

QUARTERMASTER'S REPORT.

RATIONS. The drawing of rations was very irregular owing to the uncertain times of arrival of trains at railheads. Very often they were not drawn till well on in the night. For aperiod owing to the above the usual 24 hours rations could not be held by Units. At present things are more satisfactory.

The rations on the whole have been very good with the exception of vegetables which have been very scarce, but this deficiency

was supplemented by a good supply of Pork and Beans.
Salt was unobtainable. All troops leaving the Unit en route for Australia were supplied with rations as laid down in G.R.Os.

ORDNANCE. For this period a good deal of work was necessar y with Ordnance owing to the return of "C" Section Equipment and all surplus stores. "C" Section Stores were returned in a very good condition and any deficiences were covered by indents.

All indents for Stores lost etc., before 11-11-18 were promptly submitted and vovered all deficiences of the other two sections. Indents for clothing etc., were promptly supplied. A very good supply of soap was made available, the reverse to other months. During the period a third blanket for each of the personnel was supplied by Ordnance.

TRANSPORT. The rations for the horses of the transport was very satisfactory No alteration to previous months' allowance taking place.

1 Watercart, 1 Wagon Ambulance, 1 Limber G.S., 6 Draught horses with harness complete were returned to Depot at Abbeville. This had to be carried out by road owing to the lack of train transport. Up to the present the personnel taking the wagons &c have not returned.

SALVAGE. As the Unit is stationary now, salvage is unobtainable.

MEDICAL

COMFORTS. A good supply was drawn from Depot at Beaumont, enabling all requisitions from Battalions to be fully supplied.

RED CROSS. A very good supply of articles have been available with the exception of papers and magasines. Games which were drawn were very acceptable to the patients in hospital.

UNIT COMFORTS. A good supply of comforts were obtainable from 2nd Divisional Comforts Fund and included tobacco, cigarettes, cake, sugar, scup, shirts, socks, mufflers and milk.

A very good wallet was supplied by the Y.M.C.A. for each soldier of the Unit, also a quantity of sweets.
