

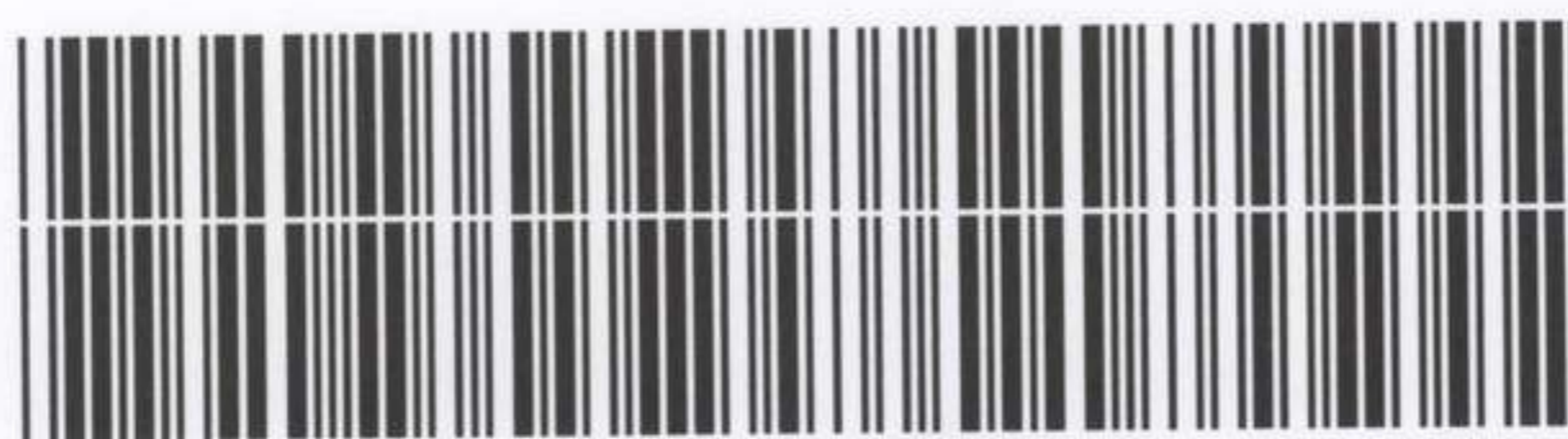

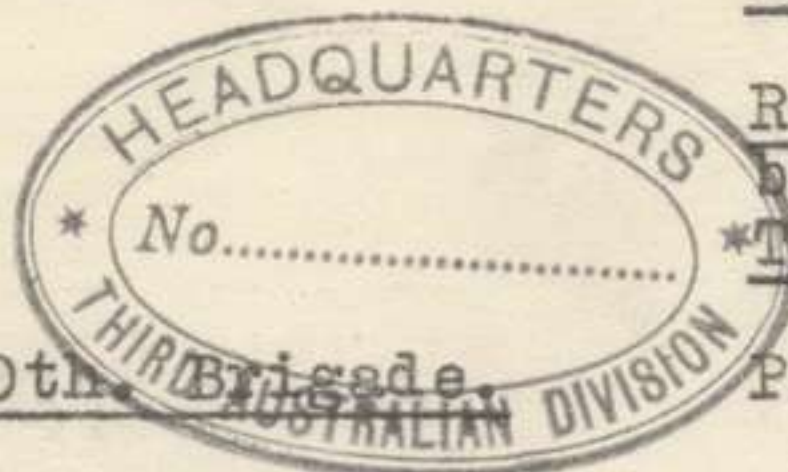

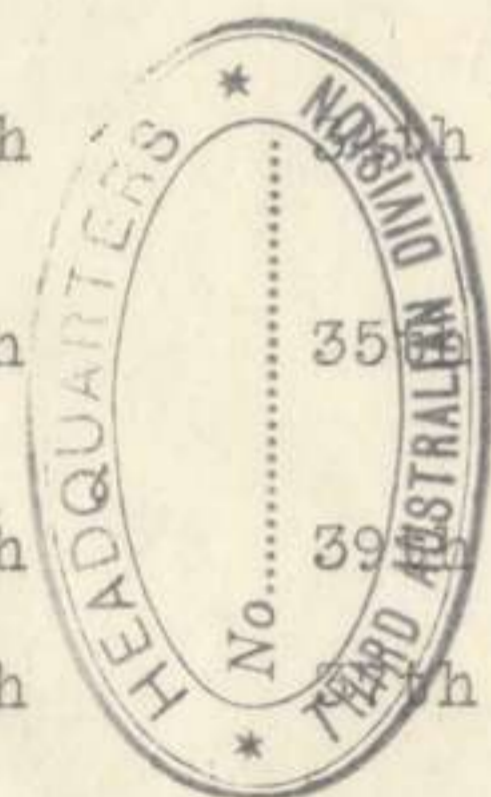

GENERAL STAFF CIRCULAR No. 56A.

The following is an extract from 2nd. ANZAC letter
No. G. 118/-/140 of 4th. September, 1917. -

"During a recent attack by the enemy with his new Mustard (H 3) Gas, a disproportionately large number of casualties was sustained by specialists, who, not having been sufficiently trained in wearing the Small Box Respirator at night, and, owing to the unaccustomed and slight smell of the new gas, carried out their duties without respirators on at all, or with only the nose-clip and mouth-piece adjusted.

All these cases became casualties later on, owing to the marked delay action of the new gas.

Divisions in rest will arrange for their troops to receive as much instruction and practice as possible in the wearing of the Small Box Respirator in the dark, during the performance of as varied duties as possible.

All arms, especially those engaged in specialists duties, e.g., machine gunners, telephonists, linesmen, gun crews, etc., will receive at least one hour (if possible more) of such practice weekly."

Attention is called to previous General Staff Circulars bearing on this matter and to the vital importance of carrying out the drills ordered therein.

THIRD AUSTRALIAN DIVISION ORDER No. 54.

7th. September, 1917.

1. The Third Australian Divisional Artillery has been allotted temporarily to the 1st ANZAC CORPS, and will move in accordance with instructions given in para 2.

Composition will be as laid down for "Detachments" in O.E/1299 (dated 5rd. March, 1917).

2. March from BILQUIN Area to Wagon Lines (vacated by 1st. Australian Divisional Artillery) staging night 8th/9th. September at ESTREB BLANCHE and night 9th/10th. September at MORBECQUE.

Occupy 280th. and 281st. Brigade positions on night 11th/12th. September, under separate instructions to be issued by the G.O.C., R.A., 1st. ANZAC CORPS.

3. The 207th. Machine Gun Company will accompany the Artillery Column to MORBECQUE. On 10th. September the Company will relieve the 41st. Divisional Machine Gun Company at ABELLE and RENNINGHELST on anti-aircraft defences. Details of defences will be communicated by letter on arrival.

4. Units will march with an interval of 200 yards between Sections, and Sub-sections D.A.C.

GENERAL STAFF CIRCULAR NO. 57 A.

Distribution of Duties to Officers of an Infantry Battalion.

The following distribution of duties to the Officers of a Battalion will be taken into use as a general guide from this date, and will supersede arrangements hitherto in force :-

Battalion Headquarters.

1. Commanding Officer.
2. Senior Major. - responsible for Regimental Institutions, Canteens, Messing, Interior Economy, Cooking and Feeding Arrangements, and all that pertains to the comfort of the personnel. (May have an Officer who is an Accountant, and a Committee to assist). -
Supervises education of Junior Officers and recruits. -
Supervises fitting of clothing, boots, and supplies of necessaries. -
Supervises enforcement of discipline and punishments by Company Commanders. -
Acts in relief of Commanding Officer. -
3. Adjutant. - acts as Staff Officer to C.O., responsible both for "G" and "A" work in the Battalion. Must not be permitted to become a mere "office man". -
4. Assistant Adjutant. - assists Adjutant and relieves him as far as possible of mere routine, but must be given every opportunity to qualify and gain experience of work in the field and on parade.
5. Quartermaster. - Clothing, Equipment, Feeding, Comfort, Housing and Forage. -
6. Transport Officer. - In charge of vehicles, animals and transport personnel and lines. - He is, however, not merely a carrier for the Quartermaster, but must think ahead and constructively in the interests of the Battalion, especially when in the battle zone and in the line. -
7. Signalling Officer. - Responsible for the efficiency and working of the whole of the Battalion communications, including Regimental and Company Signallers, and all signalling equipment; he must work in close touch with Brigade Signal Section. -
8. Bombing Officer. - Responsible for training of Rifle Grenadiers and for general bombing instruction, also for provision of munitions and equipment, and for establishment and maintenance of Battalion munition dumps. -
9. Intelligence Officer. - Collects and collates all information, both by personal observation, and by close touch with troops in front line, snipers, scouts, patrols, and observers. - He must keep au fait with the military situation, and the intelligence reports promulgated from above; must study enemy methods and

action;- must be in liaison with our Artillery and Machine Guns, and with neighboring units in the line. He supervises the distribution of war news and intelligence through the Battalion, and keeps the War Diary. -

10. Lewis Gun Officer. - Acts as technical and tactical specialist as regards training, equipment and maintenance of all Lewis Gun Sections in the Battalion; but does not relieve Platoon Commanders of the direct control of their Lewis Guns and personnel.

11. Sniping Officer. - Selection, supervision and maintenance of the snipers of the Battalion and their equipment. - Must be in constant touch with latest sniping appliances and methods, and must be enterprising in dominating enemy by efficient sniping activity, constantly maintained. -

12. Scouting Officer. - Supervises scout training, and supervises Battalion and Company Scouts; cares for scouting material. -

Companies. 4 Companies each with 6 Officers. - 24 Officers.

Total Battalion. 36 Officers.

NOTES. -

- (a). Company Officers should be allotted to definite Companies and Platoons, and changed as rarely as possible.
- (b). The duties of Sniping and Scouting Officers may sometimes be combined.
- (c). Under many circumstances, the duties of Bombing Officer, Sniping Officer, and of Lewis Gun Officer can be carried out by Officers actually commanding Platoons.
- (d). The Intelligence Officer should be carefully selected, and fully qualified for his important duties. If no competent Subaltern is available, he may be a Major or Captain, provided that another Captain or Subaltern is available to carry out Company duty in his place.
- (e). The Bombing, Lewis Gun, Sniping and Scouting Officers should be attached to definite Platoons. Whenever the Battalion is out of the line or in reserve or rest, they should be given experience in Platoon command so as to be qualified to command a Platoon at any time.
- (f). Specialist Officers are not to exercise executive commands, except as prescribed by the C.O. While they should be employed so as to render all possible assistance to Company Officers, they cannot relieve the latter of their responsibility for the training and efficiency of the Company or Platoon.
- (g). The Specialist Officers are not necessarily attached to or quartered with Battalion Headquarters.

GENERAL STAFF CIRCULAR NO. 59A.

The attached Diagrams "A" and "B", drawn to scale, shew possible methods of arranging a Battalion in order that it may attack roughly on a 600 yard front with a platoon strength of 25 to 30..

Suggestion "A" is that the Battalion should have four Companies deployed on this front, each Company having a frontage of 150 yards. The points about Diagram "A" are as follows :-

(a). The leading wave in one line consisting of one platoon on a Company frontage is strong enough to smother opposition, and shallow enough to keep close up to the barrage and let the moppers up be near the work they will have to do. It also places the leading wave on the Company front under the command of one man, whose one object is to keep close to the barrage. -

(b). It allows for moppers up to be doubly as strong as the leading wave; thus if it is decided to tell off areas, these moppers up can leap-frog among themselves without interfering with the leading wave. -

(c). It allows of half the moppers up being taken to replace the leading wave, and yet of these being sufficient moppers up handy to do the work. -

(d). It allows for one platoon to act as reserve to each Company. -

Diagram "B" shows a Battalion front of 600 yards, divided into three sections of 200 each, a Company being allotted to each of these sections - the Company to attack with three platoons in front and one platoon in reserve, the fourth Company being in Battalion reserve.

It will be seen on referring to the Diagram -

(a). That the moppers up are only equal to the leading wave. -

(b). That the moppers up and leading wave are under the same Platoon Commander, though they have different missions to perform. -

(c). That there is a platoon in reserve which could replace certain moppers up if they had to fill vacancies in the leading wave. -

(d). That there is a Company in Battalion reserve. -

It is thought to be an undoubted advantage to have a Company in Battalion reserve, but on the whole Scheme "B" does not appear to be as flexible, or to have spare parts as handy to their work as in Scheme "A". It has, however, the advantage already quoted, that there is a whole Company in Battalion reserve instead of four different platoons as in Scheme "A".

It will be seen that by either scheme the Division could attack on a 1,200 yard front with two Brigades in line and one in reserve.

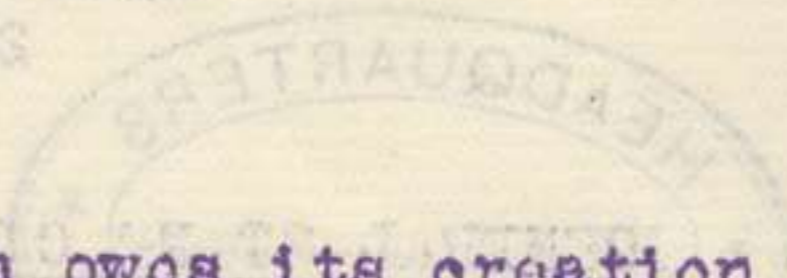

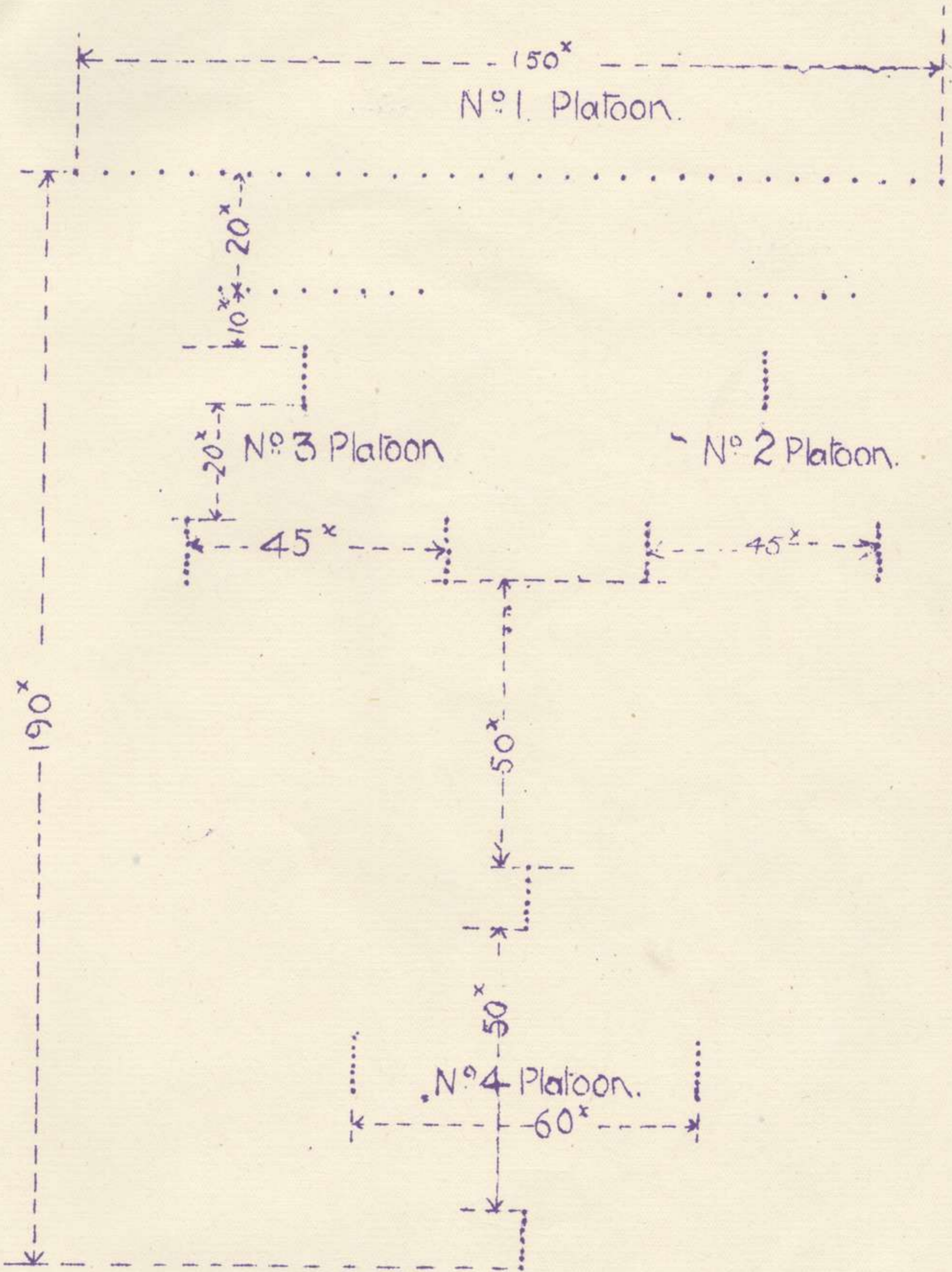

CIRCULAR No. 60A.

PROCEDURE TO BE ADOPTED FOR COLLECTION OF INFORMATION FROM
PRISONERS, DOCUMENTS, ETC.

In the event of operations it will be necessary to arrange strict procedure concerning the collection and forwarding of enemy prisoners and documents. This is especially important, as we must rely mainly on this method to obtain early information concerning enemy counter-attacks.

Increasing stress is laid by Corps and Army on the importance of ensuring that the fullest possible value is derived from these sources of information. Commanding Officers are asked to impress on those under them, the fact that all documents of any sort captured in the enemy lines, or upon prisoners, must be forwarded promptly to Divisional Cage. That papers appear not to be important, or that maps do not appear to have anything on them, are not reasons for not forwarding them. Enemy maps and sketches can be obtained afterwards from Corps in cases where Officers wish to have them, but on no account should they retain documents before Corps Intelligence has seen them.

The practice of using prisoners as carrying parties is strictly against orders. There is no objection to making a batch of prisoners on their way down from the firing line carry something with them, or help carry their wounded down, as required; but it is a different matter to use these prisoners as carrying parties back and forth during the day. There are several reasons against it.

In the first case, these prisoners are badly wanted for interrogation at Division, Corps and Army; and it is a very unsound policy to use as a carrier all day a man who may be able to give valuable evidence towards the location and timing of enemy counter-attacks.

In the second case, German prisoners do not make good carriers; their own Officers often have difficulty in inducing them to go into the firing line these days - our men, if the practice were carried out to any great extent, could not find the difficulty much less.

In the third case, such treatment gives the enemy opportunity to say that we ill-use his prisoners and he will retaliate on our own men whom he captures.

Both prisoners and documents - whether found in the prisoners' tunics, or captured in dugouts in the enemy lines - are urgently wanted at Divisional Cage. Their timely delivery may save many hundreds of lives of our men in the line.

A list of men in each Battalion who can read German will be furnished by Brigades to Divisional Headquarters, and kept up to date from time to time. The ability of men to read a little German, rather than their fluency in speaking the language, is what is required. These men, or some of them, will be told off under Brigade arrangements for searching of dugouts in the enemy lines after the attacking waves have gone over. An N.C.O. should be in charge of them and supervise their activities under Brigade orders. They will search enemy dugouts as thoroughly as possible for maps and papers, collect these in sandbags, and the N.C.O. in charge will arrange for their prompt despatch to Divisional Cage - sending them, where possible, with prisoners' escorts.

The searching of captured Officers and N.C.Os for papers should be done, if practicable, in the forward area; failing that, by the A.P.M.'s police as soon as possible. Officers and N.C.Os will frequently seek to destroy such papers if they are allowed to retain them.

Papers will not be taken from Private soldiers - this is done at the prisoners' cage. In no case will identity disc or paybook (soldbuch) be removed from a prisoner. All ranks should be informed of this.

It is of great importance that strict discipline among prisoners should be maintained by all escorts. Escorts should be impressed with the fact that it is their duty to watch prisoners as well as to bring them in. Escorts, whether of Line Infantry or A.P.M.'s Police, will see that prisoners -

- (a). Are not given food or drink before their arrival at the Divisional Cage.
- (b). Are not allowed to talk to each other, especially when halted, and especially that Officers do not talk to their men. Officers should be separated from the men as soon as possible for this reason, and whenever a batch of prisoners is halted.
- (c). March in proper order and when halted are not allowed to leave their places in the squad.

Prisoners will on no account be interrogated, save in circumstances of great emergency, until they arrive at Divisional Cage. The only departure allowed from this rule is in the case of a Company or Battalion Commander on the spot who is urgently in need of information of tactical importance. In such case he should not delay all prisoners, but should temporarily detain only one or two, and send the remainder on with all speed.

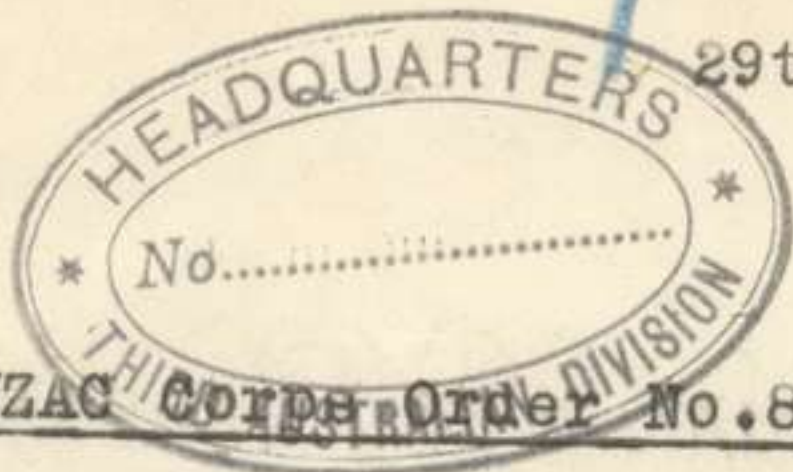

From point where front line crosses YPRES-ROULERS Railway - along YPRES-ROULERS Railway (inclusive to II ANZAC) as far as level Crossing I.10.d.2.2 - thence along YPRES-MENIN Road (common to both Corps) as far as road junction I.8.b.4.5. - along road to MENIN GATE (MENIN GATE inclusive to II ANZAC) - due South to I.8.d.3.7. thence through ST. JACQUES Church - Infantry barracks (inclusive to II ANZAC) - Laundry I.13.a.4.5. (inclusive to ~~I~~ANZAC) - thence along Old Corps Boundary.

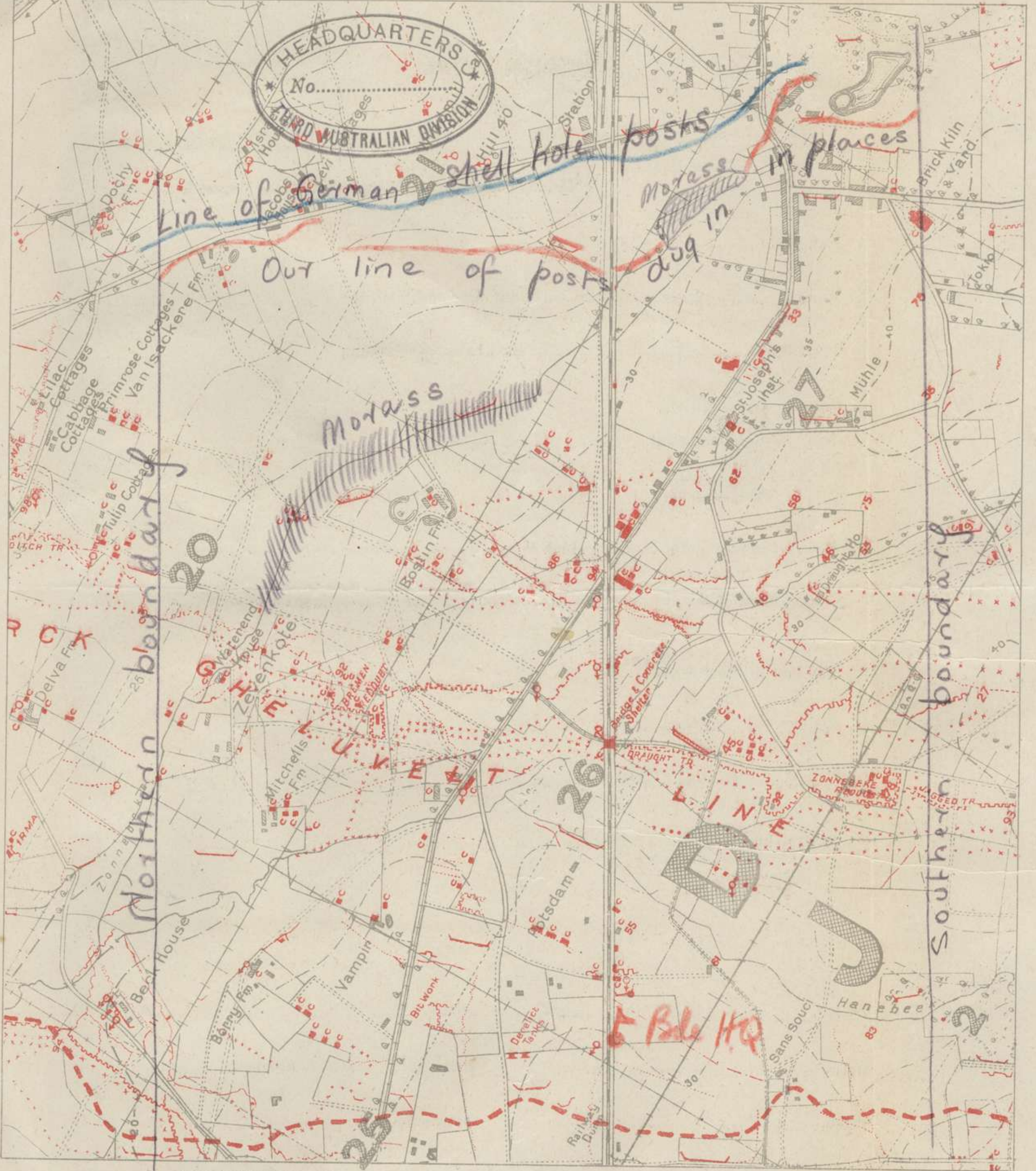

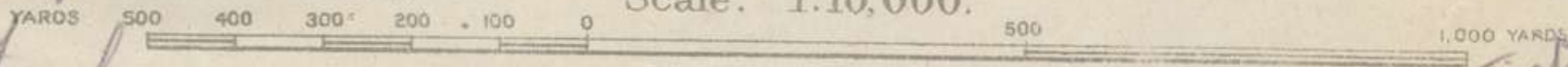
