



AUDENARDE SHEET 29 L. 10 Central	16.1	. 18	At the commencement of November/1918 the Hospital was very full and large numbers of patients were arriving. There had been a considerable amount of difficulty in obtaining sufficient Hospital Trains. The C.C.S., was warned to be prepared to move to Avelghem. The order to move to Avelghem was cancelled and the C.C.S., was instructed to close and move to Audenarde. A site was picked in a suitable field about 2 miles away from the town of Audenarde May Reference Sheet 29 L.D Central. At this move, owing to the declaration of the Armistice the whole constitution of the C.C.S., was changed and from being a unit for the treatment of surgical cases, it became a mebile hospital for the clearing of sick. To effect this change the following alterations were made: (1) The number of tents were reduced from 154 to 98 (11) The X-ray plant was disposed of. (11) The Operating Thestre was reduced from a hut capable of containing eight tables, to two tents capable of containing one table. (1V) The accommodation for patients was reduced from 800 to 300. (V) The number of beds was reduced from approximately 450 Tens to approximately 75 Tons. (V1) The quantity of material was reduced from approximately 450 Tens to approximately 75 Tons. (V1) Eleven sisters have been sent to the Base and the present nursing staff consists of one matron and six Sisters. The excess material and squipment was returned to Ordinance or Base Medical Stores and receipts obtained. The C.C.S., weas established at Audenarde and now consists of accommodation for 50 bed cases and 250 walking cases. Evacuations are by car to Courtrai. The C.C.S., pened to receive patients. A party of 2 Officers and 62 men remained on the Oil site at Kaselberg to clean the camp and hard over the excess equipment. This party followed to Audenarde in a few days. Cases are being received at the rate of about 75 per day. These are chiefly sore feet due to the heavy marching of the troops, influenza and an occasional accidental wourd from a boom be explosed on. The O.C. proceeded to Huy and picked a large school as a suitable billet. One Officer and two Other Ranks remained there to make the necessary arrangements. SURGEON SPECIALIST'S REPORT

During the month of November 1918 there has not been a great deal

of surgical work done at this Hospital.

There was only one period that was at all active. This was between Nov. 1st and Novr. 1lth., when hostilities were suspended. This was a fairly busy season while it lasted but since then there has been very few cases operated and othose were of a minor

nature and several of them were civilian.

The hospital was situated at Keselberg for the first half of the month and was then fully equipped with a theatre that would accommodate six tables. Since the 17th of the month it has been stationed at Audenarde with a very greatly reduced accommodation as far as the surgical side is concerned and the theatre is now equipped to work with one table only. This is in accordance with orders from the D.M.S...Scond Army in anticipation of very few casualties.

Appended is an Analysis of the operative work of the Unit.

PHYSICIAN'S REPORT FOR MONTH OF NOVEMBER/1918.

During November 1918 No.3 Australian Casualty Clearing Station was stationed at Keselberg (25.10.18 to 14.11.18) and just outside Oudenarde - opening on 18.11.18 heing well situated on rising ground alongside a main road.

The total sick admissions were 2162 - Influenza accounting

The type of Influenza received at Keselberg was -as mentioned in the October report- severe with a heavy proportion of toxic, Broncho paeumonia. These were apparently unaffected by treatment beyond a very temporary improvement in some cases. These Broncho pneumonias were relegated to a special ward and isolated

Broncho pneumonias were relegated to a special ward and isolated from other cases and the attendants protected by gauze masks and aprons.

Since opening at Oudenarde the type of Influenza seems to have been less severe with much fewer cases of Broncho pneumonia.

A number of Influenza cases have been admitted for "Diarrhoea"

The general health of the Unit remains good. There have been 14 admissions with Influenza not of a severe type.

QUARTERMASTER'S REPORT FOR MONTH OF NOVEMBER 30th/1918

FOOD

The quality of food issued during the past month has been excellent with the exception of fish which was unfit for consumption.

CHANGES

During the month of November the accommodation of the C.C.S., was reduced to 300 patients, which necessitated the return of much equipment and many stores to both Ordnance and Advance Depot Medical Stores; this extra work of transporting stores etc., to Railhead was carried out by Lorries specially detailed for the purpose by Army, so that now, the whole of the Stores and Equipment of this C.C.S., can be carried in 25 Lorries, as against 147 Lorry loads as heretofore, thus increasing the mobility of the unit considerably.

TRANSPORT Two lorries, each 3 Ton Hallfords, are on the strength of the C.C.S., but, owing to the amount of work to be done, which necessitates continuous running and the bad state of Roads, it is seliom that more than one lorry is available for duty at a time.

This is a great hand icap, which of late has increased by the fact that when once a lorry goes into Workshops it is weeks before it can be repaired and returned to its Unit.

Broken springs and want of spares cause most of the delay,

HEAD SISTERS REPORT NOVEMBER/18

For the first week of this month the work continued to be heavy. At 10 p.m., on 10. II. 18, we heard that the Armistice had been signed. On the following day the 11.11.18 we received orders to close the Hospital and prepare to move forward. Six Casualty Clearing Stations had been chosen to go forward with the Second Army, and this C.C.S., is one of the six. The Nursing Staff was reduced to seven, One Head Sister 3 Sisters and 3 Staff Murses. The rest of the Sisters were returned to their respective Units on 15.11.18. On 16.11.18 we left by Motor Ambulances for our new site which was at Audenarde, where the Germans made their last stand. Any day we expect orders to close. Out next stop is at Huy, some 120 miles further forward. Staff now consists of :-

1 - Head Sister E.W. Jeffries ARRC J.B.McDona k 3 - Sisters ARRC M.M.McNulty F.A. Nicholls 3 - Spaff Murses A.M. Wilson D. Robertson

Health Early in the month two Sisters had to be evacuated to No 3 Canadian Stationary Hospital suffering from Influenza, but on't he who le the Health has been good .

Wards Fresh Wards had to be opened on 10.11.18 for Influenza and Broncho Pneumonia cases. All Casualty Clearing Stations chosen to go forward have had to reduce their equipment and the accommodation is now 300 beds :-

Officers Ward 8 Beds Acute Surgical 10 " Acute Medical 32 " 5-Stretcher Wards250Total....300

The surgical work since the fighting ceased has been very light - A few accident cases due to Shells and Bomb explosions two Belgium women and one man were among the victims. Theatre Prior to 9.10.18 the work in the Operating Theatre was very heavy and while the rush was on it was impossible to obtain further help

The Sisters - Sisters McNulty and Hill " S.Nurses - S.Nurses Graham and Cornish.,

worked splendid ly. Visitors Miss McCarthy Matron in Chief B.E.F., visited us at Keselberg on 16.11.18 just as we were about to move off for our new camp at Audenarde. Heneral Birdwood paid us a friend ly visit on 25.11.18.
