mainly pulmonary and this disease was the original cause of admission of the majority of the cases of Broncho Pneumonia. Cases with severe symptoms were few.

The PNEUMONIA GROUP were of a severe type:-

Cases of Lobar Pneumonia were in most instances affected by extensive pleurisy. Of these that died one was complicated by Catarrhal Jaundice-

MEASLES were mild in type with the exception of two who developed Broncho Pneumonia (not included in the pneumonia group)-- Both these made good progress to convalescence-

Nephritis cases were all severe- one dying shortly after admission in a condition of Eclampsia.

HEREWITH DENTAL SURGEON'S REPORT FOR MONTH OF JANUARY 1919.

The programme for the month was exactly the same as that of last month. I visited the 24th Field Ambulance on Mondays and Wednesday at Enghien and the 231st Field Ambulance on Tuesdays and Thursdays at Lessines.

Later on in the month I received notification from D.M.S., 5th Army that the Dental Parade on Wednesdays would in future be at the C.C.S. instead of the 24th F.A. at Enghien as most of the patients requiring treatment were from the 26th Field Ambulance which is situated at Ath; and on Tuesdays and Thursdays I had to visit the 229th Field Ambulance at Gramment and the 231st at Lessines.

On Fridays, Saturdays, and Sundays of each week a fair number of patients visit the C.C.S. for both Surgical and Mechanical Dental Treatment.

After returning from the Field Ambulance each day I always found a number of patients awaiting treatment. So the C.O. of the C.C.S. kindly had the electric light installed as it was too dark to work in the afternoon without same.

The most notable feature of the month's work was the number of officers and men requiring treatment of Ulcerative Gingivitis and Alveolar Abscesses.

The Mechanical work done by this unit was mostly repairs, the men urgently requiring new Dentures. I warned them to be prepared to report to 39 Stationary Hospital and I forwarded their names & particulars on to D.M.S., Fifth Army.

QUARTERMASTER'S REPORT FOR MONTH OF JANUARY 1919.

For my monthly report of January the following work has been done in the Q.M. Department.

The whole of the members of the Unit, except those at present on leave, have had their kits checked and deficiencies made good, also statement showing Articles of clothing and necessaries taken on A.F. W 3321 A. signed by each member of the Unit in my presence.

Since my return from leave I have been taking stock of all equipment on charge to the C.C.S. Owing to R.Q.M.S. Lambert, Sgt. Daif and Pte. Smith from this Department being on leave (Sgt. Daif has since returned) I have not been able to complete my stocktaking by the end of this month. I hope however to have this completed in the next day or so after I have checked same with the Stock Book showing the previous stock taking of 10/5/18. I will then be able to give you details of any deficiencies, and stores may be adjusted and render the unit capable of any demands placed upon it in the near future.

With great difficulty, owing to the shortage of transport I have been able to collect supplies to meet the present demands of the C.C.S. Since the withdrawal of the lorry temporarily attached in the beginning of the month, our two motor lorries have been found inadequate, with the different supply Depots ranging from Hal to Lille. In addition these two lorries have to report twice monthly at the workshops for inspection and overhaul, and sometimes kept from one week upwards before return.

Owing to the long distance we have to obtain our supplies, and precautions necessary to adopt for the thaw, would it be possible to obtain another lorry temporarily, please.

Since the withdrawal of the Feden double disinfecter, no fumigation of blankets has been possible. Our own Thresh Disinfecter which was under repair in Ordnance workshops at Fives, has been repaired and left by rail for Ath on the 22nd but has not yet arrived. I have made enquiries from the R.T.O. here and find it was actually sent via Calais. His remarks are :-

"Left Fives on the 22nd inst and sent to Calais for regulation, as that is the quickest way for getting it up here".

During the month I have been unable to obtain practically no Medical Comports from 4th Field Supply Depot, Fives. I am now indenting through the R.S.O. Gheslingheim, who has promised to get them up from the Base in 4 or 5 days.

A canvas partition with counter has been erected in the passage where the rations from the store are issued daily, to prevent the likelihood of anybody breaking into the store. Also shelves have been put along the side of the partition. This has now made the store practically secure, private, and most convenient for issue and a great improvement; the only protection previously being small cases of stores.

During the month a wooden building outside the Hospital block has been repaired by the R.E. and converted into a splendid Dining Room for the Hospital staff and Convalescent Patients. Also another hut has been set apart for Recreation and Dance Hall, in which two Dances have been held, the latter one in celebration of "Foundation Day", which was a big success and enjoyed by all ranks.
