	June 23rd		<del>On the night of the 23rd inst., a serious outbreak of fire occurred at this Hospital.</del> On the night of the 23rd inst., a serious outbreak of fire occurred at this Hospital, resulting in the complete destruction of the Barrack Warden's Hut, with its contents. At 11.45 p.m. Private Dunlop, 3299, (Orderly) while passing from B21 to B22 heard a noise like a sharp report, followed quickly by a second noise. Following the direction of the noise he found the hut above mentioned to be on fire. At the same time 2089, Private Ford, arrived. Private Dunlop immediately set the Fire Alarm going, asked Ford to go for the Night Corporal while he rushed off and sounded the fire siren. In the meanwhile L/Cpl Condiek and Private Beekwith had run a fire hose out, and were about to <del>make use of</del> begin work on the fire. Within three minutes of the alarm having been given, ample streams of water were playing on the fire, all the men having turned out promptly. Colonel Taylor Young took charge of proceedings, and as the hut in question was doomed, directed the main effort in preventing any spread of the fire to adjoining huts and grounds. No one could have saved the Hospital, but for the fact that the wind was blowing away from the buildings, and the hut involved was the last one on the lee side. They remained on duty till 6 a.m., but in addition I had a special <del>platoon</del> was detailed for duty, which continued patrolling the Hospital until morning. A request was made for arrangements to be made for a Court of Inquiry to be held at an early date. Also that the D.O.R.E. Woolwich (Capt Rowe) be notified. On the day of the 14th., Mr Meiklejohn, in charge of Records, and Colonel Fryar of Eastern Command, with Asst Secretary of Med. Res. Committee checked Records, and found everything satisfactory. <del>Majors</del> June 15th The usual Church services were held. Strict instructions were given as to the disposal of cigarette butts, etc., on account of the inflammable nature of the Hospital buildings, and the dry nature of the grass. Captain J.W.S. McKee, A.A.M.C., reported for duty, and was taken on the Effective Strength from 14.6.19. June 16th Chaplain Rakkelfe reported for duty, and was taken on the Attached Strength from 16.6.19. 11 Cot Cases, 1 Sitting Case, and 2 Trachoma Cases, sent by road to Paddington for embarkation on the Hospital Ship "Ormonde." Sir Joseph Cook, Minister of Marine, visited the Hospital. June 17th S/Nurse A.M. Mowand embarked to Australia, and was struck off the Effective Strength from 2.6.19. June 18th At about 10 p.m. a message was received from the Dartford Police, that a disturbance was taking place between patients of this Hospital, and civilians in the town. Two Officers, the W.O., and some N.C.O.'s proceeded to the scene of disturbance in an Ambulance Car. The trouble had practically finished, and all invalids that could be found in town were collected in car, and returned to Hospital. June 19th In the morning the riot of preceeding evening was reported to the D.M.S., and C.O. was summoned by him to London for conference with A.P.M. in afternoon. As a result 1 N.C.O. in charge of 9 M.P.'s were despatched to Dartford for the evening, and returned to their quarters in London byat 10.15 p.m. train. At 10.45 p.m. news was received from civil police, that a riot was in progress, and that they were collecting our men on the Railway Station. They asked for an Ambulance to be sent for them, which was depatched, W.O Cornish in charge. Later the police asked for more cars which were also sent. The C.O., with another Officer, proceeded to the scene of the trouble in Ford Car. All personnel returning from leave to London were safely got on ambulances at Station, but in the meantime a large body of townsmen had gathered at the corner of Messrs Burrows

DARTFORD	June 19th		(Contd) ..Welcomes works, and armed with stoned and bottles, were waiting to ambush our Ambulances. Each car in turn had to run the gauntlet of a barrage of missiles, but fortunately the only injury inflicted, beyond broken lamps and fittings on cars, was a lacerated and contused wound of foot sustained by one member of the Staff. In addition a patient who had been A.W.L. some days was brought back to Hospital with a fractured clavicle, alleged to have been sustained in a brawl in the Bull Hotel earlier in the evening.	
	June 20th		Captain W.J.Trehwella proceeded for embarkation, and was struck off the Effective Strength from 19.6.19. D.M.S. Office was rung up re riot, but as the D.M.S. was not present, the C.O. communicated directly with General Griffiths, Commandant A.I.F. Headquarters, and as a result General Griffiths paid a visit to the Hospital at 12.45 p.m. accompanied by D.A.P.M. Woolwich. After consultation with C.O., the General decided to place Dartford out of bounds to all ranks, and to send an Officer's picket of 30 men to Dartford from Provost Corps. Later in the day General Griffiths rang up C.O., and stated, that he had information from Inspector of Police that a very serious riot was contemplated on Saturday night, the 21st inst, and that Provost Forces in Dartford would be increased to 2 Officers and 50 Other Ranks. He also gave orders that no man was to enter Dartford except for the Railway Station, and that, only with a pass signed by C.O., between the hours of 6 a.m. and 7 p.m. At 4 p.m. a visit was received from D.A.P.M. Woolwich, under whose provost area Dartford falls, who stated that H.Q., Eastern Command, were much concerned at the disturbance. Details of the riot, and arrangements to prevent further trouble, were explained to him, and he in turn, promised any assistance that he could render.	
	June 21st		Extract from Routine Orders.- "Until further notice Dartford Township, with the exception of the Railway Station, is strictly out of bounds to all patients and members of Staff. The Railway Station is out of Bounds from 7 p.m. to 5 a.m. General Griffiths, accompanied by Lieut-Colonel Jackson, Provost Marshal, visited the Hospital at 8.30 p.m. All was reported quiet in the town during the night by the police. Lieut Chapman and band of 37 Other Ranks from 47th Quota reported for temporary duty and played over week end.	
	June 22nd		The usual Church Services were held. Band played between ramps at 3.25 p.m. and 7.30 p.m. Chaplain-Major Gault reported from Headquarters for purposes of organising entertainments during period that Dartford is out of bounds.

The conditions which have been threatening for some time between the civilian population and the Hospital became acute and culminated in very grave disturbances, fortunately without serious casualties, only one inmate of the Hospital having been injured. It was deemed advisable to have Dartford placed out of bounds and this was immediately done. No one of any rank was permitted to enter the town, and only when holding a Pass could they proceed to the Railway Station. All traffic was prohibited after 7.p.m. and this now has only been relaxed to the extent that up till 6.p.m. all ranks may frequent Dartford, while twice a week passes are given to return by a later train, and these trains are met by Motor Transport. It is but right to place on record that in my considered opinion these disturbances need not have occurred, had the civilian police been alive to the situation and had they kept the civil population under control.



Continued). That along with the flagrant disregard of the liquor laws is entirely the cause of the trouble. No attempt is made to punish publicans who supply alcohol to Hospital patients.

Following upon the restriction of liberty of Hospital inmates a regular system of ~~Hospital~~ Amusements was instituted and has been continued ever since the original outbreak. It is a matter for congratulation that these amusements, Bands, Cinema entertainments, Concerts, Billiard Tournaments, Whist and Euchre Parties, as well as the weekly dances, have kept the place going without even any suspicion of trouble, and it is hoped that with the sailing of the next Hospital Ship all anxiety will be at an end.

There was a serious outbreak of fire on the evening of June 23rd, resulting in complete destruction of the Barrack Wardens store, with all its contents. Particulars of this have already been forwarded in a separate report.

Fortunately, immediately after assuming command my attention was first directed to fire preventing appliances, all these had been thoroughly tested and so were in excellent order on the occasion of the fire. Another good thing was that I had just succeeded in having all the grass around the huts cut and consequently that menace had been removed.

Delay in providing shipping accommodation is regrettable; were this not so, but few patients would now be remaining in Hospital.

Since my arrival I have had the Surgical Stores very thoroughly checked and arranged. All surplus stock has been returned to the Base Medical Stores and thus when the time comes to close down, that Department will be in a position for speedy disposal.

The Quarter Masters Department cannot be too highly spoken of. Captain Oxley has all branches in excellent order, and his staff do their work in a most creditable manner.

Some difficulty occurred by an almost complete march out of the Orderly Room Staff, but that condition has gradually been overcome. and now everything is working well under Temporary Staff/Sergeant McGlashan.

All the Officers have done their work well, the only trouble being that M.O's do not sufficiently realise the importance of keeping their wards empty. This is a difficulty I have almost invariably found to exist.

The nursing staff has done its work well, especially considering the very frequent changes which have taken place during the month owing to the making up of boat rolls.

REPORT OF MEDICAL DIVISION FOR JUNE, 1919.  
-----

The number of patients admitted to this Division was 181. Of these a number came from France, and had been in Hospital there several weeks or months with influenza and its complications.

There were also cases of influenza and broncho-pneumonia admitted directly to this Hospital, or transferred from other Hospitals in England.

Several cases of malaria were seen. In most, the disease had been contracted in Egypt or Palestine, but in one patient it seems likely that the disease was acquired in England.

In the course of the month two cases of measles occurred. When the first was diagnosed the ward the patient was in was isolated. Soon after this ward was re-opened another case occurred in another ward, and the latter is still isolated. This has greatly retarded the disposal of patients. Two cases of pulmonary tuberculosis were admitted, and in addition, six others have been under treatment throughout the month.

A Ward for sick sisters was opened, and three patients were received. One of them is a Medical case. Of the other cases under treatment there was nothing special to report. The health of the Sisters was very good. Large numbers have been living in the Hospital, but very few have been sick.

Many Sisters were boarded prior to returning to Australia. Only three orderlies were admitted to Hospital.

There were two deaths, one from carcinoma of the pancreas, and the other from pneumonia.

In consequence small deficiencies in various items were discovered; these, however, were, in my opinion, to be regarded as the result of fair usage in consideration of the fact that this Hospital has been working at high pressure, almost without intermission, during the last 2½ years.

I have therefore much satisfaction in reporting that the Medical and Surgical Stores Dept. is now established on the firm basis essential for its smooth running until the final closing down of the Hospital.

On the 13th June, 1919, I took over from No 958, Sergt A.C. Paterson of the A.M.T.S. the following:- Five Napier Ambulances, a Commer Lorry, a Garford Truck, and a Ford Car. The last mentioned has since been replaced by a Leon Bollee Touring Car.

The above mentioned cars were found to be in fair condition, with the exception of one Napier Ambulance which was off the road pending the receipt of twin wheels from the A.M.T.S. Workshop, Chelsea.

In addition to the cars I am also responsible for the Expendable Stores on hand. From experience gained of the work of this Hospital, I find that the fleet here is adequate to cope with the transport work necessary.

Herewith report on the work of the Quartermasters Section of this Hospital for the month ending, June 1919 as follows:-

PACK STORE.

228 Kits were taken into Stores, and 344 issued during the month, this making a total received since the Hospital took over at Dartford, 65146.

CLOTHING STORE.

Approximately 574 Q.I.Forms were compiled and the same number of patients equipped, they receiving 4422 articles averaging 19 for each patient. The number of articles received into Store during the month was 2059.

LINEN STORE.

The number of articles checked and washed by the Laundry was 26212.

COAL.

The approximate consumption of Coal for the month was 400tons.
