

SECOND AUSTRALIAN DIVISION INTELLIGENCE SUMMARY. From 6 a.m. 2oth. Feb. to 6 a.m. 1st. March. 1917.

NOTE: - Not to be taken into front line trenches.

OUR OPERATIONS.

Artillery. Operations carried out during the last 24 hours consisted of a systematic shelling of GREVILLERS TR. in M.5.a. and M.4.b., commun-. ication sap in M. 5.b., and all known machine guns and road junctions in that vicinity. MALT TR. and the wire in front of same was also subjected to fire during the day. Several registrations of important points were also obtained.

At 12.38 a.m., during some heavy hostile shelling on our front, a light barrage was put down on S.O.S. lines at request of Left Inf. Bde. At 12.47 a.m., as the firing had died down considerably, this was

stopped.

Offensive Operations. A post was established at M. 6. c. 2.8 A party bombed along MALT TR. from M. 5. d. 42.3 to M. 5. d. 2.5 and established a post there. Further advance was checked by heavy k.G. fire. A bombing party advanced 15 yds. from WALT TR. up communication trench in M.5. d. wherea M.G. prevented further advance. An attempt was made to enter MAIT TR. at M. 5. c. 5. 5 but failed owing to the wire and enemy M. Gs. which fired, one from each side of road at M. 5. c. 5. 5 and one from M. 5. c. 05. 45 .. A partial breach in wire was observed at M. 5. c. 3.6. Elsewhere it was intact. It is 15 ft. wide in the vicinity of LOUPART ROAD but further to left consists of single knife rests and trip wires.

Patrols. Patrols examined wire in front of GREVILLERS TR. from M. 6. b.6.7 and M.6.b.4.7 and found it to be in two rows, each about 10 ft. to 16 ft. thick. Front row is 3.6" high, in good condition, and appears to be on wooden pickets. Rear row is not so high. Observation was obtained 700 yds. to the west from G .36.d.9.0. No gaps were seen. There was much movement in enemy's trenches at G.36.d.5.4: sounds of

voices and moving limbers could be heard.

Patrols report wire is damaged at M. 4. d. 82.62 and M. 4. d. 5.6 but not sufficiently to allow passage of troops.

Machine Guns. During the night indirect fire was brought to bear on LOUPART WOOD, GREVILLERS LINE & SUPPORT LINE from M. 4. b. 7.6 to G. 36.d. 9.2.

ENEMY OPERATIONS.

Artillery. Enemy artillery was very active. On three occasions a barrage was placed on WARLENCOURT, extending about 400 yds. north of it, by 15 cm. and 10.5 cm. guns from direction of BAPAULE. A number of lachrymatory shells fell in the vicinity of BUTTE &UARRY (M. 17.a.O.7) and LE BARQUE SWITCH in M. 11.d. during the night. (SEE TABLE OVERLEAF).

Movement. A working party was seen at G.34.a.1.1. Four Germans in full marching order were seen walking towards the front line behind the GREVILLERS LINE in . G.36.c.

Signalling. Red and green flares brought fairly heavy barrage on our lines at 5.30 p.m. and 1.50 a.m. At 12.15 a.m. a number of red

flares brought on a heavy barrage of E.G. and rifle fire.

Strong Point. Enemy has a strong point at M. 5. d. 0. 5 . It appears to be strongly held as is the C.T. from MALT TR. commencing at M. 5. d. 5. 33.

Gas. Several Germans were seen to run from a gas cloud at M. 4. d. 8.7. Observation. Owing to mist, observation was difficult.

SECOND AUSTRALIAN DIVISIONAL ORDER NO. 94.

Divisional Headquarters, 1st March, 1917.

Reference - LE BARQUE Sheet 1/20,000.

- 1. In connection with para. 8. (1) of 2nd Australian Divisional Order No.93, an attack will be made tonight (1st/2nd March) on MALT and GAMP TRENCHES.
- 2. The 7th Aust. Inf. Bde. will make the attack. The 5th Aust. Inf. Bde. will co-operate on the eastern flank of the attack.
- 3. During the day the heavy artillery and the 2nd Aust. Div. Art. (including the two M.T. Mortars now in position) will cut the enemy's wire in front of MALT TRENCH on the line M. 5. c. 7. 6 to M. 4. b. 21. 12 and for one hundred yards down GALP TRENCH from its junction with MALT TRENCH.

Orders for artillery barrages will be issued separately.

- Zero hour will be notified later.
- Watches will be synchronized today at 4 p.m. and 6 p.m. with Signal Co. and 2nd Aust. Div.
- 6. On gaining MALT TRENCH a line of posts will be established by the 5th and 7th Aust. Inf. Bdes. from M.6.a.3.32 to the junction of MALT and GAMP TREMCHES.

A block and strong post will be made as far up MALT TRENCH towards GREVILLERS TRENCH as can be reached.

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SECOND AUSTRALIAN DIVISIONAL ORDER NO. 95.

Divisional Headquarters, 1st March, 1917.

Reference - LE SARS & LE BARQUE Sheets 1/10,000.

- 1. (a) Immediately after the capture of MALT and GAMP TRENCHES preparations will be made to attack the GREVILLERS line in co-operation with an attack by the 2nd Corps against LOUPART TRENCH.
- (b) The attack will be made on the front G.35.d.9.7 to M. 4. b. 2.9 and will include the capture of the south-eastern portion of LOUPART WOOD.
- 2. In order to facilitate preparations for this operation a readjustment of boundaries will be made as follows :-

Right Divisional Boundary - G.35.d.9.7 - G.36.c.0.2 -M. 12.a. 75.75 - M. 17. central, thence along present Divisional Boundary.

Left Divisional Boundary - G.34.central - G.34.d.3.0 -M. 4. d. 5. E, thence down GAMP TRENCH to present Divisional Boundary.

Inter-Brigade Boundary - G.35.d.O.6 - G.35.d.2.O, thence down old communication trench (inclusive to Right Bde.) to M. 5. d. 6. 6 - 3ross Roads at M. 11. a. 6 2. 3 - M. 16. c. 3 2. 6, thence along present Inter-Brigade Boundary.

- 3. Any movement of troops necessary to effect these readjustments will be completed during the night 1st/2nd March, details being arranged between brigade commanders and commanders of flanking brigades. Completion of adjustment will be reported to D.H.W.
- 4. Posts will be relieved by day where possible. If a post can only be relieved by night a proportion of the old garrison will remain there till just before daylight on the 2nd March, and will withdraw under the crders of the commander of the relieving garrison.
- 5. The front of the Division will be established after the capture of MALT and GAMP TRENCHES on the line M.6.a.30.35 -M. 4.d. 50.90, from which line the attack against the GREVILLERS line will be made.

This line will at first be held as an outpost line. When constructing posts or fire-bays special attention will be given to protection against enfilade artillery and M.G. fire from the East.

To conform with the above movement, the 1st Australian Division is to establish posts on the line TRIP TRENCH (N.1.b. 6.2) - M.6.a.30.35.

SECOND AUSTRALIAN DIVISION INTELLIGENCE SUMMARY.

From 6 a.m. 1st. karch to 6 a.m. 2nd. March, 1917.

NOTE: - Not to be taken into front line tranches.

OUR OPERATIONS. Art illery. An enemy O.P. at G. 34. a. 5.1. was fired upon by our 1.8 pdrs. at Il. 45 a.m. Our 4.5" howitzers shelled the machine gun positions at M. 5.c. 15.50., N. 5.c. 8.6. and M. 5.c. 7.6. In the afternoon lapdre, were employed for wire cutting in front of MALT TRENCH Registrations were also carried out. During the night light barrages were put down several times on account of enemy's bombardment. At 3 a.m. the artillery co-operated in the attack on MALT TRENCH. Offensive Operations, at 10:3/o p.m. under cover of our artillery barrage on LATTON ALLEY in M.5.b. a party bombed up the trench and thus engaged his attention while another party from the valley East of the trench attacked him in rear. Enemy was completely taken by surprise and strong point at M. 5. d. 6. 6. was captured. Six prisoners of the 5th. Coy. 2nd. Bn. 1st. Guards Reserve Regt and a sergeant of the 5th. Grenadier Guards were taken . At 3 a.m. MALT AND GAMP TRENCHES from LOUPART ROAD to M. 4.d. 3 . were attacked under cover of "artillery barrage. The wire in front of MAIN TRENCH to the w. of Junction temporarily held up the attackers on the left. Enemy was driven from MALT TRENCH betweenLOUPART ROAD and TRENCH juncbion (M. 4. d. 7. 7.) The right party after a hard fight finally penetrated 300 yards to the east of LOUPART ROAD. 2 Machine Guns, 3 small trench mortars and 63 prisoners were taken. Patrols. A patrol observed the wire in front of the GREVILLERS LINE from M.6.b.7.8. Behind the first row (3'6" high and in form of a fence with 5 strands of wire) there are thick entanglements about 12" high on four rows of stakes. Fresh earth was not load at G. 36. d. 5.32. Enemy were observed filling sandbags and chopping wood in copse near this point. Eleven men were seen at one time and much movement heard in the copse. No movement was observed in the trench but sounds of a number of men mere heard. Trench Mortars. Stokes guns co-operated successfully in our operations during the night and an enemy Strong Point in MALT TRINCH in M. 5. d. was knocked out and 4 dead Germans were Lying in it when our troops oscupied it.

ENEMY OPERATIONS.

Artillery. Enemy artillery romained active during the day. (SEE TABLE OVERLEAF)

Signalling. At 12.15 a.m. the enemy sent up flares bursting into three Red stars followed by flares bursting into single Green stars.

Hostile artillery immediately opened fire.

At 12.20 a.m. the enemy sent up flares bursting into Green stars and immediately the hostide artillery slackened on that part of the line.

Aircraft. Hostile aircraft was active throughout the day. At 4.20 p.m. five hostile planes flow over WARTIMPUDH at a considerable height.

WEEKLY SUMMARY OF OPERATIONS.

For Period 8 a.m. 23rd Feb. to 8 a.m. 2nd March.

1. GENERAL.

As a result of operations during the past week, our line has been advanced from 1200 to 1500 yards and is now established on the line MALT TRENCH - GAMP THENCH, with posts pushed out in advance in M.5.d. and a. The occupation of this line has not been attained without considerable opposition on the part of the enemy, which has only been overcome after heavy fighting.

To conform with this advance our batteries have been pushed forward into the area EAUCOURT L'ABBAYE - BUTTE - LE SARS - D'ESTREMONT FARM.

2. OPERATIONS.

(i) Eritish.

Indications of an enemy retirement were first noticed on the night of the 23rd/24th February, when enemy machine guns and trench mortars, which had hitherto been active, were silent, and no flares were fired from the enemy lines. Attempts to draw fire on the 24th were unsuccessful. Fighting patrols pushed out all along the front that evening found the enemy forward positions evacuated. These were at once occupied by our troops and our line established on the night 24th/25th February on the general line BUTTH - GALLWITZ TRENCH.

on the morning of the 25th February our patrols, pushing forward through LITTLE WOOD - WARLEMCOURT and towards LE BANQUE SWITCH, were sniped on, but enemy quickly retired on his line of retreat being threatened. Posts were established to N.W., N. and N.E. of WARLENCOURT and in LE BARQUE SWITCH without serious opposition. Patrols pushed forward towards MALT TRENCH found it strongly wired and occupied by the enemy. An attempt to occupy MALT TRENCH in the evening failed owing to wire and enemy machine gun fire. Contact with the enemy was maintained during the night.

February were again unsuccessful, but that night, in conjunction with the brigade on our right, a portion of the trench was cleared between BATTERY COPSE and the BAPAUME Rd. and a post was established in GAMP TRENCH and at M.S.d.S.l, in contact with the enemy. A detailed reconnaissance of MALT and GAMP TRENCHES showed that they were heavily wired and held by infantry and machine guns.

bombing and a block established in MALT TRENCH at M.5.d.42.52.

Posts were also pushed out to the North of the BAPAUME Road and at the North end of MISTY WAY.

-2.

In view of the stubborn enemy resistance, preparations were made on the 28th February for a regular assault on MALT and GAMP TRENCHES. Trench mortars were emplaced to deal with the wire, which was also subjected to a bombardment by 18-prs. and howitzers. Our new posts meanwhile were consolidated.

On the 1st March the wire in front of the objective was successfully dealt with and on the night of the 1st/2nd inst., at 3.10 a.m., MALT and GAMP TRENCHES were assaulted by the 26th and portions of the 27th and 28th Battalions, 7th Aust. Inf. Bde. Between LOUPART Read and the junction of GAMP and MALT TRENCHES the attack was immediately successful but the enemy continued to fight obstinately East of the LOUPART Road and N.W. of EMMA ALLEY. GAMP TRENCH could not be entered by the party detailed for that task owing to wire and machine gun fire, but progress was made up to a point 40 yards beyond the trench junction by bombing, and a block established there.

LAYTON ALLEY by the 5th Aust. Inf. Ede., which resulted in a block being established about M.5.d.5.9 and the capture of seven prisoners. An attempt by the enemy, on morning of 2nd March, to regain the lost ground was defeated by an excellent piece of cooperation between the artillery and infantry. A second attack, however, succeeded in driving us back nearly to the junction of MALT TRENCH and LAYTON ALLEY. A fresh attack drove the enemy back and a strong block has now been established at M.5.d.5.8.

3. OBJECT OF OPERATIONS.

The above operations have been carried out with a view to

(i) harrassing the enemy's retirement;

(ii) maintaining touch;

(iii) gaining a position from which an assault on the GREVILLERS Line from G.35.d.9.7 to M.4.b.2.9 can be carried out.

4. OBJECTIVES.

As given in narrative above.

5. UNITS AND AFPROXIMATE NUMBERS EMPLOYED.

The dispositions on the evening of the 24th, when the advance commenced, were -

Right Brigade Sector - 5th Aust. Inf. Bde. disposed on a 2 battalion front.

Left Brigade Sector - 6th Aust. Inf. Bde. disposed on a 2 battalion front.

On the evening 26th/27th instant the 7th Aust. Inf. Bde. relieved the 6th Aust. Inf. Bde. in the Left Brigade Sector. The Right Brigade is now on a one-battalion front.

6. ENEMY'S RESISTANCE.

As indicated above, the enemy showed little fight until our troops got into touch with him in MALT TRENCH. He has held this line stubbornly, and successfully obstructed our advance for 5 days.

His machine gums have been particularly well-handled, firing from the MALT TRENCH line itself and from the WARLENCOURT TRENCH. Enemy artillery has also been active on lines of appreach and on places likely to be used by us as headquarters. Occasionally intense barrages have been put on different sectors of our new forward area.

7. PRISONERS.

The total number of prisoners reported captured to date as the result of the week's operations is 71 0.R's. Of these 63 were captured by the 7th Aust. Inf. Bde. and 8 by the 5th Aust. Inf. Bde.

Captured material includes 2 machine guns and 3 trench

OUR CASUALTIES.

Our casualties for the operation have not yet been reported.

BESULTS ACRIEVED.

MALT TRENCH, the capture of which was necessary as a preliminary to the more important operation against the GREVILLERS Line, has been captured. Considerable casualties have been inflicted on the enemy, his moral damaged, and nearly a mile of territory, on a frontage of 1700 yards, regained. Dumps containing a considerable amount of engineering stores have been found.

TREECH MORTARS. 10.

Medium trench mortars were emplaced on the night 28th Feb./1st March to deal with the wire in front of MALT TRENCH. These mortars were excellently handled under very difficult conditions. The wire was effectively dealt with. They contributed largely to the ultimate capture of the trench on the night 1st/2nd March.

11. ARTILLERY.

(a) Artillery action has conformed generally to that of the infantry. Batteries have been moved forward as mentioned in para. 1. Eatteries were employed on wire-cutting on the 28th February and 1st March in connection with the attack on MALT TRENCH.

LOUPART WOOD has received a considerable amount of attention daily. On let Warch a body of enemy moving on the western edge were dispersed, and several observers reported in trees in the wood were specially fired on.

Heavy artillery has co-operated by neutralising enemy batteries active against our front; by shelling strong points, and by assisting in destruction of wire in front of MALT TRENCH and in the GREVILLERS Line.

(b) Enemy Artillery.

Until the enemy evacuated his front system hostile shelling was normal, the usual attention being paid to LE SARS and vicinity, MARTINPUICH, and the valley in M.27, 28 and 22, the BAPAUME Read and D'ESTREMONT FARM.

Since the withdrawal the fire on the whole has been slightly below normal, but on several occasions very heavy shelling has been reported, almost all firing coming from the direction of BAPAUME and its vicinity.

12. CHANGES OF DIVISIONAL OR BRIGADE FRONTS.

A readjustment of the Divisional Right Boundary, in accordance with 1st Anzac No.8/1636 of 27th February, has been made with the 1st Australian Division.

The inter-brigade boundary is now from G.35.d.2.0 down LAYTON ALLEY (inclusive to Right Bde.) - to M.5.d.6.6.6 - Cross Reads at M.11.a.62.3 - M.16.c.32.6.

Artillery. The communication trench in M.5.b. was subjected to intermittent periods of heavy shelling throughout the morning. The medium trench mortars expended 40 rounds between 6 and 6.30 p.m. (1/3/16) in cutting the wire in front of MALT TR. at M.4.d.8.7, M.5. c.05.65, M.5.c.45.60, and in bombing the strong points at M.5.c.45.60 and M.4.d.90.65. The results were satisfactory. At 5.30 a.m. 8 bombs were fired at the strong point at M.5.c.7.7.

Offensive operations. At 5.25 a.m. (after MALT TR. had been taken) the enemy put up a heavy artillery barrage and at 5.35 launched a counterattack which was repelled, 4 German prisoners being captured. Later the whole line of trenches taken was cleared and consolidated. At 1 p.m., while the artillery bombarded LAYTON ALLEY and M.5.b.4.4, to junction with GREVILLERS TR. and along the latter trench about 100 yds. each side of the junction, a bombing party proceeded to bomb up LAYTON ALLEY and established a block at M.5.d.5\frac{1}{2}.8. 25 enemy dead were counted along the trench.

Patrols. A patrol reports two ordinary barbed wire fences, 100 yds. apart, each with 5 strands of wire, about M.6.a.3.4. Strong wire was met with about 100 yards from GREVILLERS TR. (G.36.a.1.1)

four lines of stakes about 4.6" high wired in the usual way.
Coughing, sounds of hammering stakes, and movement of transport in
rear of GREVILLERS TR. were heard. At this point the patrol was fired
on. It is estimated that 40 rifles were firing from a frontage of
300 yds. No machine guns fired. Another patrol passed through a
gap in the wire at approx. G.35.d.9.1 and met a second line about 10
yds. in rear of the first. Each row is about 20 ft. wide, well wired
on stout pickets.

On the left patrols found that GREVILLERS TR. was occupied in strength by the enemy. Sounds of talking, whisting and hammering were heard, and also sound of a wheeled vehicle moving close behind the enemy line. A special patrol found no signs of enemy working in front of his wire.

Machine Guns and Mortars. Machine guns fired on enemy trenches and approaches in rear. During the morning 200 rounds were fired by Stokes mortars into LAYTON ALLEY at M.5.d.5.5, where the enemy was seen attacking down the trench. The fire was effective, causing several casualties and the enemy retired.

Sniping. Very little sniping activity on right: snipers active on left.

ENEMY OPERATIONS.

Artillery. MALT TR. was subjected to intermittent fire by 10.5 cm. shells throughout the day. A 21 cm. howitzer shelled HEXHAM Rd. about 4 p.m. Flashes of two guns were observed which appeared to be lecated at M.35.c.5.7. Flashes were also observed at true bearing 37% from M.16.a.8%.1%

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

Dispositions before attack.

1st. Guards R.I.R. sector from H.31.d.6.6. to M.5.b.3.92. (approx).

1 Battalion front system.

LAYTON ALLEY nominally held by 1 M.G. and two sections (17 men) were just being relieved by about 40men and 2 M.Gs. when we attacked. Remaining 2½ Coys. were in WARLENCOURT TRENCH in G.36. c&d. Company strength average 50men. Each company in WARLENCOURT had attached to it 3 M.Gs. 1 Battalion in support in trenches round GREVILLERS. Remaining Battalion in reserve in BIHUCOURT line.round about AVESNES. Policy.

At first orders were received that MALT TRENCH and LAYTON ALIEY were to be held merely as an outpost line. Some days ago these orders were cancelled and fresh orders issued that these trenches were to be strongly held. Prisoner's impression is that the GREVILLERS - VILLERS

AU FLOS line is to be held for two or three weeks.

Trenches and Defences.

WARLENCOURT TRENCH is a good trench and likely to be strongly held. It contains many dugcuts and M.G. positions. Prisoners can give no definite location of the latter. GREVILIERS TRENCH is disused, being very muddy, and in some places full of water. Both trenches are wired. Wire in front of WARLENCOURT TRENCH is in two rows each about 7 metres thick distance between rows of wire about 7 metres. Prisoners do not think there are now any gaps in wire, and do not know of any forward posts. GREVILLERS is not occupied by troops, nor are there any other trenches in it except those shown on the map. Reliefs.

There is no definite hour for reliefs. Times are constantly changed. Men rove overground to the trenches. Garrison in LAYTON

ALLEY used to be relieved every 24 hours. OBSERVATION.

From GMEWILLERS line prisoners say they could only see the tops of the trees along the BAPAUME - ALBERT ROAD. From BIHUCOURT line near AVESNES direct observation into WARLENCOURT could be obtained. Prisoners were told to look out for our posts in M.6.d.2.8. and 6.6. Although they could neither see nor hear anything suspicious. there. Artillery.

MALT TR. was considered most important by the enemy as it formed an excellent defence for their front line (GREVILLERS TR.) Enew thought MALT TR. was sufficiently strongly held to provent us from gaining even a temporary footing in it. Priconer caid that on this account he thought no orders for a counterattack had been previously assued.



OUR OPERATIONS.

Artillery. During the day and night 4.5" howitzers paid special attention to trench junction at M.46.15.55. The 18-pdrs. shelled the GREVILLERS LINE. LOUPART WOOD and country in rear.

Machine Guns. Machine Guns fired occasional Tursts along the

G TYILLERS LINE. Patrols. A patrol worked up LAYTON ALIFY to M.5.b:2.8. where the sup was barricaded with knife rests and barbed wire. From approximately M.5.b.27.6. to this point LAYTON ALLEY is in good condition, 6'6" deep, duckboarded and revetted. Close to our block at M.5.d.45.45. the trench is in a bad state being in places knee deep in mud. It looked as if the enemy had quite recently used the trench for sniping and firing flares. The wire was observed from M.5.b.2.8. to be in two lines 18' apart, the front line 12' wide and the second 20' wide. The patrol was sniped at from the GREVILLERS LINE. Later another patrol got through the first line of wire near . M.5.b.2.8., but was unable to penetrate the second line. is 20' wide and uncut. Talking and coughing could be heard along the trench. A machine gun was firing from about M.5.b.0.9. At 4.15 p.m. another patrol visited the same point and found the enemy at work on his wire. A patrol examined the wire at the junction of MART and GREVILLERS TR and found it very strong. The party was fired on by a M. G. at the junction of the two trenches. No enemy patrols were met.

Defences. Posts were established on the line M.6.a.3.5.
M.5.b.8.4., M.5.b.4.3., M.5.b.25.75., M.5.a.30.05., M.4.d.25.90.

Artillery. MALT TR. was barraged with guns of all calibres from 2.40 p.m. to 4 p.m. Six minnenwerfer bombs were fired in vicinity of our posts on the right at 8.45 a.m.

SECOND

1. On taking over the extended front line defined in 2nd Aust. Divl. Order No. 97 dated 4th instant, the Divisional Commander desires to indicate the manner in which the front line is to be held.

It is improbable that the attack referred to in 2nd Aust. Divl. Order No. 95 can take place immediately.

DIVISION.

The division will, as far as can be foreseen, be continuously in the line for an indefinite period, - at any rate for two or three weeks.

The system of giving each infantry brigade a definite section of the front line has been adopted as being the best suited to a more or less prolonged occupation.

The division is now considered as an advanced guard to the Corps, which, while stationary, will provide the outposts

on the western half of the Corps front.

In each brigade section therefore, outpost companies will be told off and carefully allotted to posts or positions on the front which can be made mutually supporting. Behind the posts will be formed bodies for support.

The front line system will also include strong patrols

3. It is estimated that, in this way, one battalion on each brigade section will suffice for the front system. Behind this the remainder of the brigade will be suitably distributed in depth; one battalion in support and one as reserve - thus leaving the fourth battalion free to go back into

a hut camp where it can be near the baths and can also receive some training. It will be referred to as the "Relief" Battalion

- 4. The above system in itself will be the means of training battalions in the duty of protection and will afford practice in the selection of Posts and supporting points, also in the work of patrols.
- 5. It is important that the enemy should not be able to slip away without the fact being discovered by our patrols at once. It is equally important that any counter attack on

his part should be discovered quickly so that the formed bodies behind may be prepared to meet him in front and envelope the flanks of any party which penetrates the line of posts.

The division is required to hold itself in readiness to take up the duties of an advanced guard at any moment.

In this case the "Relief" Battalions would be used for the Vanguard, the battalions on outpost duty closing in and forming the main guard.

The C.R.E. will be prepared to detail parties of engineers to the Vanguard.

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6. The C.R.A. will dispose the artillery placed under his orders with two objects: -

- (a) for the protection of the front held by this division:
- (b) to co-operate in the attack on LOUPART VOOD.

He will also select positions for four brigades of artillery, additional to those already in the line, these positions being sited with a view to many wire-cutting on the GREVILLERS LINE from M. 4. b. 1. 5 eastwards to H. 31. c. 6. 9.

The positions when selected will be prepared for occupation, cover being provided for detachments, and preliminary arrangements made for communications, etc.

When selected the positions will be re-sected by the R.E.

At 3.30 a.m. enemy working party at M.5.a.0.5 was fired on and dispersed. Heavy batteries fired on LOUPARD LINE and targets in rear. In response to S.O.S. Signal from right battalion, left brigade, at 12.29 am. our artillery put up a heavy barrage until about 1.15 am.



WEEKLY SUMMARY OF OPERATIONS.

For Period 8 a.m. 2nd March to 8 a.m. 9th March.

1. GENERAL.

The policy has been that of steadily pushing forward and establishing a line of posts in advance of the captured trenches to get within striking distance of the enemy, and to prepare for future operations against the LOUPART Line.

The attitude of the enemy has been quiescent.

In accordance with 1st Anzac Order No. 104, the 2nd Australian Division relieved the 1st Australian Division in the front line from CATAPULT Road, N.8.a. 8.8 to M.6.a.3.3 (original inter-divisional boundary).

The front is held by a series of outposts with supports and reserves.

to N.2.d.1.0 to N.2.c.9.8 to KNOTTY POINT, thence to TRIP
TR. to N.1.a.8.2 to M.6.b.9.4, thence to M.5.b.4.3 to M.5.
a.3.1 to M.4.d.9.9 to M.4.b.3.0 to M.4.c.7.8.

2. OPERATIONS.

No raids or attacks have been attempted by our troops or by the enemy forces. (N.B. - Last report on operations included details of attacks up till 12 noon on 2nd instant).

3. PATROLS.

(1) British. Our front has been systematically patrolled, both fighting and reconnoitring patrols being sent out nightly, with the object of keeping in contact with the enemy, ascertaining his dispositions, and obtaining up-to-date information regarding NO NAN'S LAND and enemy defences. From patrol reports it appears that the enemy is still holding the LOUPART LINE in normal strength, but with a large number of machine guns, and snipers in forward posts, and that any movement of our patrols in the vicinity of enemy trenches and wire immediately draws heavy rifle and machine gun fire.

(2) Enemy. On three occasions only have enemy patrols been seen in NO MAN'S LAND. On night 5th/6th March an enemy patrol of about 20 was seen near enemy wire at G.36.d.3.l - objective unknown. On night of 7th/8th one of our patrols encountered a machine gun and party of riflemen near M.4.b.4.4 covering a large enemy wiring party. Patrol returned and directed artillery fire on to this point.

On night of 4th/5th March enemy patrol of 3 O.R's. wandered into our lines and was captured by our machine gun post at M.4.d.3.8. All three prisoners belonged to 64th R.I.R.

MACHINE GUNS.

(1) British. Enemy has been harrassed by firing bursts of indirect fire at irregular intervals along his trenches and approaches.

. 2 -

Bursts have also been fired into LOUPART WOOD,

where movement was observed.

- (2) Enemy. Enemy machine guns have been active at night firing across NO MAN'S LAND. Guns have been located by our patrols at intervals along GREVILLERS, WARLENCOURT and TILL TRENCHES.
- 5. TRENCH MORTARS. (1) British. Stokes mortars have engaged suspected machine gun positions in WARLENCOURT and GREVILLERS TRENCHES, and enemy post in BRICKFIELD at N. 2. a.

Medium trench mortars have been put in position for cutting enemy wire round salient in G. 36.d., in M. 5.a. & b., and in M. 4.a. & b.

- (2) Enemy. Enemy mortars have done little firing except on night of 8th/9th March, when Right Brigade reported that several hundred bombs fell in THILLOY. Enemy appears to have been chiefly using the light Granatenwerfer.
- ARTILLERY.

(1) British. General policy has been to shell LOUPART Line, WARLENCOURT and TILL TRENCHES, LOUPART WOOD and GREVILLERS; to search cross roads, communication trenches

and other approaches.

Special operations were undertaken on 2nd Harch when artillery covering fire was provided on the north part of LAYTON ALLEY to assist a bombing attack up the latter; and on the 8th of March when 90 rounds were expended in cutting wire at G. 36.c.l.l.

(2) Enemy. During the past week reports indicate that enemy artillery fire has usually been slightly below normal. The apparent direction in most cases was between GREVILLERS and BAPAUME, and in one case a 15 cm. gun was reported as firing from the direction of VILLERS-au-FLOS.

Shell of all calibres from 77 mm. gun up to 21 cm. howitzer have been used. The principal weapon employed appears to have been the 10.5 cm. howitzer. There was a considerable diminution in the percentage of 15 cm. howitzer.

7. CHANGES OF DIVISIONAL AND BRIGADE FRONTS.

In accordance with 1st Anzac Order No. 104, the 2nd Australian Division relieved the 1st Australian Division in the front line, and the divisional right boundary has been adjusted accordingly. Owing to this readjustment, it has been found necessary to hold the front with three brigades in the line. The interbrigade boundaries are now from N. 1. a. 7. 5, along RED CUT to N. 7. a. 2. 3, along Blue CUT to M. 18. c. 4.7 to M. 29. a. 5. 4 to M. 28. d. 8.9 to M. 28. d. 7.0 to M. 34.d.O.O to S. 3.a.O.1: and LAYTON ALLEY (inclusive to Left

OUR OPERATIONS.

Artillery. The centre and left sub-groups wire cutting batteries fired on wire in lanes at the following points :- G.35.d.25.30, G.35.d.65.05, G.35.d.85.10, G.36.c.3.3, G.36.c.65.40, M.4.b.45.45, M. 4. b. 75. 60, M. 5. a. 25. 60, M. 5. a. 55. 70. Registrations were carried out during the day.

The BRICKFIELDS in N. 2.a., the clump of trees at N. 2.a. 05.60, the cross roads at N.1.b.85.45 and trees at N.1.b.7.6 were fired on. At all these points, working or moving had been seen. To assist the attack of the II Corps on GREVILLERS TR., LOUPART & GREVILLERS TRENCHES in G.34.c.& d. and M.4.a. & b. were kept under a heavy fire from 5.15 am to 6.15 am, a light barrage being continued at

the request of 2nd Corps till 8.45 am. 38 rounds were fired by the medium trench mortars at enemy wire about

M. 4. b. 2. 4.

medium trench mortars also fired on the BRICKFIELDS.

Trench Mortars. Stokes nortars fired on the ENICHFIELDS and strong point at N.2.b.30.15.

Machine Guns. Machine guns fired on LOUPART WOOD, GREVILLERS LINE & enemy's communications .. Enemy working party of 12 men in front of GREVILLERS LINE was fired on and 8 casualties inflicted. M.G's. in co-operating with attack on left fired on LOUPART TR. & GREVILLERS LINE an G. 35.c.

Snipers. At 7 am snipers fired on an enemy party in vicinity of BRICKFIELD in N. 2.a. and dispersed them with one qusualty. Patrols. Information from patrols shows that enemy is definitely established from BRICKFIELD (N. 2.a.) to TILL TR. at N. 9. c. 9.8. In front of the latter point he has snipers well in advance of his line. The strong point at N. 9. c. 65. 90 is still occupied. Flares were fired throughout the length of TILL TR. There is no sign of the enemy between the B APAUNE RD. and the BRICKFIELDS. Patrols came under H.G.

fire owing to the good visibility.

A patrol examined wire from G. 35, d. 6.0 to junction of LAYTON ALLEY and WARLENCOURT TR. (N.5.b.) and found it heavily wired on strong oden stakes. No gaps were observed. At about G.36.d.6.0 the patrol was fired on by enemy with rifles and bombs. A machine gun fired approximately G. 35.d. 5.0. One man was wounded; A patrol found tracks through the enemy wire at G. 36. v. 32.3 and at another point about 250 yds. east of G.36.c.32.3. The wire is in good condition.

Patrols reported that wire in front of GREVILLERS LINE at M. 4. b. 2.3 is not cut.

Works. A large number of German bombs and horseshoes were salved. Trenches and posts were deepened as much as possible under frozen conditions. On the right posts are now linked by a continuous trench as far west as N.2.c.25.85. 250 yds. of wire was put up on the right of the line to strengthen that put up on previous night. About 400 yds. of trench running east from LAYTON ALLEY is now 4'6" deep. About 500 yds. of trench running west from BAPAULE RD. is

nearing completion.

ENEMY OPERATIONS.

Artillery. EAUCOURT L'ABBAYE was heavily shelled between 11 am & (See table overleaf) l pm.

Trench Mortars. On the right brigade front 200 to 250 rounds were fired during the night. Bombs also fell on BAPAUME RD. and rear of MALT TR.

Machine Guns. Enery machine guns fired accasional bursts over NO MAN'S LAND, front and support lines.

From 6 a.m. 10th March to 6 a.m. 11th March, 1917.

NOTE: - Not to be taken into front line trenches.

Artillery. At 11.30 am about 100 shrepnel were put into violaity of BAPAUME RD, at H.31.d. and H.31.b. Enemy trench mortars firing from H.32.6.2.2 were engaged and silensed at 2.30 pm. Wire outting in lanes was carried out with observation during the day at the Following points: M.4.0.9.6. M.5.2.95.80, G.36.0.65.35, G.36.0. 3.3, G.35 d.8.1, G.35.d.7.1 and G.35.d.60,05. 3000 rounds time shrapnel were expended.

Trench Mortars. Medium T.M's. fired 60 rounds about 3 pm at wire in four plabes between M.4.b.80.55 and M.5.a.l.6. It was reported that the wire was cut in each case. 14 rounds were also fixed on wire on G.36.d. T.2.

Machine Guns. Direct fire was brought to bear on road at G. 35.b.2.5 and the Was brought to bear on anomy's front line trenches and tracks, and compution tracks in reas.

Lewis Guns. Lawis Guns fired occasional bursts over enemy front

Snipars. Enamy enipers in TILL TR. were silenced by our own after much activity. Four casualties to enemy are claimed in vicinity of LOUPARS WOOD.

Patrols. A patrol found the BRICKFIELD (N.2.a.) occupied by the enemy, with whom they had a bomb fight.

A patrol moved along BHAULENCOURT RD. to N.S.b. 45.20, where they found a tree across the weel. Freshly used track runs from the tree to the enemy's line, also a telephone wire which was cut. At N.S.b. 6.2 the patrol was fired on by M. 3s. from approximately N.3.c.2.1, N.9.a.b.3. A patrol went out towards the wire at G.36.d.7.2, previously bombed by the medium T.Ms., but the exact damage was not ascertained owing to a German party which was working in and about the wire.

A patrol moved from in front of our lines at M. 6.8.9.7

E. to BAPAUME RD. No enemy were seen or heard.

A patrol moved up the sunkan road in M.S.b. It reported that the enemy is probably rebuilding post at M.S.b.1.7 and that movement in the wire was heard.

A patrol examined wire at M.S.a.l.5 and found it unout. Sounds of enemy working on the wire to the E. were heard from this point.

Work. The bight brigade improved front line and posts. The centra brigade continued the digging of the new forward trench. The left brigade deepened the front line and provided chelters in all posts. A communication trench from MALT TR. to post at M.4.b.93.3 was commenced. Sap from MALT TR. at M.5.c.25.53 was dug to a Support Post at M.5.c.15.3. A new block was put in MALT TR. 150 yds. in advance of post at M.4.b.3.0. Trench between these points has been cleaned out and deepened to 5 ft.

Artillery Enemy appears to register on a lone tree near LUISENHOF FARM. Shells of all calibres are fixed in vicinity until they strike close to the tree. The tree will be removed tonight.

Works. A direct hit on an apparent enemy strong point at M.5.b.1.7 was seen to send sheets of iron, etc. into the air and 5 men ran to the rear. During the night patrols reported that enemy was probably rebuilding this.

Movement. At 10 am. 2 Germans were sighted at about N.1.a.8.8. They were fired on but disappeared in the fog. Two enemy ran back from a clump of bushes E. of BRICKFIELD when artillery opened fire on the BRICKFIELD.

Considerable movement of hostile parties of 2 and 3 from the GREVILLERS LINE at G.35.c.5.l to LOUPART WOOD was observed. Possibly a H.Q. is at G.35.c.5.l.

Divisional Headquarters 11th March, 1917.

Reference: Sheets 57c.SW 1 and 57c.SW 3

relieved in he right sector of the Divisional Front by the Eighth Australian Infantry Brigade (5th Australian Division) on the nights of the 11th/12th and 12th/13th March. On the same nights the Fifth Australian Infantry Brigade will relieve the Seventh Australian Infantry gade in the left sector.

The relief will be carried out in accordance

with the attached Table of Reliefs.

(b) On relief the Seventh Australian Infantry Brigade will be in Divisional Reserve and will be located in camps in the BECOURT area with one Battalion at ACID DROP CAMP.

- Details of the reliefs will be arranged mutually between Brigade Commanders, subject to the following:
 - (a) The relief is to be completed by 8 am on 13th instant.
- (b) Command of Brigade Sectors will be transferred on completion of relief, but G.O's.C of relieved Brigades will not leave Brigade Headquarters until no longer required by the incoming Brigadiers.
 - (c) Two sections (8 guns) of the Fifth Aust.

 Machine Gun Company will remain at the disposal of the G.O.C. 5th Australian Division temporarily for duty on the Intermediate line.
 - (d) Stokes Mortars will be handed over in situ in exchange for a similar number to be taken over by the Seventh Australian Infantry Brigade at BAZENTIN LE PETIT (Camp S.6 central) on the 13th instant.
 - and trenches in the particular sector, air photographs, log books, Battalion armunition and bomb dumps, and all documents likely to be of value, will be handed over and receipts obtained. Copies of receipts will be forwarded to D.H.Q. within 48 hours of completion of relief. Orders regarding the handing over of Brigade dumps will be issued by "Q" of Division.
 - will be at the disposal of the 5th Australian Division from 6 p.m. on the evening of the 11th instant. It will also be available for the use of the Fifth Australian Infantry Brigade until completion of the relief.

- (a) The HIGH WOOD POIERES riage is still under view from the enemy's position. No troops in formed bodies will cross this ridge before 6.30 p.m. except under cover of mist or fog.
 - (b) Distances of 200 yards between Battalions and 100 yards between Companies will be maintained.
- On completion of the reliefs the boundary be-6. tween the Second and the Fifth Australian Divisions will be: -

RED CUT and BLUE CUT (inclusive to Second Australian Division) southwards to point M. 18. c. 0.3, thence due south along co-ordinate line to present boundary at M. 36.a.O.O, thence along present boundary.

7. The Second A.F.A.Brigade at present covering the front of the Fifth Australian Infantry Brigade will be transferred to the tactical control of the G.O.C. Fifth Australian Division at 8 a.m. on 13th March.

> Ammunition on charge of this Brigade will be transferred with it, Anzac Form FA being used, after which its ammunition expenditure will be accounted for by the Fifth Australian Divisional Artillery.

- 8. The A.D.M.S. will arrange to make the necessary adjustment in the disposition of Advanced Dressing Stations etc. in consultation with the A.D.M.S., Fifth Australian Division.
- 9. The C.R.E. will arrange to hand over all R.E. work at present being carried out in the Right Brigade Sector to the C.R.E. Fifth Australian Division.
- 10. The command of the Right Brigade Sector will be handed over to the G.O.C., Fifth Australian Division at 8 a.m. on 13th March.

SECOND AUSTRALIAN DIVISION INTELLIGENCE SUBLARY.

From 6 a.m. 11th. March to 6 a.m. 12th. March, 1917.

NOTE: - Not to be taken into front line trenches.

OUR OPERATIONS. Artillery. The 4.5" Howitzers fired on the trench junctions throughout the front line and support systems. At 12 noon a 20minute intense bombardment of the enemy front line system was carried out. A hostile batteryat H. 20. a. 9. 1, reported by aeroplane, was en. gaged at 4 pene by our 4.5" hows. Registrations were obtained on the wire and other important points. During the day 5104 rounds 18-pr. were fired to cut wire; 19 different lanes were dealt with as follows: - G.36.c.65.35, G.36.c.50.35, G.36. c.3.3, G.36.c.10.25, G.36.c.0.2, G.35.d.90.15, G.35.d.8.1, G.35.d.7.1, G. 35.d. 60.05, G. 35.d. 5.0, G. 35.d. 4.0, M. 5.b. 3.9, G. 36.c. 00.55, M. 4.b. 6.5, M.4.b.75.55, M.4.b.6.7, M.4.b.7.7, M.5.a.4.6, M.5.a.95.80. Where locations are underlined it is claimed that the wire has been cut. At M. 4. b. 6. 5, M. 4. b. 75. 55, G. 26. c. 3. 3, G. 36. c. 10. 25, G. 36. c. 0. 2, G. 35. d. 10.15 and M.4.b.6.7, infantry efficers expressed themselves as satisfied that lanes had been cleared. In several places it has not been found possible to secure observation of the wire, particularly on the 2nd line. During the day hostile aircraft interfered to a large extent with the wirecutting. Trench Mortars. Medium T.Ms., between 3.30 pm and 4.30 pm, fired 32 rounds at the wire at M. 4. b. 2. 4 and M. 4. b. 45. 40, at both of which places it has been cut. At 3 am they also fired 22 rounds in cutting wire at G. 36.d.8.0 and G. 36.d.7.0. Machine Guns. Indirect fire over enemy's lines and approaches was carried out. Occasional bursts were fired into LOUPART WOOD to check enemy snipers and observation. At daybreak an enemy working party was fired on and 12 casualties inflicted. Between 2 am and 4 am LOUPART WOOD and approaches were swept with M.G. fire as an enemy relief was expected to take place at that time. Patrols. A patrol moving along BEAULENCOURT RD., N.8.b., saw a party salving wire from the dump previously reported. Patrols reported an

enemy listening post at N. 2. b. 2. 2. Work was also heard going on in rear of the BRICKFIELD.

patrol heard movement in enemy trench in G. 36.c. - patrol examined enemy wire in vicinity of M. 5. b. 5.8 and found it badly d-maged in places. A M.G. was firing from G.35.d.5.0. A patrol observed wire to be cut in several places in the vicinity of G. 35, d, 3, 2 and G. 36.c. 2.3. Gaps 5' to 10' wide were seen. A patrol moved from G.36.c.6.2 along wire to G.36.d.62.2. It reported that wire was damaged at several points but not sufficiently to allow ingress. About 8 Germans were seen at work on wire at G. 36.d. 61.1. A M.G. fired from approx. G. 36.c. 9.41. A patrol saw a party of 7 men at work behind the wire in the salient at G.36.d. A patrol reported LAYTON ALLEY (M.5.b.) near enery line, in bad condition although recently used. Wire at junction is much broken by our artillery fire.

Enemy was very much on the alert during the night and used a great number of flares.

Snipers. Our snipers report one enery casualty. Works. On the right front line trench was widened and deepened. Exisving wire was strengthened. In the centre, posts at M. 5. b. $3\frac{1}{2}$. 5, M. 6. a. $3\frac{1}{2}$. 7, M. 6. b. $3\frac{1}{2}$. 7, N. 1. a. $3\frac{1}{2}$. 6

were completed to an average depth of

5'6"and connected to an average aepth of 3' with the exception of about 25 yards at about L.6.a.7.7.

APPENDIX XVa

Of the left, MALT TR. was cleaned out. It had previously been blown in at many places. 50 yds. single corkscrew wire was put out in front of posts. From trench at M.5.a.l. l. l. a sap was dug for6 0 yds. 3'6" deep and 3' wide at top. Posts were improved.


Aircraft. Our planes were very active. One landed at M.24.d.7.8 with engine trouble and a few bullet heles through the propellor. Pilot was slightly wounded. One fell in the vicinity of the BUTTE and one at M.10.c. A fourth one was reported to have fallen, but this has not been verified.


Miscellaneous. The tree near LUISENHOF FARM was cut down last night.

Trench Mortars. Salvoes were fired from enemy T.Ms. in H.32.c. and N. 2.a. during the day and night. About 250 bombs fell during the 24 hours. A T.M. is suspected at N.2.a.7.7. Machine Guns. Enemy M.Gs. fired occasional bursts over our lines. were active when any movement was noticed. M.Gs. are suspected at G. 35.d.5.1., G. 36.c.9.42. and L. 5.b. 1.8. Defences. Wire is damaged in front of salient in G.36.d. Movement. 2 Germans were seen to, pass through wire at H.31.d.50.65. and idsappeared at about H.31.d.3.2. Movement was seen in WARLE COURT TRENCH. At 6.12 a.m. 8 men were seen at G.34.a.1.1. A party appears there regularly every morning. Considerable rovernet was noticed in LOUPART TRENCH throughout the day. Parties going along both ways in road in G.9.d.appear to enter dugout at G.9.d.5.4. and then move on again. Movement was observed on roadsat G. 2. c. 5. 9., G. 3. c. 1. 3., G. 9. c. 8. 2, G. 9. d. 5. 4. The road in G. 9.c. and d. appears much used. Aircraft. Enemy planes were active. One was driven down behind LOUPART WOOD. Signals. At 5 p.m. chemy dropped a shell into his own wire. Blue flares were put up and range lengthened. Mismellaneous. At 1 p.m. yestprday a fire which lasted several hours was observed in direction of GREVILLERS. At 2.15 a.m. loud explosions were heard in direction of LOUPART WOOD (G.3 5.c.) lasting about 30 seconds. Another explosion in direction of GREVILLERS followed almost immediately. During the night large clouds of white smoke were observed along energy lines opposite our left sector and sounds of muffled explosions were heard. At 4 a.m. explosions were heard in both the suspected strong points at G.35.c.4.2. and M.4.b.1.7. Flares had been sent up from these points during the night. House at G. 2.d. 3.9. near LONG LOGEAST WOOD appears much used and in good condition.

From 6 a.m. 12th March to 6 a.m. 13th March, 1917.

NOTE: - Not to be taken into front line trenches.

OUR OPBATIONS. Artillery. At 4.25 pm. a 20-minutes intense bomourdment of the wire in front line was carried out. On the Right Sector the wire in front of TILL TR. received special attention. A party of men observed at G.35.d. 95.60 at 11 am. was fired on and dispersed. Registrations Were carried out during the day. During the day 4350 rounds were fired on the wire protecting the enemy front system in the following localities :- M.5.b.00.85, M.5.a.95.80, M. 5.a. 75.71, G. 35.c. 3.8, G. 36.c. 60.65, G. 36.c. 45.60, G. 36.c. 3.6, G. 36.c. 15.35, G.36.c.00.55, G.35.d.8.6, M.4.b.8.6, M.4.b.9.6, M.5.a.5.7, M.5.a. 6. At all these points it is reported that lanes have been made, except the two last-named, where it is stated that, though the wire has been removed, knife-rests still remain. The wire all along the front of trench G.35.c.l.3 to 4.35.c.5.8 has been badly damaged by shell fire. Machine Guns. During the afternoon small parties in G.31.a. were fired Indirect fire was maintained on enemy approaches until 2 am. Patrols - Operations. Owing to observation of flares falling short on enemy's line, it was suspected that the enemy had evacuated the front line trenches. Patrols went forward. At 11.50 pm., patrols entered WARLENCOURT TR. at G.35.d.8.2 and at G.35.d.3.0. The strong point at latter place had been blown up. There were no signs that the enemy was in occupation of the trench. Parties were pushed out and by 2 am. WARLENCOURT TR. was occupied. GREVILLERS TR. was then occupied and patrols pushed forward to the line H.31.a.1.5, QUARRY (G.36.a.) FONDS BERTIN (G.29.d.), corner of wood G.35.a.4.4. South-East corner of LOUPART WOOD was found unoccupied. By 6 a.r. posts had been established on this line and patrols went on into GREVILLERS. No opposition was met with. Hostile M.G. fire and sniping was heavy from the East (H.32), also from G. 24.d. and H. 19.c. About 6 a.m. enery shelled WARLENCOURT & GREVILLERS LINE from direction of DAPAUNE. One prisoner was taken in LAYTON ALLEY, G. 5. b. 2. 9.


Artillery. Energy artillery was very active during the day over the whole of the front, but slackened towards dusk. LE SARS CUTTING (M.16.c.) was shelled throughout the day by 15 cm.



SECOND AUSTRALIAN DIVISION

Information obtained from a prisoner of 9th. Coy. 3rd. Bn. 1st Guard Reserve Regt. captured near H.5.b.2.9.

He stated that yesterday afternoon (12th.) 9th. and 10th Coys. ere in LOUPART LINE with not more than 3 line in a Guns. At 4 p.m. prisoners dugout was blown in and six men buried. Two were killed and the prisoner lamed. The other three managed to dig out by 7 p.m. when they, quite unexpectedly, found the trench vacated.

The following information was obtained from prisoner:- 9th. and 10th. Coys. relieved Coys. of End. Battalion on March 7th. One Coy. went to LORCHIES the other to the vicinity of H.26.c. The 12th. Coy. reinforced by part of the 11th. Coy. formed the Rearguard Cor. and was resting at MORCHIES. 3rd Battalion was to have been relieved by the 1st. on 11th. inst. 1st. Battalion was to be relieved by Rearguard Coy. on 14th. which was to hold LOUPART LINE for one or two days to cover retirement of remainder to LOGEAST-BAPAUME TRENCH as front line. On the lith, a message was received that 3rd. Battalion was to hold LOUPART LINE until 14th. inst Evacuation of LOUPART LINE last night came as a surprise. LOGEAST -BAPAUME LINE is not good, and not likely to be held for long. Wire is thick and 4 to 5 metres wide. Switch trench in H.25.a. and H.25.c. is shallow and not likely to be held. Trench H.25.a.30. to H.26.d.2.1. is not completed but wire is good. The trenches in H.33. are not in a good condition although the wire is good. GREVILLERS has never been used for billats or Headquarters. There are no dugouts in the village, only a few reinforced cellars. There are a number of good wells but prisoner thinks they are mined. The prisoner said HINDENBURG LINE (SIEGFRIED STELLUNG) is a very formidable obstacle with conference dugouts. The wire is not more than 15 to 20 metres broad and about 1 to 2 metres high. During December Russian prisoners were working on it, and since then French civilians. The road from BAPAUME to FREE ICOURT is fairly good up to Brickfields. From there it is deeply nutted owing to artillery traffic and has not recently been repaired.

A fortnight ago two batteries of 10.5 cm. guns were removed from road junction in G.35.b. owing to our shelling. Dugouts in WARLENCOURT had been prepared for blowing up but our occupation was too rapid.

A rumour was in circulation to the effect th t the Division was to be relieved by Bavarians.
