April.	1.	<p>Addendum to 1st Anzac Order No.119-issued. 1st Anzac Order No.120-issued. 1st Anzac General Staff Circular No.68-Artillery Re-organisation- issued.</p> <p>-----</p> <p>During the day our artillery registered on all datum points and barrage lines for our operation on the 2nd inst. Enemy working parties were successfully dispersed. Hostile artillery was not quite so active as on previous days. 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		2nd.	<p>Addendum to G.S. Circular No.49 issued. G.S. Circular No.69 issued-Reorganisation of Howitzer Batteries. G.S. Circular No.70 Organisation of Army F.A.Bde Park Sections. At about 4 a.m. the 2 Battalions occupying the advanced line of resistance of our right Div. (5th) attacked LOUVERVAL and DOIGNIES and successfully occupied these villages and established a line approximately J.16.c.5.8-J.16.d.8.8-J.16.b.7.7-J.10.d.5.0-J.10.b.1.7-J.4.b.3.1 and consolidated it. There were five (5) counter-attacks by the enemy all of which were successfully repulsed and heavy casualties inflicted on the enemy. Some were accounted for in close fighting by our infantry and considerable numbers by our artillery, which, on one occasion, brought fire to bear on a large number of enemy troops assembling for a counter-attack and inflicted a large number of casualties among the attacking force.</p>	<p>App.B. 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HENENCOURT	1917. April 2. Contd.		<p>An aeroplane also brought effective machine gun fire on a large part of the enemy.</p> <p>At 5.15 a.m. the 13th Bde. occupying advanced line of our left Division (4th Div.) carried out an operation the objective of which was the road running from C.11.c.1000 to C.4.d.04 and with the intention of pushing our patrols to the railway line running between ECOUST and QUEANT after the initial objective had been gained.</p> <p>At 6 a.m. our infantry were through the village of NOREUIL and on to the high ground to the north where they dug in on their objective.</p> <p>The left Battalion of the 13th Bde. occupied a shallow trench 500 yards behind NOREUIL and gained touch with the right Battalion of the Division on our left.</p> <p>On the Bde. front all objectives were gained and consolidated.</p> <p>In this operation 135 prisoners were captured, 7 machine guns, 4 trench mortars, 3 bicycles and other miscellaneous stores were also captured.</p> <p>An actual count of dead bodies after the operation showed that our 5th Division killed 350 Germans and our left Division 150 Germans.</p> <p>Enemy retaliation to our bombardment was slight. April.	3.	<p>Warning Order issued for move of 1st Australian Divisional Artillery into line.</p> <p>Our artillery was active during the 24 hours. From 7.10 a.m.-8.10 a.m. artillery of 5th Australian Division (right Div.) engaged a party of the enemy infantry, about 500 strong, massing for counter-attack at J.17.b. with excellent results.</p> <p>During the day our artillery engaged enemy infantry advancing on D.28 and along road between D.21.a. & D.27.b. also machine gun positions at D.26, D.27, D.20. central and D.27.central.</p> <p>An enemy Field Battery was seen getting into position S.E. of PRONVILLE at D.10.c.90.</p> <p>A good deal of movement was observed on the main BAPAUME-CAMBRAI Road in E.23.d. & E.24.c & d. Motor and horse transports and infantry movement was seen. The wagons appeared to be coming from FONTAINE light and returning loaded.</p> <p>Movement was also observed in Areas D.8.c.& d, D.9.c.55. Transport was seen moving along roads in these areas. Parties of enemy were also seen in U.30.a. and b.</p> <p>Our planes were very active observing for our artillery and on several occasions brought targets under notice of which every advantage was taken.</p> <p>Hostile planes were also active, one being brought down in our lines and the 2 airmen taken prisoners.</p> <p>Early in the morning of the 2nd inst. several mines were sprung in DOIGNIES and at 11.30 a.m. a mine exploded in a house at LEBUCQUIERE.</p> <p>During the night of the 2nd/3rd posts of 4th Division were pushed out and established on line C.4.c.55-C.4.c.90-C.4.d.35-C.5.c.02-C.5.c.31-C.11.a.68-C.11.b.22-C.11.d.47.</p>	App.

From 4.30 p.m. to 7 p.m. we bombarded HERMIES Railway Station with hows. Between 8 p.m. and 11 p.m and again from 5.50 a.m to 6.30 a.m we shelled the cross roads in J.5.c.</p> <p>We shelled D.9.d.31 from 4 p.m. to 4.40 p.m.</p> <p>Hostile artillery was very quiet on our right Division front during night, but more active during daylight.</p> <p>Situation on our left Division front remained unchanged, Hostile artillery fire was not active. During the night 4th/5th posts were established on the railway from C.6.e.43 to C.5.a.90.</p> <p>This line is being held by 1 Coy.</p>	App.A.

A party moving along road in J.23 was fired on and dispersed.</p> <p>A hostile machine gun was located by a patrol as firing from J.10.b.55 and an O.P. was located at D.21.b.44.</p> <p>A considerable amount of movement was observed in rear of enemy lines throughout the day.</p>	App.A. 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HENENCOURT.	1917. April.5. Contd.		<p>Hostile artillery was not very active against our right div. sector. BAPAUME was shelled at irregular intervals by a heavy howitzer during the afternoon. Several large explosions were observed in PRONVILLE at 5 p.m. At 12.7 p.m. clouds of smoke were seen rising from HERMIES.</p> <p>At 3 a.m. right Battalion of our left Division (4th Div.) advanced its left flank and formed a line of posts from C.18.d.18 to C.12.a.63. At 5.12 a.m. 2 Coys. of left Battalion captured the railway from C.5.a.05 to C.5.central with little opposition from the enemy. At the same time the right Coy. advanced its line to C.11.b.05-C.12.a.63 and got into touch with our troops on railway at C.6.c.43. Touch was maintained with right Division (5th Div.).</p> <p>Our left Division artillery was very active during the 24 hours. Several hostile parties in rear of enemy lines were dispersed with casualties.</p> <p>Hostile artillery was active on our left Div. area. C.26. & C.24 were heavily shelled also road in C.9.d. RIFENCOURT CHURCH spire was knocked down at 2.26 p.m.</p>

Considerable movement observed in rear of enemy lines. Hostile artillery below normal.</p> <p>4th Division report that Railway line running from U.27.d.24 to U.28.c.53 was taken over from 2/7th Bn. West Yorks. Posts were also established on railway from U.28.c.53 to C.4.b.86. Railway line is now held from C.6.c.33 to U.27.d.24 with posts at intervals.</p>

Wire was damaged in U.28.b., U.30.a, U.29.a & b. Our planes were active during the day. 2 hostile planes were driven down and 3 of our own. Enemy shelled the forward line of 4th Division with H.E. and shrapnel throughout the day. NOREUIL, ECOUST, ST MEIN and LONGATTE were heavily shelled. VAULX was lightly shelled at 5.30 p.m. Considerable movement was observed in enemy rear lines and on roads.</p> <p>-----</p> <p>1st Anzac Summary of operations for week ending 6-4-17 issued.</p>	App.																																										
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		7th.	<p>During night 6th/7th 3rd Infantry Bde. relieved 14th Infantry Bde. in front line. At 9 a.m. command of right sector Anzac Corps front taken over by G.O.C. 1st Aust. Div. from G.O.C. 5th Aust. Div. Both divisions report hostile artillery fairly active on our forward positions and on sunken roads. DOIGNIES, LAGNICOURT and LOUVERVAL were fairly heavily shelled.</p>																																											
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HENENCOURT.	1917. April. 8.		<p>During the night 7th/8th outpost line of 1st Aust. Div. was advanced to the line J.5.c.00 - J.5.b.55-D.29.c.49-D.28.d.04-D.28.c.00-D.27.b.59. Heavy machine gun fire was encountered during the operation but our casualties were light. Patrols located M.gun at about J.29.a.85 and STATION in J.29.a. appeared to be strongly held. A hostile post at J.23.c.09 was strongly held. Our artillery was active throughout the day, shelling the high ground north of PRONVILLE-BOURSIES-HERMIES and Windmill at J.5.c.00. Hostile artillery showed a marked increase in activity on our right Div. area. MORCHIES & I.5.c. were heavily shelled and our troops forced to evacuate this area. LOUVERVAL-LAGNICOURT-DOIGNIES Squares J.2.c, J.3, J.7 and J.8 were very heavily shelled during the night. Hostile machine guns were very active during the operation in the morning. During the night 7th/8th the front line of right Bde. 4th Div. (left Div.) was pushed forward to SUNKEN Road from U.29.c.22 to C.5.b.57. Our artillery was very active during the day firing on the HINDENBURG LINE, BULLECOURT and RIENCOURT. Wire at U.28.b.78, U.29.b.98, U.29.b.96, U.29.a.65 is reported to be badly damaged. Patrols report enemy were in U.28.b. of an average thickness of 30 yds. It is cut about in places but no gaps exist yet. Enemy lightly shelled forward positions of 4th Division during day. NOREUIL, ECOUST, ST MEIN, LONGATTE and VAULX were shelled at intervals. HENENCOURT.	1917. April. 9.		<p>The operations carried out by the 1st Australian Division during last 2 days culminated in the seizure of HERMIES, DEMICOURT, and BOURSIES:-</p> <p><u>Operation 1.</u> The operations of the last two days culminated in the seizure of HERMIES, DEMICOURT and BOURSIES. It was considered that the action against HERMIES would present considerable difficulty, while that against BOURSIES appeared to present an easier problem. The capture of HERMIES was expected to facilitate the seizure of DEMICOURT.</p> <p><u>Operation 2.</u> The 3rd Infantry Brigade established itself on the ridge north west of BOURSIES on the night 7th/8th April meeting with considerable opposition (vide Summary of 8th inst.) Action against HERMIES and DEMICOURT was confined to normal artillery activity.</p> <p><u>Operation 3.</u> It was hoped that these measures would lead the enemy to believe that BOURSIES was the next objective and would lull any suspicions of immediate action against HERMIES and DEMICOURT. These expectations appear to have been justified.</p> <p><u>Operation 4.</u> The 1st Infantry Brigade was to seize HERMIES and DEMICOURT and the 3rd Brigade was to capture BOURSIES. The plan of the operation was to attack HERMIES from the north west with the right of the attack on the DOIGNIES-HERMIES Road, the left of the attack was to sweep through the north eastern side of the town. The 2nd Battalion was allotted to this task. The enemy's main defences were to be continued from the south by the 3rd Battalion and as soon as the main attack reached the Railway this attack was to be pressed home. The 1st Battalion was to push forward from DOIGNIES to cover the left of the 2nd Battalion and to seize DEMICOURT when opportunity offered, 4th Battalion remained in reserve.</p> <p><u>Operation 5.</u> The 3rd Brigade was to assault BOURSIES at the same time as the 1st Brigade assaulted HERMIES. To facilitate this the posts on the high ground in Squares J.5 -D.27 and D.28 were to be pushed forward by 10th Battalion early on the night 7th/8th, prior to the assault on BOURSIES by 12th Battalion. The 11th Battalion was held in reserve.</p> <p><u>Operation 6.</u> From zero onwards the 5th Divisional Artillery were to keep DEMICOURT under fire and the Divisional Artillery and Machine Guns of 20th Light Division were to keep the northern part of HAVRINCOURT wood under fire also. Zero hour was 4.15 a.m.</p> <p><u>Operation 7.</u> At 10.30 p.m. the enemy anticipated our action by counter-attacking the posts of 12th Battalion which was nearest BOURSIES. He gained a footing but was ejected almost immediately by a local counter-attack and left 1 prisoner of 94th R.I.R. in our hands.</p>	

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HENENCOURT.	1917. April. 9. Contd.		<p>The 10th and 12th Battalions met very strong opposition in advancing their posts chiefly from machine guns on the high ground and portion of the Reserve Battalion was called upon to reinforce the 12th Battalion for the action.</p> <p>The assault on BOURSIES was delivered at zero and at 5.30 am. it was reported that the village had been captured. There was great difficulty in maintaining communications at this place, and the village was subjected to severe machine gun fire throughout the morning from the North. At about 2 p.m. special parties were organised and sent through the village to 'mop up'.</p> <p><u>Operation. 8.</u> The assault on HERMIES was carried out as planned. There was considerable opposition on the Southern and Northwestern fronts chiefly from machine gun fire.</p> <p>At 5 a.m. the right of 2nd Battalion was reported by the F.O.O. to be in HERMIES in Square 29.B and the left to be working round the Northeast of the town. At 5.55 a.m. 3rd Battalion was reported to have occupied CEMETERY South of HERMIES and to be in touch with 2nd Battalion in the town.</p> <p>The 1st Battalion was then ordered to send patrols into DEMICOURT.</p> <p>At 7.20 a.m. the enemy endeavoured to develop a local counter-attack from the direction of DEMICOURT. This was broken up by Artillery fire.</p> <p>The 1st Battalion pushed forward against DEMICOURT under cover of artillery fire. At about noon the Germans bolted over the ridge to the East under artillery fire and pressure of patrols of 1st Battalion.</p> <p>The 1st Battalion pushed through the village and established themselves on the Eastern side. All localities are being consolidated.</p> <p><u>Operation. 9.</u> By noon 157 prisoners had passed through Brigade Headquarters.</p> <p><u>Enemy Activity.</u></p> <p><u>Artillery.</u> Throughout the 24 hours hostile shelling was more active than usual and was distributed over the forward areas. DOIGNIES, LOUVERVAL LAGNICOURT and BEAUMETZ were shelled during the period.</p> <p><u>Machine Guns.</u> A number of hostile machine guns on ridge E.28.b.1.9 to D.23.c.7.5. One machine gun was located at D.28.b.1.9 and another fired from road in D.29.c and b.</p> <p>4th Division report our artillery very active during day on enemy's wire and defences. Enemy wire reported well cut from U.28.b.47 to U.29.a.28 and fairly well cut from U.29.b.65. U.30.a.05. also from U.29.a.85 to U.29.b.45. ^{Sketches} of 20.x. were well cut in U.28.b.</p>	

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HENENCOURT.	1917. April 9.		<p>During the night 8th/9th the front line of the Right Bde. was pushed forward to <u>SUNKEN Road</u> from U.29.c.22 along road to C.5.b.57.</p> <p>Our machine guns were active on Cross Roads in U.22.a and b. and on communications in rear of BULLECOURT.</p> <p>Strong patrols were out throughout the night examining state of wire and endeavouring to establish how strongly the HINDENBURG Line was being held. A patrol found enemy's wire from U.29.b.45 to U.29.b.66 badly broken and cut to pieces.</p> <p>At 2.15 am. patrol commenced to put out tape marking jumping off trench, while engaged in this 2 of the enemy were seen approaching and were surrounded and captured. They turned out to be an officer and his orderly both of 24 I.R.</p> <p>Enemy could be heard at U.29.b.9054, U.29.b.56, U.29.b.7550 (a machine gun).</p> <p>Enemy artillery was active at intervals on NOREUIL and our batteries in rear of the village.</p> <p>Hostile machine guns at U.29.b.84 and other at U.30.a.73 were active during night.</p> <p>Enemy trench mortars fired on patrols from U.28.a.55.</p> <p>Enemy snipers were occasionally active.</p>

<p>Corps Order No.124 issued.</p> <p>During the night 9th/10th April the advanced line held by 1st Aust. Division was considerably advanced and now runs J.35.b.81-J.36.a.51-J.36.a.65-J.36.a.96-J.30.d.78-J.30.d.89-K.25.a.06-K.25.a.8005-K.25.a.53-K.19.c.05-J.24.a.72-J.24.b.1595-J.18.d.36-J.18.b.51-J.18.b.62-J.18.b.76-K.7.c.02-K.7.c.25-J.12.d.76-J.12.d.19-J.5.c.77-D.29.c.47-D.28.b.04-D.27.a.33-D.20.d.36-D.20.a.23-D.20.a.09-D.13.d.30-D.13.a.77-C.18.b.96-C.12.d.82-C.12.b.20-with standing patrols at K.25.d.66 K.25.c.51-K.25.central and K.25.b.34.</p> <p>Patrols report that SUNKEN ROAD running S.E.from K.7.c.85 is held by enemy with machine guns. It is wired and has at least 2 machine guns there.</p> <p>Our artillery was active during the day. HAVRINCOURT and WOOD in K.32.a. BULLECOURT and vicinity were intermittently shelled throughout the 24 hours.</p> <p>HERMIES appears to have been more systematically destroyed than other villages which we have captured.</p> <p>Hostile artillery was very active on our right Divisional area.</p> <p>HERMIES DOIGNIES and LOUVERVAL receiving particular attention.</p> <p>At 12.30 a.m. 10th inst.following order was issued to 4th Australian Division :-</p> <p>"Under Army Orders action will be taken on 10th inst. as verbally arranged tanks will precede advance. Heavy artillery will cooperate under orders of 4th Australian Division. Special bombardments will be arranged to protect flanks. If action successful TANKS and infantry will clear BULLECOURT and advance will be made to RIENCOURT. V Corps are to take their objectives if we succeed and are to move on to HENDECOURT. 4th Cavalry Division are to follow 4th Australian Division and operate in direction VIS-EN-ARTOIS. Keep 4th Cavalry Division informed of progresss.</p> <p>Much enemy movement was noticed particularly during the afternoon opposite our left division.</p> <p>Wagons and men were seen moving both ways on road in the U.6.c and U.12.c. near Chateau.</p> <p>Between 4 p.m. and 5.45 p.m. parties of two to four men were observed moving from U.22.d.and c towards BULLECOURT.</p>

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GREVILLERS. (G.29.b.)	1917. April. 11.		<p>1st Anzac Corps Order G.50/63 issued. Move of Advanced Corps Headquarters to GREVILLERS (G.29.b). 1st Anzac Corps Order No.125 issued. Relief of 4th Australian Division by 2nd Australian Division.</p> <p>-----</p> <p>During the 24 hours ending 6 a.m. April 11th Left Bde. of Right Division (1st Aust. Div.). advanced its line to D.21.d.82-D.22.c.54-D.22.b.44. The right Brigade took over from the left Brigade the three posts in J.6.c. and J.5.d. Patrols from our right Division located an enemy machine gun at J.6.d.55 and report enemy to be holding a line of disconnected holes running from K.7.d.55-K.7.a.82-K.7.a.25- A hostile machine gun was located at K.7.d.54. A hostile party was observed digging and putting out wire at J.6.d.51. Posts at J.12.a.92 report a light trench mortar about 800 yards-1000 yards to their immediate front. Right Divisional artillery activity was about normal.
