

#### 4. TREATMENT -

During the whole of May the treatment has been carried out on the organised lines introduced this year and has proved eminently successful. It has perhaps been somewhat less successful than it otherwise should have been owing to the change in the personnel of the Medical Officers, and the fact that 50% at least of them are learners. Notwithstanding that fact, the average number of days in Hospital for uncomplicated gonorrhoea still shows evidence of decrease. The most important, and so far unsolved difficulty as regards efficient and rapid treatment, is due to the lack of proper instruments and apparatus required in the Institution. This lack is due to the great delays and difficulties met with in endeavouring to obtain these special appliances from the makers and so far has not been satisfactorily overcome.

The early instrumental examination and direct cauterization by an experienced Medical Officer is giving good results, but owing to the absence on leave of the Officer i/c Treatment, a definite report as promised in last month's report on this phase of treatment will not be available until the end of July.

During the month just passed, 28 cases of Epididymitis have occurred and have been treated by the direct injection of "Electragol" in the substance of the epididymus, with marked beneficial results as regards the almost immediate relief of pain, cessation of swelling, and much more rapid reduction of the primary swelling, with the result that the average stay in bed has been reduced to 13 days, as against a previous 28 before this method of treatment was employed.

Readmissions from Convalescent Training Depot are not reckoned as relapses returned to Hospital, because the 8 days test
of modified training is considered as part of the "try-out" before
the man is definitely cured. As all cases are not being sent to
C.T.D. it will be possible in future to state the percentage of
cases which fail to stand, and also to show the number of days
required to render them fit once again. Relapses are only considered as such when returned from their Training Battalions in
U.K.

#### 5. EARLY PREVENTION -

A large number of cases still fail to avail themselves of the precautions supplied to them and the instructions given at the various Centres both Overseas and in U.K., quite 50% taking

absolutely no precautions, and under 2% taking full and proper precautions. It would appear that some improved method of bringing prominently before every soldier the advantage of early and proper precautions should be introduced, if the number of men infected is to be considerably lessened.

### 6. QUARTERMASTER'S DEPARTMENT -

Application was made early in February for the removal of superfluous and unserviceable stock, and eventually the necessary permission was obtained and the required authority forwarded, since when over 20 tons of superfluous and unserviceable stock has been

returned to Imperial Ordnance, Tidworth.

An Officer from the Audit Branch of the Chief Paymaster, London, visited the Hospital in company with the Paymaster, Tid-worth, on 17.5.18, for the purpose of enquiring into our method of obtaining supplies for the Hospital, and checking supplies already made by the Imperial authorities charged against the A.I.F. After careful search of our Diet Sheets and checking our various supplies as received from the A.S.C., he expressed the opinion that our methods were most satisfactory and complete in every detail.

A Court of Inquiry assembled at the Hospital on 30.5.18 in accordance with A.I.F.Depot in U.K. Order No.4821 of 20.5.18, to inquire into the surpluses and shortages of the stock, etc., at the Hospital. As a previous stock-taking was not considered satisfactory, which had been made during the end of January; and the Court decided that a fresh stock-taking be made, and the Court adjourned accordingly until such time as this was completed. Owing to the unsatisfactory condition in which the washing contract for this Hospital was being carried out, the matter was reported to the A.D.M.S. who issued instructions that the Quartermaster should personally visit the Alverstoke Laundries at Elson. This was done by him on 15.5.18 and all differences and difficulties gone into. The above complaint was owing to the state in which underclothing worn by scabetic patients was sent by us and returned by the Laundry.

7. TRANSPORT - Ford

taken on charge here on 9.5.18 and has been in use during the whole of the intervening period. It already shows the advantages to be gained by taking the small and economical Car as the weekly supply of Benzine has been reduced from an average of 35 gallons per week to an average of 22 gallons per week, which practically means that in 12 months the saving in petrol would almost pay for the vehicle.

#### 8. SPECIAL VISIT OF INSPECTION -

On 30.5.18 the Director General of Medical Services, Surgeon General R.H.J.Fetherston accompanied by General Sir Neville R. Howse, V.C., K.C.B., the A.D.M.S., A.I.F.Depots in U.K., Lieut.Col. T.G.Wilson and Mr.Manifold, visited this Hospital. The D.G.M.S inspected the Detention Huts, Administrative block, Medical Huts, Treatment Huts, Pathological and Operating Theatre Huts, and Kitchens of "A" Division; "606" room, Operating theatre, Medical and Surgical Huts, and Patient Officers quarters in "B" Division, and Staff Officers' Mess. With the exception of the Detention Huts he made no comment. As regards this latter he considered that they were not as tidy and clean as they should have been. It was explained to him that this was the first occasion on which they had not been found thoroughly efficient, and that the Guard attached to the Hospital were responsible for the Tarrying out and the cleaning of the Huts in question.
